June 4, 1983 has been designated for the First Annual Masters Track and Field Meet to be held at the Eldorado High School track complex.

# City bosses call for Manager Election

The Eldorado City Council held a special called meeting Tuesday May 24, 1983. The council had quite a few items on their agenda which included reviewing the petition presented to Mayor Lester on May 17 requesting that the Mayor call an election for a city manager plan of government. After a brief discussion, motion was made by Gus Willeke that the election be called for August 13 as provided in Vernon's Civil Statutes. The motion was seconded by Ronnie Sauer and the motion carried.

Marie Barrera, who represented her sister, Vivian Rodriguez appeared before the council. The Rodriguez family had built a chain link fence in Block 117, O.T. and several people had questioned the position of the fence as it appeared to be infringing on the alley and possibly the street. Mrs. Barrera was advised to check the surveyor's field notes, a copy of which was given to her. Also, Mrs. Barrera asked that the Council consider opening up Hill Street down to its intersection with Vermont St. as her mother was to be locating mobile homes needing access from Hill St. Bobbie Sanders made the motion that the city crew lay 20' of caliche in Hill St. adjacent to Block 117 whenever the caliche became available. The motion was seconded by Gus Willeke and the motion carried.

Fair Housing Ordinance, Ordinance #103-83, was reviewed by the Mayor and City Secretary. This is a requirement for the C.D.B.G. funds. The motion was made by Ronnie Sauer that the Ordinance be approved. Bobbie Sanders seconded the motion and the motion carried. Mayor Lester appointed City Secretary, Carolyn Mayo, as Fair Housing Administrator to handle any complaints.

Ordinance #104-83, extending the 40-mph speed zone on Hwy 277 North by 400' was reviewed. The motion was made by Wayne McGinnes that the ordinance be approved and that a copy be forwarded to the State. The motion was seconded by Ronnie Sauer and the motion carried.

The City Superintendent and the City Secretary asked the Council to ratify their action by terminating Charles Clinton Clark due to disciplinary problems. After a brief

discussion, motion was made by Ronnie Sauer that the action be ratified. The motion was seconded by Gus Willeke, the motion carried.

Next on the agenda was a letter agreement from Freese & Nichols Engineering that was read by the Mayor. The letter agreement asked for approval by the City Council for additional services by Freese & Nichols to do survey work and obtain proper easements for the 12-acre pond area for the sewer treatment plant and the force main included in the C.D.B.G. project. An amendment to the engineering contract will be forwarded shortly. A motion was made by Bobbie Sanders to execute the letter agreement, the motion was seconded by Wayne McGinnes, the motion carried.

After a discussion of David Meador's failure to execute easement as agreed in the January 12, 1983 meeting, motion was made by Ronnie Sauer that the 4" sewer line not be maintained or accepted by the City unless he signed the easement within 2 weeks. The motion died for a lack of a second. After more discussion by the council, motion was made by Ronnie Sauer that the signed easement be obtained by the June 7 meeting or the minutes would reflect that the line was not City owned. The motion was seconded by Edwin Jackson, Jr. and the motion carried. Mr. Meador will be notified of this deadline by the Council.

City Secretary, Carolyn Mayo reviewed correspondence with Cities Service with regard to the third-party integration of Cities Service charts. She stated that she had again made arrangements with John Squier and Co. to integrate the charts at the City's expense; however, Cities Service had not sent to the charts to be integrated as requested. Also, Mr. Motter's letter to the City reflected that the RRC had not suspended proration as requested. Mr. David Talbot was to discuss this matter with the City Council; however, no one from the City had any knowledge of it. The Secretary has requested Cities Service personnel to inform the Council of the situation.

The possibility of instituting a Municipal Court was again discussed by the Council. Justice of the Peace,

Frank Bradley, has indicated he has no interest in trying city infractions. Mayor Lester stated that he is willing to serve as Municipal Judge as necessary. Mr. Bradley will meet with the Council on June 7 to discuss the establishment of the court.

