### Gov-Elect Bush Names Garza Sec. of State

Austin, Texas

Texas Governor-Elect. George W. Bush announced Monday the first major appointment to his cabinet. Cameron County Judge. Tony Garza was nominated to fill the post of Secretary of State. Garza, a Republican, will replace current Sec. of State Ron Kirk who was appointed by Governor Ann Richards.

Garza made an unsuccessful oid for the office of Texas Attorney General in the Republican Primary last March. Garza's nomination has received enthusiastic support thus far from Democratic State Senators who must confirm the nomination.

#### T.S. Gordon Slams Into Florida

Key Biscayne, Florida

Tropical Storm Gordon left a swath of death and destruction across the Eastern Caribbean Sea this week, leaving more than a hundred dead and thousands homeless in Haiti and Jamaica before moving in on the Florida peninsula. Although the storm carried only 60 mph. winds, it has spawned several killer tornadoes.

The landing of the Space Shuttle Atlantis was diverted from Cape Canaveral to Edwards Air Force Base in California because of the storm

#### Raises Interest Fed

Rates Washington, D.C.

The U.S. Federal Reserve Bank raised its Federal Funds target by 3/4 of a percentage point Tuesday in response to inflation worries. The hike, the largest single increase in over 13 years, was the sixth increase so far this year.

#### Gingrich Dole **Announces Plans**

Speaker of the House in waiting, Newt Gingrich (R Ga.) and Bob Dole (R-Ks.), soon to be Majority Leader. announced this week that the incoming Republican Congress will waste no time in making changes. According to Gingrich, the first item on his agenda is the passage of legislation to place Congress under the same laws as the rest of the nation.

In a meeting with White House Chief of Staff Leon Panetta, the two Republican leaders tipped off President Clinton's point man that the White House can expect swift passage of many conservative measures. Panetta said, "President Clinton is prepared to work with the new leadership in Congress."

# Eagles Win Bi-District Crown

## 2nd Victory Over Wall

## **Eagles To Face Hamlin Next**

The Eldorado Eagles captured the Class AA Bi-District Championship last Saturday night by downing the Wall Hawks 28-23 and setting up this Friday night's match against the Hamlin Pied Pipers for the Area Championship. The Eagles met the Hawks for the second time this year in San Angelo Stadium and it was a very different Hawks team than the Eagles defeated 6 weeks ago. Wall won the opening toss and elected to kick, giving the Eagles the first possession of the night and the bruising battle began.

The Hawks drew first blood when Charlie Martinez connecting on a 27 yard field goal. The Eagles answered quickly however. when quarterback Travis Whitten hit receiver Pepper Nix on a 58 yard touchdown pass. Shylowe Middleton converted on the extrapoint and the Eagle's led 7-3.

In second quarter action. Wall's Daniel Herrera pounded in a touchdown from 2 vards out and Hawks' kicker Charlie Martinez hit the extra point to make the half-time score 10-7 in favor of

The Hawks widened their lead to 17-7 in the third quarter with 4:00 remaining when Daniel Herrera punched in another score from three yards out and Martinez made good the extra-point at-

But, the tide turned for the Eagles at the beginning of the fourth quarter when running back Reagan Bownds scored from 1 vard out and Shylowe Middleton added the extra-point to pull the Eagles within 3. At the 9:45 mark, the Eagles took the lead 21-17 when Travis Whitten carried the ball into the end zone on a quarterback draw and Middleton converted the extra-point.

The Hawks responded with 6:52 remaining in the game when quarterback McMillan connected with receiver Craig Box from six yards out for the Hawks final score of the game. But, Eagles defenders poured through the line on Wall's extrapoint attempt and Zane Bruce blocked the extra-point attempt to

## Farm Service Agency Created

There's a new kid on the block- bilization and Conservation Ser- FSA is to be able to provide better, (FSA).

It came into being last month, when President Clinton signed into law a restructuring plan for the U.S. Department of Agriculture (USDA) that will improve the way USDA agencies do business in Schleicher County, said Jan G. Wanoreck, acting County Executive Director of the Schleicher County FSA.

The FSA will administer commodity price and income support programs, farm ownership and operating loans and the federal crop insurance program. The new agency combines all or part of three agencies familiar to farmers and ranchers-the Agricultural Stavice, the Farmers Home Administration, and the Federal Crop Insurance Corporation. Other loans offered by the former FmHA will be assigned to a new rural development agency

In addition, the FSA will offer conservation cost-share assistance under the Agricultural Conservation Program, as well as cost-sharing and land rental payments for the Conservation Reserve Pro-

"We want producers to know that the reorganization did not eliminate any programs," she said. What will change are that these services soon will be available to producers on a 'one-stop' basis. The whole purpose of the new

more efficient service and to make it easier for farmers to use our programs.'

At the local level, farmerelected committee members will continue to oversee farm program administration and will take on additional duties in overseeing other FSA programs.

"The agencies are merging at headquarters first," Wanoreck said. "The combination of staffs and fuctions at the county level will come in time. In the meantime, farmers can receive service as usual at their county offices."

FSA administers all programs without regard to race, color, religion, national origin, sex, age, disability or marital status.



AUSTIN - During her campaign, Gov. Ann Richards ridiculed a man who she said woke up one day and decided he wanted to be governor of Texas. That man is now Gov.-elect George W. Bush.

