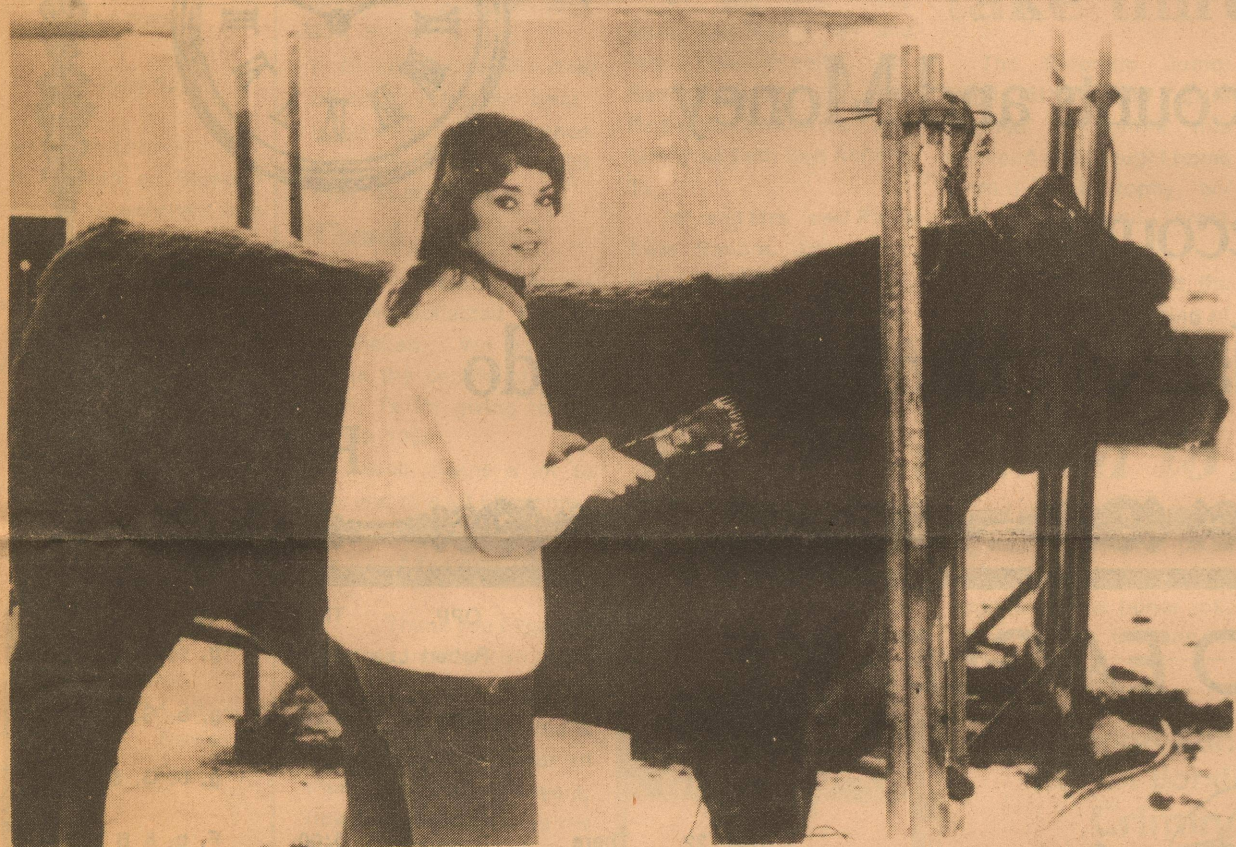

County workers receive raise

The Schleicher County Commissioners met in regular session Monday morning to discuss a number of topics.

The first business at hand was the reading of the minutes and approval of bills for payment.

At nine o'clock the public hearing was held and afterwards the commissioners voted to extend the 5 percent pay raise to all county employees.

Bids were opened for the servicing of the Sheriff's Department's vehicles. There was only \$1.25 difference in the bids submitted so all bids were

rejected and Sheriff Edmiston was instructed by the Court to rotate the servicing of his vehicles between the local service stations on a monthly basis.

The commissioners then voted to advertise for bids on a new vehicle for the Sheriff's Department.

The Salary Grievance Committee was selected, as in previous years, by drawing four names from the Grand Jury list which were Ray Romero, Dora Bosman, Mable Freitag and Willard Gentry along with the County Clerk, Sheriff, County Attorney, County Tax Collector and County

Treasurer to make up the committee.

The election judges salary was voted upon to remain the same as in previous elections.

The Commissioners called for bids to be advertised for on a motor grader. Bids are to be opened February 13th.

Commissioners reviewed reports concerning a curve in a county road that had been the cause of an accident on the Gene Edmiston property. The Court took no action but will seek to rectify the problem.

With no further business the Court adjourned its meeting.

Prissy Paxton, Precinct 3 has filed for her position again. Jack Turner, Precinct 1 has also filed to seek his position as county commissioner for 1984.

Offices that will be coming up for election include: County Sheriff,

County Tax Assessor-Collector, County Attorney, County Commissioner in Precinct 1 and 3.

