Large turnout at meeting

A crowd of 200 plus packed the Memorial Building Tuesday for the town meeting on the proposed site selection of Southwest Pave Paws with County Judge fulfilling the duties of moderator for the meeting and introducing Col. Charles Powell, Wing Commander of the Goodfellow Air Force Base in San Angelo. Col. Powell performed the introductions of the military personnel, the government and associated scientists that were present at the meeting. He then relinquished the podium into the hands of Major Pamerleau who presented a short briefing on Pave Paws and its environmental impact assessment on Schleicher County, which was followed by a question and answer period.

With the completion of the town meeting, the Air Force's process begins its final leg. From now until

May 23rd the Air Force will be accepting public comment on the proposed site selection. With the completion of this study the project will enter into the development decision package stage which will involve study reports, public comments, and recommendations at which time an air staff approval will be rendered followed by a public announcement of the military's intent. Major Susan Pamerleau representing U.S. Air Force Headquarters at the Pentagon told the crowd that the congressional appropriation of funding was anticipated in early 1984 with construction to start in June of 1984.

The radar installation is anticipated to be on line and functional by March of 1987. She went on to tell the crowd that their comments should be addressed to Goodfellow Air Force

The site proposal for Pave Paws is located on the Blaylock Ranch approximately 6 miles north of Eldorado on Hwy. 277. The military anticipates that they will spend approximately \$25 million in the construction phase of Pave Paws southwest and another \$7.1 million in operating expenses annually for the radar installation which will be the third installation in a network of four detection warning devices for submarine launched ballistic missile attacks. At present one Pave Paws installation is located at Beale Air Force Base in California, OTS Air National Guard Base in Massachusetts and another site proposed at Robbins Air Force Base in Georgia.



Citizens voice approval of SW Pave Paws

At the conclusion of the drama that unfolded Tuesday night in the Memorial Building Wing Commander Col. Powell grinningly said that he thought the meeting was a success.

The overall rhythm of the Pave Paws site selection here in Schleicher County was that of welcome to the military. With only a minute few voicing an opposing viewpoint to the installation of the radar device here.

The primary opposition to the radar device came from local rancher Floyd West, who began his address to the group by stating that he felt that the public needed to know more about Pave Paws and its effect on Schleicher County. He went on to say that he was sure that you the public do not really know what Pave Paws is, West then cited the deficiency in numbers and locations of the Environmental impact assessment of Pave Paws. He then turned the floor over to Dick Lavine, representing American Friends Service Committee of Austin who stated that he had been invited to the meeting by West and that he had found a small amount of information pertaining to radio frequency radiation but, that there was little information available to the public on this topic.

West once again took the floor and inquired how many assessment manuals were available to the public and where were they located. Carolyn Mayo, City Secretary of Eldorado provided the data to West and in another conversation, not addressed to the floor, another member of West's group questioned Mrs. Mayo on whether or not she had told anyone where the documents could be found, to which she replied no, they had come through the mail with no instructions. This individual later refused to give Mrs. Mayo her last name but later as she addressed the podium, she stated she was Kathy Johnspokes from Del Rio. Also accompanying the West party was an

unidentified individual who stated that he was a private businessman from Austin. He filmed the entire meeting on video tape and responded later in the meeting when he was asked why he was filming it that this was to be a record of the meeting. Other questions placed before the podium came from Al Forlano, a local farmer with a degree in chemistry, asked for hard data on geneological studies involving radio frequency radiation. His reply came from John Mitchell from the School of Aviation who stated that there was a deficiency in long term studies involving RFR but in their California installation, no negative aspects of RFR had been cited. The issue also drew questions from the audience pertaining to what the military anticipated would be their improvements to Hwy. 277, and what would be the effect on television as well as radio reception in the area. The podium was also questioned on the effect that the radar beam would have on small aircraft, to which County Judge Griffin stated there would probably be none in that the types of radios used in small aircraft. There were several questions presented to the panel involving the

economic impact of the installation being placed here which drew responses from Dick Moore, Chief of Pave Paws System at the Air Force System Command at Electronic Systems Division at Hansom Air Force Base in Massachusetts, who stated that land values around the installation had increased since the installation of the radar unit. Major Pamerleau cited that the economic impact would be nominal in Schleicher County but a few new families could be anticipated. When Pamerleau was asked by a local resident whether or not the installation would change her environment to the point that she would want to leave her 15 year residency, she answered, absolutely not and that was the finding of the environmental impact assessment document that no negative impact would be found to the environment. Tony Cheatham, a local resident one of many who spoke in favor of the installation said that if one family moved to Eldorado and was employed and not on welfare, that the installation would be welcome. Eldorado resident, John Pitts inquired of the panel whether or not the environmental study had been approved by the military and that if it had, that was good enough for him. Points of patriotism were made by several Schleicher County residents including Alton McGinnes, Martha Meador, Jimmie Powell and numerous others.

