Start Spraying

It's Pecan Nut Casebearer spray time for Schleicher County. Pecan nut casebearers have started laying eggs on pecans in Schleicher County, reports Jerry Swift, County Extension Agent for the Texas Agricultural Extension Service. This means that pecan producers and homeowners should check their trees closely for egg deposits and nutlet damage by newly emerged larvae and begin a spray program if necessary. Eggs are deposited on the tip of the developing nutlet.

Field inspections made in Schleicher County indicate the best time for spray application will be May 23 through May 29. Producers with early maturing varieties will need to treat a few days earlier than areas with late maturing pecans.

Insecticide applications should begin soon after the first nutlet damage is observed, points out Jerry Swift. Many producers treat too early for this pest. It is best to have 1 to 2 percent entries before sprays are applied. A second application may be required where eggs are found and nutlet damage continues 7 to 10 days after the application.

Effective pecan nut casebearer control depends on proper timing and application of insecticides, emphasizes Jerry Swift. Often insecticides are applied too early for optimum control.

County bosses approve lights

Schleicher County Commissioners Court met Monday in their regular scheduled session. During this relatively short meeting the county bosses elected to raise from \$4 per hour to \$5 per hour all county employees who assisted in firefighting after the end of the normal work day. The commissioners also okayed a motion which would guarantee the pay of the electrical guard light electricity bill if the Eldorado Volunteer Fire Department would pay for the placing of guard lights around the new fire hall.

The commissioners also decided to advertise for purchasing bids of oil and fuel supplies necessary for the county vehicles. With these matters behind them as well as the paying of the county's bills the court adjourned until its next regularly scheduled session.

What is a City Manager?

[Editor's Note] This installment is the first of a series investigating the aspects of establishing a Council/Manager form of government for our community. In this article we will discuss the terminology and definition of duties performed by a City Manager.]

August 13, 1983 has been set as the election for the adopting of the City Manager form of government. The Texas Election Board mandates that this is the soonest opportunity to place this election before the people of Eldorado. Their mandate supercedes the time slot called for the election as layed out in the Mayor - Councilman Home Rule Handbook.

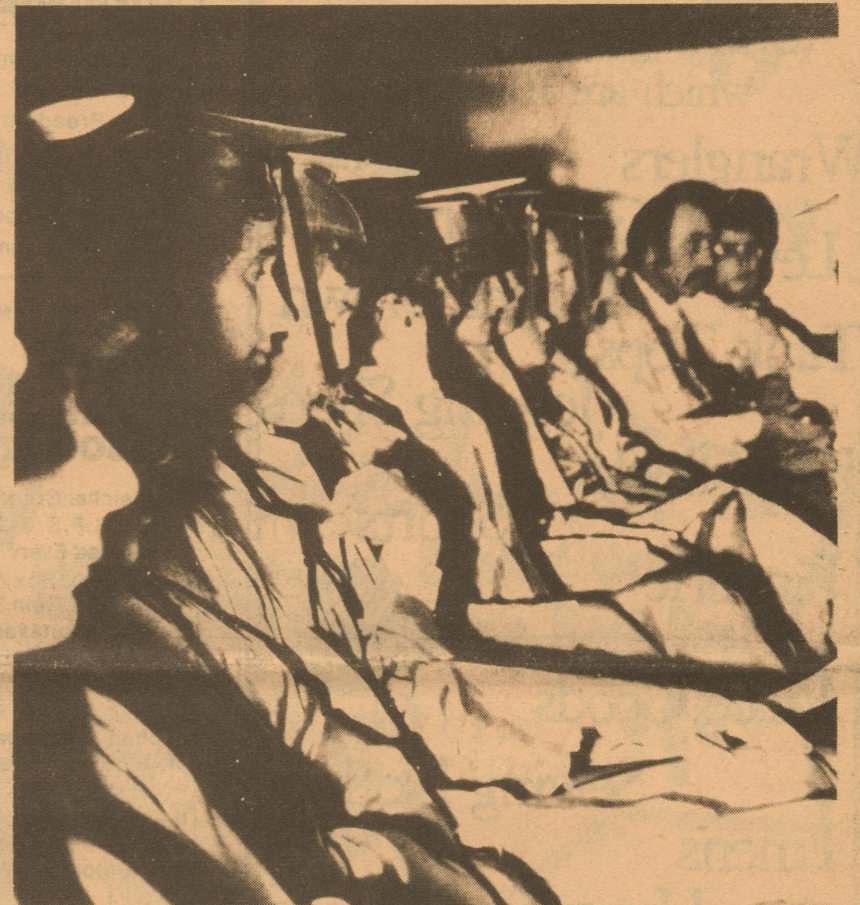
The powers and duties of a City Manager are described as follows: The City Manager shall be the chief administrative officer in the city. He may head one or more departments and shall be responsible to the city council for the proper administration of all affairs of the city. To that end he shall have power and shall be required to appoint and when necessary for the good of the service suspend or remove all officers or employees of the city except as otherwise provided by the City Charter or law. An exception as he may authorize, the head of a department or officer to appoint or suspend or remove subordinates in such departments or offices. The City Manager is to prepare the budget annually and submit it to the council together with a message describing the important features and to be responsible for its administration after its adoption by the City Council.

