

## Ussery ranked 5th at State

Eldorado's own Doug Ussery walked away with 5th place in the 800 meter run Saturday at the State Championship U.I.L. Boys Track and Field Meet held in Austin, Texas at the Memorial Stadium. Doug's time 1:59 fell short of his best time for the year which was 1:58.8. The 800 Meter Run was taken by Gerald Valderrama of Woodsboro with a scalding 1:55.6 which will stand as the 1983 Conference AA State Championship Mark.

Coach Larry Mitchel told the Leader that he expected Doug to do even better next year simply because he will become faster and the excitement of being at the State Finals should have less effect on Doug's attempt at the state championship next year. He went on to say that the honor that being one of the fastest eight in conference brought glory and notoriety to the Eagles' track team.

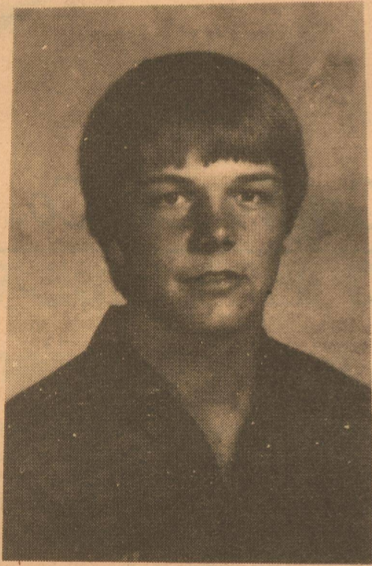
## Bill to lead area Ag'ers

## Medicare and money at Hospital meeting

Monday night found the trustees of the Schleicher County Medical Center in session, the board members were apprised of a recent Medicare survey in which the hospital received good reports with minor recommendations in procedures and policies. There was some discussion of the Medicare recommendations which were complied with by the trustees. The board then moved its attention to the purchasing of a new oven as well as a worktable for the hospital's kitchen.

Action was tabled concerning the floor in the new wing of the hospital and the board elected to meet with architect Don Goss of San Angelo at a future meeting in order to review the possibilities on correcting the deficiency in the flooring of the new wing. In the financial report it was learned that an additional \$30,000 was borrowed and placed in the operating funds until more tax money could be received from the county tax assessor's office.

## Retail sales drop in Eldorado

The City of Eldorado will receive a \$9,016.37 check from the state comptroller's office this week.

This is Schleicher County's portion of \$94.5 million in retail sales tax rebates sent from Bullock's office for the period ending May 6, 1983. The \$9,016.37 received this period by Eldorado reflects a 30.8 percent decline in retail sales from this period last year at which time Bullock authorized a check for \$12,812.01 at this time last year Eldorado had received a grand total of \$50,932.28 whereas this year, the city received only \$35,613.85. This reflects a \$15,000 decline in retail sales.

Sonora, our neighbor to the south,

is also experiencing a decline in retail sales which reflects a 34.56 percent decrease from this period compared to this period last year. Sonora received a \$35,014.83 check for this period as opposed to a check last year of \$67,390.28 but on the other hand, Menard had a 1.15 percent increase in retail sales at the mailing of this check. The check itself was only \$5,693.48 whereas last year Menard at this pay period received \$6,209.79 but the overall totals reflect an increase for Menard in retail sales over this period last time.

The city of San Angelo's check from Bullock is \$603,115.72 and their percentage of increase is 6.37 over last year's rebate retail sales checks.

# City employees gained pay raise

A Regular Meeting of the City Council was held Wednesday, May 11, 1983, at City Hall at 7:30 p.m. (meeting was delayed one night due to Pave Paws hearing on Tuesday, May 10) Meeting was called to order by Mayor Lester with all Councilmen in attendance with the exception of Ronnie Sauer who arrived later in the meeting.

Citizens present were Henry and Patsy Holguin who requested that the Council review their billing for gas. Upon comparison of the current billing with those of one year earlier, and confirmation from Supt. Whitten that the swivel on the customer side of the meter had not been tightened when the gas line was replaced and the meter switched over to the new line, motion was made by Edwin Jackson, Jr. that the Holguin's bill be credited with \$105.00 adjustment plus tax. Motion was seconded by Wayne McGinnes. Motion carried with Gus Willeke abstaining. Betsy Johnson, representing Charles Graves, presented the Council with Petition to Annex 50 acres (Edgefield IIA) South of Edgefield I. Motion was made by Gus

Willeke that the petition be accepted and hearings called as necessary. Motion was seconded by Bobbie Sanders. Motion carried.

