Tough digging in the Christian

The trenching of the Christian Addition began Monday for the installation of new water and gas lines but the digging has been anything but easy. The contracting firm of Henkles and McCoy of Odessa has already brought in a large machine in that the original piece of equipment found the bedrock a wee bit tougher than anticipated, and reports have it that even larger machine will be brought in.

The water and sewer lines have to be completed before the C.D.B.G. contractor will begin on the sewer

installation. The water and gas lines should be installed within 45 days.

Money required for the water and gas line installation came from the cashing of \$38,000 worth of treasury bills that were previously held for security by the Mercantile Bank of Dallas on a retiring City debt service. The majority of the finances will be expanded for the cost of labor and machinery, approximately \$30,000.00. Approximately \$3500.00 for water line was necessary with the City providing its own gas line and supplementary labor.

Varsity girls out of race

The Varsity Girls basketball team no longer qualifies for any district title following a Junior Varsity Tournament held here last week. The regulation was enacted after a coaching oversight was discovered which allowed a varsity girl to participate in four tournaments, one more than allowed by U.I.L. The regulation states that no more than 22 games and 3 tournaments can be participated in by a varsity player.

The decision to enact the regulation was made by the district executive committee when Eldorado's school administrators reported the oversight to the U.I.L. This penalty does not affect the points or games of any pre-district play off games.

County bosses ok extension to rodeo slab

In a lengthy meeting Monday the Schleicher County Commissioners took care of numerous matters. The Rodeo Association appeared before the court to request that the county provide a Community Center. The Court unanimously approved the motion to extend by 20 ft. the rodeo slab and enclose and air condition the facility. Bids for the materials will be opened February 13th. Work on the facility will be done by the Rodeo Association. This action follows the announcement that after the re-vamping of the Memorial Building there will be no more dances or functions

allowing alcoholic beverages held in the building.

County Treasurer A.G. McCormack presented the Quarterly Report to the court and it was approved.

The 1983 Annual Report was reviewed by the commissioners. This action took most of the court's time. County officials also presented their reports to the court.

The salary for the Deputy Treasurer was set at \$850.00 by the county. In other financial matters the county approved the transfer of money from the General fund to the Jury fund.

Commissioners voted to advertise for bids for a 1984 pick-up for the county road department. Bids will be opened March 12th.

With no further business the Commissioners adjourned the meeting.

Fohn seeks re-election

Gerald Fohn, 51st District Attorney since 1975, will seek re-election in the November general election to a third term in the five-county office, subject to the May Democratic primary election.

His district shares Tom Green County with the 119th district, and includes all of Coke, Irion, Schleicher and Sterling Counties.

Fohn, 38, stressed his experience in office in announcing his decision to seek another term.

"We've seen a tremendous growth in our office caseload since 1973 when I came to work just out of law school as the only assistant for the 51st and 119th District Attorneys," Fohn said.

"Today, besides felony cases our office handles juvenile matters, child-protective cases, and child support as well. I feel it is vital to the public interest that there be a District Attorney who has the knowledge and

experience to see that these cases are handled efficiently and correctly.

"To face these new challenges, we have put together a prosecution team including myself, assistant prosecutors, and investigator, and clerical staff. We will continue to work with law enforcement and the Courts toward our constant goal - firm, but fair prosecution, with the swiftest possible administration of justice", Fohn stated.

A full-time prosecutor with no outside law practice, Fohn has achieved a leadership role among Texas prosecutors. He is currently serving his second consecutive term as an elected Director of the Texas District and County Attorneys Association, and serves as a member of the Advisory Committee of the Texas Prosecutor Council.

He and his wife, Dolores, live in San Angelo and are the parents of three sons.

(Pete) Peters, Mike Moore and Sam Henderson, Jr. Filing for the school, city and hospital board seats will begin February 6th with March 7th being the deadline for the April 7th election.

PUBLIC NOTICE

In proceedings pending before the Public Utility Commission of Texas (PUC), local exchange telephone companies are requesting authority to charge AT&T Communications of the Southwest, Inc., for use of their facilities. These proposed charges are higher than AT&T Communications can pay at current Texas long distance rate levels. To position itself to be able to implement rates that are sufficient to produce revenues that will recover the costs facing the company, AT&T Communications must now file for rate relief to be able to implement rates that reflect the costs of access that are ultimately imposed on the company.


