City Is Ready For Santa Celebration

He will be met there by the Goin' Band from Eagle Land and volunteer firemen who will escort him to the starting place of the parade.

"Top quality garden tools are sure to always please," says Janne. "There is a price range for almost any budget from a hand trowel to electric grass clipper to a riding mower or compost shredder. Most gardeners have the basic tools but the purchase of speciality items is usually put off until extra cash is available. Such

items are sure to please even the most discriminating gardener." A subscription to a monthly gardening magazine, suited for the area, will please any gardener and serve as a reminder of your thoughtfulness throughout the year, believes the horticulturist. There are also many garden books available on a multitude of subjects. If undecided on the subject matter, consider a gift certificate from a good bookstore. "Accessories for the garden are always welcome," points out Janne. ("A sculpture or urn for the patio or garden will last a lifetime. Other gift suggestions for the outdoor area include a wind chime,

a martin house or bird feeder for the bird watcher, a hanging basket or fancy plant container, a hammock, porch swing or other garden furniture, or a rain gauge, outdoor thermometer or barometer for the weather buff." The horticulturist also notes that a wide variety of potted plants suitable for indoor landscaping can make excellent Christmas gifts. Outdoor plants also make welcome gifts. A terrarium is a suitable gift for anyone interested in plants and can bring special joy to the shut-in. "If all else fails in selecting a gift for a gardener, a gift certificate from the local garden center or nursery is sure to please," adds Janne.

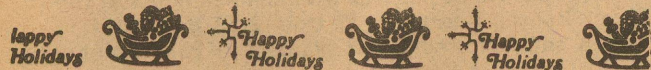

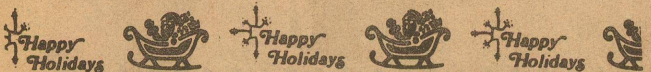

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Know Your Bible

With Thanksgiving behind us, the Christmas holiday season is in full swing with shopping, wrapping gifts, decorating, trimming trees, company dinners and office parties.

At this special time of the year, let's stop for a moment each day and consider the true Christmas story, the wonderful account of God's demonstration of love for us, the birth of His Son in a lowly stable 2,000 years ago.

For the next 3-4 issues we will depart from our regular Bible Quiz format to present the Christmas story as it is written in God's own words in the Bible.

Such Statement of Intent includes the proposed revisions, tariffs and schedules, and a statement specifying in detail each proposed change, the effect the proposed change is expected to have on the revenues of the Company, and the classes and numbers of utility customers affected. Gross revenues are expected to be increased 15.4 per cent over adjusted test year revenues by the new rates. Notes From Nancy

When you think of your most memorable holidays, chances are they were the ones in which you took special pains with homemade gifts and decorations. Each gift was made with a special friend or relative in mind. Each decorative touch was created to make that and future holidays extra festive.

This year, recreate that special feeling, with some new decorative ideas and gifts to make from your kitchen. The decorations are made with fresh California-Arizona oranges and lemons and materials you can pick up at a florist supply into roses and sprayed with glitter. As the roses dry out, they take on that quaint antique feel that gives your creation an heirloom look. The beauty of this idea is that it lets you use the inside and the outside of the fresh citrus, so nothing goes to waste. And once you have made your initial investment, the arrangement can be used year after year. The dried Glittered Citrus Flowers will probably even last from year to year, if stored properly. But if they don't you know you'll always be able to find fresh citrus in your favorite store--whatever the season.

These lovely designs were created by Grace Redding, Southern California's well-known floral designer.