On Nov. 8, Texas voters turned their backs on the incumbent Democrat's long record as a public officeholder and weren't convinced by her "smear" ads. Bush, a Republican, won with 53.5 percent of the vote to Richards' 45.9 percent.

The day after the election, Bush said he believed he had a mandate to overhaul the state's juvenile justice, public education and welfare systems. He congratulated his party mates and held out his hand to Democrats, saying, "This is not a Republican agenda, because there will be a lot of Democrats who will support my plan to make our schools better, our streets safer and the welfare system more responsible.

### **Bullock Scores Easy Win**

Lt. Gov. Bob Bullock, Texas' powerful officeholder, is the state's highest-elected now Democrat.

Bullock, 65, overwhelmingly defeated Republican Tex Lezar of Dallas to win his second four-year term. Bullock garnered 62 percent of the vote to Lezar's 38 percent.

"This election is not so much a victory for me as it is a victory for Texans who want their problems solved without partisanship or gridlock," said Bullock.

### **Hutchison Defeats Fisher**

U.S. Sen. Kay Bailey Hutchison is returning to Washington with a full six-year term and a Republican majority in Congress for the first time in 40 years.

Hutchison, the state's first female senator, easily defeated Dallas financier Richard Fisher with 62 percent of the votes to Fisher's 37.3 percent.

"I think we are going to see some significant legislation passed immediately," Hutchison said. She predicted that the GOP Congress would approve term limits, staff cuts and a constitutional amendment requiring a balanced federal

#### budget. **Veteran Democrats Defeated**

Four longtime Democratic officeholders shared Richards' fate. For months, political talking heads accurately predicted that the mid-

term election would be a plebiscite against incumbents, liberals and President Bill Clinton.

Voters rejected four veteran Democrats: State Sens. Carl Parker of Port Arthur and Steve Carriker of Roby, and in the House, Betty Denton of Waco; and U.S. Rep. Jack Brooks of Beaumont.

Parker, 60, who was elected to the state Senate in 1976, also served 14 years as a state representative. He was elected to the Texas House in 1962 three years before his Republican opponent was born.

Michael Galloway of The Woodlands, a 29-year-old independent oil and gas producer -- and political novice - claimed 53 percent of the vote to Parker's 47 percent.

State Sen. David Sibley, R. Waco, told the Houston Chronicle Parker was "the idealogical and intellectual leader of the liberal group" in the Senate.

Carriker, 43, was defeated by Tom Haywood of Wichita Falls. Carriker served in the House from 1983-88, and the Senate from

Meanwhile, Denton, 48, lost to Republican Barbara Rusling of China Spring, after serving in the House for 17 years.

Brooks, whose hold on the 9th Congressional District in East Texas spanned 42 years, would have been the senior representative in Congress had he been reelected. He lost to Steve Stockman, a 37-year-old accountant from Friendswood.

### **GOP Takes RR Commission**

As further proof that Texas is a bona fide two-party state, Republicans staged an unprecedented sweep of the Texas Railroad Commission, with the first woman ever elected to the post winning one of two seats on the ballot this year.

GOP challenger Charles R. Matthews of Garland defeated Democratic Chairman James E. Nugent for a full six-year term, ending more than 40 years of government service for Nugent.


In the other race, Democratic incumbent Mary Scott Nabers was beaten for a two-year term by GOP challenger Carole Keeton Rylander, a former three-term mayor of Austin.

Nabers became the second consecutive woman appointed to the commission by Gov. Richards to lose her job at election time. Lena Guerrero was the first. Nabers was appointed last year to fill the unexpired term of Bob Krueger, who left the commission to make an unsuccessful run for the U.S. Senate.

u Republicans captured four of the seven seats on the State Board of Education up for election to give the GOP a slim majority (8-7) on the 15-member board.

• Other statewide officials reelected include: Dan Morales (D), attorney general; John Sharp (D), comptroller; Martha Whitehead (D), treasurer; Garry Mauro (D), land commissioner; and Rick Perry (R), agriculture commissioner.

#### FEELIN' AGITATED?

It was hard not to notice the words of daily radio commentator Jim Hightower the day after the Revolution began in America (this is what certain Republicans called the sweeping election results). ### Former Allies Slaughtered

As the Veteran's Day celebration and memorial unfolded in the U.S. and President Clinton spoke to the American people, an unforgivable tragedy unfolded half way across the world. The abandoned streets of the second largest city in Angola were littered with the bodies of thousands of men, women and children who had mistakenly learned to trust the United States of America.

from last week]. Shrewdly, Dos Santos converted thousands of the Cuban troops to Angolan citizenship thus technically "ridding" himself of the Cubans. For decades Dos Santos has shipped thousands of Angolan children to Cuba to go through Castro's education system--along with a little military training. Through this same time period, UNITA children looked at the U.S. as the blood brother who backed their quest for freedom.

#### **Changing Sides**

Last year, the U.S. drastically changed policy for the first time, we honored a multi-party '92 election which had been protested by UNITA as fraudulent. The "Marxist" government's General de Matos flew victory lap around the city in his Russian Mig jet fighter.

What the dead and dying U.S. friends on the landscape below had no way of knowing---what most Americans do not even realize: America had switched sides...






