Council lowers their water rates

During last week's City Council meeting three city residents appeared before the Council requesting assistance and participation from the city fathers concerning utilities and damage to utility services. Mrs. Ray Boyer presented a claim of \$40 in damage done to her sewer line by the city gas line contractors. The Council approved Mrs. Boyer's request and reimbursed her the \$40.

Albert Torres also appeared before the city fathers and requested the city's assistance with his February gas billing. It seems that Mr. Torres' gas line developed several leaks after the meter had been moved to another location and reinstalled with PVC as opposed to steel. The connectors leaked on Torres' side of the meter. After discussion by the Council Mr. Torres was given a \$108 credit by the city.

Mr. David Vannett appeared before the council in a petition to request credit for the amount of gas lost at the meter which services his car wash during the month of January. It appears the meter had been struck by an unknown person and after repairs had been made to the meter it was later found that the line leaving the meter was also broken. Councilman Sauer made a motion that 1/2 of the bill, \$146, be forgiven in that it was the failure of a city employee to report the broken line to the Sheriff's office for further investigation. The motion received a second from Gus Willeke but died when Councilwoman Bobbie Sanders and Councilman Edwin Jackson, Jr. opposed the motion. Another motion made by Willeke tabled the issue for further discussion. This motion passed with only one dissenting vote. Mr. Vannett also asked for consideration of his request for a \$2500 reimbursement for a sewer line laid in Block 1, South Heights Addition in December of 1977. No action was taken concerning the matter until further research could be developed and the item will reappear on the May 11th agenda.

"Statewide, these checks are down 3 percent from last year," Bullock said. "This follows the downward trend we're seeing in state sales tax receipts. For the first time in 21 years, we've seen a drop in the number of sales tax dollars collected from year to year. We've found the oil and gas industry pays about 30 percent of our state sales tax, either directly or indirectly, and the hardest hit areas of our state are where the local economy leans heaviest on oil and gas," Bullock also added.

Sonora returned the largest check in our area when Bullock sent Sutton County \$12,009. Big Lake got \$6907, Mertzon received \$3322 while Menard got \$2110.

During the City Secretary's financial report to the councilmen it was

learned that there was a gas loss due to leakage estimated below 10 percent with installation of new gas lines. The city's secretary, Carolyn Mayo, also brought forth a report on the status of the trash account and the problems incurred recently by customers leaving an unpaid balance and the deposit not being sufficient to cover the bills left behind. The Secretary was instructed to prepare an analysis on the trash account and to determine if a rate increase is necessary to keep this city service in a positive cash flow.

During City Superintendent Hal Whitten's report, it was learned that the airport gas pump needed an overhaul. The council voted that the repairs be made as well as giving Superintendent Whitten permission to repair a hole on Oak St. with concrete and reinforced steel and on Whitten's request the Council voted to prepare an ordinance that would disallow PVC pipe to be installed within 6ft. of a gas meter.

The oath of office was administered to Bob Lester, Ronnie Sauer and Wayne McGinnes, incumbents from the last terms of office.

First quarter Bank totals

Very few changes are visible in the report of condition issued by First National Bank of Eldorado for the first quarter in 1983 when compared with the last quarter of 1982.

A \$200,000 increase in deposits is visible as is a \$3,000 decline in total assets, but over all the report of condition reflects a stable growth pattern in spite of a declining economy which is visible in the tax rebate check paid to the City of Eldorado which was \$2,961 shy of last year's payment at the same period.

The decline is also visible in a report issued by the state's Comptroller's office which showed gross sales for Schleicher County of \$10,626,093.00 for the year of 1981. While in the year of 1982 only \$7,112,661.00 was shown in the gross sales column presented by the 84 reporting outlets in the county. This shows a 33.1 percent decrease in a one year period.

Bank president, Jo Ed Hill told the Leader that even though there were some declines in the local economy brought on by the reduction of the oil and gas industry and the effects of a long dry winter, the overall trend is still positive.

