Loeffler Back In West Texas

U.S. Representative Tom Loeffler was in West Texas again this week, to discuss everything from the Iranian situation to a balanced federal budget. Meeting with the Lions Club in Sonora, Loeffler repeated his feelings that it is a "sad situation when the U.S. is on its knees and humiliated. This is not an isolated incident and not an accident, but it is something that happens when a nation is perceived to be weakened."

The Congressman added that another dangerous point in the world was the Middle east, as is central America. He explained that the central American government were being tested and he was hopeful that they would survive and

remain pro-west.

The Honduras, he said were stable at the present time which was reassuring, as it was the only buffer to Mexico. "You can't trust a Marxist or a Communist," he said emphatically, "and Nicaragua will prove that."

Speaking of Mexico, Loeffler said the country's best interest still lays with the "friend to the north and not the bear of the USSR."

Loeffler said he supports Carter's sanctions of food and spare parts to Iran although he felt it should have been done much earlier. Saying, "I am frustrated when the president says to do something and waits so long to implement it." We will become more the laughing stock and be thought of as a paper tiger." He added he felt the president should consider the option of blocking the harbor to Iran to stop all imports.

"It is time for Americans to stand up and be counted," he said, "to protect all of our interests around the world." Today, Iran has nothing to fear from us."

Turning to the home front, he took a pessimistic view saying that rising inflation rates would cause the loss of more real jobs, make it more difficult for couples to buy homes, more difficult for retired persons to live on a fixed income and in general, make it harder for everyone to make ends meet.

However, he repeated that this congress was more conservative and more responsible than it ever has been. "Coming back to the type of government we have believed in back here."

He explained the government's efforts to establish a balanced budget for the coming years saying he thinks the budget will have to be balanced before the government can begin to fight inflation. He also noted that he knew there would be some programs, some of which he felt should have never existed, that

would have to be cut to balance the budget. However, he told the group he would still support increased defense spending so that the "country would not be crippled like it has been recently."

On the subject of energy, Loeffler told the audience the windfall profits tax was stimulated as a political maneuver and was nothing but an excise tax. He said the tax "would not get anyone of us one additional drop of oil," would make the country more dependent on OPEC and slow down development of other energy sources such as coal, nuclear and solar powers.

Speaking of defense, Loeffler favors reinstatement of the draft because he feels the country is now deficient in numbers and quality, to the tune of \$620,000 in the army and national guard. He said at the present time, it would take 200 days to mobilize troops and with reinstatement of the draft, it would take 100 days. With an active draft, it would take no time.

Lester, Meador, Callison Win

Even with perfect spring weather, local voter turnout for the elections Saturday was poor, with about 500 persons voting in each of the three elections.

City voters elected Bob Lester, Rusty Meador and John Callison to represent them on the City Council. Lester led the race the 221 votes with Meador receiving 192 votes and Callison receiving 165 votes. Charlie Niblett received 48 votes, Nick Robledo received 73 and David Vannett received 22 votes.

Write-ins were Bobby Sykes, three; Ray Lewis Ballew, two; Richard Preston, one and Ed Meador, one.

In the race for two spots on the school board, incumbents Lynn Meador and Billy Williams retained their spots on the board with 221 votes and 164 votes, respectively. Dan Griffin received 154 votes. Write-ins were George Scott with 25 votes, Ronnie Mittel with three and William Chris McCravy with two. Three incumbents on the hospital

board Curtis Andrews, Pete Peters and Mike Moore will also return to their duties, receiving 225, 211 and 222 votes, respectively. Sam Henderson Jr., who received 192 votes, will begin a new term on the board.

Joe Andrews received 80 votes and Dawn Meador received 139 votes.

Election judges reported that although the turnout was poor, voting was steady throughout the day.

District Is This Weekend

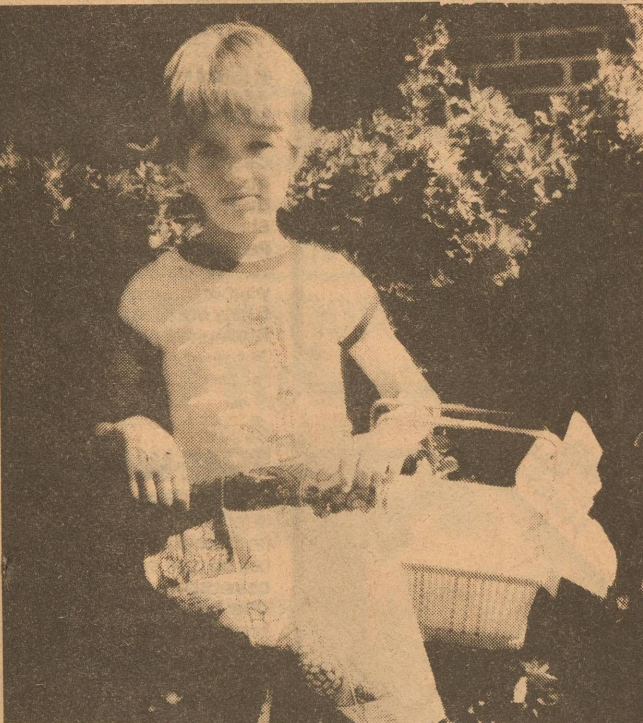
The new track at Eldorado High School will get its second workout of the year when EHS hosts the district track meet for high school and junior high school tracksters this weekend.

