## Pat Bobo is Chairman, Hospital Auxiliary Drive

Pat R. Bobo, well known Muleshoe attorney, has accepted the general chairmanship of the Fund Raising Campaign sponsored by Muleshoe Hospital Auxiliary.

Bobo attended school in Rhone, Wise County until 'My father thought I should go to another school and sent me to Decatur Baptist Academy (now Decatur Baptist College). He later was graduated from Baylor University with a degree of L. L. B. He opened law offices in Muleshoe in 1927 and has been practicing here since that time. In 1932 he married Miss Inez Farrell, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. C. R. Farrell, a loyal supporter of civic, church and school projects. Bobo is a member of Muleshoe Lions Club.

The Auxiliary has initiated the drive to raise \$20,000 to furnish the new addition to the Muleshoe Nursing Home and school projects. Bobo is elected to be a channel through which donations may be received. Funds raised will be placed in a Capitol Funds account at a local bank. Your tax-deductible contributions may be made at the office of Pat Bobo or sent to Muleshoe Hospital Auxiliary in care of West Plains Memorial Hospital, or contact any member of the hospital auxiliary.

For those contributors \$1,000 or more, a bronze

plaque will be placed over the door of a room at the Muleshoe Nursing Home, with the donor's name and the honoree's name if given as a memorial. For those giving \$500, a smaller bronze plaque will be placed, together with another, on a door of one of the nursing units, with both the donor's names and the memorial names.

Donor's names and memorial names for gifts from \$100 and up will be placed on a large plaque in the new lobby of the Hospital. All other small gift donor's names will be recorded in a book permanently placed in the lobby.

Muleshoe Nursing Home is enlarging its 40-bed capacity by 19 additional rooms which will provide 35 additional beds. Construction is being made on the West side of present facilities, and it is hoped rooms can be furnished by the time construction is completed to accommodate the waiting list.

## Noian Harlan At Farmers Seminar

Noian Harlan, of Bula, president of Bailey County Farmers Union, attended a seminar held in Austin this week and heard the public relations director for National Farmers Union tell the group that the agricultural colleges and universities are failing to balance emphasis between production and marketing research.

Victor Ray of Washington, D. C., editor of the Farmer's Union Washington Newsletter, "Agricultural college officials are still spending too much time emphasizing the biological sciences and production without giving enough attention to farm policy and marketing."

"Farmers and ranchers don't understand the economic gibberish but do understand their inadequacies in marketing agricultural production profitably," Ray said.

The farm editor urged Texas farmers and ranchers to use their political influence in the legislature to "change the direction of emphasis at the agricultural schools. Ray pointed out that political pressure can determine where the money is spent in agricultural education.

State representatives who addressed the seminar were Bill Clayton of Springlake and George Hinson of Minola. Representative Clay-

## Muleshoe Grad Is Honored

Durward G. Head, son of Mr. and Mrs. D. B. Head, Route One, Muleshoe, has been named a distinguished student at Texas A&M University, announced Dr. Horace R. Byers, academic vice president.

The undergraduate honor is awarded to students who have excelled academically at A&M. Dr. Byers explained, by earning at least 2.25 grade point ratio (out of a possible 3.0), during the most recent semester of the regular school year.

In addition to posting at least a 2.25 GPA, a student qualifying for Distinguished Student honors must have been enrolled for a minimum of 15 semester hours and have no grade lower than a "C". Distinguished Student ranking is limited to ten percent of A&M's undergraduate enrollment.

farming and ranching. He said the corporations "completely ruin" rural communities and rural churches. Young people are eliminated from getting into agriculture. Corporations bid up prices for farm land thus making it impossible for young people to buy land.

"We are building another Appalachia region when we allow corporations to move in and buy up the land. People become dependent on the corporation; they lose their independence and initiative," he said.

Hensley said he believed the family farmer can compete successfully with the corporation farming enterprise. He said his experience with corporations is that "they are fumbling, stumbling and boondoggling" organizations. "The farmer knows the art of farming; he has an intimate knowledge of the land he farms. This would not be true in a corporation farming set-up," he said.

