
To reach the dump, drive six miles west of the city on the Big Lake Highway and turn right on a caliche road and drive for about one mile.

During the council's meeting last week. aldermen decided to give a reward to anyone giving information leading to the arrest and conviction of anyone dumping illegally.

According to Texas State law, anyone dumping or otherwise disposing of "trash, junk garbage, refuse, unsightly matter of other solid waste on public highways, right-of-ways on public or private property...without written consent of the owner, his agent or the public official in charge thereof shall be conviction shall be fined not less than \$15 nor more than \$200. Every law enforcement officer of this state and its subdivisions shall have the authority to enforce the provisions of this act." Anyone charged with this misdemeanor would be charged in the justice of the peace court. Also during the meeting last week,

aldermen, city secretary Carolyn Mayo and City Works foreman Hal Whitten discussed the purchase of dumpsters to be used in the city, with Don Foard, representative of Pak-Mor Company of San Antonio which supplies trash trucks. Foard told the council the barrels residents now use are being banned by OSHA and should be removed. He said the dumpsters would cost \$250 each and could be shared by four families.

Forad said with the dumpsters and the proper trash truck, it would take the city's crew only a day and a half to pick up the entire town where it

is now taking them five days. He added that the dumpsters would last for about 20 years, and could not be turned over by dogs and would not collect water during rains.

Land, Building, Roads **Discussed By Court**

Several items were discussed during the Commissioners Court Monday, including school land in Gaines County, overtime for road employees, the new law enforcement center, and the sale of two acres of land.

Architects representing Atkinson and Atkinson met with the court to present final plans for the law enforcement center. The court reviewed the plans and is making plans for advertising for bids in the near future.

Comissioner Joe Christian noted that several roads should be paved but the work needed to be done shortly after moisture had fallen. He added that a lot of work could be done on Saturday if rain had fallen on Friday and asked if the

court would authorize employees to work on grading roads on Saturdays if it looked like they would dry out by Monday. The Court agreed to pay employees overtime, but only on the stipulation that the work had to be done on that Saturday and if the commissioner using the equipment

Those wishing to file on the hospital district board must present a petition with ten legally qualified voters to the secretary of the Board of Directors, Peters, by March 11. Peters office is in Meadors - Peters Agency across from the Courthouse.

There will be four county positions open during the 1980 election. sheriff, tax assessor-collector and commissioners of precincts one and three. Presently those positions are held by Orval Edmiston, Dorothy Evans, Richard Jones and Joe Christian, respectively. Anyone wishing to run for any of these offices has to file before Feb. 4 with Dick Preston.

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
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

As a small business person I've often thought about trying to sell my products to the Federal Government. Do you have any tips on how I might go about it

Uncle Sam is the world's biggest buyer. Military and civilian agencies buy everything from complex space vehicles to paper clips and also buy a wide variety of services--from janitorial help to technical studies. The Federal Government also contracts for construction projects, including housing, offices, warehouses, bridges and dams. It buys from giant corporations and small businesses like your own. In fact, under President Carter the government has set up special programs to buy more from small firms.

A small firm wanting to sell to Uncle Sam must get its name on appropriate lists of bidders. Even before that, you must find out which agencies buy what goods or services. A good source for this information is the SmallBusiness Administration's publication called "U.S. Government Purchasing Sales and Directory.'
