Candidates Needed As Deadline Nears

With only seven calendar days left before the first filing deadline of the local governmental bodies, three candidates have filed for election out of ten open spots on the four major boards. The four boards that have place openings are the Water District, City Council, School Board, and the Hospital Board.

The Water District has two seats open with one spot being Howard Derrick in Precinct 2. Steve Sykes in Precinct 3 represents the other seat open. No one has filed for these spots as of presstime. Deadline for filing is March 11, 1983.

Walt Bosmans, Jr. is the only person who has filed at present for a seat on the City Council. Councilmen Ronnie Sauer and Wayne McGinnes

both have terms expiring along with Mayor Bob Lester. Aldermen are picked at large in Eldorado. March 2, 1983 is targeted as deadline for candidates to file for seats.

Wednesday March 2, is also the deadline for School Board candidates to file for two seats that will become open. Board members Billy Williams and Lynn Meador's positions are up for grabs in this election. Incumbent Meador and John Nikolauk have filed for the seats and they were the only two that had filed at presstime.

Three hospital board seats will be opening April 2 when Pat Sykes', Becky Sterling's and Reuben Minor's terms will expire. At presstime, no one had filed for any of these seats. Deadline for filing for places on the

water board will be March 8.

Hospital Board Looks At Services

Medical services were the main topic of Monday night's meeting of the Schleicher County Medical Center Board of Trustees.

Dr. Wayne Williams representing his firm MedFirst, an extended hours family practice and emergency clinic program that offers two doctors and their qualified assistants to small community hospitals.

The clinic offers a 12 hour service on a 7-day work week with primary medical services only.

His proposal will utilize existing medical center facilities such as the clinic, reception area, examination area, laboratory and X-Ray facilities as well as some use of the business office. A 24-hour hospital observation program would be instated.

Williams went on to state that should his proposal be accepted by the trustees the initial proposal would be flexible to comply with the desires of the board as long as it was financially feasible.

In Williams proposal, he proposed for discussion in affiliation with the hospital district the approximate sum of an initial grant from the district of \$450,000. The statement he offered that this approximate level of support along with the fees for services rendered would enable his innovative family practice system to support itself and should provide sufficient funds over a period of years. His system also considers the non-guaranteed status of Medicare for the future due to lack of federal cutbacks.

In summarizing Dr. Williams initial proposal his offer brought forth comprehensive medical sources at the present hospital site on a regular basis, efficient emergency service, all under the guise of primary medical facility equipped with two physicians.

Williams cited that his operation had been successful in other communities throughout West Texas and that he recognized and could offer a solution to the problem of small communities providing adequate primary medical services in the family practice mode. He further stated that the public would have to be educated to the hours and methods of the family practice service he offered.

The normal office call could range between \$25-\$28 as it does in San Angelo and San Antonio but a non major emergency could range as high as \$110 after hours. The hospital trustees voted to table the motion for further study and to call a special executive session for next Monday under the statutes of deliberation of contract.

During the reading of the minutes of the previous meeting an amendment was made to the previous minutes in relationship to the purchasing of insurance for the hospital.

On a motion made by Mike Moore and seconded by Reuben Minor, \$237 was added to the premium for personal injury coverage. Also in the reading of the minutes an amendment was made in relationship to the payment of the election judges for the upcoming board election. The judge's salary was increased to \$77 for election day with the helpers to receive \$52 per day.

The board acted on a motion made by Mike Moore and seconded by Sam Henderson, Jr. to enter into phase II of the hospital's landscaping program. This would release \$876 for the planting of trees on the grounds. Board President Curtis Andrews appointed Moore as chairman of the committee comprised of Pete Peters and Sam Henderson, Jr. to study the employing of a groundskeeper for the hospital. They were requested to report their findings at the next meeting.