Locke described the bad effects of corporation farming on small towns. He pointed out that small town business firms would go out of business and do close their

doors as corporation farming takes over. He said corporations buy from one central agency, thus eliminating the small town merchant.

Baggarly explained that corporation farming brings on a whole new concept of land ownership in which only a few own the land. This drives out of the community responsible, hard-working citizens. They are forced to move to the city where big-city problems of overcrowding are made even worse.

A bill to outlaw conglomerate corporate farming in Texas will be presented at this session of the Texas Legislature. Senator Murray Watson of Mart, vice-chairman of the Senate Agriculture Committee, said details of the bill are still being worked out. He said he also will introduce a resolution calling for an interim study committee to go into more detail into the pitfalls of corporation and what the Legislature might do to prevent this type of agriculture from taking over in Texas.

"The Farmers Union is to be commended for bringing together a group such as this for an exchange of ideas and discussion of issues confronting our rural communities," Senator Watson said. How successful getting a

bill passed to outlaw corporation farming "depends on how successful you are in convincing your senators and representatives of the need," Senator Watson said. "The rural population of the nation is facing a new crisis, a crisis which can bring to an end a way of life that means so much to all of us," he said. American agriculture is being invaded by your big corporations, and rural America is threatened by this invasion of non-farm interests in Texas to qualify for the trip rewarded for outstanding insurance sales in 1968.

The loopholes in federal tax laws have made it profitable for corporations to move into agriculture, he said. "There are corporations that exist solely for the purpose of providing a vehicle by which individuals, including well-known figures from the entertainment world, can funnel money into farming and ranching so as to reap a great tax bonanza.

"This is creating a new breed of person -- the tax farmer -- who is more interested in farming the internal revenue code than he is the land and who is making it increasingly difficult for true farmers and ranchers to earn an adequate rate of return on their effort and investment," Senator Watson said.

He also urged Texas Farmers Union to support the Metail bill, federal legislation which would plug federal tax loopholes.

# Homemaking Tips

FROM THE OFFICE OF HOME DEMONSTRATION AGENT

**CARE OF STEAM IRONS**  
The steam iron has become standard equipment in most homes. Since it is a piece of equipment that has some rather delicate parts, it requires some special care.

First one should read and follow the manufacturer's instructions.

For best results use only distilled or demineralized water.

For safety, disconnect the iron from the electric outlet while filling. Protect the soleplate from scratches. Avoid ironing over pins and snaps. When ironing is completed, drain the iron while it is still hot and place it on the sole plate so that all steam is exhausted. This dries the small tubes out completely and there will be no corroding. Store the iron in an upright position.

When tap water is used in steam irons, deposits of calcium and other minerals will form. These deposits usually lead to spluttering irons, drops of water splattering on white clothes, and very disgruntled housewives.

To correct the problem, dissolve one tablespoon of non-precipitating water softener in one cup of distilled water. Fill the iron with this solution and let it steam for 5-10 minutes shaking it constantly during this time.

Empty this water and fill the iron with a mixture of two tablespoons of distilled vinegar to one cup of distilled water. Let the iron steam 5-10 minutes, again shaking it constantly. Pour off this water and rinse with distilled water. Fill the iron with this solution and let it steam for 5-10 minutes, shaking it constantly during this time.

Don't neglect to shake the iron while steaming it clean. This is the secret to success. If this does not completely clean the iron, repeat the procedure. Irons should be cleaned every two months to keep them in proper working order.

## Jehovah's Meet March 7-9

**Nursery News**  
LANDSCAPING By A.L. Woodburn GARDEN CENTER NURSERY Clovis, N.M.

The last few weeks we have been trimming on fruit trees, roses and some of the other items we like to have in the yard. This week we would like to point out some of the items to do and not to do in trimming on some of the evergreens.

Basically an evergreen is a plant that does not shed its leaves or needles. To the average person on the plains to mention evergreen is to bring to mind the nicest of the conifers, spruce, pine or maybe a few will admit the magnolia into this class.