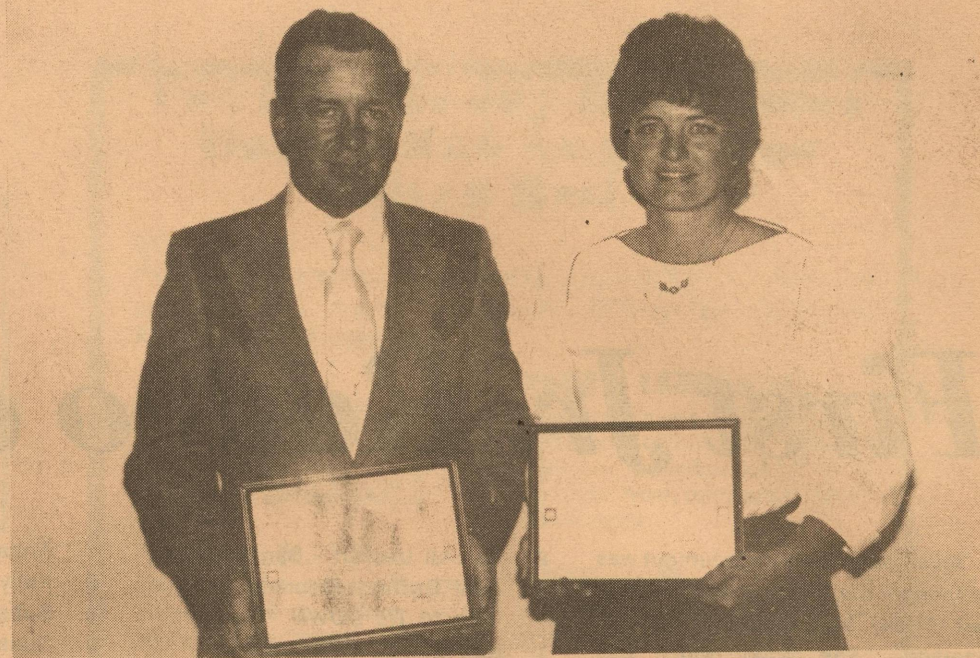

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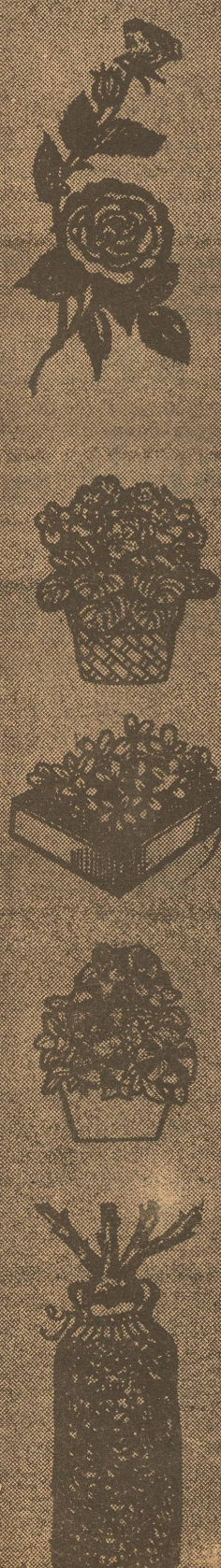
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Grass judging competition was held Monday here in Schleicher County. The event was sponsored by the SCS and instructed 4-H members on various grass specimens.