GLITTERED CITRUS MANTLE DECOR

You will need:

- 36" x 12" x 1-3/4" green styrofoam rectangle
- 7 votive lights with candles
- 1 roll (60") florist Stickum
- 9 yards velvet ribbon, 3/4 inch wide
- 9 yards patterned ribbon, 1" to 1 3/8" wide
- 1 bunch (100) wooden florist picks
- 1 roll green florist tape
- Straight pins
- 3-1/2 to 4 dozen natural or artificial greens on picks
- 1-1/2 dozen orange blossom picks or other small white flowers on picks (if single flowers, double amount)

Pipe cleaners or light-weight florist wire
10 Glittered Citrus Flowers (directions follow)
2 Glittered Whole Lemons
6 Glittered Citrus Slices (orange and lemon)

To assemble:
1. With knife, cut styrofoam into three pieces, 4" x 27", 18-1/2" x 4" and 4" x 5". 2. Center one atop the

other, ending with the smallest rectangle. Attach with Stickum. 3. Cut seven blocks, 2" x 2", from remaining styrofoam; attach to votive lights with Stickum. Arrange lights across styrofoam bases, securing with Stickum. 4. Place velvet ribbon over patterned ribbon and work two layers as one. Wrap ribbon around bottom rectangle, attaching with straight pins. 5. Beginning at ends of styrofoam, insert greens; work to center until styrofoam is well covered. 6. Add orange blossoms. 7. Make 12 Ribbon Tufts (directions follow) and place among greens. 8. Add bow (directions follow) to front center of arrangement. 9. Arrange Glittered Citrus Flowers and Slices among greens. 10. Add Glittered Whole Lemons around center bow.

Note: To save the expense of votive lights, cut 4 oranges in half crosswise and ream juice. Remove remaining membrane from 7 halves. Secure orange halves to arrangement as indicated. Add candles.

GLITTERED HOLIDAY CITRUS TREE

You will need:

- 16" green styrofoam tree
- 12" to 16" green styrofoam disc (1" high)
- 1 roll (60") florist Stickum
- 1 bunch (100) wooden florist picks
- 5 votive lights with candles
- 6 yards velvet ribbon, 1/2" to 3/4" wide
- 6 yards patterned ribbon, 3/4" wide
- Pipe cleaners or light-weight florist wire
- 1 roll green florist tape
- Straight pins
- 6 dozen natural or artificial greens
- 3 dozen orange blossom picks or other small white flowers on picks
- 14 Glittered Citrus Flowers
- 6 Glittered Whole Lemons
- 12 Glittered Lemon Slices

To assemble:

1. Attach styrofoam tree in center of disc base with Stickum. 2. Arrange votive lights around edge of base; attach with Stickum. 3. Place velvet ribbon over patterned ribbon and work two layers as one. Wrap ribbon around base; attach

with straight pins. 4. If greens do not have self picks, wire to wooden picks. For artificial greens that are too full as purchased detach from self picks and insert wooden pick in hole. Greens will go further this way. 5. Beginning at top of tree, insert greens, working down until tree and base are covered. 6. Add orange blossoms among greens and between votive lights. 7. Make 24 Ribbon tufts (directions follow) and add to tree and base. 8. Arrange Glittered Citrus Flowers and Slices on tree and base. 9. Place Glittered Whole Lemons around base.

Note: To save the expense of votive lights, cut 3 oranges in half crosswise and ream juice, saving juice for a beverage or punch. Remove remaining membrane from 5 halves. Secure orange halves to arrangement as indicated. Add candles.

YULETIDE CITRUS AMBROSIA

- 1 tablespoon fresh squeezed lemon juice
- 2 tablespoons honey

- 1 medium banana, sliced
- 2 California-Arizona oranges, peeled, cut in bite-size pieces
- 1/4 cup raisins
- 1/4 cup flaked or shredded coconut

In bowl, combine lemon juice and honey; stir in banana slices. Add orange pieces and raisins; chill. Stir in coconut before serving. Makes about 3 cups (4 servings).

From The County Agent

Showing livestock in shows is a very rewarding experience for all members of the family. That feeling is conveyed in the following article written by Dr. Frank A. Orts of Texas A&M University.

See that barn on the outskirts of town! Perhaps it's in a fairgrounds surrounded by gooseneck trailers and four door pickups.

What's going on? Why it's a steer show of course. They come in all sizes from the smallest community show held perhaps under a tree or maybe a tent on a vacant lot to the "biggies" held in a facility covering multiple acres.

The number of entries range from 8 - 10 up to close to 2,000. These may be broken into classes by breed, by weight or any combination thereof. Breeds range from the old tried and true British Breeds to varying degrees and percentages of these plus the European and Asiatic breeds.