To start with, the juniper is in so many varied and different forms it would be rather foolish to say that you trim a juniper this way or limit the trimming to some other way. One thing that I learned the hard way is not to take all the needles off one tree at the same time. Some years ago we trimmed one of the upright juniper trees rather severely, in fact took out the entire top and quite a bit of the stump. In a short time it put out and really looked good. The next year there were two or three trees that needed some attention and again they caught it. When they put out and really looked good we figured it safe to treat trees in that manner was permissible. Then we started trimming on a big bunch and thought we knew. Well, some of the trees did not make it. Since then should we want to prune as severe we spend two seasons, that is strip approximately one half of the height to leave and let the needles of the other half support it until it puts out and then the second season cut off the remaining part, then the plant will have the factory in operation without so much strain.

The juniper is very versatile in that you can prune for the boxed formal effect or you can prune for the feathered natural look by changing very little in the methods used. To get the boxed or formal effect you cut all outside an imaginary line to get the feathered effect you cut the terminals and let the new ones be the end and still look uncut. (PD ADV.)

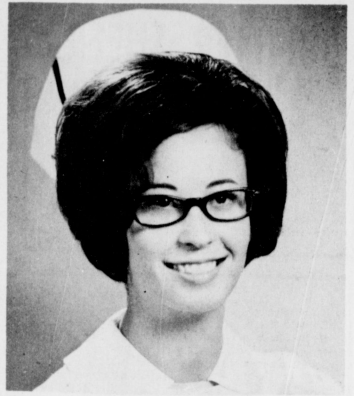

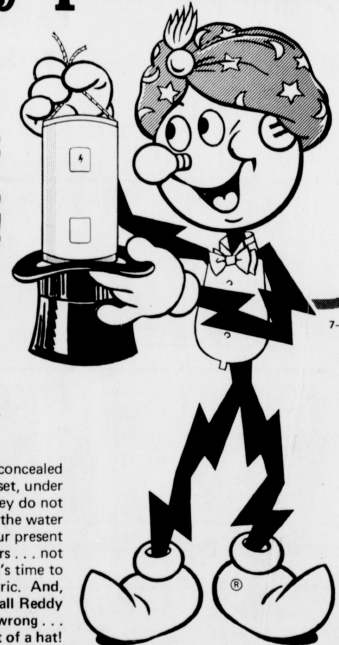

# Mrs. Jennings, A True Scholar

Mrs. O. N. Jennings has the instincts of a librarian and a collector of books. When asked how early in life she began taking clippings

from magazines and newspapers and filing them away for future use, she replied, 'Since I was a little bit thing'. 'My father used to

read us stories from a magazine which was the forerunner of Christian Advocate. I would tear them out and carry them around in my pocket until they wore out. She recalls how the family enjoyed Pathfinder magazine, too.

Habit of a lifetime, Mrs. Jennings preserves articles on nearly every prominent person in the news and files them so she can find them for reference. She has kept magazines as far back as 1940 and is immensely proud of a copy of the last Saturday Evening Post issued January 25, 1969, a gift of her daughter-in-law, Mrs. Joe Bates Jennings of Lazbuddie. Mrs. Jennings subscribes to most of the usual magazines and many not seen in the average home, such as 'Texas Parade', 'Travel' and 'Ebony'. Besides the ones filed in the house, she has stacks in the garage and told of her distress at finding her husband and a helper busily burning half of a five or six foot stack of Life magazines she had saved. Mrs. Jennings plans to donate some of her collections to the public li-

brary when the new building is completed and there will be space for them.

The Jennings home has an upstairs library and beside it is a workroom where Mrs. Jennings keeps magazines and clippings she sorts into order. She says of the self-imposed task that one can work all day and not make a dent and that she prefers to spend the entire day when she starts.

Included in the four or five hundred volumes in the library and other rooms are some very old books Mrs. Jennings prizes. She has the Bible of her Grandmother Flint which came from Mississippi and with which 'she raised her family'. Mrs. Flint died almost fifty years ago at the age of 100.

