# "Bryant" Well-Known Mother To Children

Keeping ten or twelve or even more children each day would make many people shudder, but to Mrs. E. R. Bryant that has been a way of life for about 28 years.

"Bryant" as she prefers to be called, is going on her second generation of children. In fact, she has lost count of the number of children she has kept through the years.

"My first three children were Prissy Linthicum (Paxton), Joe Charles Christian and and Lvnn Meador," she recalls, adding, "and Nancy Thompson was the first school teacher I kept a child for." And now she is keeping Mrs. Paxton's and Meador's children. But after that, she says she has lost count of the number of children she has kept.

In the beginning, Bryant's daughter warned her that she would be hurt when the parents would not need her to keep their children any more. "And she was nothing but

right," Bryant said with a tear in her eye. "And it still hurts every time I lose one, even if it is just for the summer."

Until about five years ago, she kept children without a state license or a fence around her yard. "I kept children for 20 years without a license and didn't think I needed it, but the state did," she said. At that same time, she added a chain link fence around her yard.

"I still don't like fences," she will tell you, "I would rather tell the children where they can and where they cannot play and watch them. I never had one to run out in the street while I was keeping them."

Watching Bryant working with her children is amazing. She knows where each one of them is and what he is doing at all times. She is always cool and calm and perhaps that is why they are all so well behaved while they are at "Bryants".

Each child knows where to play, where to sit and where to take his nap and each knows not to argue with Bryant because "what she says goes".

Because of the state license the 78 year old woman is unable to keep as many children as she wants to, and as a result, she is swamped with calls from mothers to keep their children because there is such a shortage of women keeping children in Eldorade

"I just love children," she will tell you. "I wish I could keep them all." Bryant follows several rules at her house. "I always give a child two minutes to obey a command because it takes that long for them to understand. And I never pick one up without giving them a love spat and a kiss. She is also extra careful to follow any directions mothers give her about their children.

She is famous for her muffins which she makes several times a week and any child who has ever stayed with her never forgets their delicious taste.

Bryant not only keeps children for working mothers, but she has also kept children during funerals and weddings. "I was just glad to help out," she will say refusing any payment.

Bryant also keeps the nursery at First Baptist Church each Sunday. During the Mother's Day service this year, Rev. Don Williford, pastor, asked Bryant to come to the service. He asked Mrs. Bryant to stand and then asked each member who had left any of their children with her to stand. "And almost everyone in the audience stood up," she said with a

laugh.

Williford added that Bryant had not only been a mother to her own two children but to the town because she has kept so many children. He couldn't have said it any better.

The Congress has already approved a multi-billion dollar budget cut, though the exact figures are yet to be decided upon. 





## **Railroad Commission Sets Production Rate**

The lexas Railroad Commission recently set the Texas oil production rate for July at 100 percent for the 53rd month in a row. Buyers wanted to purchase 2,558,000 barrels /a day during July

The month's permissable rate of output is calculated to average 3.5 million barrels a day with actual production estimated at about 2.5 million barrels each day. The maximum allowable applies to all but ten fields in Texas that are assigned lower legal rates of flow for conservation purposes. Actual production in July of last year was

2.5 million barrels a day.

There have been several articles written lately about oil prices remaining stable for a period of up to three years. May we quickly say don't count on it. The present oversupply of oil in the world was engineered by Saudi Arabia and can be stopped almost at will. In fact, some reports say the Saudis have already begun a cutback in production. The Saudis are currently producing about 3.5 million barrels a day more than their target of approximately 6.5 million barrels. The 3.5 million is almost exactly the amount of the glut now

raising oil prices, OPEC countries have succeeded in making it profitable once again to look for oil in the U.S. and in forcing people to cut back on the use of petroleum products.

Don't be surprised if the glut disappears early next vear and prices start back

And, the special session of the Texas Legislature, set to begin July 13th, will deal with property taxes. We'll keep a close eye on any changes that might affect the industry.

# **Prepare Landscape Before Vacation**

Now that summer has
arrived, you're probably
thinking about that summer
vacation. If you're planning to take an extended
vacation now or later this vacation now or later this summer, be sure your land-scapes left unattended and uncared for several weeks can be virtually ruined by our summer sun, wind and

Just a little extra effort on you part before leaving can make a big difference in the health and well-being of your plants. Here are some practical tips which should help to ensure that your home landscape will not suffer the "post vaca-tion blues" tion blues."

1. Water the home

grounds well prior to leaving. Soak your lawn,

garden and all landscape plants deeply. Our shallow soils can dry out rapidly even after heavy watering, so if you'll be gone over 5-7 days, plan to have a neighbor hook up your hose and do a little supplemental

watering.

