

Largest field ever

Jr. Rodeo kicks off

Friday night at 7:30

The largest number of entries ever assembled for a local youth rodeo will be on hand Friday night, as the first ever Eldorado Youth Rodeo, sponsored by the Schleicher County 4-H Club and Beta Sigma Phi Sorority, kicks off at 7:30 p.m.

According to Barbara Jackson and Mary Leigh Dunagan, co-chairmen of the Rodeo Parade Committee, a parade will start at 4:30 Friday afternoon. Four floats and the San Angelo Riding Club will highlight the parade which will start at the Eldorado Woolen Mills and travel down Main Street and out the Mertzow Highway. Judges for the parade will be Mayor Bob Lester, Wayne McGinnes and Rooster Jackson.

One hundred five youngsters from twelve towns have entered the Rodeo as of Leader presstime. More are entering each day.

There will be three age divisions this year including girls and boys 12 and under, girls and boys 13 thru 15, and girls and boys 16 thru 19. Six events will make up the 12 and under division, which include barrel racing, pole bending, flag race, break-away roping, goat tying and calf riding.

Entry fee for each of these events is \$10. Barrel racing, pole bending, flag race, tie-down calf roping, goat tying, tie-down calf roping and boys steer riding make up the events in the 13 thru 15 division. Each entry fee is also \$10. The events in the 16 thru 19 division are the same as the 13 - 15 division except that there will be bull riding instead of steer riding. The entry fee in the bull riding is \$20.

There will be one go-round this year with the top five in each event competing for top honors Saturday night. Trophy buckles with an approximate \$500 retail value will be awarded to the All-Around Boy and All-Around Girl. First place winners receive a \$250 belt buckle with 2nd and 3rd place winners receiving cash prizes. To vie for All-Around honors you must compete in at least 3 events and no more than 6 events.

All bucking stock has been donated by local ranchers which include: Mort Mertz, Jim Hooten, Jim Gilstrap, Lynn Griffin, Dan Griffin, Billy Williams, Bob Johnson, Bill Wells and Ford Oglesby.

The Eldorado High School Art class and instructor Bill Wells have

been painting murals on windows of local Merchants' businesses to encourage people to come out and support the kids.

There will be a dance following Saturday night's performance. The Country Rimshots will be featured on the Rodeo slab.

After the meeting was called to order, bills from the previous pay period were approved as read except for one bill from Westerman Drug. The bill for medication of Bobby Lozano was sent back pending judgement over a litigation.

David Page with Plains Machinery met with the Commissioners to

discuss a bid on a new roller machine to be used on county road work. Jack Turner motioned that the bid of \$15,950 be accepted. Prissy Paxton seconded the motion and it passed unanimously.

Sheriff Edmiston visited the Court and asked them to discuss what they could do with the old 37180 fire base station that is presently on the third floor of the courthouse. The Court has recently purchased a new station.