Ray Ballew representing the Schleicher County Tax Appraisal District appeared before the board as a courtesy visit should any questions arise pertaining to the \$5490.76 bill from the tax appraisal district for services rendered. During this segment of the session it was learned that the appraisal district had a budget of \$78,690.00 with a breakdown as follows: hospital board's share \$10,910; city's share \$1,453; county participating to the tune of \$26,371; with the school district carrying the bulk at \$38,835. Ballew stated that the present tax appraisal could be amended in 1985. The board unanimously passed the motion made by Moore and seconded by Peters.

Next the trustees took up the issue of allowing Lee (Smokey) Taylor to

lease space in the middle clinic at a rate of \$276 per month to open a pharmacy within the Medical Center. Taylor is already in the employ of the Medical Center as acting consultant pharmacist and derives \$176 monthly for his service.

At present he is waiting for his licenses to open his pharmaceutical center in the medical complex.

The board then entertained the proposal of Dr. Charles Webb, D.D.S. to operate in the Medical Center for two days a week and to lease 3000 ft. in the old clinic for \$300 per month. Webb plans to supply his own equipment and assured the board that a local receptionist would be hired. At present he has a relatively large practice in San Angelo. The motion was made by Mike Moore and seconded by Reuben Minor to accept the proposal.

During the Financial report presented by Bobbie Sanders the board was informed that the audit had not been completed but would be presented at the next meeting.

At present the Nursing Home is standing at status quo in relationship to last year and that a \$2400 unaudited profit is being shown by the hospital for the previous month.

Sanders reported that approximately \$13,000 was present in the accounts receivable column and that roughly \$5000 had been charged off at the end of the year from the hospital books. Minor made the motion which was followed by Moore's second to pay the bills. Peters requested and received permission to write three prospective doctors in relationship to practicing in Eldorado. With this the meeting was adjourned by a motion from Henderson and seconded by Peters.

Dahlberg and Forrest Meador will show two shorthorn steers. Shanna Swift will show a Hereford steer while Marty Wells exhibits a Limousine steer. Ron Mittel will show a polled Hereford steer while sister, Mitzi, shows a Brangus steer. Kelly Leggett will take a Santa Gertrudis steer. Steve Whitten will exhibit an Angus steer. Clint Griffin will show a Poland China Barrow. There will also be FFA pigs and lambs making the trip.

The next show after Houston will be the San Angelo Livestock Show.

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Seventeen Counties Represented at Meet

Youthful skills will be highlighted in San Angelo February 26 in Sunset Mall when more than 150 4-H'ers from across the 17 county West Central Texas District meet for competition during the 1983 District Seven Food and Project Shows.

According to Iris Kalich, 4-H Youth Specialist, the shows feature two firsts as this is the first time a project show in which contestants may advance to state competition has been held in the district. The second new innovation is the use of the Mall as a setting for the shows. "We are hoping to generate more community interest by having the shows in the Mall," said Kalich. "By using this ideal setting the public will be able to view samples of just what 4-H is doing. We

also feel that the new activities and setting are appropriate now as this year marks the 75th Anniversary of the 4-H program in Texas."

Actual judging will begin at 10:45 a.m. Saturday with the awards ceremonies set for 2:00 p.m. George Bundren, Texas 4-H Trustee, representing Nathan's Jewelers is scheduled to present plaques to the winners and ribbons to all 4-H participants. The foods and projects will be on display throughout the judging.

Miss Kalich said judges in the food show will evaluate the contestant's knowledge of nutrition as well as his or her skill in preparation in deciding on the junior and senior winner in one of the four major food groups including breads and cereals, main

dishes, nutritious snacks and desserts, and fruits and vegetables. Concerning the project show, she said contestants may enter any of 59 categories available in the 4-H program. The exhibits entered must consist of work done during the past 12 months by the exhibitor in a bonafide 4-H project.

Divisions for the competition are divided into age groups of 14 to 19 year olds which make up the senior segment and 9-13 year olds which make up the junior segment. Following competition at the district level senior contestants who qualify will participate at the state level at Texas A&M University during the Texas 4-H Round-up, June 7-8, 1983.

Both the shows at the Mall are sponsored by the Texas Agricultural Extension Service.