Just Talkin'

Can you tell it's spring? The grass is turning green, fruit trees are blooming, and everyone seems to have a good case of spring fever. There are several symptoms of this catching disease, which has no cure except scorching July heat.

One of the biggest symptoms of spring fever found only in women

(why men don't catch this, I'll never know) is the itch to clean house. Although only a few do this like Granny on the Beverly Hillbillies (where you take everything out of the house, clean it and then move it back in), they think they have to wash everything--the cabinets, closets, windows, the plastic flowers and maybe even the family cat and dog.

This is when all male members of the household and, of they can manage, the female members, seem to disappear into thin air. It may be that they are not afraid of the work as much as they are afraid of getting scrubbed down, too.

And then there are some people who have another symptom of spring fever, the itch to just go fishing. These are the people you see washing their boats, charging up their batteries and buying a new tackle box before the first daffodil breaks through the top of the

ground. But then these are the people who have a double fever, (spring and fishing) and they never seem to be rid of the latter at all.

From The Horse's Mouth

Gardeners who are getting ready to plant spring gardens can't completely forget about that fall garden they may have thought they were finished with last December.

What was planted in that fall garden has a direct affect on what will be growing in that soil this spring.

potential of the soil must be considered by gardeners who wish to plant many kinds of vegetables in the same garden each year.

Each family of vegetables has unique affects on the soil, and most kinds of vegetables within a given family fall prey to the same diseases and insects.

It is important to know that the pea or legume family includes peas and beans of all kinds.

The mustard family has many member: cabbage, collards, brussell sprouts, kale, cauliflower, broccoli, kohlrabe, rutabaga, turnip, cress, horseradish and radish.

The gourd family claims the vinecrops: summer squash, winter squash, pumpkin, watermelon, cantaloupe, zucchinis.

Chicory, endive, salify, dandelion, lettuce, Jerusalem artichoke and globe artichoke are all included in the composite family.

In a small garden it is advisable to rotate families of vegetables where only a few plants of each kind are planted.

Common vegetable diseases that survive in soil and attack vegetables can be effectively controlled by timely rotation

coupled with a preventive fungicide program. For example, anthracnose and fusarium root rot fungi will build up in beans and peas unless there is a span of two to three years between plantings on the same plot of land.

Tomatoes, potatoes and carrots are very susceptible to injury by the root knot nematode and favor the build up of this nematode in soil.

Wireworms and white grubs thrive in grass turf, and a new garden plot will usually contain many active soil insects.

Sweet corn, watermelons and winter squash are better choices than the root or tuber crops for planting on newly tilled soil.

Try to follow a crop which supplies a large amount of organic matter with one that favors the decomposition of organic matter.

It is important to precede shallow-rooted crops requiring close cultivation, such as lettuce, beets, and other greens with clean-culture crops such as tomatoes, peppers or summer squash, which tend to extend their roots deeply into the soil.

Tomake sure you have all of the gardening information that anyone will ever need to be a success, stop by the local Extension office or a participating nursery and get, free of charge, a spring vegetable gardening special.

Food, Family And 4-H

Spring is here. Along with the sunshine often comes a small bug, known as "Spring Cleaning." If you've gotten inspired to do a little spring cleaning, let's look at some easy ways to get started.

The first room I often tackle is the kitchen. There comes a time.... every so often when kitchen cabinets require a thorough cleaning. A little organization makes the job easier. Prepare a bucket or dishpan of warm detergent or soap suds, another of water. Have a sponge or clean cloth handy as well as some type of shelf covering...lining paper, adhesive type paper, plastic or rubber fabric...and scissors.

Use a sturdy stepstool or ladder to reach high shelves. Do not overreach. Start with the bottom shelf and take everything out and place on the counter below or on a tabletop. Next, take everything from the second shelf and place on the now empty first shelf. This method keeps to a minimum the stooping and bending that would result from putting the contents of each shelf on the counter or table.

Starting with the top shelf, remove old lining paper and discard...if the adhesive-type plastic coated paper is on the shelf.

wash with a sponge or cloth dipped in suds. Rinse and dry. Some plastic or rubber fabrics are removable for cleaning. Wash and rinse the cabinet walls thoroughly. Cut new lining paper to fit and smooth it on the surface. Or line shelves with other type of washable covering.

