

CARE OF STEAM IRONS
The steam iron has become standard equipment in most homes. Since it is a piece of equipment that some rather delicate parts, it requires some special care.

First one should read and follow the manufacturers in-

ow the manufacturers in-

structions.

For best results use only distilled or demineralized

distilled or demineralized water.
For safety, disconnect the iron from the electric outlet while filling. Protect the soleplate from scratches, Avoid ironing over pins and snaps, When ironing is completed, drain the iron while it is still hot and place it

on the sole plate so that all steam is exhausted. This dries the small tubes out completely and there will be no corroding. Store the iron in an upright position, When tap water is used in steam irons, deposits of

in steam irons, deposits of calcium and other minerals will form. These deposits usually lead to sputtering irons, drops of water splat-tering on white clothes, and very disgruntled house-wives.

To correct the problem, dissolve one tablespoon of non-precitating water soft-ener in one cup of distilled water, Fill the iron with this solution and let it steam for 5-10 minutes shaking it constantly during this time.

Empty this water and fill the iron with a mixture of two tablespoons of distilled vinegar to one cup of distilled water. Let the iron steam 5-10 minutes, again shaking it constantly, Pour off this water and rinse with distilled water.
