Eagles Bomb Iraan Braves For First Win

Tangle With Old Rival Sonora Friday

Coach Johnny Clawson of the Eagles has only one thing to say about his encounter with the Sonora Broncos Friday night, "we can play with them."

Sonora, who rumbled past the district 9-AA pre season favorite, Junction, 27-6 last Friday, haven't played the Eagles since

1975 in regulation play. At the end of the last outing the Eagles fell to the Broncos by 53-12 tally. this game renews a rivalry that dates far back into the past and until seven years ago when Sonora was a member of the old District 9-A

The last time the Eagles met the Broncos in a dis-

trict game was in 1973. It was the last District game of the season and the outcome would name the district champion. At the end of the fourth quarter Eldorado came from behind to take the district title on 24-22 score.

Well Coach Clawson expects to see the same type of excitement this Friday

night. "We don't plan to anything special except play our kind of football, and try to force the Broncos into making mistakes. We have one of the best groups of receivers around," added Clawson.

If anything Coach Jerry Hopkins of the Broncos whould be worried about the Eagle passing attack. Behind the arm of quarterback Keith McCormack, the Eagles ground out 219 yards via the airways last week on 15 completions of 19 passes with no intercep-

"Keith had a spectacular night last week. Throwing five scoring strikes, and running two more, he figured in on every point we scored." But you can't give all the credit to the quarterback, McCormack probably is well aware and thankful for the outstanding pass protection he has been receiving from the Eagles offensive line. "We have a truly outstanding offensive line from tackle to tackle," added Clawson.

Members of that offensive

line are center Whit Paxton a Junior, Wesley Wilson and Rojelio Adame at the tackles, both seniors, senior Joel Robledo and Junior Mark Wallis at the guard positions.

Clawson adds that the Eagles still haven't really goten fired up for a game, but he also believes that this weeks game will do almost everything to innovate his players. "We still haven't matched our defensive effort against Brady in our first scrimmage. We still haven't mastered stopping the 'big play' that most teams get in a game. Sonora will be the toughest team we play this season, and their well coached, but we can play with them."

Early Miscue Fails To Thwart Eagle Victory

The Iraan Braves were on the scoreboard first, capitalizing on an early Eagle error, but this was not reminiscent of the final score and depth of play exhibited by the Eldorado Eagles in their 46-20 upending of the Braves last Friday evening.

On the very first play of the game, quarterback Keith McCormack was stripped of the ball and the Braves recovered at the Eagle 27 yard line. Seven plays later, the Braves struck paydirt behind a four yard run of Joe Sconiers. The PAT failed.

The Eagles were unable to move the ball on their first possession and were forced to punt the ball away, only to find the ball back in their hands again as Rojelio Adame recovedred a fumble on the Eagle 48 yard line.

This time the Eagles were quick to sport their offensive potential. Mc¶ Cormack struck flanker Ed Willoughby again for six yards, added ten rushing, and struck Willoughby again at the two yard line with a spectacular reception. On the next play, McCormack went over from the two to tie the game at 6-6. Eddie Montalvo put the Eagles ahead with the PAT and the Eagles held and extended their lead the rest of the evening.

The Eagle second scoring drive started at the Iraan 24 yard line after Mike Griffith recovered a Brave fumble. It took the Eagles only two plays to score with McCormack

going in for the score on an 18 yard run from his quarterback position. Montalvo added the PAT, and with 8:11 left in the first half the Eagles no lead 14-6.

Once again the Eagles found themselves in good field position after Wesley Wilson blocked an Iraan punt, and the Eagles took over at the Brave 27 yard line. This time it took McCormack only one play to add six points to the scoreboard tally as he lofted a 27 yard TD pass to Willoughby. Montalvo added the PAT and ther Eagles lead 21-6 with

6:49 left in the half.

A tough Eagle defense stopped the Braves as they drove deep into Eagle territory before losing the ball

The Eagles took over at their own 24 yard line and slowly grounded out some offensive yardage while run-

ning the clock out.