It was obvious throughout the meeting that emotions were high and the intrusion of outsiders into this issue involving the citizens of Schleicher County was not particularly welcome but that Southwest Pave Paws was. Perhaps the best indicator of the Schleicher County's citizens feelings is best reflected in a statement read at the beginning of the meeting by Robert Paschal of Congressman Tom Loeffler's office which states, "I strongly support the location of the Southwest Pave Paws mission at Goodfellow Air Force Base, and I am very pleased that the Air Force has wisely selected the Schleicher County ranch property as the site for Pave Paws. This selected site has my full endorsement. As a member of the House of Appropriations Committee, I look forward to providing full funding for Pave Paws construction at the earliest possible date in the interest of our national security."

School board meets

The Schleicher County Independent School District Board of Trustees met Monday night in their regularly scheduled session.

The first item on the agenda concerned the re-painting of classrooms. The classrooms in question have asbestos in the ceiling and the Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) has advised that the classrooms be repainted as a preventative measure. Upon the findings of an EPA representative, it was found that there was only 5 percent asbestos in the ceiling, therefore the EPA representative suggested that repainting only would solve the problem. Gary Donaldson, Architect from San Angelo was present at the discussion. Bids for the job were opened earlier in the afternoon. Submitting the tentatively accepted bid was Broncy's Painting of San Angelo with a bid of \$28,042, the other bid presented was

from Tri-Pro Services of Kaufman with \$57,771. Board members voted to tentatively accept the lower bid which is for the re-painting only of the classrooms over the higher bid which followed strict EPA guidelines and would have entailed more work than merely repainting. The board members will seek legal counsel before making a final decision on the bidders.

The next item on the agenda concerned changes in the Students Handbook. Richard McCarsion and Dick Richey were representatives of the high school and elementary school. The board approved the giving of elective credits for band students up to 4 years. In the elementary school the board approved to follow the federal and state laws dealing with the random selection of children for classrooms.

The matter concerning parking at the rodeo arena was tabled and will be discussed at a later meeting.

Guy Whitaker, Superintendent presented the board with several special programs that the school district could have if the funding was made available and if the school met the requirements.

The board approved the hiring of Scott Martin of Brownfield to the position of Girls' Coach and Assistant Football Coach.

The board approved the resignation of Coach Larry Fatheree. Mr. Fatheree has resigned to further his education.

The Exhibit Building was the next subject to have the board's attention. The school has drawn up specific guidelines which everyone is to follow.

With this the board adjourned.

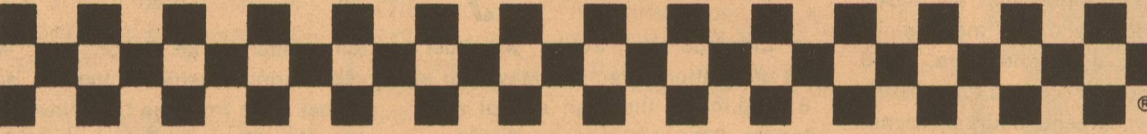

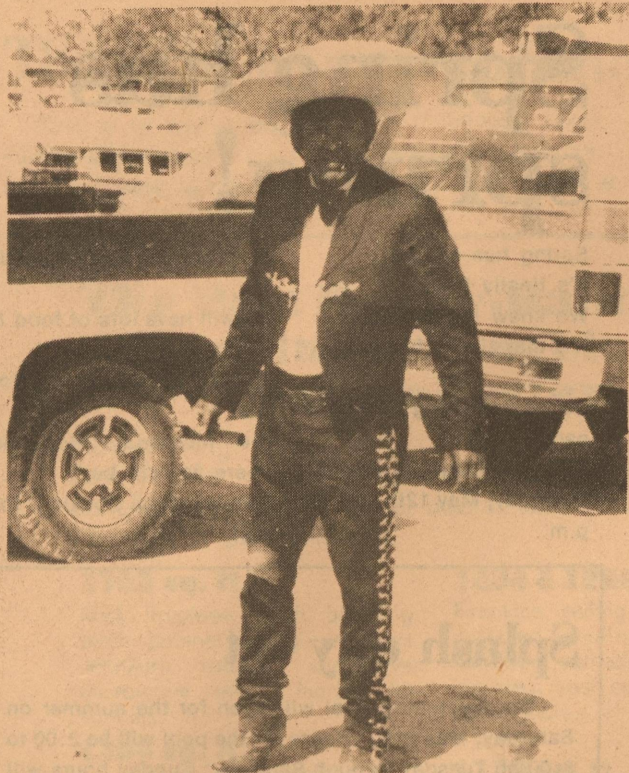

Linksters take 3rd

The Eldorado High School varsity boys golf team competed in Regional Competition last Wednesday and Thursday at Lubbock's Meadowbrook Municipal Golf Course and finished 8 strokes away from a trip to Austin.