Trustees set election date

The Schleicher County Independent School District's Board of Trustees met for their regularly scheduled meeting Monday evening.

Johnny Griffin approached the board, upon requesting the school's support, not financially but in allowing the students to participate, in a Rodeo Club. Since Mr. Griffin was not scheduled on the agenda, his request was not acted upon at the time but will be reviewed later by the board.

The trustees voted to call the trustee election on April 7th. Three positions will be open for election: the position previously held by Frankie Hardy who resigned earlier in the school year; Richard Kent and

Sonny Turner. Filing for the position will begin February 7th with the deadline for filing being March 7th.

The president of the board was appointed to head a study on salaries and benefits for personnel. Those on the committee include Ronnie Mittel, Richard Kent and Lynn Meador.

Superintendent Guy Whitaker reported on the damage to the school's water pipes during the recent cold spell. Plumbers are currently working on the repairs for the school.

The board then briefly discussed goals they as board members would like to see the school attain.

Bills were then paid and with no further business on the agenda the board adjourned.

The 150' x 40' building is being constructed by Abbco of San Angelo

and to date only the pad has been completed. Work had been delayed due to the holidays and the incimate weather but, should resume soon.

Sales Tax rebate down

Bob Bullock, state comptroller, sent checks out last week for this period's one percent city sales tax.

Bullock stated that the checks were "up by a whopping 39.5 percent over last January's payments." He stated that a big part of that increase came because 15,000 taxpayers who previously only paid four times a year started paying every month and therefore got their money back to these 980 city halls that much quicker. But, Bullock also added that some of the increase is due to the economic recovery in Texas.

Eldorado's share of the money came to \$2742.66 which is down by

21.36 percent from last year's payment of \$3487.71.

Sonora received a check from the state for \$12,926.37 which is a 12.48 percent increase over last year's payment for this same period of \$11,492.56.

Our neighbor Menard received a check that was 87.30 percent higher than the same period last year. This year's check for this period is \$2496.02. Last year's check was \$1332.60.

San Angelo's share of the money totaled \$264,375.87 which is an increase of .04 percent over last year's check of \$264,266.87.

Information on emergency loans

The Farmers Home Administration (FmHA) will resume making economic emergency loans by the beginning of next year, according to FmHA County Supervisor Ben T. Rucker Jr.

"Economic emergency loans are designed for farmers who are in a cost-price squeeze or face other financial difficulty beyond their control," Rucker said. "In other words, the loans are for a financial emergency rather than a natural disaster such as a drought or flood."

The economic emergency or "EE" program was in operation from 1978 to 1981. The program expired in 1981 but was later reauthorized by Congress. It is being reopened under an order by the U.S. district court in Washington, D.C.

"Under the program, loans will be available to

farmers who are suffering an economic emergency through no fault of their own. They must show that they have tried unsuccessfully to get a loan from another source before coming to FmHA and that they can repay the loan over a period of time, depending on the use of the funds. The funds can be used to finance debts and related uses," Rucker said.

The interest rate for direct loans fluctuates with the cost to the government of borrowing money. The interest rates for guaranteed loans, which are made by commercial lenders and backed by the government, are negotiated between the borrower and the lender.

Applications for economic emergency loans will be available at the FmHA county office located at Box H, Eden, Texas 76837, (915) 869-3941.

PUBLIC NOTICE

In proceedings pending before the Public Utility Commission of Texas (PUC), local exchange telephone companies are requesting authority to charge AT&T Communications of the Southwest, Inc., for use of their facilities. These proposed charges are higher than AT&T Communications can pay at current Texas long distance rate levels. To position itself to be able to implement rates that are sufficient to produce revenues that will recover the costs facing the company, AT&T Communications must now file for rate relief to be able to implement rates that reflect the costs of access that are ultimately imposed on the company.

While AT&T Communications does not want to increase its Texas rates, an increase would be required to recover the increased access charges AT&T Communications will have to pay to the local exchange telephone companies under several proposals pending before the Commission. These access charges at the proposed increased levels represent more than 80 percent of AT&T Communications' operating expense in Texas.

Accordingly, AT&T Communications, in accordance with the Public Utility Regulatory Act and the rules of the PUC, hereby gives notice of the company's intent to implement a new schedule of rates for long distance calls within Texas. The proposed rates will be effective January 28, 1984, unless otherwise determined by the Commission. All customers and classes of customers would be affected by AT&T Communications' proposed rates.

If higher access charges are ordered, AT&T Communications has no recourse but to pay these charges and recover the costs from its customers as a cost of providing long distance service within Texas. AT&T Communications has filed rates which would mean a maximum overall increase in adjusted test period revenues of \$301.4 million, or 27.85 percent. This amount would help recover cost increases due to the proposed level of access charges now pending before the PUC.

A complete copy of all tariffs and rate schedules is on file with the Texas Public Utility Commission at Austin, Texas, and with every municipality in Texas.

Persons who wish to intervene or otherwise participate in these proceedings should notify the Commission as soon as possible.