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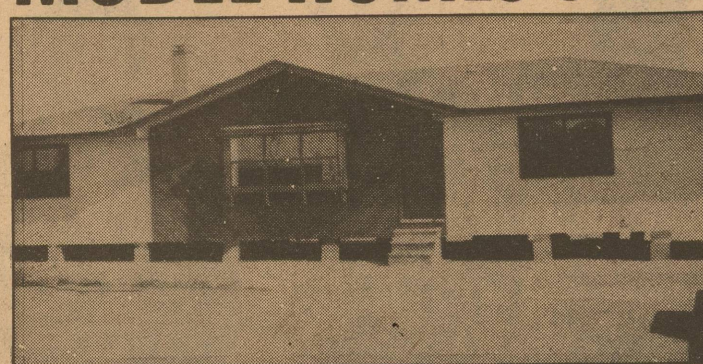
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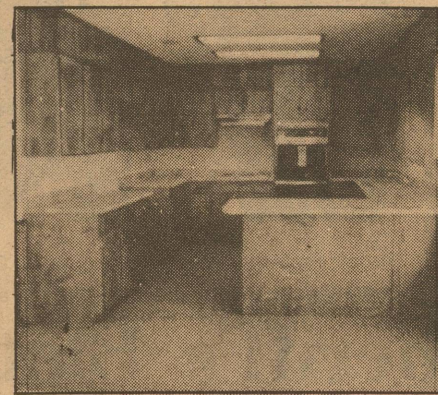

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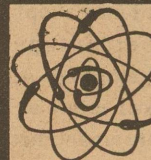

Ballew offers tax saving tips

Ray Ballew, chief appraiser for the Schleicher County Appraisal District, has announced the availability of an eight-page pamphlet which may help district residents save on their property taxes.

According to Ballew, "Taxpayers' Rights, Remedies, Responsibilities!" explains how the property tax system operates in Texas and highlights possible tax savings available to property owners.

The pamphlet is published by the State Property Tax Board under provisions of the Texas Property Tax Code. The information in "Remedies" applies to property taxes collected by all types of local government, including counties, cities and school districts.

The pamphlet explains in detail the residence homestead exemptions offered by various taxing units, Ballew said, including the amounts of each exemption and what it takes to qualify for and receive them.

For example, all homeowners in a school district are eligible for a \$5,000 general residence homestead exemption. Also, certain disabled taxpayers and those aged 65 or over may qualify for an additional \$10,000 exemption from the value of their homesteads.

"A taxpayer who was 65 or older on January 1 of

this year is also entitled to a tax freeze or ceiling on the tax bill from the school district on his house and yard," Ballew added. "This ceiling is established when a taxpayer receives the over-65 school homestead exemption."

The chief appraiser pointed out, though, that homeowners who received the elderly exemption and tax freeze from the school district last year need not apply again this year. Only those who became 65 during 1982 and those who have never been granted the exemption and freeze must apply for 1983.

Homeowners may also be eligible for a \$3,000 general homestead exemption for county tax purposes. This exemption is granted on the portion of county tax levied for farm-to-market roads and flood control.

Ballew noted that now any taxing unit may adopt a general "percentage" homestead exemption. Approved by Texas voters as a constitutional amendment in 1981, this exemption can be granted for any percentage up to 40 percent off the appraised value of residence homesteads.

School boards, city councils and county commissioners must take official action for this exemption, after careful review of the taxing unit's needs and taxable property. Percentage homestead

exemptions have been adopted by Schleicher County, 40 percent and Schleicher County Ltd., 40 percent.

Additional exemptions are available, upon application, to disabled veterans.

Owners of agricultural land which was taxed for 1982 on its productivity value under 1-d-1 open-space provisions do not have to reapply this year.

"More complete information on special land valuation, tax reductions and exemptions is available from appraisal district personnel as well as in the pamphlet," Ballew said.

He said that the "Rem-

edies" pamphlet also contains information about the appraisal review board (ARB) which serves to equalize all property values in the district. This section of the pamphlet outlines the steps for making a protest to the ARB and suggest ways to prepare and present the appeal.

"District residents are encouraged to review the pamphlet and to make any applications required, in order to get all the tax relief to which they are entitled. Remember, applications must be filed with the appraisal office by May 2 when the rendition period ends," the chief appraiser said.