Replace the contents from the shelf below, wiping utensils, cans and jars and discarding anything no longer usable. Also consider reorganizing supplies so that those that are used often are located on the lower shelves, while items used less frequently are on upper shelves. Finish each cabinet by washing and rinsing the doors, inside and out, particularly areas surrounding knobs and handles where finger marks collect.

It may be desirable to shine the exteriors of wooden doors with a special wood polish.

Now that you've gotten it all cleaned up and straightened up, maybe you ran across a few items that you no longer need.

Along with the Spring Cleaning bug, many of us get a Garage Sale bug.

Successful garage sales depend on organization. Check these items when planning and staging a "neighborhood marketplace."

Successful garage sales. Advertise your garage sale with signs in the neighborhood, bulletin boards at grocery stores and other public places, and classified ads in the newspaper.

Most shoppers check newspaper ads on Wednesday and Thursday....advertising those days will bring your sale its wildest readership.

Consider combining your sale with a neighbor or friend, or having a "block sale"...in which several people on the same block hold sales at the same time.

Holding a sale with others provides company during the lulls and help during the crowds.

Be ready the day before by organizing the items for sale. Price all items ahead....this will keep prices reasonable, even under crowd pressure.

Expect someone to come the day before or several hours early just to get a headstart on the other shoppers.

Some experienced garage sellers will not sell ahead of their starting time to avoid selling something not intended for resale below the price they would have set later.

With a little spring fever and a little ambition, you can enhance any room with these tips and ideas:

For an inexpensive wall hanging, frame a beautiful silk scarf.

Pillows are in! Sew a variety of shapes and sizes using a bright-colored fabric or terry towels. Applique or quilt them.

Fill an empty fireplace with large baskets filled

with dried flowers or spray painted weeds.

Pegboards placed in closets are ideal for hanging and organizing numerous items. Keep them within easy reach too!

Add life to an old lamp by recovering the lampshade in fabric that coordinates with the room.

Place a mirror at the end of a hallway to give the hall a feeling of depth and added length.

Attach squares of cork to a kitchen wall. They're great for tacking up recipes and important messages.

Have a bare kitchen window? Place a few narrow shelves across it and fill them up with plants and herbs. This is a good location for "starter" shoots too.

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Annual Exempt Reports Are Due By April 16

All Social Security beneficiaries who have earned more than the annual exempt amount during 1979 and received at least one check, need to file a report of these earnings by April 16, 1980. Franklin Upp Social Security Manager in San Angelo, said recently.

ings does not have to file a report. But Mr. Upp said, if their earnings were less than expected, it may be to their advantage to make a report. Because just \$1.00 in social security benefits is withheld for every \$2.00 of earnings above the annual exempt amount, it could be that some benefits may be payable.

Also, beneficiaries need to remember that this annual report of earnings needs to be filed regardless of whether or not they file an income tax return.

Anyone that may have additional questions or needs assistance, please get in touch with the San Angelo Social Security office located at 2214 Sherwood Way. The Telephone number is 949-4608.

The 1979 annual exempt amount was \$4,500 for people age 65 or older and \$3,480 for people under age 65 all of 1979. Anyone who was age 72 or over in all of 1979 does not need to file a report. People who receive benefits because of disability also do not need to file reports, since different rules apply.

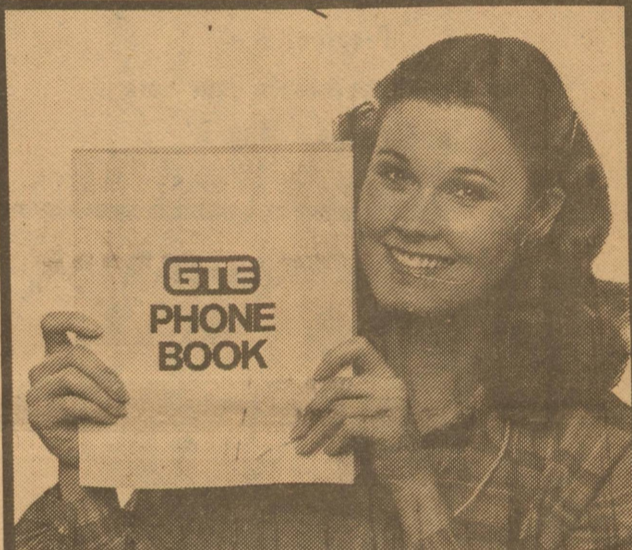

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

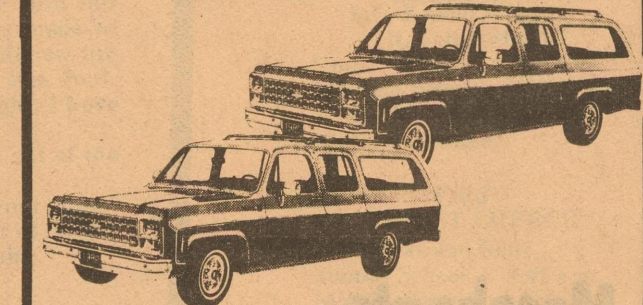
