Local Filing Deadlines Are Repeated; Several Persons Are Entering Races

Filing deadlines for four local governmental bodies are quickly nearing, and several persons have announced their candidacy for the open positions on the County Commissioners Court and School board.

The deadline for the school board is 4 p.m. March 5, instead of Feb. 6, as previously reported. Open positions

are now held by Lynn Meador and Billy Williams. Williams has filed for re-election. Filing should be done at the school superintendent's office.

Deadline for the city elections are 5 p.m. March 5, with open seats now being held by Vida Mercer, Bobby Sykes and Ray Lewis Ballew. Mrs.

Mercer has announced she is not a candidate for re-election. Filing for the city council should be done at the City Hall.

Four positions on the hospital board directors will be open this year. They are presently held by Robert W. Page, E.C. "Pete" Peters, Mike Moore and Curtis Andrews.

Anyone wishing to file on the hospital board must present a petition with ten legally qualified voters to the secretary of the board of directors, who is Peters, by march 11. His office is located in Meadors-Peters Agency across from the courthouse.

There will be five county positions open during the 1980 election, sheriff, tax assessor-collector, county attorney and commissioners of precinct one and three. Filing deadline for county races is Monday. Sheriff Orval Edmiston and tax

assessor-collector Dorothy Evans have announced they will be running for re-election. For precinct one, candidates are Billy Gene Edmiston and Paul Page Jr. Commissioner Richard Jones has announced he is not formally seeking re-election but voters may write his name in if they so desire.

In the precinct three race, candidates are Prissy Paxton and C.D. "Charlie" Kellogg. (See related story this page). Commissioner Joe Muller Christian has not made any announcement.

Those wishing to file for county offices should contact Dick Preston, county Democratic chairman. However, Preston will be out of town beginning Sunday. Applications should be mailed to him, postmarked Feb. 4, or obtained or given to Curtis Andrews at Ratliff Insurance on South Main.

Whitten Injured In Accident

Sam A. Whitten, a well-known resident of Eldorado, was severely injured in a gas well explosion Sunday. The explosion knocked him across the location and into a pickup.

He was taken to Schleicher County Medical Center and later transferred to St. John's Hospital in San Angelo. He has a broken neck but reported not to have any paralysis.

Emergency Service Meeting

Personnel of the Schleicher County Medical Service will meet at 7 p.m. Monday in the Fellowship Hall of the First Methodist Church. The group will discuss the purchase of a new ambulance and operating procedure.

Also, the service is announcing new rates effective immediately. Transfer of patients or emergency runs to San Angelo will cost \$55. Runs within Schleicher County will be \$25 and transfer of patients to Sonora will be \$30.

TWO INDICTED

Two persons were indicted and another was given a probated sentence during the grand jury held last week.

Gary Head, who was charged with unauthorized use of a motor vehicle, pled guilty and was given a three year probated sentence plus \$150 fine and costs.

Johnny Factor was indicted for subsequent DWI and Reyes Robledo was indicted with aggravated assault. Their trials will be set for April.

County Is Boosting Meals For Friends

The newly organized Meals for Friends, a program designed to provide hot meals for the elderly and disabled in Eldorado received a shot in the arm Monday when the County Commissioners Court granted the program \$3,000 to operate on during the first year.

The Rev. Dan Adams, pastor of the First United Methodist Church and chairman of the project, met with the court and explained that all the groundwork had been done on the project, but the group needed additional funds to begin work.

He told the court his workers had found about 45 people who would benefit from the program, some of whom could pay and some of whom could not. He is estimating that the total cost for the first year would be about \$10,500.

The program has received a temporary okay from the school

board to use the school facilities, for both preparing the meals. About one-third of the participants would have to have their meals delivered.

Adams told the court he felt the people would be more receptive to the "program if they could see it work first."

The agreement to give the money to the project was unanimous.

Also meeting with the court was Jack Brown, financial consultant for construction of the new law enforcement center, who explained several aspects of selling bonds for the building. The court will be selling bonds during its regular set meeting Feb. 11.

Bids for construction of the center will be opened during the two court meetings in February.

The court also formulated a new policy for use of hangers at the airport. The contracts will stipulate