2. Mow your lawn a day or two before you leave.
Use the same cutting height that you normally do. Don't lower the mower blade for a "closer shave." Doing so could easily cause

sun scald and damage.

If you plan to be gone more than a week, it would be an excellent idea to arrange to have a neighbor mow the lawn for you. Also, have them pick up papers if the paper boy forgets. Unmowed lawns and a collection of old newspapers in the vard is a

3. Prune hedges and other plants likely to get rangy by the time you return. Cutting back annual flowers and applying additional fertilizer will have them well on their guals to another flowering wals to another flowering cycle by the time you return.

4. Mulch to help conserve valuable moisture needed for plant growth whether you are home or away. Choose a clean mulch, free of weed seed. and one which will remain loose and well aerated. Consider dried grass clip-

## Foals Should Be Weaned Gradually

both a young foal and its mother, wean the foal gradually at three to six months of age, suggests a horse specialist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, Texas A&M University System.

Traditionally, foals are weaned abruptly by separa ting them from their mothers. Oftentimes, mares are put in far-away pastures. This makes life miserable for both mares and foals for some time, says Dr. Doug Householder.

Since a foal is introduced to feed, deworming, vaccination and halter-breaking during the weaning period, all this can put a severe strain on the young animai. Full recovery may take six to eight weeks.

Research has shown that the most suitable weaning program for both the foal and mare is a gradual

One plan calls for placing the foal and mare in adjacent stalls so they can see, smell and hear eachother but the foal is unable to nurse. Make sure the foal has access to creep feed, hay and water. Keep the pair separated

four hours the first day, eight hours the second day and 12 hours the third day. Finally, separate them permanently after four days, says Householder.

Another plan is to place two or more foals in one stall and their mothers on either side, each in an adjacent stall. Use the same time span as with the first plan, and remove the mares permanently after



### **Lawmakers Wage Anti-Theft Campaign**

ACKAS law makers and our and gas officials have initi- are: ated a state-wide anti-theft program aimed at combating thieves that steal an estimated \$100 million worth of oil field equipment yearly in the United States.

Officials from six oil and gas trade organizations will fect on July 1 a theft reporting system where individuals can call collect to report a theft or information regarding a theft. The telephone number is 817/723-1114.

Prompt reporting of an oil field theft increases the chance of getting the property returned by 10 fold. This is the first statewide reporting system for

equipment stolen from the

oil patch. This reporting system -coupled with the passage of two new laws passed by the 67th Texas Legislature and signed into law by Governor William P. Clements -was devised to stop the

oil patch. The new laws increase the penalty for stealing oil Lot with cabin on Lake field equipment, and re-Amistad-Rough Canyon quire more detailed recordkeeping on the sale and exchange of used oil field

equipment. The theft-reporting system will be based in Wichita Falls. After the information regarding the theft has been taken, the proper law enforcement officials and area news media will be notified.

Several associations have established a reward program of up to \$2,500 for the arrest and conviction of a person or persons who have stolen oil field equipment.

The organizations involved in the theft reporting system includes the Texas Independent Producers and Royalty Owners Association in Austin; North Texas Oil and Gas Association in Wichita Falls; West Central Texas Oil and Gas Association in Abiiene; Panhandle Producers and Royalty Owners Association in Amarillo; Permian Basin Petroleum Association in Midland and the Petroleum Committee of East Texas Chamber of

Commerce in Longview. These organizations urge land owners and royalty owners to take note of suspicious looking vehicles or persons on oil and gas leases, and report these citings via the anti-theft telephone number.

The two new state laws Individuals whose

primary business is dealing in used oil and gas equipment must keep records when they obtain used equipment. These requirements include name and address of dealer; serial number, if any; kind, make, size weight, length and quantity of the used materials purchased or acquired by exchange; date obtained; name and address of seller or person who exchanged the materials; the location of the property at the time of sale or exchange; license number of vehicle used to transport the item to the dealer; and the driver's license of the seller or person who exchanged the materials. Thes records must be kept for two years. Failure to

fine of not less than \$500 per violation. 2. Theft of oil and gas equipment or petroleum itself, regardless of price, was raised from a third degree felony to a second degree felony. Previously a theft of material worth less than \$10,000 was a third degree felony. A third degree felony in Texas is punishable by two to ten years in prison and a fine

of up to \$5,000. A second

comply could result in a

degree felony is punishable by two to 20 years in prison and a fine for up to \$10,000. This law does not increase the minimum penalty for oil field thieves. It does, however, give prosecutors more discretion concerning

the punishment which can be sought. The revision also simplifies the law by removing the need to establish the precise value of the material stolen.

The reporting system via telephone and subsequent notification of law enforcement officials and the news media will be on a six month trial basis beginning July 1 and ending December 31. For More Information