Next on the agenda was David Vannett who again requested consideration of his request for payment on sewer line installation in South Heights Addition. A statement from previous Councilmembers was not signed, and the matter was tabled until Jimmy Doyle could be located to speak with the Council. Letter from Barbara Jackson, representing Beta Sigma Phi and the 4-H, was read thanking the Councilmembers for assisting with the Eldorado Youth Rodeo. Minutes of the April 12 and April 26 meetings were read with motion made by Bobbie Sanders that they be approved as read. Motion was seconded by Gus Willeke. Motion carried.

A discussion followed concerning the installation of a 6 or 8 ft. fence on the East and North sides of the Landfill due to difficulty containing blowing trash. Motion was made by Wayne McGinnes that Patton Enochs be contacted to obtain permission to set a 6' fence on the East and North

inside the property line. Motion was seconded by Bobbie Sanders. Motion carried.

Councilman Sauer arrived with Ronnie Glasgow, Amana heating dealer, next up on the agenda. Mrs. Glasgow had installed a heating unit in the Richard McC Carson home and was questioning the gas usage at the residence. Mr. Sauer explained the problem with the gas meter which was not properly calibrated. A new meter was installed May 3. After discussion, motion was made by Ronnie Sauer that old meter be retired with the reading of 13210 and that he be credited with 10,000 cfg. (\$45.00 plus sales tax). Motion was seconded by Wayne McGinnes. Motion carried.

Jimmy Doyle, representing the 1977-78 City Council, reviewed the happenings during the installation of the sewer line by Mr. Vannett. After a discussion, motion was made by Edwin Jackson, Jr. that Mr. Vannett be issued a check for \$700 in payment of 6" pipe, glue, fittings, tee's installed. Motion was seconded by Wayne McGinnes. Prior to a vote of the Council, Mr. Vannett agreed to accept

the payment as sufficient reimbursement to resolve his claim. Motion carried.

Concerning the claim by Mr. Vannett for adjustment on his billing when the gas meter was hit by an automobile, Ronnie Sauer and other Councilmen reported on the location of the meter and action by the City crew since the last meeting to cover all gas line ditches. Mr. Vannett asked that the meter be moved to nearer his property line. Motion was made by Wayne McGinnes that the City crew move the meter back to the property line with Mr. Vannett agreeing to install steel line on his side of the meter. Motion was seconded by Ronnie Sauer. Motion carried. Concerning the adjustment to Mr. Vannett's billing, motion was made by Gus Willeke that Mr. Vannett be given credit for \$146.00 plus sales tax on the gas lost from the meter. Motion was seconded by Ronnie Sauer. Motion carried.

Letter from the State Highway Department on the City's and County's request for review of the speed limits was read by the Secretary, who reported that the State

would extend the existing 40 mph speed limit from 50' South of Brooks Avenue to approximately 400' North. An ordinance will be prepared for the Council's approval to extend the 40 mph speed zone. The Secretary reported that she had written Cities Service concerning their failure to provide third-party chart integration of their gas field. The need for a Municipal Court was briefly discussed with no action taken. The matter will be explored further.

April billings were reviewed and initialled with Wayne McGinnes making the motion that the bills be paid as presented. Motion was seconded by Gus Willeke. Motion carried. The Secretary reported on tax collections, showing \$57,207.18 1982 taxes collected to date. A statement was initialled by all Councilmen.

Next on the agenda was the annual salary review which was tabled from February's meeting. After a discussion of merit and percent raises, motion was made by Gus Willeke that all City employees be given a 7 percent raise. Motion was seconded by Ronnie Sauer. Motion carried with the raise to be effective immediately.

Starting pay will remain at \$5.00/hr. A discussion was held on the meter reading responsibilities and the need for a backup meter reader. The matter was referred to Mr. Whitten for his study. With no further business, the meeting adjourned.

