Bob's Bucks

Thirty-five million dollars in local sales tax payments were returned to 974 Texas cities this month, according to Bob Bullock, state comptroller. Bullock said that the payments are running 4.5 percent behind last year.

Houston received \$7 million, the largest check compared to the \$10.3 million last March. This was a decrease of 31.5 percent. Dallas' check of \$4.2 million was down 19 percent from last March.


City sales taxes are collected along with state sales taxes by merchants and rebated monthly to the cities in which they are collected by the year of 1982 and the bottom line reflected that the hospital through all its sources of income had derived a \$79,018.00 net profit for the past year. This figure showed an increase in net profit of \$66,563.00 as opposed to the audit prepared for 1981. The hospital district had it not had approximately \$400,000 in ad valorum taxes, would have found itself in the red for the year of 1982.

The auditors' report also reflected a total of \$208,473.00 in total current assets and total current liabilities at \$189,417.00. In the long term liabilities, the hospital has an indebtedness of \$4,601.00 in notes payable and a bond indebtedness of \$100,000.00, bringing to a grand total of \$294,018.00 in total liabilities. When the total liabilities are combined with fund balances a total figure of \$1,110,586.00 is found. In the total asset columns the same figure is reflected.

In a survey compiled by the administration of the Schleicher County Medical Center a total of 1,928 patient days was accumulated in the year of 1982, 644 admissions and 53 baby deliveries were performed at the hospital. In other regular business addressed by the trustees during the meeting, it was learned that Dr. Webb, D.D.S. would not utilize the clinic's facilities for his 2 day dental practice