Morton High School led Class 2A team with a 675. Reagan County, led by top medalist Craig Bagley's 154, finished second at 679. Eldorado took third coming in at 687.

Senior John Griffith finished with seventh medalist honors by firing a 85-82 for a two day total of 176. Wray Crippin shot a 174, Gene Edmiston 176, Kelly Kerr 179, and John Mitchell fired a 181 to finish out the Eagle's scoring.

Coach Matt Chalmers said, "We played well the

first day but let a few things bother us and didn't play as well the second day. I am very proud of these guys. They have gone to regional the last three years. That is more than any golf team has ever accomplished here."

When asked how he felt after the tournament, Griffith said, "Getting third was just like finishing last. It was like not placing at all. We all wanted to go to State!" Crippin also said, "I felt very let down. I know we could have played better especially me."

The golfers placed at almost every meet they competed in this year. They won first at Robert Lee, second at Stanton, second at Big Lake, third at Iraan, second in District and third at Regional.

Ussery to state

Eldorado High School qualified one individual for the State Track Meet in Austin next weekend when junior Douglass Ussery crossed the finish line second in the 800 meter run during regional competition last weekend. The meet was held on the campus of Texas Tech University.

Ussery, who had the fastest qualifying time going into Saturday's finals (2:01.3), unfortunately was placed in lane 1 which meant he would have to sprint so that the other runners would not box him in. Ussery did not get around the curve in time and got boxed in. "I had to waste alot of energy getting out of the pack," Ussery said. But, Ussery did get out of the pack and fought off a runner down the home stretch to take second. Ussery ran a season's best 1:58.8. Ussery has ran his best time of the season in Friday's preliminaries but broke that time in the finals. "I think my chances are pretty good at state," he added. "It'll take about a 1.56 or 1.57 to win state."

The sprint relay team of Jon Robledo, Ricky Cathey, Ussery, and Jeff Harlin, failed to make the last exchange and were disqualified. The team was coming off of their best time of the season a 43.8 the week before.

Jeff Harlin ran a 22.6 to take fourth place in the 200 meter dash. Ricky Cathey failed to qualify for the finals in the 400 meter dash but turned in a 53.3. Ashley Niblett cleared 6'0" in the high jump but did not place. Senior James Woodward soared 11'9" to take fourth in the pole vault.

The Mile Relay turned in the fifth fastest preliminary time of 3:25.8 but turned around and barely missed second place in the finals. The boys ran a season's best and new school record of 3:22.7. Clint Bumquardner led off with a 51.78 split. Jeff Harlin followed with a 50.5, Rickey Cathey turned a 49.9, while Ussery anchored the team with a 50.4. Coach Larry Mitchel had this to say following the meet, "I feel like our track team did a superior job. They not only represented their school admirably but the young men matured and took alot of pride in what they did. The success of these young men was largely a part of their own time, hard work, and God-given ability. I was very proud to be their coach. I'd like to thank the boys, Coach Singleton, and Coach Richters for their hard work."

Ussery will be competing at the State Track Meet Saturday, May 14, on the campus of the University of Texas at Austin.

Netters finish season

Eldorado High School's varsity boys doubles team finished out their season at the Regional Meet last week in Lubbock.

Gregg Davidson and Danny Pina finished second at the district meet, losing to Big Lake 6-2, 6-4. That qualified them for regional competition where they lost their first match to a team from Petersburg 6-3, 7-5. Coach Larry Fatheree talked about his team, "they didn't start playing doubles until late in the season so then they qualified for Regional it said alot about their athletic ability." Fatheree also said, "the guys they played had alot more experience than they did so that gave them an edge. But our guys hung in there and I'm real proud of them. We had alot of fun.

Social security news

Even though earnings for recent years are not posted to a person's Social Security record, earnings for those years will be included when his or her benefit rate is figured, Frank Upp, Social Security district manager in San Angelo, said recently.

This is because Social Security can use other evidence to establish the correct amount of Earnings, Upp said. Commonly used documents are W-2 forms for the years concerned. Self-employed people can submit copies of the Federal Income Tax Returns, along with evidence showing taxes were paid, to establish their earnings. Generally, all earnings through 1980 are not posted at this time.

Posting of 1981 earnings should be completed early this year, Upp said.

Social Security processes about 210 million wage items each year. Employers send wage reports for their employees to Social Security by the end of February for the previous year and Social Security processes these reports throughout the year. About 5 percent of the wage report show an incorrect Social Security number or name and another 1 percent have no number or name at all. All but about 1.4 percent of the incorrect reports can be corrected through processing. Reports that cannot be processed are kept on file and can be used when the person involved reports that some of his or her earnings are not recorded. Most of these earnings are those of people who work at casual labor, migrant work or other irregular jobs.

