



Mickie Clark

Mickie Clark of Charlotte, TX, was named Working Cowboy of the Year at the annual Cowboy Homecoming in Pleasanton on Saturday, August, 16. Clark is the son of Tucker and Lula Mae Clark of Eldorado. He is the ranch foreman of he La Paoma Ranch.

The winner of the award is decided each year by a committee of former Cowboys of the Year. In order to be considered for the Working Cowboy of the Year award, a cowboy must be nominated for the honor and meet the following criteria:

• Must be working cowman and reside in Atascosa County

• Must have years of experience as a cowboy

• Must possess an overall knowledge and ability with a horse

• Must demonstrate ability in working with trailing cattle herds of various sizes in the brush country

• Must possess a knowledge of cattle habits and ailments

• Must possess unquestionable character and dependability

Clark was nominated this year by Arthur McCall. His nomination letter reads as follows:

In your search for Cowboy of the Year for 2003, I wish to submit Mickie Clark of Charlotte, for consideration. Fifty-one year old Mickie Clark has been a cowboy all his life. He grew up on a ranch near Eldorado, Texas and as a youngster, did ranch work alongside his father.

Mickie is a ranch foreman for the La Paloma Ranch in the Charlotte area. La Paloma covers 10,000 acres and runs about 600 head of cattle. They also have 25-30 horses in training.

Cutting horse training is a big part of the ranch operations. Mickie and his wife, Suzy, live on the ranch and she has taught school in Charlotte school system for 28 years. He has distinguished himself with his ability and knowledge or horses. A horse "Doc Special Peppy," trained by him, won the World Championship for the cutting events in 1999 Paint Horse Association.

This man shows horse in cutting events as often as possible as well as ranch horse competitions and sales at the bigger rodeos like San Antonio, Houston and Ft. Worth. He also trains rope horses as well. He is well known and well respected throughout the horse world, not only for his skills and abilities but also for his integrity.

This Cowboy of the Year is not just a horseman but a cowman and truly a ranch manager. He knows cattle well and knows how to "cowboy." He is knowledgeable and capable in all areas of ranch management. He has combined being a horseman, a cowman, a manager and just an all around good hand.

We could go on for some time about this man's ability in the world of the "real" cowboy. Those of you that know him will agree that he is well deserving to be selected as Cowboy of the Year for 2003.

Hill pleads guilty to wire fraud in AFLAC case

David E. Hill, 42, of Eldorado, a former employee of American Family Life Assurance Company (AFLAC), pled guilty last Thursday to one count of Wire Fraud before U.S. District Judge Sam Cummings last Thursday in federal court in Lubbock. Hill faces a maximum sentence of five years in prison and a fine of \$250,000. A sentencing date has not yet been set.

The case against Hill sprang from an investigation into the Eldorado Youth Baseball League and money that was missing from its account. Hill served as the league's president and, as such, had access to its funds. As the case developed against Hill, Sheriff David Doran and Chief Deputy George Arispe learned that not only was money missing from the baseball league, other money, originating from Hudspeth Hospital in Sonora, and intended for the purchase of AFLAC insurance, and been funneled into Hill's accounts.


At that point Texas Ranger Sgt. Brooks Long was called in to assist. He proved to bring unique skills to the investigation, since he had worked as an insurance agent prior to going into law enforcement. As soon as the men felt they had a strong enough case, they turned it over to 51st District Attorney Stephen Lupton who sought and received a two-count Grand Jury indictment for Misappropriation of Funds on January 8, 2003. Hill was arrested the following day and released on \$10,000 cash bond.

Other questionable transactions involving insurance policies issued under fictitious names would require the officers to call on and receive the assistance of AFLAC. Since the company's office was in Georgia, that meant calling in the FBI and sending the remainder of the case up to federal court.

Assistant U.S. Attorney Steve Sucsy

took over the federal portion of the case and ultimately reached a plea bargain agreement with Hill and his attorney, R.H. Wallace, Jr. of Ft. Worth. Under the terms of the agreement, Hill admitted to obtaining lists of employees from various companies and using the lists to create insurance applications for the individuals despite the fact that they did not want an insurance policy. Hill also admitted to occasionally using the name of an individual who worked for one company and submitting an application for that individual under another company's name. The bogus applications were transmitted electronically to AFLAC's office in Columbus, GA. He also confessed to forging signatures on the false applications.

Insurance companies routinely pay commissions to their agents and AFLAC was no different. The company paid Hill



Guilty Plea Entered — David E. Hill pleaded guilty last Thursday to one count of Wire Fraud in Federal District Court in Lubbock. He will be sentenced at a later date and could face as many as 5 years in jail and a fine of up to \$250,000. 36 percent of the face value of each policy that he wrote. However, the company went a step farther, paying Hill 63 percent of the commission at the time the policy was written. The company referred to the up front payments as "first year advance commissions."

Once the company learned of the scam, Hill was confronted and he paid AFLAC \$19,340 in restitution. The company then withheld \$26,319.72 in commissions from Hill. That resulted in AFLAC recovering their entire loss of \$45,659.72. Investigators note that after the company terminated Hill's employment, it let the issue drop and did not report it to authorities.


Meanwhile, the local charges against Hill remain in place. In addition to the two counts he was indicted on in January, a separate charge of Money Laundering is remains to be settled. Authorities tell the Success that once Hill is sentenced on the federal charges, he will be brought back to Schleicher County to stand trial on the charges in State District Court.

That date is still off in the future a bit. Asst. U.S. Attorney Steve Sucsy tells the Success that Hill won't be sentenced on the federal charges for another 10-12 weeks. That gives time for the U.S. Probation Office to issue a pre-sentencing report.

Awaiting sentencing in U.S. Dist. Judge Sam Cummings court is nothing new for Hill. He appeared before the judge in 1995 and pleaded guilty to misapplying more than \$66,000 while he was a Vice President at First National Bank of Eldorado. In that case, Judge Cummings sentenced Hill to a year in a halfway house in Abilene and a fine of \$3,000. By the time his term in the halfway house began, Hill was working for AFLAC and he continued representing

I believe it is very important to stress that you are saved by believing only. John 3:16, probably the most quoted verse in the Bible, says that, "whosoever believeth in him should not perish, but have everlasting life." Again, this passage clearly prescribes believing, not repeating a prayer. In John 3:4, Nicodemus asks Jesus, "How can a man he born when he is old? Can he enter the second time into his mother's womb, and be born?" He was asking this in regard to Jesus' statement in John 3:3, that a man needs to be born again. Jesus' answer in John 3:5 and following is "Except a man be born of water and of the Spirit, he cannot enter into the kingdom of God." Nowhere does Jesus say, pray to be saved, it is always believe.

He said unto Jesus, "Lord, remember me when thou comest into thy kingdom. 43And Jesus said unto him, Verily I say unto thee, today shalt thou be with me in paradise." You don't fool Jesus. Jesus knew that this man believed in Him; that this man believed that this Jesus that he was talking with was the Lord, The Messiah, the Only Begotten Son of God, the Savior, and in believing, the man was saved. Now if you think that you have to pray first, repeat first, or anything first, before believing, why did Jesus tell him "today thou shalt be with Me in paradise?" OR if there is a need to do for anything to go along with believing, why didn't Jesus tell him what that was? Jesus doesn't make mistakes! God's Word is true. You don't (really you can't), add to or take away from God's Word, and it be true. Just leave His Word alone, and do what God said, believe. Psalm 119:89" "For ever, O LORD, thy word is settled in heaven."