The City Manager shall prepare and submit to the Council as of the end of fiscal year a complete report on the financial and administrative activities of the city of the preceding year. He is to keep the council advised on financial conditions and future needs of the city and make recommendations as he may deem desirable. It is the City Manager's place to recommend to the governing body from time to time adoption of such measures as he may deem necessary or expedite for the health, safety or welfare of the community for the improvement of administrative services.

He may consolidate or combine offices, positions, departments or units under his jurisdiction with the approval with the City Council. The City Manager must attend all meetings of the City Council unless excused therefrom and take part in the discussion of all matters coming before the council. He shall be entitled to notice all regular and special meetings of the council. He is to supervise the purchase of all materials, supplies, and equipment for which funds are provided in the budget. He is to see that all laws and ordinances are duly enforced. He is to investigate the affairs of the city or any department or division thereof, investigate all complaints in relationship to matters concerning the administration of the government of the community and in regard to service maintained by the public utilities in the city and to see that all franchisees permits and privileges granted by the city are faithfully observed.

He is to devote his entire time to the discharge of his official duties, he is to perform such other duties as may be required by the council not inconsistent with the City Charter, law or ordinances.

The Council - Manager Plan of government is the system of local government which combines the strong political leadership of elected officers in the form of the City Council with the managerial experience of the appointed City Manager. The following is a profile of the profession of City Manager: Seventy-six percent of all City Managers hold college degrees, forty-five percent hold graduate degrees, forty-four percent are trained in public administration, political science or government, eighteen percent as engineers and fifteen percent in business administration. The average salary is \$28,000 annually. The average tenure of office is four years and five months with any given municipality.