According to Clinic officials, complete physical examinations will be given and will include PAP smears, breast exams, glaucoma tests, blood counts and dental screen-

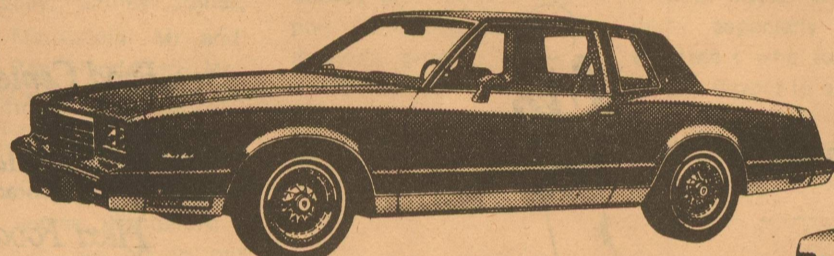

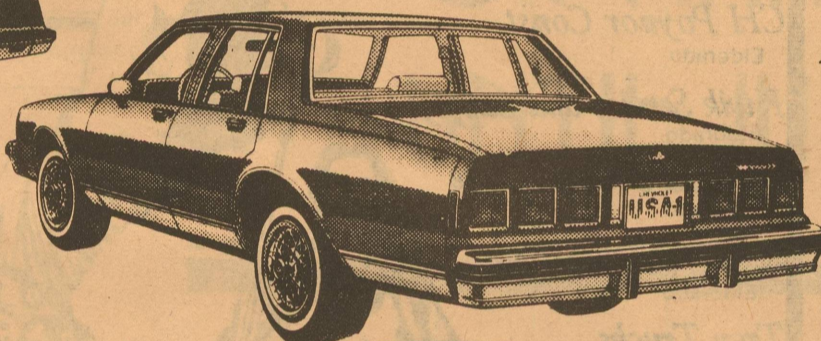

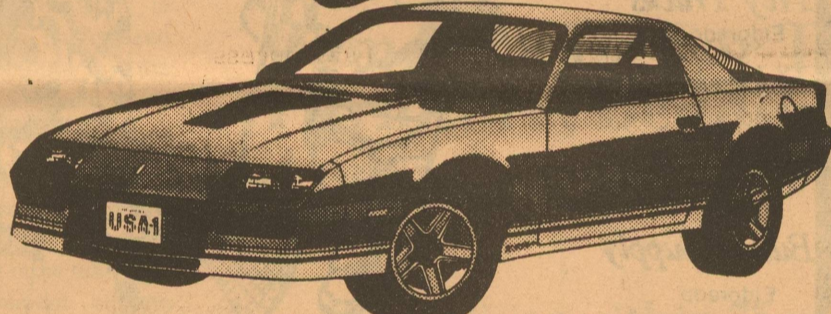

# Grain sorghum planting date

May 31 is final planting date for insured grain sorghum in Schleicher County according to Marcus Kocich, District Director for the Federal Crop Insurance Corporation (FCIF).