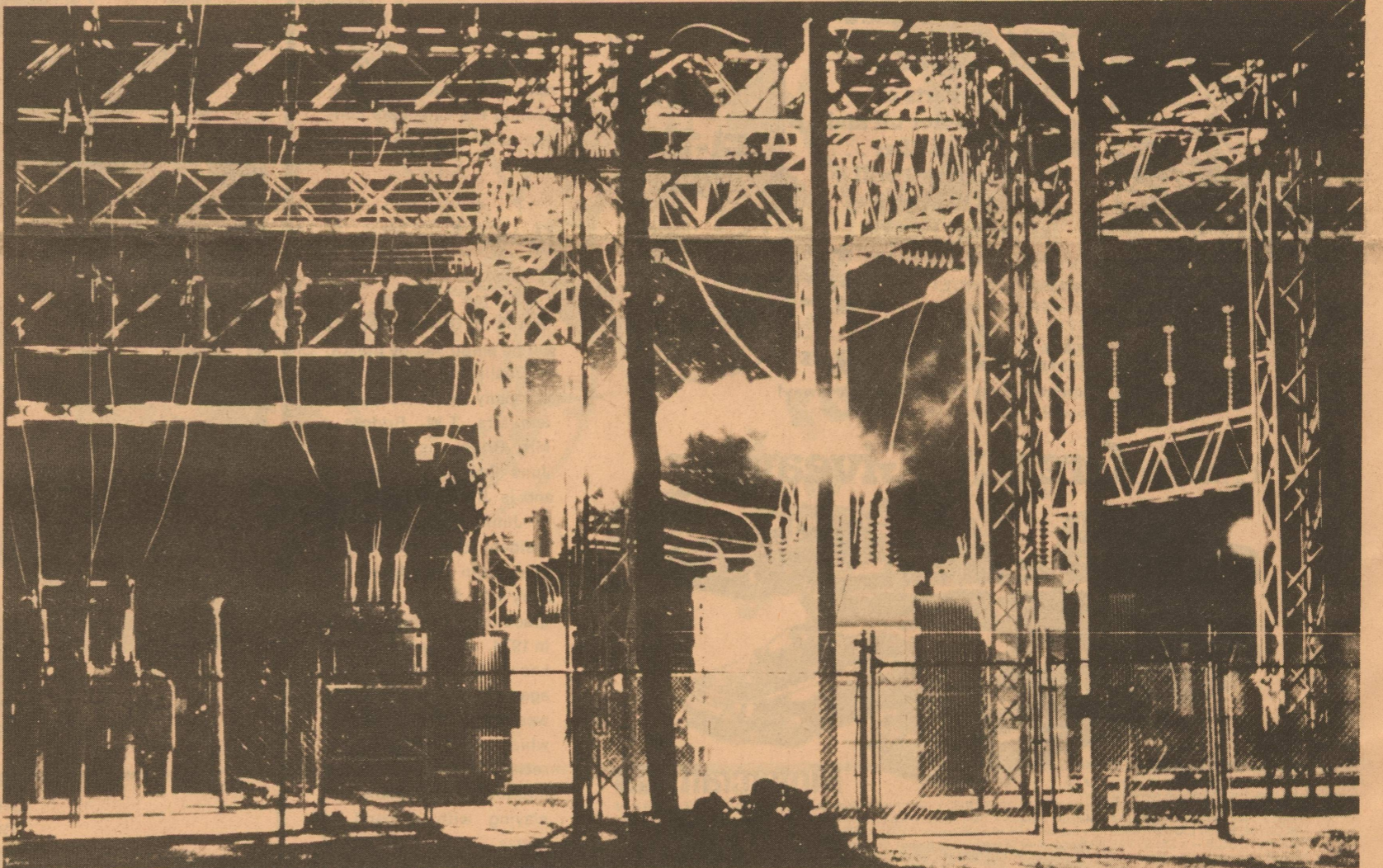
It was decided to advertise for bids in the Leader.

The Court then signed a letter giving permission for a right of way easement to be built on Schleicher County School grounds in Gaines County.

The widening of the front sidewalk was the next topic of the Commissioners. The existing walkway will be widened to five feet. The Court decided to advertise for bids in the Leader.

The reason for this change is that the department does not want to disturb the people of Eldorado during the night.

Any time the whistle is blown during 6 P.M. and 6 A.M., it will designate a weather warning or a civil defense warning. You will know this by three long blasts followed by a pause and then three more long blasts.

Paula Ranae Byrd and Karl Kinney Kothmann were united in marriage on March 5, 1983 in San Angelo.

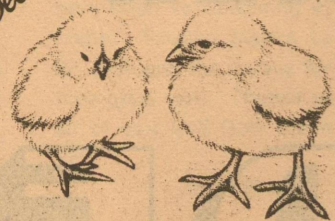

The calendars will have school events, birthdays, anniversaries, business meetings, and many more interesting dates.

