Soil Conservation Service Here To Help

Prescribed Burn Can Be Beneficial

The subject of prescribed burning of rangeland often evokes strong reactions, particularly from anyone who has experienced the danger and destruction of a wildfire. However, a safely and effectively conducted burn program is a viable range improvement practice which, with the increased costs of chemical and mechanical treatments, might just be the tool needed for certain situations.

The use of fire as a range improvement tool is not new. Indians and many early ranchers alike regularly fired the land to control unwanted plants or to provide nutritious forage. Research on prescribed burning has been conducted in the United States for many years; however, burning had been used in Texas only on a limited basis until the past few years. The recent surge of use and interest in

prescribed burning has been attributed to its relatively low cost, freedom from herbicide restrictions, and its own merits as a range improvement practice. Studies have also shown

that the life of more expensive control measures can be lengthened when combined with prescribed burning, thus improving the economic returns over single method range improvement.

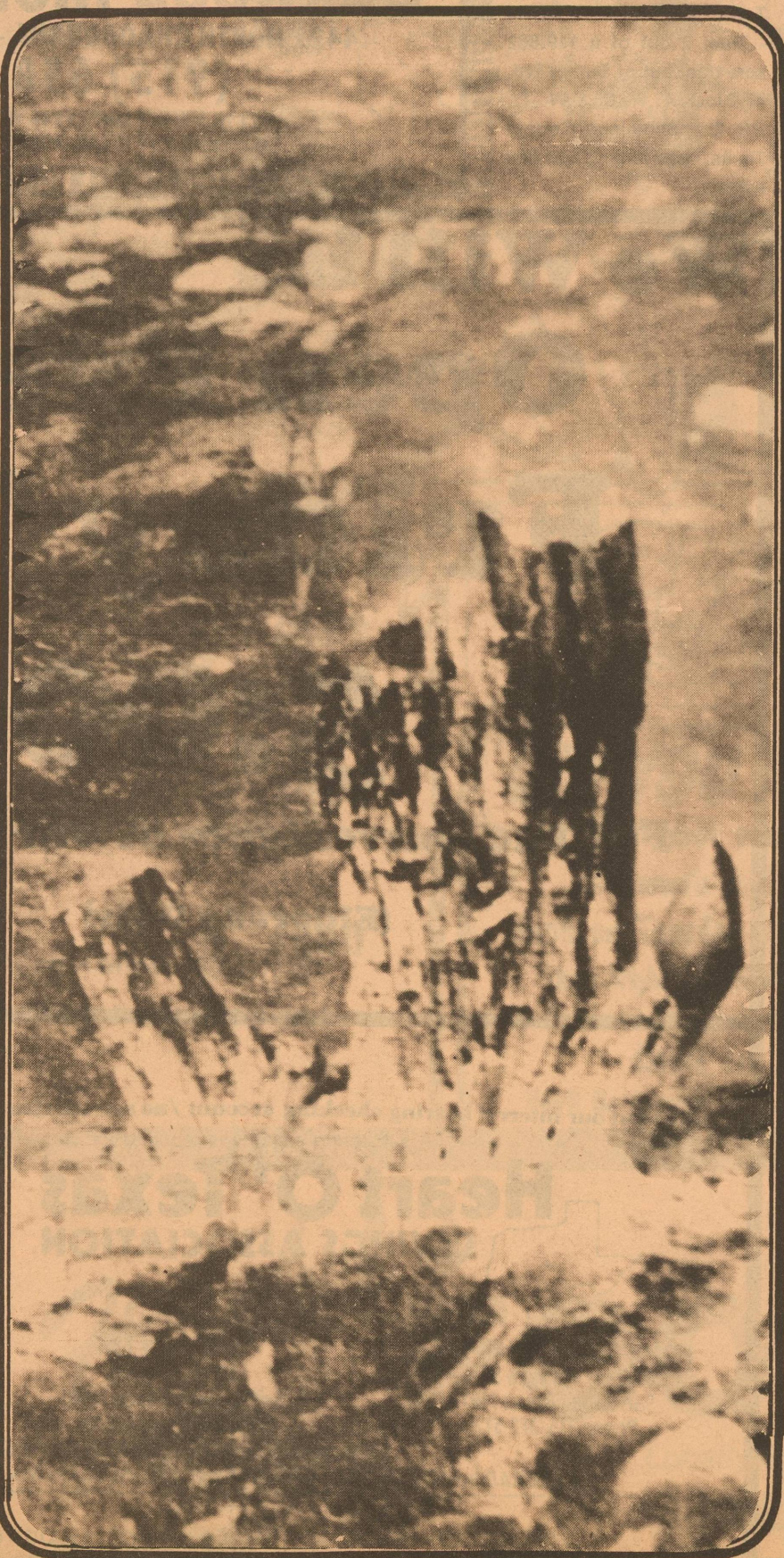
The Soil Conservation Service can assist producers wishing to include prescribed burning in their management programs. SCS can discuss and help define objectives, assist in evaluating whether a burn is applicable and feasible in a particular situation, and outline conditions and procedures necessary to conduct a successful burn. SCS will also help develop a prescribed burning management plan - a thorough outline of information needed and procedures to follow before, during and after the burn.