The Braves came out storming once again, scoring on their first possession of the second half, going 59 yards in 11 plays, with Hill going in from the nine yard line. Hill added the two-point conversion, trimming the Eagle lead to 21-14.

The Eagles once again were unable to operate offensively on their first possession, only to have to punt the ball away. But minfortune once again plagued the Braves, as Brad Thomas recovered a loose fumble at the Iraan 41 yard line.

Quickly McCormack added six more points to the scoreboard on the second play of the drive, tossing a 35 yard aerial to Tommy Martinez. Montalvo added the PAT and the Eagles lead 28-14 with 6:15 left in the third stanza.

Two plays later, the Braves added their third and final score for the evening on a two yard run by Hill. The PAT failed.

The Eagles received the ball on their own 45 yard line on the kickoff. Nine plays later McCormack threw yet another TD pass. This time a five yard strike to Griffith. The PAT failed, and the Eagles lead 34-20 with 2:47 left in the third period of play.

The ensuing kickoff was filled with excitement as Hill took the ball down the right sideline for a 76 yard return and score, only to have it nullified by a climing penalty.

The opening of the fourth quarter found the Eagles with the ball in excellent field position once again. On the third play from scrimmage McCormack struck fullback Eddie Montalyo on a 19 yard TD pass. The conversion failed, and the Eagles strengthened their lead to 40-20 with 10:56 left in the game.

The Eagles once again capitalized on Brave mistakes, recovering the football on the Brave 27 yard line. McCormack added another six points with two completed passes, the latter being a 19 yd TD strike to Griffith. The conversion failed and the Eagles had posted a 46-20 score.







Schleicher County rated 113 in the state in production. A total of \$4,394,637 were made in royalty payments in the county, with a total of \$2,303,961 paid in state production taxes.





BRIEF EXPLANATORY STATEMENTS

Senate Joint Resolution 35 proposes a constitutional amendment that would authorize the Legislature to permit banks to establish and operate unmanned teller machines within the county or city where the banks are located and to share the use of teller machines on a basis consistent with antitrust laws, if it finds such operation will serve the convenience of the public. The Legislature has already passed enabling legislation (H.B. 1510) for this proposed amendment.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:

"The constitutional amendment permitting the legislature to authorize banks to use unmanned teller machines within the county or the city of their domicile on a shared basis to serve the public convenience."

PROPOSITION NO. 2 ON THE BALLOT

House Joint Resolution 97 proposes a constitutional amendment that would grant the State and the accused the right to an interlocutory appeal from the following trial court rulings in criminal cases: pretrial rulings on the constitutionality of a statute; on a motion to quash, dismiss, or set aside an indictment; and on a motion to suppress evidence.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows: constitutional "The

amendment authorizing appeal of certain pre trial rulings of a trial court in a criminal case by either the state or the accused."

PROPOSITION NO. 3 ON THE BALLOT

House Joint Resolution 98 proposes a constitutional amendment that would require a single appraisal of all property subject to ad valorem taxation and would provide for a single board of equalization within each county. constitutional amendment to authorize bingo games on a local option election basis if the games are conducted by a church, synagogue, religious society, volunteer fire department, nonprofit veterans organization, fraternal organization, or nonprofit organization supporting medical research or treatment programs and if the proceeds are to be spent in Texas for charitable purposes of the organizations."

"The constitutional amendment to change the name of the Courts of Civil Appeals and the names and qualifications of the justices of the Supreme Court and to prescribe the jurisdiction and authority of the appellate courts."

House Joint Resolution

54 proposes a constitution-

al amendment which defines separate property owned by either spouse as all property, both real and personal, of a spouse owned or claimed before marriage, and that acquired afterward by gift, devise or descent. Persons about to marry and spouses, without the intent to defraud pre-exist. ing creditors, may by written instrument from time to time partition between themselves all or part of their property. Spouses may exchange a community interest property owned or to be acquired for a community interest in other community property. The amendment would allow spouses to agree in writing that income or property arising from any separate property is to be separate property rather than as community property as it would be in the absence of an agreement. The amendment proposes that a gift from one spouse to another is presumed to include all income or property deriving from such