Social Security

Garland Gregg, Social Security Representative for the San Angelo Social Security office, has scheduled his March visit to Eldorado. He will be at the county courthouse on Thursday, March 17, 1983, from 1:30 - 2:30. Anyone who wants to file a claim for benefits, get information, or transact other business with the Social Security Administration may contact him at this time.

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The sponsors of this law have told us it was designed to catch a small minority of Americans who evade taxes on their interest and dividends. But the truth is the law penalizes the great majority of America's savers and investors who pay their taxes faithfully. What's more, the federal government is now receiving all the necessary information to curtail tax cheating.

Though the law does include exemptions for some low income and elderly Americans, if they go through the red tape of filing an application, most savers and investors will forfeit some of the money they could earn in compounded interest.

We urge you to join our efforts by writing letters to your representative in Congress and to the two senators from this state. Tell them you want the 10 percent withholding tax repealed, because it would impose an unfair penalty on savers like yourself.

For assistance in contacting your representative and senators please ask any of our bankers. If we all act now, Congress will get a clear message from the voters back home, and they will work to repeal this needless law.

Please contact one of our officers if you would like to express your opinion regarding the withholding law to one of our elected representatives in Washington. We have printed information and letters available if you would like to send a letter to your Congressman. We urge you to express your opinion regarding this issue. We believe there is a fair chance that the withholding law as described in the above information can be repealed.

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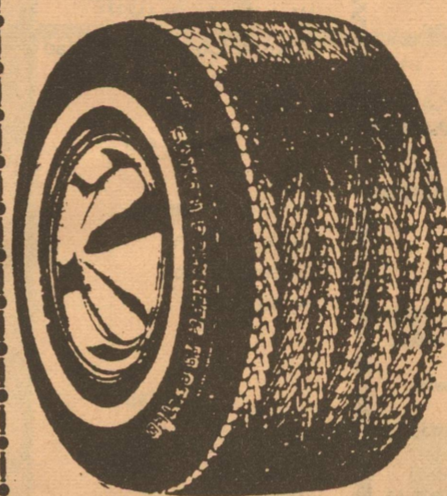

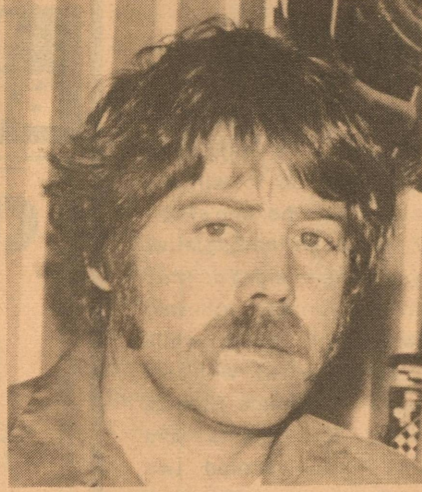

Margaret Litton - No one is concerned, they don't want to get involved.



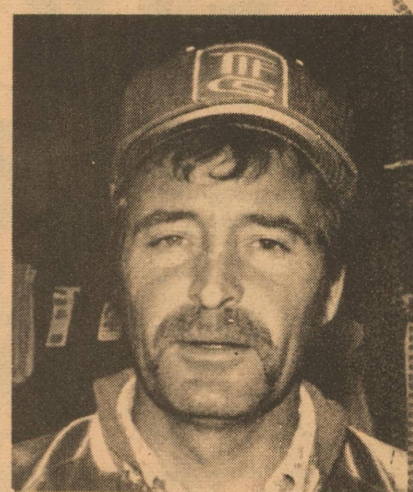
Joe Christy - They just don't want to get involved because of the way it is run now.

Practices that virtually guarantee a net return are pregnancy testing, sorting and feeding cattle according to need, selecting bulls on performance and implanting steers.

"These practices can mean extra dollars because they help increase the calf crop and weaning weights," points out Dr. L.R. Spott, beef cattle specialist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, Texas A&M University system. "This means more pounds of beef going to market, and that's the name of the game."