Next on the agenda, Walt Bosmans, Jr. met with the Council to bring up questions asked by the people living in Christian addition. Some of the residents wanted to know the status of the C.D.B.G. project and the sewer treatment plant. Also, Mr. Bosmans requested an explanation of the chosen location of the plant and any necessary additional property. After an explanation of status of the two projects and assurance that the sewer treatment plant would not encompass additional property, Mr. Bosmans questioned the Council about the City Manager petition and its effect on the city government.

Mayor Lester told the Council that there had been several inquiries about the front end loader off of the Farmall tractor, as it had not been used in several years. After a discussion of other surplus property, a motion was made by Wayne McGinnes that an ad be prepared to offer the front end loader for bids in two consecutive weekly papers with the bid opening to be June 7th. The motion was seconded by Edwin Jackson, Jr.; the motion carried. The purchase of a pipe threader machine was mentioned with Mr. Whitten to obtain prices on a new unit for the Council's consideration.

The fence at the landfill was reviewed with Superintendent Whitten reporting that a 2"x4" 1/2" gauge had been located. He was authorized to purchase the wire if acceptable. A 3/4" water line crossing Blocks 107, 109 and 110 in a diagonal manner was called to the Council's attention. Councilwoman Bobbie Sanders reporting that people obtaining their water from the line had poor or no pressure. Superintendent Whitten proposed extending a larger line across or down East Street to supply the people with water. He was authorized to replace the line as necessary. A water leak near the fire plug on Highland Drive was discussed with Mr. Whitten reporting that the line needed replacement due to

continuous problems. He was authorized to replace the line and fireplug as necessary.

The matter of the ice machine was again discussed by the Council but no

action was taken.

The Council was informed that the catapillar at the landfill is in need of repairs. A Treanor Equipment representative will be preparing an

estimate of the cost for the Council to review at a later date. With no further business, the Council then adjourned.

## The pro's and con's of a City Manager

[Editor's Note: This article is the second in a series to further investigate the aspects of the City Manager plan of government. This particular issue will deal with some of the pros and cons of this plan.]

There are some basic arguments over the Council-Manager plan of government and the University of Kansas' Governmental Research Center recently assembled some of those arguments favoring and opposing the Council-Manager form of government. The Council-Manager plan, the researchers concluded embraced in this study, embodies three main elements: 1) an elective city council which holds the power to determine municipal policy; 2) an appointed official (the city manager) selected by and responsible to the Council in whom is centered the administrative authority of the city; 3) use of the "short ballot", where the Council members are the only important officials elected.

The study uncovered these principal arguments:

1. Pro - It is easy for citizens to understand the simple structure of council-manager government; and it is easy for the manager, through the council, to report to the people.

Con - In those cities where election of the council by wards is replaced by election at large, citizens,

who consider that personal contact with their ward represents a "democratic" prerogative, may fear that election at large will mean a loss of geographical representation on the council.

2. Pro - A single governing body is collectively responsible to the voters for the city government.

Con - Chances of damage done by a poor or bad city official are reduced when various elected officials serve as checks on each other.

3. Pro - Council-manager government represents a balance between elected and appointed officials, providing capable administration responsible to elected representatives.

Con - Efficacy in city government is gained at the expense of democracy.

4. Pro - With city management there is an increased tendency to place more confidence in the ability and efficiency of city government.

Con - The manager is emphasized while the council receives little attention or instruction under the council-manager plan.

5. Pro - A more representative body of councilmen is possible since technical expertise is not required and council positions are more attractive to qualified citizens as they are not full-time occupations.

Con - Because of the manager's familiarity with the city operations and needs, the council may do little more than approve proposals made by the manager.

6. Pro - The Council is relieved of many of the pressures which often lead to patronage, favoritism and graft by delegating administrative power to the manager.

Con - If the council does not accept political leadership, the manager may feel pressure to take the initiative in "getting things done."