Prior to 1983, SCS had assisted Schleicher County producers burn about 2500 acres of rangeland. So far this year, prescribed burns have been conducted on 675 acres and are scheduled on 700 more in the county.

Prescribed burns are usually conducted in late winter and early spring before greenup. The dry grass burns well and greenup occurs soon afterward in years with normal rainfall patterns. With the mild winter so far this year, greenup will probably be early, leaving little time remaining for conducting burns. Even if a burn cannot be managed now, it is not too early to begin planning for next year. For instance, it is very important to defer grazing long enough during the year to build up enough fuel to carry a good fire.

Hospital Board Says No To Proposal

The Schleicher County Medical Center Board of Trustees met Monday night in an executive session to discuss the proposal made by Dr. Wayne Williams to establish an extended hours family practice and emergency clinic at the Medical Center. After approximately 2 hours of discussion, the board voted to reject Dr. Williams' proposal and to continue as they have in the past in providing medical services for Schleicher County.

The board's decision came with the reasoning that the district would have to be completely realigned and that they would continue in their efforts to acquire an additional doctor to service the community, whereas if they had selected Williams' proposal the Medical Center could no longer function as it is now and would lose its primary medical service standings.

The trustees also discussed the employment of a groundskeeper for the upcoming spring and summer months. No action was taken on this matter.

More Enter Races

More hats are being tossed into the ring as deadlines for two governmental bodies, the City Council and the School Board, have arrived.

Four Schleicher County citizens have announced their candidacy for positions on the City Council which closed its doors for candidates as of March 2. Candidates for positions include Walt Bosmans, Jr., Bill Hodges, Barbara Jackson, and Ronnie Sauer.

John Nikolauk and incumbent Lynn Meador are seeking positions on the Schleicher County Independent School district Board of Trustees. Billy Williams' and Meadors' terms on

the board will expire this year. Deadline for candidates to file for election was also March 2.

At the Leader presstime, two candidates had filed for election on the hospital board with one position unfilled for, Pam White and Bill Hodges will be trying for seats left open when Pat Sykes' and Becky Sterling's and Reuben Minor's terms expire.

The two positions up for grabs in the Water District have been filed for as deadline for filing is today. Incumbents Steve Sykes and Howard Derrick will run again in Precinct 2 and Precinct 3 respectively.

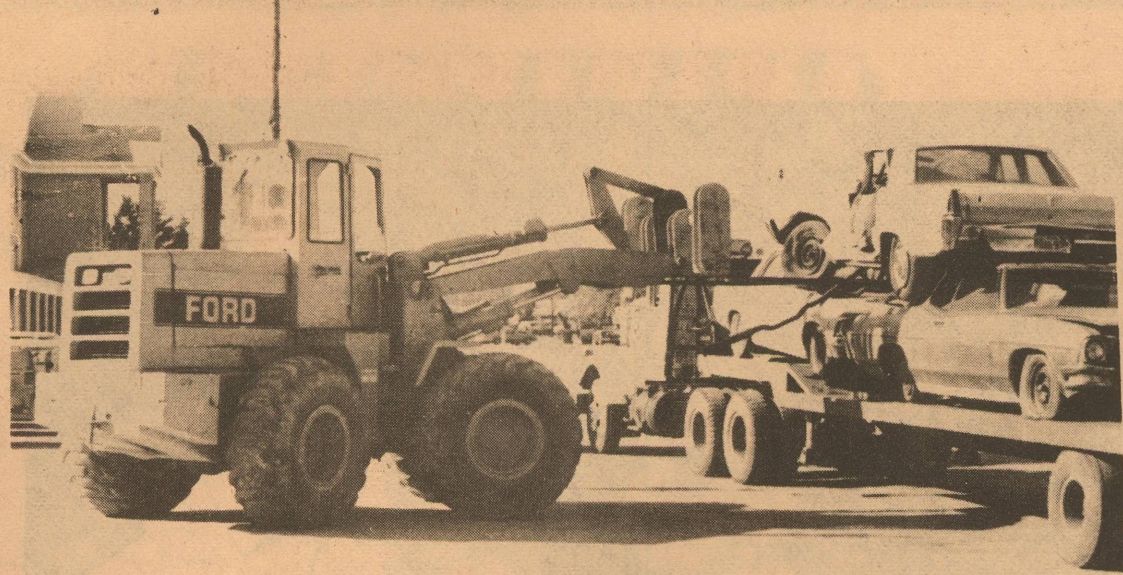
Sheriff Gives Lecture

Schleicher County Sheriff Orval Edmiston met with approximately 20 people Thursday night at Our Lady Guadalupe Catholic Church. The group was comprised of a majority of young people and Edmiston discussed drug usage. He stated that marijuana was the most frequent drug used in this area with its main supply coming from Mexico and South America. He stated that there had been some hard drug usage locally but it nowhere compared with the use of marijuana. He informed the youngsters of the damage that the use of marijuana could do to themselves such as effects on the brain, body chemistry, blood, and reproductive organs in the body. He said that drug sales on a nation wide basis was one of the largest businesses in America at approximately 50 to 60 billion dollars annually. These statistics he offered cited that approximately 75 percent of all burglaries, robberies and murders were drug related.