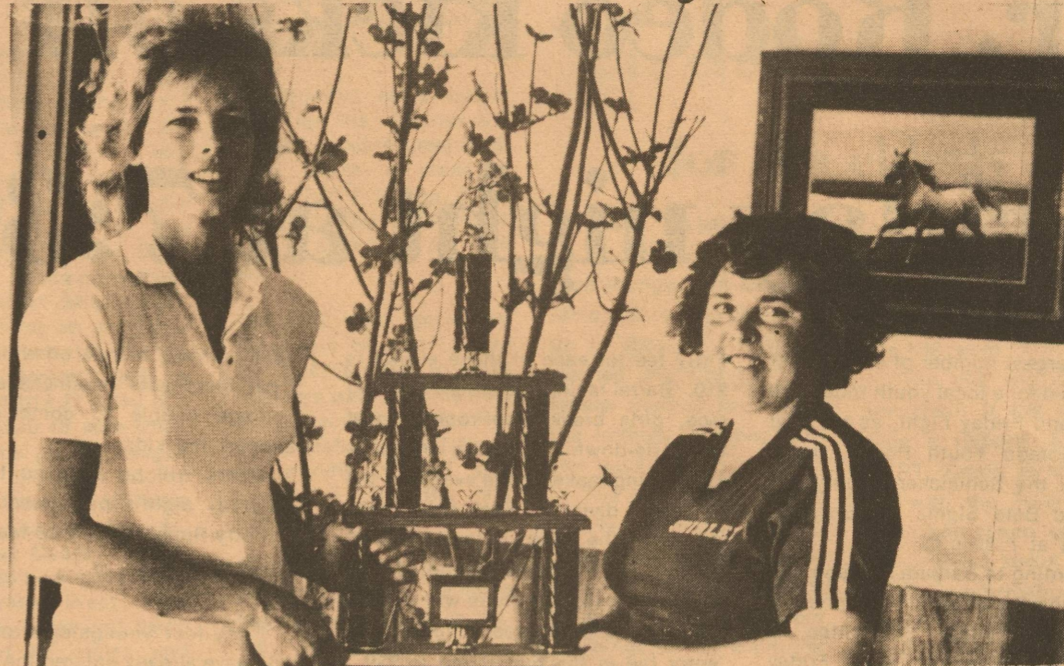

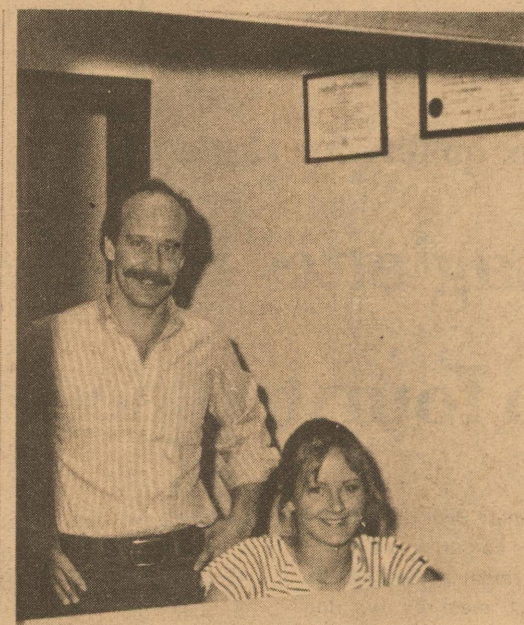

With approximately 20,000 cows in the county, that would produce about 10,000 heifers annually. Of this estimated count, only 651 heifers have been vaccinated.

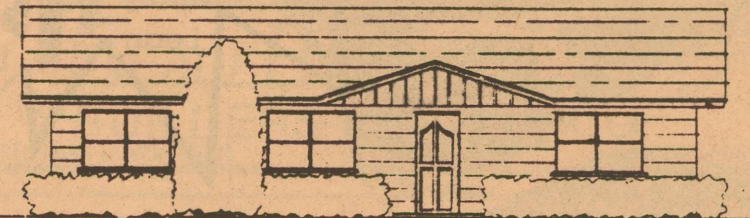
There is no charge for vaccination and ranchers are urged to have their heifers vaccinated.

Tax credit for the elderly

Some taxpayers who are 65 and older, and some even younger, can receive a tax credit for the elderly of up to \$562.50 if they are married and filing a joint federal income tax return, the Internal Revenue Service says.

The tax credit for the elderly is available on 1982 federal tax returns filed by taxpayers who are age 65 or older. Even taxpayers under age 65 can claim the credit if they receive a taxable retirement income from a public retirement system and meet certain other requirements.

Because this is a credit, it is subtracted from the tax due, but it cannot be greater than the total tax, the IRS says.

The IRS will compute the credit if the taxpayer files a filled-in Schedule R&RT, 'Credit for the Elderly,' with the Form 1040. The credit cannot be claimed on Form 1040A.

More information on the credit for the elderly is available in the free IRS Publication 524, 'Credit for the Elderly.' It can be ordered by mail using the handy order blank contained in the tax package.

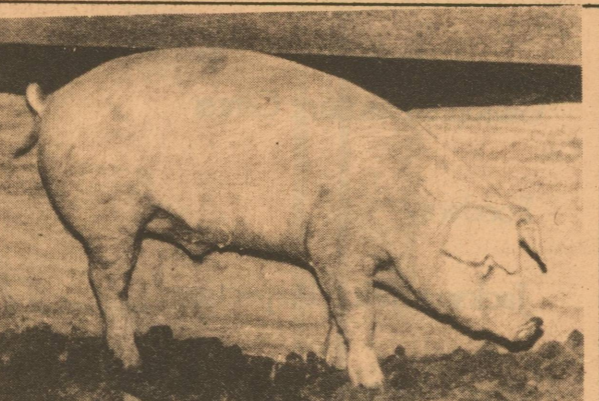