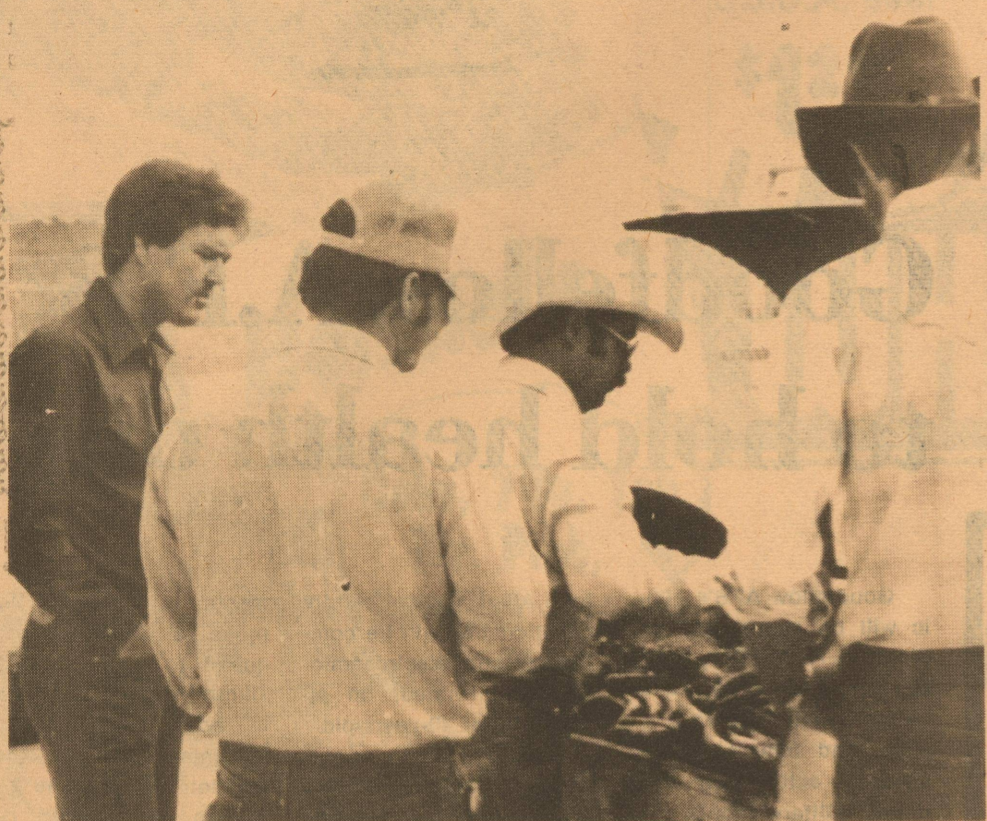
"Acres of grain sorghum planted by May 31, insured by FCIF (or by a private company reinsured by FCIF), must be reported by June 15 to receive full insurance coverage," says

Kocich. Acreage planted after May 31 must also be reported by the June 15 acreage report as being planted too late for insurance.

"Farmers unable to

plant prior to May 31 because of excess moisture conditions may sign a 20-day late planting agreement, which permits insurance coverage, but provides for a lower bushel-per-acre guarantee due to

the late planting," Kocich explained. Farmers wishing additional information about the new late planting agreement should contact their local, authorized crop insurance agent.

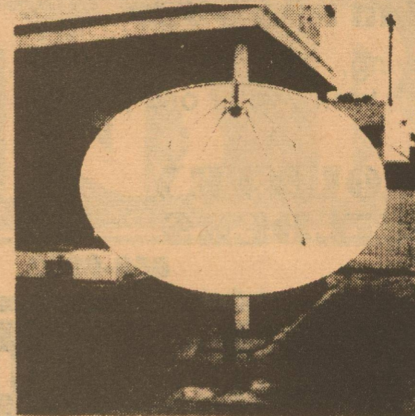

## Social Security eligibility

The Social Security Administration has a dual responsibility: to provide benefits to people who are entitled to them under one of the provisions of the Social Security act and to protect the Social Security trust funds by denying benefits to those not entitled to them.

Criminal prosecution for fraud may be undertaken under a variety of circumstances--for example, if an individual uses a Social Security number not his or her own in order to obtain a payment or to have a payment increased; or provides erroneous information in an attempt to establish eligibility for Social Security or supplemental Security Income (SSI) payments; or attempts to conceal information that would affect his or her eligibility for an initial payment or for continued payments; or where the individual uses money received on behalf of another person for some unauthorized purpose.

Prosecution for such fraudulent acts may be undertaken even when the act is discovered before any erroneous payments are actually made. Moreover, even where a decision in a case was supposed to have been final, the case may be reopened at any

time if the decision is found to have been based on fraud, whether on the part of the claimant or of some other person.

The penalties for fraud include fines and/or imprisonment. They range from a fine of not more than \$500 or imprisonment of one year, or both, to a fine of not more than \$10,000 or imprisonment of not more than 15 years, or both.

Applicants and beneficiaries who may be uncertain about some aspect of the law can have their questions answered at any Social Security office.

In addition, airmen who complete basic training earn credits toward an associate degree in applied science through the Community College of the Air Force.