7. Pro - The council can devote its time to policy matters, being relieved of the responsibility of day-to-day administration.

Con - It is not possible to separate policy and administration.

8. Pro - Democracy is safeguarded by having elected council members control the manager's length of service.

Con - Democratic and representative government is threatened when one man has so much authority in managing city affairs.

9. Pro - Because of his training, a city manager can handle city operations more efficiently than untrained, elected officials.

Con - Cities may find it difficult to obtain a well trained, capable manager for what they believe they can afford to pay him.

10. Pro - An outside man has no prior friendships or obligations in the community to color his decisions.

Con - An outside man will lack an understanding of local situations and problems. City councils are often inclined to prefer a local man over an outside man.

## GTE offers "do it yourself" repair kits

By taking advantage of repair services now available at Western Auto at 201 S. Divide in Eldorado, residential and single-line business telephone customers in Eldorado can avoid charges that now apply if the customers request the company send employees to the customers' premises to repair company-owned telephones.

E.O. Cambren, West Texas Division Operations manager for General Telephone in San Angelo, said the Public Utility Commission of Texas, on May 19, approved a \$22.50 charge for single-line business and \$17 for residential customers who have service problems associated with the telephone instrument and who prefer the company to send an employee to the customers' premises to make the repair rather than bring the instrument to Western Auto.

In addition, there are separate charges for each telephone outlet repaired if the problem is in the house wiring and the customer prefers to have the telephone company make the repairs rather than purchasing a repair kit to make the repair themselves, or have a third party make the repairs. Wiring charges were started in 1982 but were increased in the recent ruling.

"We have responded to customers' requests to come to their premises for years, and we are more than pleased to respond now," he said. "The only change, brought about by deregulation, is that we must charge a fee to recover those expenses from customers requesting the service."

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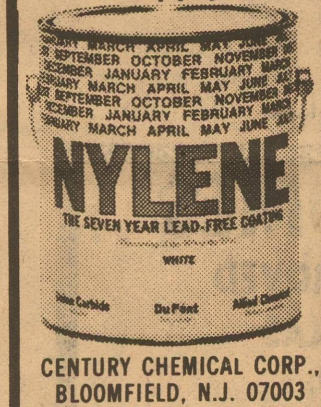
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## Dahlberg on honors list

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## The Congressional Budget

As the Congressional Budget for fiscal year 1984 — and the Congressional Budget process — continue to dominate both the news and our work on the Floor of the House, it seems appropriate to take a closer look at exactly where we now stand and exactly what appears to be in store for all of us.

When the House passed its version of the Budget, I called it the most ridiculous budget I had ever seen. It contained \$30 billion in new taxes for the forthcoming fiscal year; \$29.7 billion in excessive Federal spending above the President's request; and only a 2.8 percent increase in real defense spending at a time when our national security clearly demands more serious attention. I voted against that budget loudly and clearly, because it continues to spend money we cannot afford on programs we do not need, because it is wanting in meeting our Nation's need to upgrade and modernize our strategic deterrents, and, primarily, because it calls for outrageous tax increases on the American people.

In order to achieve that \$30 billion in new taxes, the Congress would be forced to either repeal or cap the third year of the tax reductions which are scheduled to occur this July; or to eliminate those hard-won reforms of the estate and gift taxes and the slight reduction in "windfall profit" taxes which were enacted in the 1981 Economic Recovery Tax Act; or to impose a surtax or some other kind of onerous tax on the already heavily-burdened middle American taxpayer. I repeat — the House budget was ridiculous.

Despite House action, some of us had hopes that the Senate would act more wisely, so that the final Congressional Budget would be more in keeping with our Nation's need for a responsible fiscal policy.

Instead, after a prolonged debate, by a vote of 50 to 49, the Senate passed its version of the Budget and it is only slightly better than the House version. It calls for \$8.9 billion in new taxes, \$11 billion in Federal spending above the President's request, and a 6 percent increase in defense. The domestic spending figures and the tax increases remain outrageous.