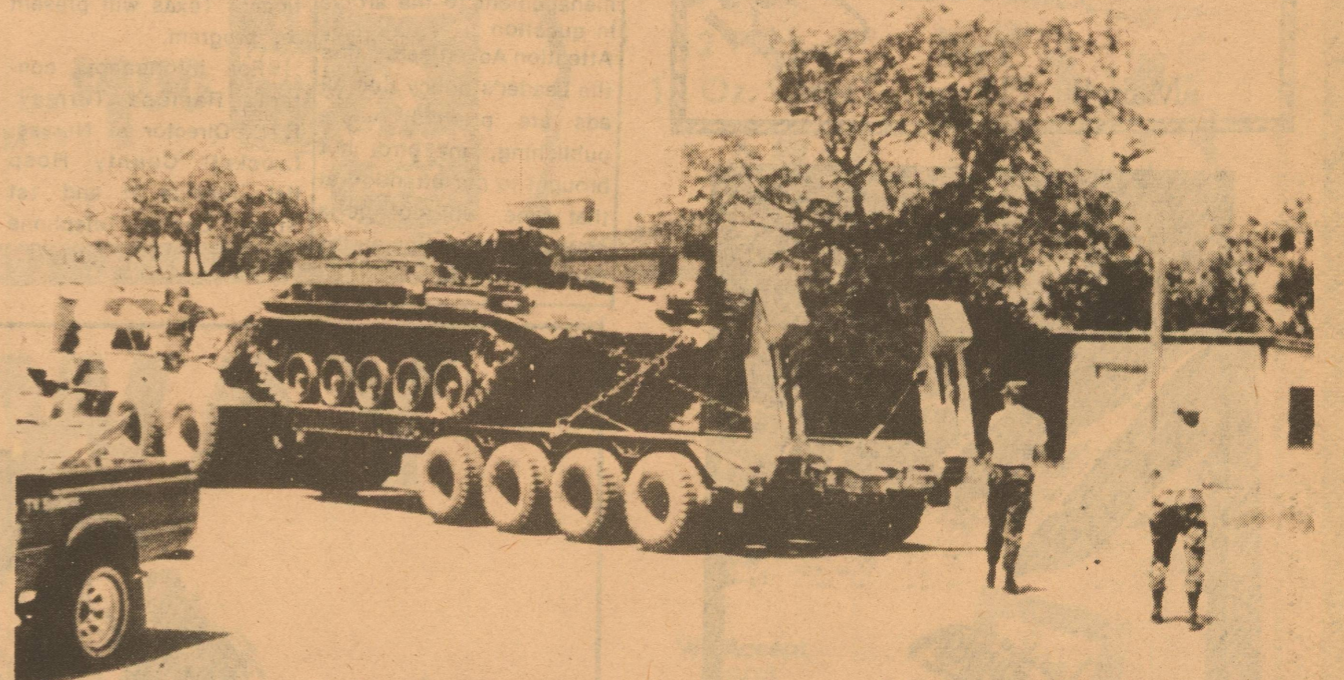
Monday marks ball season

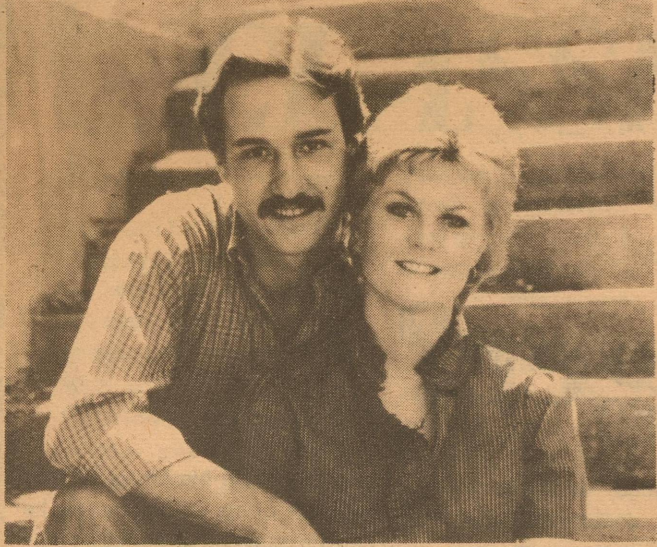
Richey resigns

1983 marks the 30th anniversary of the casting of the Mental Health Bell. The bell weighs 300 lbs. and is housed at the National Mental Health Association headquarters in Arlington, Virginia. This historic bell was cast from a collection of shackles, chains and handcuffs used to bind the mentally ill in hospitals throughout the United States. The inscription on the bell reads: "Cast from the shackles which bound them, this bell shall ring out hope for the mentally ill and victory over mental illness."

Rosalynn Carter, a long-time mental health volunteer, came to Texas on April 27th and, in an impressive public ceremony, presented Governor White with a replica of the Mental Health Bell. At that time, Governor White proclaimed May as Mental Health Month and paid tribute to Mental Health Association volunteers such as you who work so hard for the cause of Mental health in your community.