Edmiston told the group the identifying tell-tale signs of drug usage, such as incoherent speech, mannerism changes, sleepiness, eye dilation, lack of coordination, a degrading in values such as appear-

ance, grades and withdrawal from the family unit.

Edmiston touched lightly on the technicalities of making a drug related arrest such as the proper wording of search warrants, the necessity of blood tests to find the drug substance in the user's body and the difficulty confronting law enforcement agencies making major drug sales apprehension such as the drug dealers being represented by the very best lawyers available which could be afforded with money derived from their sales of the illegal product. He requested that each individual be aware of the signs of drug use and to notify the local sheriff's department in an effort to control drug usage here in the community. He invited his listeners to come to the sheriff's office and view the display of drug related paraphernalia. He brought to the attention of his audience the long range effect of hard drug usage such as cocaine, heroin, LSD, amphetamines and barbituates. The group responded with some questions concerning drug usage and Sheriff Edmiston reiterated his plea for assistance from the community to help control drug usage in Schleicher County.

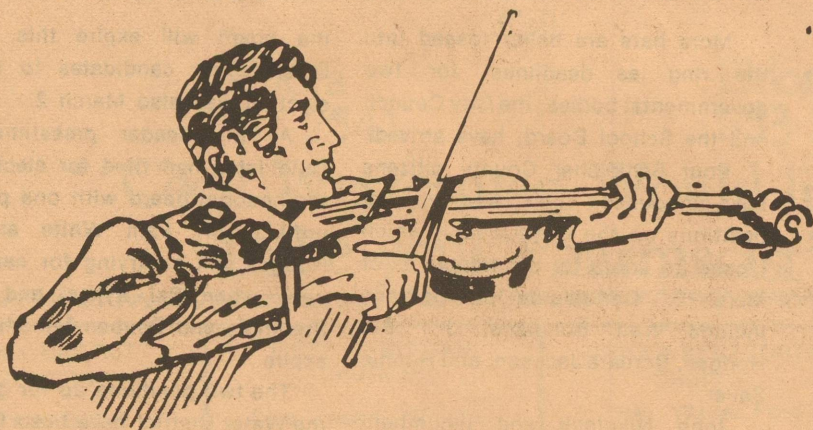

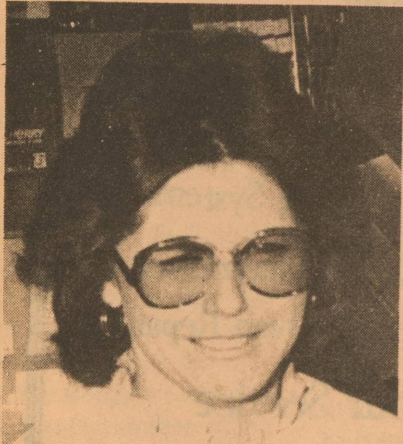

Doc Bar's Son And Peppy Horse Split At Houston

Two Texas horses shared the championship title in the exciting conclusion of the National Cutting Horse Association World's Championship Finals, Feb. 20 in the open division. With matching cumulative scores of 672.5 Handle Bar Doc and Tenino San were named as co-champions in one of the

most dramatic events held at the Houston Livestock Show Horse Arena.

The World's Championship Finals is an open cutting event held annually by the NCHA. For the first time, it was held in Houston, co-sponsored by the Houston Livestock Show in cooperation with Gold River and Silver Creek

Smokeless Tobaccos.

Each of the co-sponsors contributed \$25,000 for the purse. With added entry fees, the total purse was \$96,075, making this competition one of the richest purses in cutting competition.

After two preliminary go-rounds, the field of 115 entries in the open division was narrowed to the top 12 finalists for Sunday night's competition. The meeting for March 14th has been designated Pledge Ritual for our three new pledges.

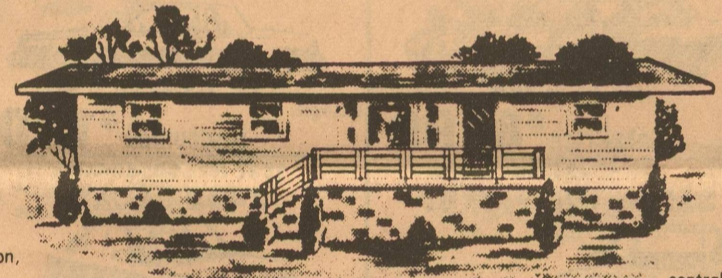