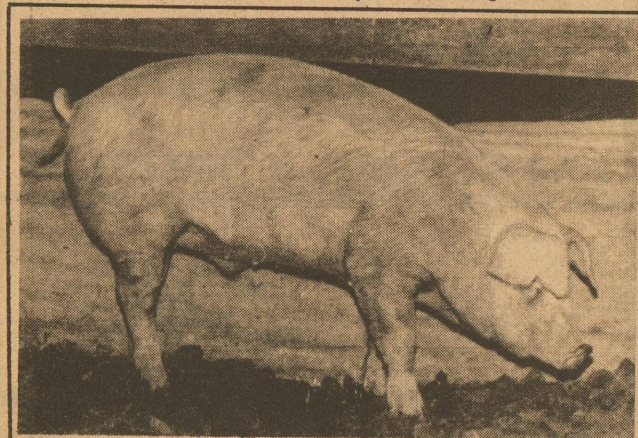

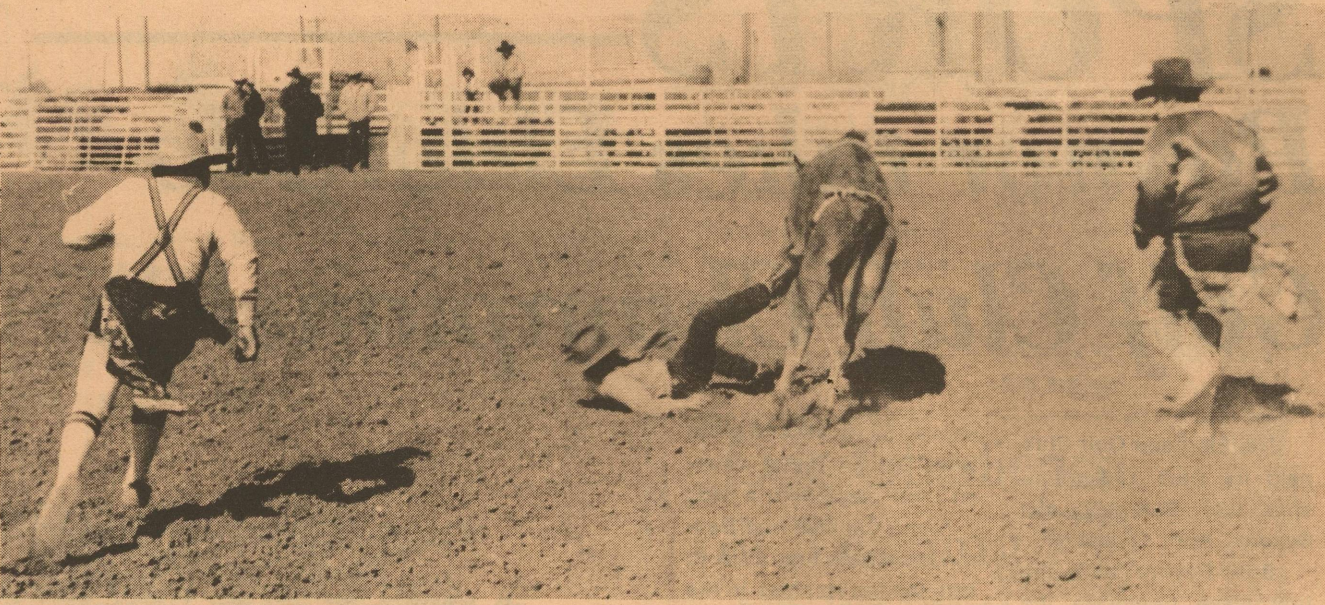

taxes have been beaten back. We emphasize temporarily because the comptroller's office says that oil production revenues will decline by 12 percent this year and almost ten percent next year and there are about seven weeks left in

this legislative session. For the record, the state will have 12.4 percent more to spend the next two years, than it did the last two.

In other news, Canada will announce a ten percent cut in its price for natural gas sold to the U.S. The correct price is \$4.94 per on thousand cubic feet which is higher than most American producers are getting for their natural gas.

In the Permian Basin our rig count for this week is 244. Last week it was 228. One year ago it was 370.

Reports from Washington

Home To Texas

My return to the 21st District over the Easter work break was particularly meaningful, as it ended the longest period away from Texas since my election in 1978.

I remained in Washington during the past several months to stay close as we awaited the birth of our third child, who arrived March 10. With Kathy, the boys, and their new sister all settled in, this Easter recess offered a time of special renewal.

