City Sets Hearing presented during the council's meet-



The Eldorado School Board met for a very brief meeting last week to discuss several routine matters.

The board nominated five persons to run for the tax appraisal district board of directors, Ray Willoughby, Floyd Butler, Mike Moore, Fred

Ray Ballew of the tax district met with the board and discussed the cost of operating the district for each taxing jurisdiction as well as the cost of assessing and collecting school xes. Whitaker also presented a survey

The board agreed to take up the issue of insurance for employees during the February meeting.

Whitaker also presented a procedure for renewing and non-renewing contracts, as required by Senate Bill 341. The board will review the procedure and act upon it at a later