SCS Field trip

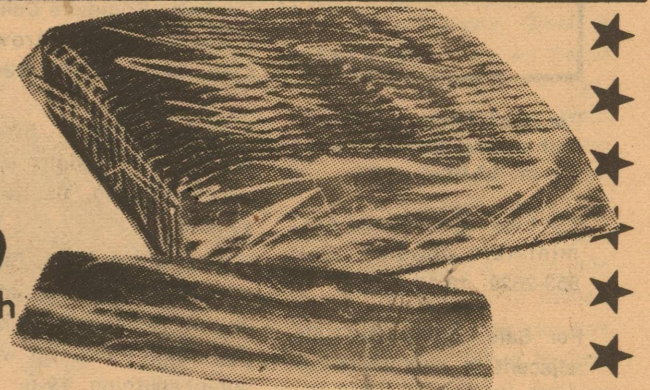

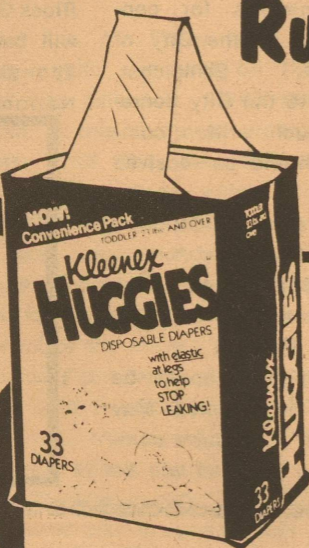

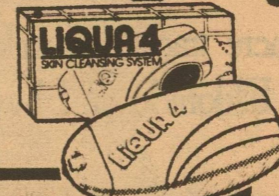

considered. The City of Eldorado, Texas will not request the release of Federal funds or take any administrative action on the within project prior to the date specified in the preceding sentence.

The City of Eldorado, Texas will undertake the project described above with Block Grant funds from the U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development (HUD) under Title 1 of the Housing and Community Development Act of 1974. The City of Eldorado, Texas is certifying to HUD that the City of Eldorado and Bob Lester, in his official capacity as Mayor, consent to accept the jurisdiction of the Federal courts if an action is brought to enforce responsibilities in relation to environmental reviews, decision making and action; and that these responsibilities have been satisfied.

The legal effect of the certification is that upon its approval the City of Eldorado, Texas may use the Block Grant funds and HUD will have satisfied its responsibilities under the National Environmental

Policy Act of 1969. HUD will accept an objection to its approval only if it is on one of the following basis: (a) that the certification was not in fact executed by the certifying officer or other officer of applicant approved by HUD; or (b) that applicant's environmental review record for the project indicates omission of a required decision finding or step applicable to the project in the environmental review process. Objections must be prepared and submitted in accordance with the required procedure (24 CFR Part 58) and may be addressed to HUD at P.O. Box 10050, 1403 Slocum, Dallas, Texas 75207.

Objections to the release of funds on basis other than those stated above will not be considered by HUD. No objections received after June 8, 1983 will be considered by HUD.

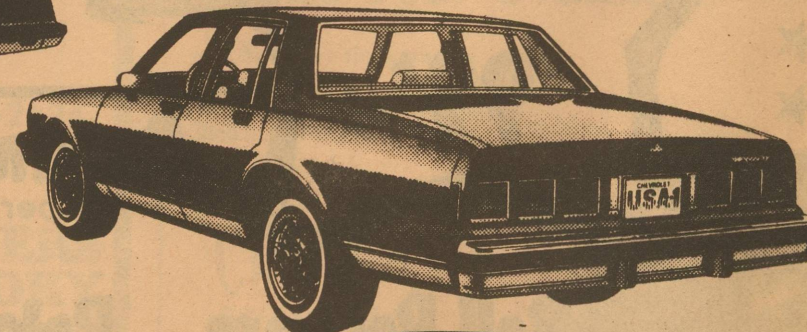

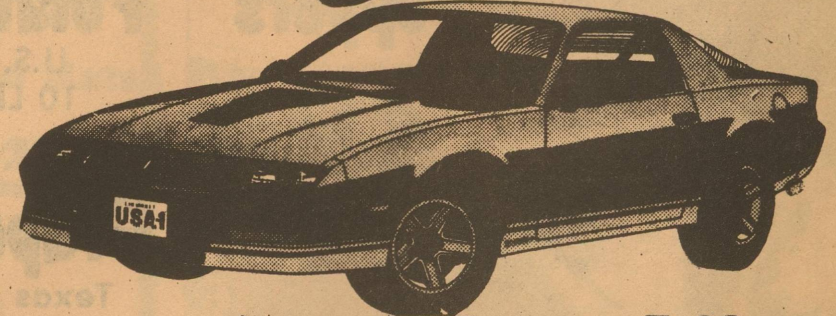