For no matter where Texans live or travel, we always look forward to heading back to the Lone Star State. And whether it is watching the gently flowing Guadalupe River's south fork near my home, or following a busy schedule squeezing in as many visits as possible, being home is always a refreshing experience.

Although my travels reinforced once again the accuracy of your calls and letters as a barometer of the thoughts and attitudes of the 21st District, nothing can ever replace the importance of personal contact.

It was good to be able to meet and talk with you — on our home ground — rather than in our office in Washington.

The issue most on your minds — whether in town meetings, at service clubs, or in individual meetings — remains the universal opposition to the automatic withholding of interest and dividend income. In all my years as an elected official, never has one single legislative issue generated as much negative feeling.

To bring you up to date, many of us sponsoring legislation to repeal this onerous provision have filed a discharge petition to force a repeal bill out of the Ways and Means Committee, where the legislation is, in a sense, being held hostage. As soon as we get 218 signatures, a majority in the House, the Committee will be forced to send a repeal bill to the House floor. As you know, I remain determined that we must get that provision off the statute books before it takes effect July 1.

Aside from automatic withholding, the impacts of the budget rammaged through the House by the liberals was on most everyone's mind. There was anger expressed that the liberal budget would be financed by the largest tax increase in history: a \$265 billion tax burden which, to the average taxpayer, means an additional \$3,500 in taxes over the next five years. There was disgust that this liberal budget would effectively repeal the third year of the tax cut and the tax relief promised by the indexing of taxes scheduled to begin in 1985. Finally, there was extra concern that these taxes would be used to finance those same discredited programs of the past that we no longer need and cannot afford.

"Trying to turn back the clock — it will ruin the country!" is the way one constituent described it.

I could not agree more.

This irresponsible, liberal document, filled with the bankrupt "tax and spend" policies of the past, will indeed drive a sword into the heart of our Nation's economic recovery at a time when recovery is underway.

Equally strong concern was expressed over the liberal's willingness in their budget to reduce growth in defense spending by an unjustified amount with no documentation as to how the proposed reductions would be achieved or what the impact of these reductions would be on our national security.

I returned to Washington with the renewed sense that Congress cannot turn its back on the wishes of the American people, as you so forcefully expressed to me during my trip home. Your reactions have affirmatively added to my strong determination that we must continue with the ongoing program for economic recovery. We must not turn back the clock.

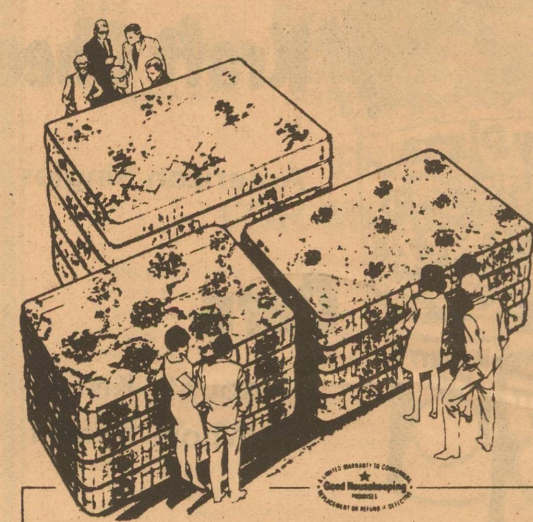

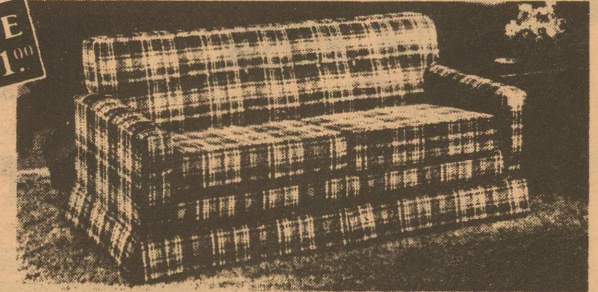