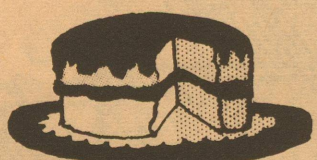

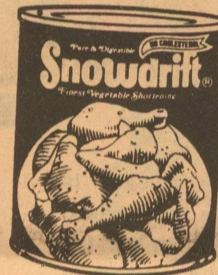

### Ranch review

About now is one of the times of the year when ranchers review their operations and plan for the future with the objective of producing the greatest number of quality livestock at the lowest possible cost. The basic ingredient for success is a plentiful supply of quality forage. A planned grazing system is an excellent management tool for the most effective production and utilization of forage - harvesting the maximum amount without damaging future production.

There are two basic types of planned grazing systems, deferred-rotation and short duration. Each has a number of variations, providing suitable adaptations for all types of range and ranch operations.

The deferred-rotation system is excellent for steady range improvement and good animal performance. In this system, grazing time on a given area exceeds rest time with the stock spread out over most of the ranch. Pastures are rested a minimum of three months on a rotation basis. This rest allows grass to grow leaves which are the site of 95 percent of the plant's food production, extend root systems, expand bases, lengthen runners, and make seed.

Short duration systems generally provide rapid improvement of grass production and composition, accompanied at times by some sacrifice in animal performance. The short duration system concentrates all livestock on less than half the grazing area, thus providing more rest time than grazing. Animals are moved relatively rapidly through the system, staying in each pasture only a short time.

Flexibility is the key to any grazing system. The range manager must be able to "read" his range and make adjustments when needed. Some factors to consider include length of grazing period, season of use, class and kind of livestock, and stocking rates.

The Soil Conservation Service, through the Eldorado-Divide Soil and Water Conservation District, can assist with planning grazing systems. In the past several years, Schleicher County ranchers have installed 24 planned grazing systems on 75,336 acres of rangeland with SCS assistance. These systems are characterized by improved range condition, increased forage production, and lowered supplemental feeds costs.

Public Notice Of No Significant Effect On The Environment And Of Request For Release of CDBG Funds

The City of Eldorado, Texas, on June 1, 1983, will request the U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development to release Federal funds under Title 1 of Housing and Community Development Act of 1974 (PI 93-383) for the current Community Development Block Grant (CDBG) project. This project consists of sanitary sewer lines and lift station construction located in the City of Eldorado, Texas.

It has been determined that such a request for release of funds will not constitute an action significantly affecting the quality of the human environment. 27, 1983. All such comments so received will be considered. The City of Eldorado, Texas will not request the release of Federal funds or take any administrative action on the within project prior to the date specified in the preceding sentence.

The City of Eldorado, Texas will undertake the project described above with Block Grant funds from the U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development (HUD) under Title 1 of the Housing and Community Development Act of 1974. The City of Eldorado, Texas is certifying to HUD that the City of Eldorado and Bob Lester, in his official capacity as Mayor, consent to accept the jurisdiction of the Federal courts if an action is brought to enforce responsibilities in relation to environmental reviews, decision making and action; and that these responsibilities have been satisfied.

The legal effect of the certification is that upon its approval the City of Eldorado, Texas may use the Block Grant funds and HUD

will have satisfied its responsibilities under the National Environmental Policy Act of 1969. HUD will accept an objection to its approval only if it is on one of the following basis: (a) that the certification was not in fact executed by the certifying officer or other officer of applicant approved by HUD; or (b) that applicant's environmental review record for the project indicates omission of a required decision finding or step applicable to the project in the environmental review process. Objections must be prepared and submitted in accordance with the required procedure (24 CFR Part 58) and may be addressed to HUD at P.O. Box 10050, 1403 Slocum, Dallas, Texas 75207.

Objections to the release of funds on basis other than those stated above will not be considered by HUD. No objections received after June 15, 1983 will be considered by HUD.

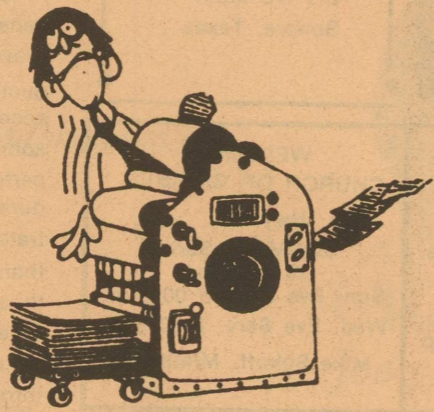