So much for talking about the steers. It is my conviction that we have a much more important "commodity" and that is the boy or girl on the halter of that "beast".

They come in all ages, sizes and shapes but let us not forget they are our future. They are the farmers, ranchers, agri-business leaders, doctors, lawyers, and yes, politicians of the future. They are the most valuable commodity that we have in that showing. As far as I am concerned they are the most important commodity; the steer is secondary.

When I see a youngster on the halter, I can rest assured that in most cases that steer is the result of a total family endeavor. When I walk down the aisles in the barn I see mama, daddy, brothers, sisters, aunts, uncles, grandparents and the County Extension Agent or Vocational Agriculture teacher, and in some cases both. This is the big reason I always say one of the major advantages of steer shows is that it contributes to family closeness. Parents and family are concerned and working together with their youngsters, and I feel this is so important in this day and time.

I also feel having a steer project, or any livestock project for that matter, gives the youngster a sense of responsibility (perhaps at times we would like to

see more), money management, love and care of animals, and last, but not least, honesty and integrity as well as something to do with his or her idle time.

Youngsters have varying amounts of money (either theirs, mama and daddy's or his bankers) invested in that steer. This ranges from a few hundred to many thousands of dollars. At the end of the feeding period everyone hopes they can show a profit, but in actuality, very few do. There are always the monetary fortunates, but let us not forget there are no losers. This I feel is another lesson that a youngster learns; how to not win there is a great sinking feeling but when they win there is that indescribable feeling that runs up and down your spine. One holds his or her chest a little bit higher and says "that's my boy or girl on that halter". In your mind you know that maybe in some way you as a parent have contributed something to the upbringing of that youngster and perhaps helped to mold their future.

One of the most sickening things that I have ever experienced in my 40 years of being involved with shows occurred some time ago. It did not happen in a steer show but in a barrow show. A young man had a barrow which placed high in the class and when the barrows were "weighed back" it failed to make the weight tolerance by one pound and was disqualified. The next day the father was rather irate and was venting his anger on the show officials. In the conversation he related that

conversation he related that his son had told him, "Daddy, perhaps if you had helped me like other parents help their youngsters this would not have happened" The daddy's comment was that the barrow was not his project but belonged to his son and he wanted nothing to do with it. I think that youngster

was trying to tell his daddy something (I want your help, understanding and love!) but the individual could not see this. What a shame!

These are just some of the feelings that go through my mind when I'm at a steer show, whether it be in XYZ County or in the Astrohall in Houston. Think about it this way sometime, maybe the steer is actually showing the youngster. This is the product of a total family endeavor and this we say is showing a steer, but is it? It might give you a different perspective of the show even if your youngster doesn't get that banner or that big price at the auction you still can have a great sense of a job well done. You can think, perhaps I have touched my son or daughter in a way that would not have been possible were it not for that steer.

Maybe you feel (if not in the winners circle) there goes all that money and work down the drain. How wrong can you be. That time you spent with your youngster and in most cases with your whole family is invaluable. Can you put a monetary value on that? It truly makes me feel good when I sit in my office and look out the window and see young adults; who maybe just last year were on a halter; carrying books, pursuing an education which will prepare them for the future. I feel equally good when I am traveling throughout the state and I see other young adults who are using their talents and lessons learned in the show ring in everyday life.

Next time you go to a steer show, just sit back and say thanks we have something like this in which our sons and daughters can compete. Don't look for faults, just look at those developing young adults who are trying to deep one eye on the judge, one on the steer, and one on the coach on the outside of the ring and one on the ring steward - what an incredible being that can do all this with only two eyes. They are truly amazing!

Naval Oranges Are Coming Into Market

The September and October rains increased the sizes of lemons coming from the desert areas, so look for larger sizes to be a good buy.

Select lemons with firm, smooth, unblemished skins and no soft spots. Lemons will keep at room temperature for about a week to ten days, and in the refrigerator for several weeks. A lemon will yield more juice if left at room temperature before squeezing.