At some point in June, the House and the Senate, meeting in a joint conference committee, will attempt to somehow reconcile the differences between the two versions and report a final budget back to both houses. My crystal ball is not much better than that of anyone else, but my guess at this time is the House and the Senate will pass a conference report — eventually if not at first — my own opposition to the contrary notwithstanding.

Where are we then? Since the Congressional Budget is a simple concurrent resolution, it does not get sent to the President for signature. Instead, it serves as an overall internal benchmark against which the Congress considers individual tax and spending legislation. Those tax bills and those appropriations bills are not internal resolutions, however, and they will be sent to the President for final action. It is my guess, and my crystal ball is a little clearer on this one, that the President will veto each and every high tax and high spending bill that comes his way. When those vetoes occur, there is absolutely no question in my mind that we can get the necessary votes to sustain the President, thereby preventing excessive taxes and spending from becoming the law of the land.

### TAC approves improvement program

Texas Aeronautics Commissioners today approved a supplement to the agency's FY83 Capital Improvement Program that will provide financial assistance for public projects at 11 communities.

Commissioners also elected newly-appointed Commissioner Warren C. Harmon of Bryan as vice chairman, and decided on applications for route amendments from several TAC-certified airlines.

The financial assistance projects added to the FY83 program include:

\$40,000 to Center to reconstruct a new paved entrance road and gravel auto parking area, restripe

the runway, install fencing, medium intensity runway lights (MIRL), a windcone and a segmented circle.

\$40,000 to Cleveland to install MIRL.

\$36,000 to Commerce to construct hangar taxiways and a parking apron, install a windcone and rotating beacon and to relocate a power line.

\$25,000 to Edwards County (Rocksprings) to install low intensity runway lights (LIRL).

\$75,000 to Gladewater to construct a 150' by 650' aircraft apron and taxiway.

\$37,500 to Gray County (Pampa) to seal cracks on 5,500' by 100' runway 17/35 and apply a seal coat on 4,500' by 75' runway 5/23.

\$26,500 to Munday to seal coat the 3,200' by 50' runway, stub taxiway, aircraft apron, entrance road and auto parking area.

\$45,000 to Pineland to seal coat the 4,000' by 75' runway, turnarounds, stub taxiway and apron, and to restripe the runway, pave an entrance road and install a segmented circle.

\$31,500 to Post/Garza County to install MIRL on Runway 17/35.

\$23,300 to Stanton to install LIRL.

\$45,200 to Vega/Old-

ham County to install a drainage structure and widen existing 2,100' long Runway 17/35 by 10 feet to a 60 foot width.

The Commission approved a cancellation in the FY82 program, as well. Schleicher County (Eldorado) has withdrawn its request for \$75,000 to acquire land and construct a 1,020' by 60' extension to the existing 3,170' by 50' runway.

Harmon, the Commission's new vice chairman, is a pilot and builder/developer. A former Captain of the U.S. Air Force, he earned a B.S. from Ohio University.

In deciding on air carrier requests, Commissioners agreed to Cen-Tex Airlines' addition of two airports to its route schedule and the deletion of one. Its newly offered scheduled passenger service is at Lufkin/Nacogdoches (Angelina County Airport) and Dallas/Ft. Worth Regional Airport, Cen-Tex dropped authority to serve Houston's William P. Hobby Airport. rport.

Applications by Eagle Commuter Airlines to discontinue flights to Lufkin/Nacogdoches, Eastland, Fort Worth and San Angelo were approved at the meeting. The Commission also affirmed the withdrawal of an earlier request by Eagle to add the points of Waco and Arlington. It was noted that Cen-Tex began service at Lufkin/Nacogdoches the same day Eagle ceased its operations there.

Commissioners approved the deletion of points Brownsville, DFW, Midland/Odessa (Regional Airport), Houston Hobby and Laredo from the certificated authority of Emerald Airlines. And Emerald was allowed an additional six months (starting Jan. 6) in which to