Mrs. Jennings has a volume of Peloubin's Select Notes on the International Lesson, dated 1901, and used by her father, T. J. Davis, to teach at Harmony Methodist Church in Dawson that same year. Another very old volume is "Cookman's Speeches", dated 1857, brought from Mississippi by T. J. Davis, once the pro-

perty of Harmony Methodist Church at Iuka, Mississippi. Another volume, "The Data of Ethics by Herbert Spencer" is dated June, 1879, 'Favorite Stories' by Mable Lee Cooper is dated 1923. 'Grammar as a Science' by R. F. Sisk is dated 1903. A copy of the first quarter of the (Sunday School) Student of the Book of Acts is dated 1902 and was used by her father to teach.

Because she remembered hearing her parents say most of their education came from the 'old blue back speller' she bought a modern day copy of this well-loved book. Both Mrs. Jennings and her husband enjoy reading and she says, 'He starts reading just as soon as he finishes eating.' Unusually well informed for one not active in business, with a world view of the news and happenings, Ruby Jennings enjoys sharing her knowledge, her collection of articles and her understanding of world events. She reads for the sheer joy of knowing.

Inquiring into what causes a woman to love books and knowledge as Mrs. Jennings does, we hear of a father who read and who all his life either was a Sunday School Teacher or superintendent

of Sunday School and insisted that his children read their Sunday School lesson material...the father who had an uncompromising rule that all the children old enough to read must study and read each night after supper and then must listen while he read from the Bible. This was followed by prayer at which time every member of the family, and visitor, too, if present, must kneel reverently while he prayed.

The T. J. Davis home was always furnished with reading material, magazines and current reading. Mrs. Davis, the mother of ten, was too busy to do more than read stories and her Bible, but her husband read more extensively. Mrs. Jennings was born at Dawson, the daughter of a Navarro County planter. Her mother's maiden name was Flint. Both parents lived past the age of ninety and died ten or twelve years ago. One sister lives at Cone and a brother lives at Petersburg.

Although she has loved books as long as she can remember, she also loved sports and said 'I always liked baseball, just like my grandsons do.' There were always some cousins living with us to go school ('You know, in those days kinfolk took care of kinfolk and we always had a crowd - I don't know how my mother managed,' said Ruby). 'I had six brothers and my sisters and I, with the cousins who lived with us, could have a baseball team of our own and I played until I was fifteen years old, I still like it.'

Mrs. Jennings attended Texas Women's College (now Texas Wesleyan College) at Fort Worth two years, 1917 and 1918. 'I remember my brother was going to war and he came to tell me goodbye while I was there my first year.'

After getting their teacher's certificates, Mrs. Jennings and her sister went out West to be old maid school teachers' at McCoy in Floyd County. School teacher she was - old maid she was not. In 1920 she married Ophel N. Jennings, a rancher and farmer and they lived at Cone, in Crosby County.

In 1923 the family moved to Lazbuddie, in Farmer County where they still own land. About 1946 they moved

to their present home (only the two story part for awhile.) Mrs. Jennings recalls when they moved to Lazbuddie, Muleshoe streets were still ungraded.

The Jennings are parents of two children: a son, Joe Bates Jennings of the Lazbuddie community and Mrs. J. A. Nickles, whose home is adjacent to her parents on the Plainview highway. Children of the J. B. Jennings are Joe Bryant (Hoppy), a student at Texas Tech, Derrell (Jeep) who is married and the father of a son, Derren Lynn, and who lives on the family ranch at DeKain, and Miss Tamara Jennings, a student in Dallas.

Mr. and Mrs. Nickles are parents of three daughters, Mrs. Jerry (Glenda) Bruns of Lubbock, Mrs. Gene (Kerna) McGuire, Lubbock, and Belinda of the home. One would expect a scholar to be a part of a study group and Ruby is, in college days she was a member of Bardnetson Study Club, a social and study group. She was a member of Lazbuddie Study Club from 1924 to 1946 and

is a long-time member of Muleshoe Study Club. At one time or another she has held nearly every office in these clubs and is a past president of both.

Ruby has been a member of Women's Society of Christian Service of the Methodist Church since moving to Muleshoe and for many years was Secretary of Missionary Education, a position which entailed responsibility for programs. She and her husband are regular attendants at United Methodist Church. She is also a member of Friends of the Library and of Bailey County Historical Society.

If you would like to make Ruby happy, take some time afternoon to 'talk books' with her. You will enjoy it, too.