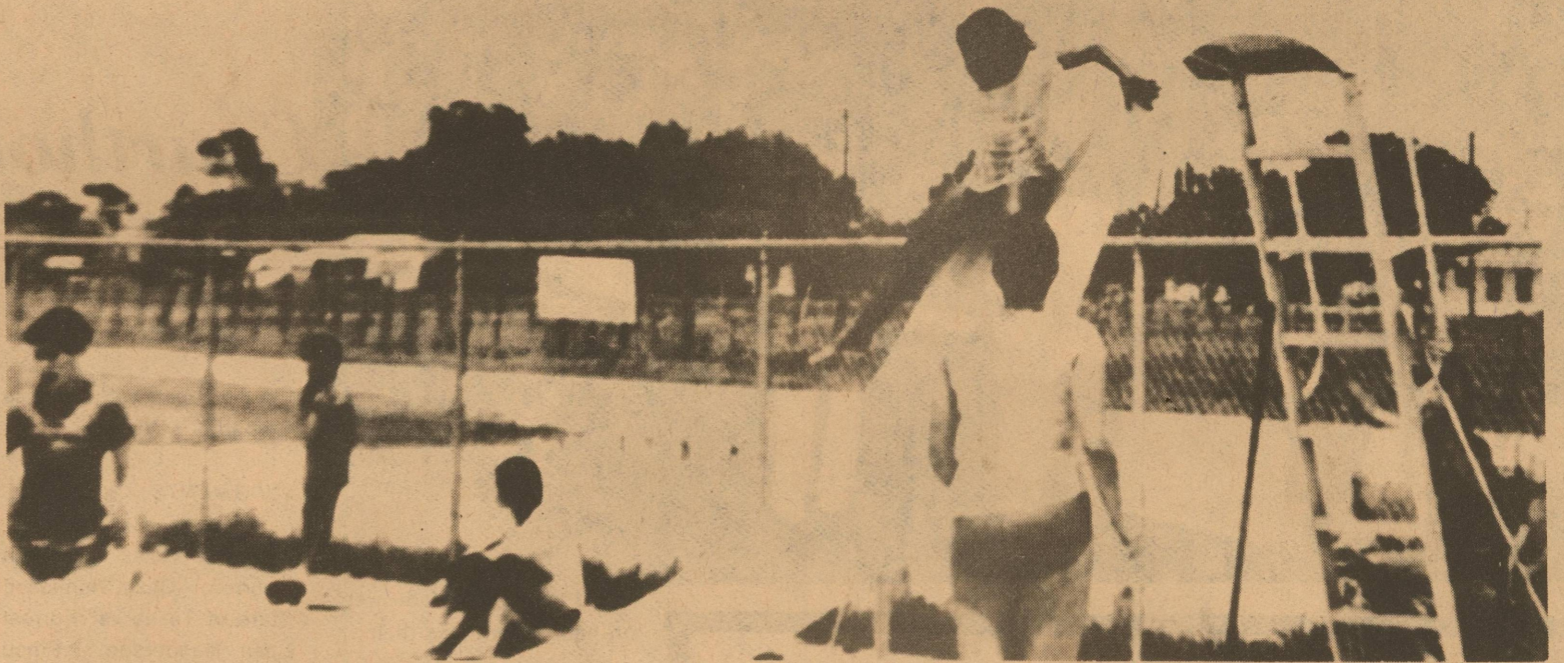

Utilities take stance

Electric utilities in Texas, including West Texas Utilities Co., are taking a tougher stance these days on theft of electricity.

Reasons for the crack-down are a change in the State Penal Code making meter tampering a penitentiary offense and the fact that the cost of producing electric energy has gone up.

"We view any form of

stealing electric power as a serious crime," said Don Welch of Abilene, WTU vice president and director of customer services, "because we feel a strong responsibility to protect the interest of our good paying customers."

"It costs money to produce electricity," Welch said. "If one customer manages to get some of it free, the other customers have to make up the difference."

The State Legislature amended the criminal mis-

chief statute in 1981 to make diversion of any utility service a third degree felony with a possible punishment of a maximum fine of \$5,000 and from two to ten years in prison. The law also allows authorities to make the assumption that the person whose name the service was last billed is the responsible party.

Convictions have been obtained in several Texas cities since the law was passed, and WTU recently filed charges which re-

sulted in a felony indictment being issued against a customer.

