## Wounded man leads cops on 3-hour chase

An Eldorado man managed to elude law enforcement officers for three hours, last Friday evening, despite the fact that he was suffering from a gunshot wound to the shoulder. Joe David Gandar, 21, was eventually found, hiding under a bed in a home on Rudd Road. After being subdued by officers, he was taken by EMS ambulance to Schleicher County Medical Center where he was treated and transfered to a San Angelo hospital.

The local 9-1-1 dispatcher received a call at 9:28 p.m. reporting that Gandar had shot himself in the chest in an aparment at the Eldorado Place Aparments complex on East Murchison Avenue. Deputy Kevin Herbert arrived at the scene moments later to find that Gandar had fled on foot. At that time Herbert was advised by witnesses that Gandar was still armed with a .38 calber revolver.

Sheriff David Doran, Chief Deputy George Arispe and Deputy David Olivan were called in to assist with the search. Also joining the hunt were TPWD Game Warden Marco Alvizo and agent Guajardo, with Texas Alcohol Beverage Control.

During the 3-hour search, officers received numerous tips from Gandar's friends and relatives, some of whom said Gandar had called them from his cellular phone. While some of the officers followed up on the tips, taking them across town to the football field, and other points around the school campus, other investigators began a grid

"We didn't know how badly he was wounded, if he was hiding from us, or if he was down somewhere and unable to respond to our calls," Sheriff David Doran commented after Gandar was found. "It turned out he didn't want to be found.

The Sheriff said that all the tips from Gandar's friends turned out to be false leads. "As far as we can tell, he headed straight for the house on Rudd Road," Doran said. The Sheriff also noted that Gandar did not have a cellular phone in his possession when he was found. Neither did he have the .38 revolver, prompting an extensive search of the area. However, the search proved fruitless and the gun was never found.

Witnesses at the scene of the shooting told officers that a dispute over the custody of a child quickly escalated. At one point, Gandar reportedly produced the revolver and threatened to end his life. Witnesses told officers he turned the gun on himself and fired.

Gandar's chest wound turned out to be in his shoulder. The bullet reportedly passed through without striking a vital organ. A trail of blood led investigators into a field to the west of the apartment complex soon dwindled.

At one point, Deputy David Olivan recalled a previous incident in which he pursued Gandar from the apartment complex. That pursuit ended at a relative's home on Rudd Road. Following a hunch that Gandar would return to the home, Olivan went to the house in search of clues. His hunch sooned proved out as Olivan found a broken window, and spots of fresh blood.

As soon as backup officers arrived, the men entered the home through a back door and reportedly found Gandar hiding under a bed. At that point he became combative and had to be subdued before being placed in an ambulance.

#### Enrollment decline forces cutbacks and higher taxes at SCISD

Saddled with declining enrollment and diminishing state funding, Schleicher County ISD trustees find themselves faced with having to make some difficult decisions — cut spending, raise taxes, or both.

The dilemma isn't exclusive to SCISD. School districts across the state are wrestling with the same problem.

The culprit? A statewide budget crisis brought on by the recent economic downturn. Following the terrorist attacks on New York and Washington, D.C. in 2001, Texas' economy took a nose dive, driving down state revenues and sending legislators scurrying to protect their pet programs.

Few if any programs avoided the budget cutting axe during the recent legislative session as Texas Governor Rick Perry, Lt. Governor David Dewhurst and Speaker of the House Tom Craddick made good on their promise not to raise taxes. Among the areas hit the hardest was education.

Locally, the statewide budget problems are compounded by declining student enrollment. Since the amount of State funds SCISD receives is dictated by the number of children in school, Eldorado schools are facing a double whammy.

As if those problems were not enough, SCISD overstated its enrollment during the 2002-03 school year, resulting in an overpayment from the State — money that the Texas Education Agency now wants back. SCISD Supt. Mark Gesch says the school district must repay \$273,523.00 to the

Schleicher County Medical Center is planning a patio party, complete with hamburgers, hot dogs, and all the trimmings, as a way of welcoming Dr. Jim Lucas and Dr.Lillian Perez to the

The party will be held on the patio adjacent to the Nusing Home dining room on Friday, Aug. 15, 2003. It will begin at 7:00 p.m. and will be open to the public. Everyone is encouraged to come by and meet the new physicians.

The overpayment resulted from SCISD reporting an average daily attendance of 600 students. However, TEA penalizes schools for student absences and calculated its payment to SCISD based on a "refined" average daily attendance of 575.6. Refined ADA numbers have been steadily declining at SCISD for years. During the 1998-99 school year the refined ADA stood at 679.5. It dropped to 639.9 the following year and continued to fall to 620.7 in 2000-01. Last year the number dipped to 597.5 and continued its decline this year.

Through the same period, staffing numbers declined from 129 in '98-99 to 116 in '01-02. The number of paid staff grew to 121 during 2002-03.

Gesch, in only his third month on

the job, has the unenviable task of navigating through the budgetary mine field. He told SCISD trustees Monday night that one of the first things he learned at Superintendent School was, "Don't raise taxes your first year."

Perhaps in hopes of forestalling a tax increase, Gesch has already implemented spending cuts. But, with 75 percent of the school's budget going for personnel, it will be all but impossible for Gesch to trim the budget enough, without making cuts in staffing.

And, there have already been some staff reductions — all coming through attrition, Gesch is quick to point out. At least two teaching positions in the Middle School are likely to remain unfilled and the position of assistant band
