Law Center Is Certified By Texas Jail Commission

After three full years of planning, consulting and building, the Schleicher County Court received certification from the Texas Commission on Jail Standards for the new law enforcement center during their meeting Monday.

The final inspection and certification presentation was made by Joe Slater of Sweetwater, inspector for the commission. He presented to County sheriff Orval Edmiston, county judge Johnny Griffin and commissioners Holvey Enochs, David Meador, De Lux and Prissy Paxton.

The certificate will be framed and ung in the lobby of the new facility.
Slater said, "County officials and theriff Edmiston are to be commended on the splendid accomplish-

ment. This is not due to one person but to all working together. The taxpayers should be proud they have elected officials who have been able to achieve this result at minimum costs.

"Having achieved compliance with the Texas Jail standards and with continued operation at this level, you can be assured that frivolous complaints and lawsuits will not be looked upon favorably by the federal courts. Compliance with the laws of the state of Texas serves to protect you as these rules and statutes have been tested and upheld on numberous occasions by the federal courts," he added.

The court hired an architect exactly three years ago to begin plans for the new building.

Edwin "Rooster" Jackson Jr. was appointed to fill the unexpired term of Rusty Meador as councilman during the meeting of the City Council July 7. Meador resigned because he is moving to Dallas.

In other business, councilmen discussed complaints regarding door-to-door salesmen. City policy is that salesmen must register with City Hall, providing information about their product and themselves and paying a permit fee. All information is given to the sheriff's department. Salesmen are restricted to sales between 8 a.m. and 5 p.m. Any complaints or questions should be directed to City Hall in the superire softice.

The council also discussed costs for replacing gas lines, paving streets and maintaining sewer lines. Individual contractors are estimating that it would cost over \$20,000 for each mile of gas line. There are about 19 miles of cityowned gas lines in the city limits for a minimum cost of \$380,000. Gas line replacement is considered priority because of rising gas costs, safety and existing pavement would be damaged while new lines are being

Costs for paving are estimated at over \$5,000 for each 100 feet of pavement. That is 68 x 100 feet with curbing. There are about 20 miles of city maintained streets in the city limits for a minimum cost of \$5,-

The city is estimating that there is 14 miles of city-owned sewer lines and 22 miles of city-owned water linesin the city limits to be main-

tianed and operated with revenue from utility sales and tax monies.

The city and county are working together at the present time to pave a street off the old Sonora highway through the city-county work agreement.

Work on these projects would be done by individual contractors because the city crews would not have the time or equipement to do the



warranted Disability payments are made under social security and SSI to people with a severe physical or mental impairment that is expected to keep them from working for a year or more or to result in death. Disabled people who have not worked long enough under social security may qualify for disability benefits under SSI if they meet the income and resource eligibility requirements. Currently 2.9 million workers and 1.8 million of their dependents are receiving social security disability benefits; another 2.3 million persons are on the SSI disability rolls. Both programs provide for a formal appeal process. The notices sent to individuals advise them if they do not agree with the decision made in their case, an appeal can be filed with the ocal social security office.

Jerry Lackey's **Country Folk**

According to the 12th century writer Ibn-Al-Awam, farmers in Muslim countries believed that land weeded with a copper fork that had been tempered in the blood of a billy goat would remain weed-free. Ibn-Al-Awam also recorded the construction of a magical talisman from wax, mummy dust, and sparrow blood for selectively killing weeds and thorns in infest-

ed crops Goats and copper are too expensive, and virgins with inbound hair are too much n demand to be used for veeding. Home gardeners are now using mechanical emoval, mulching and hemical control to eliminte weeds.

Mechanical removal, which often means simply nopping the weeds down ith a sharp hoe, controls mly those weeds present at ne time of hoeing, and terefore it must be repeatd several times during the growing season. It is best done when the ground is noist but no wet, and when he weeds are no more than -2 inches high.

Garden weeds should be haved off with a sharp hoe hile gently breaking the rust of the soil. Digging deeply into the soil in order to remove weeds may damage established plants and may also bring a fresh crop of weeds to the surface.

While mechanical removal controls weeds after they have appeared, mulching has the advantage of helping to control weeds before they break ground by preventing light from reaching the weed seedlings. Mulches are especially effective for controlling annuals and are helpful for controlling some perennials (weeds which grow from underground plant structures every

Chemical control can save a great deal of time and labor in the garden. This is especially true for a

large garden. Use of naturally occuring substances were suggested as a practical weed control method by Democritus in the 5th century B.C. He considered that trees could be killed by treating their roots with a mixture of lupin flowers soaked in hemlock juice. Similarly, Varro, a Roman agriculturist writing in the first century B.C., noted that vegetation was killed in the vicinity of olive presses. H He suggested that the amurca, the watery residue remaining after the oil had been expressed from the fruit, could be used to kill

The killing of plants by

use of salt, from the sea or mines, has been known since biblical times. Salt was applied to the fields of vanquished enemies to destroy their crops and desolate their fields for years to come. Many homeowners still annihilate houseplants and damage growing areas by watering with softened water that contains sodium salts. The fields of Carthage were thus treated by the Romans in 146 B.C. The specific use of salt as a weed killer in England appears to date from the latter part of the 16th century. During the 17th and 18th centuries, experimentation with the control in fields and gardens. Salt was also used to control weeds on summer fallow. This was the primary weed-killing chemical until the widespread use of man-made chemicals in the 20th cen-