Welsh said that meter tampering not only is a serious crime which is becoming more easy to detect, but that it is extremely dangerous.

"Many people do not understand the danger involved," he said. "Property damage, serious injury, or even death can result."

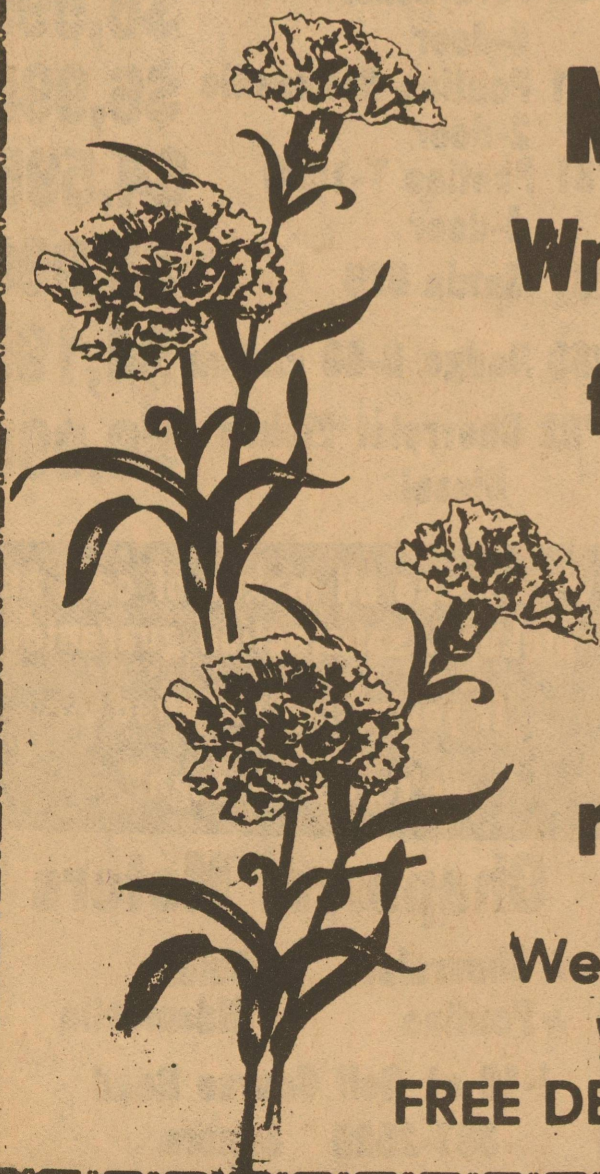

Social Security news

The maximum amount of earnings on which Social Security taxes are paid; has increased to \$35,700, Frank Upp, Social Security district manager in San Angelo, said recently. The 1982 base was \$32,400.

Since the Social Security tax rate remains unchanged at 6.7 percent for 1983, most people will not pay more in Social Security taxes this year unless they have higher earning than in 1982, Upp said. People who earn more than \$43,400 in 1983 will pay

more in total Social Security taxes.

People who earn more than \$35,700 in 1983 will pay total Social Security taxes of \$2,391.90, which is \$221.10 more than the \$2,170.80 they paid in 1982.

Employers match the Social Security taxes paid by employees.

Also increasing in 1983 is the amount of annual earning required to earn a "quarter of coverage," the measur used to determine eligibility for benefits. In 1983 a person will earn one quarter of coverage if annual earnings are \$1,480 or more.

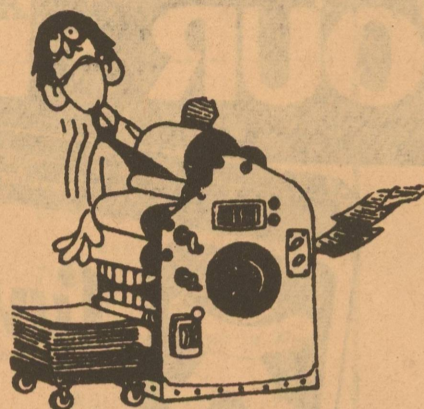