While AT&T Communications does not want to increase its Texas rates, an increase would be required to recover the increased access charges AT&T Communications will have to pay to the local exchange telephone companies under several proposals pending before the Commission. These access charges at the proposed increased levels represent more than 80 percent of AT&T Communications' operating expense in Texas.

Accordingly, AT&T Communications, in accordance with the Public Utility Regulatory Act and the rules of the PUC, hereby gives notice of the company's intent to implement a new schedule of rates for long distance calls within Texas. The proposed rates will be effective January 28, 1984, unless otherwise determined by the Commission. All customers and classes of customers would be affected by AT&T Communications' proposed rates.

If higher access charges are ordered, AT&T Communications has no recourse but to pay these charges and recover the costs from its customers as a cost of providing long distance service within Texas. AT&T Communications has filed rates which would mean a maximum overall increase in adjusted test period revenues of \$301.4 million, or 27.85 percent. This amount would help recover cost increases due to the proposed level of access charges now pending before the PUC.

A complete copy of all tariffs and rate schedules is on file with the Texas Public Utility Commission at Austin, Texas, and with every municipality in Texas.

Anyone who wants to file a claim for benefits, get information, or transact other business with the Social Security Administr-

tion may contact him at this time. Any type of application for Social Security or Supplemental Security Income benefits can be handled by telephone. Your application can be more quickly processed if you will return all applications and requested documents promptly. The phone number for the San Angelo Office is 949-3718.

Social Security News

Social Security benefits are designed to replace, in part, loss of earnings as a result of disability, retirement, or death. Therefore, for every \$2 in earnings above an annual exempt amount, \$1 in Social Security benefits is withheld. (Starting in 1990, the \$1 for \$2 withholding will become \$1 for \$3 for people 65 and over.)

For 1984, the annual exempt amount is \$6,960 for people who are at least 65 during any part of the year, and \$5,160 for those under 65. However, benefits are payable for all months a person is 70 or older, regardless of the amount of his or her earnings during those months or for the entire year.

A special rule applies to the first year of retirement. A person whose annual earnings exceed the exempt amount during the first year of retirement can

still get a full benefit for any month he or she did not earn more than the monthly exempt amount (\$580 for people 65 and over, \$430 for those under 65) and did not perform substantial services in self-employment.

A person who works more than 45 hours a month in self-employment is considered to be providing substantial services. Services may also be considered substantial even if the person works less than 45 hours if the work requires considerable skill or involves substantial responsibilities. However, services are never considered substantial if the person works less than 15 hours a month.

W.T.U. rates

New rates for West Texas Utilities Co.'s retail customers have received final approval of the Public Utility Commission of Texas, and are now in effect.

The rates are designed to provide an annual revenue increase of \$11.97 million. The company, in its rate request filed last June 10, had asked for \$26.5 million.

Although the change means a 5.2 percent increase in total retail rates, the current effect will be a decrease for customers who have been paying temporary rates the past 2½ months. WTU had started collecting interim rates, as allowed by law, on Oct. 22 from all customers except those in 30 towns whose cases had been appealed to the PUC.

Because the final rates approved by the PUC are lower than the temporary rates, WTU will refund the difference plus interest. This will be done by crediting customer bills and should be accomplished during February and March.

Cash refunds will be mailed to customers who have moved off WTU lines or transferred to towns where the interim rates were not in effect. These checks will be sent to the

customer's last known address.

If these customers have not received refunds by April 1, they should contact their former local WTU office.

Amount of refunds will vary according to the size of the customer bills. For example, for a customer using 1,000 kilowatt-hours of electricity a month, the difference would be \$4.34. At this rate, his refund for the entire period would amount to about \$12.

Refunds will be made to all customers served by WTU during the period from Oct. 22 to Jan. 6, except those who live in the city limits of the following towns:

Alpine, Aspermont, Balmorhea, Bronte, Clyde, Cross Plains, Dodson, Estelline, Hawley, Iraan, Jayton, Junction, Lawn, Lueders, Marfa, Memphis, Menard, Merkel, Miles, Presidio, Putnam, Quitaque, Rankin, Santa Anna, Shamrock, Sonora, Sterling City, Turkey, Tuscola and Valentine.

None of the rate changes apply in the City of Vernon, where WTU's rates are kept the same as those of the city's municipal system and already are higher than those in the remainder of the system.

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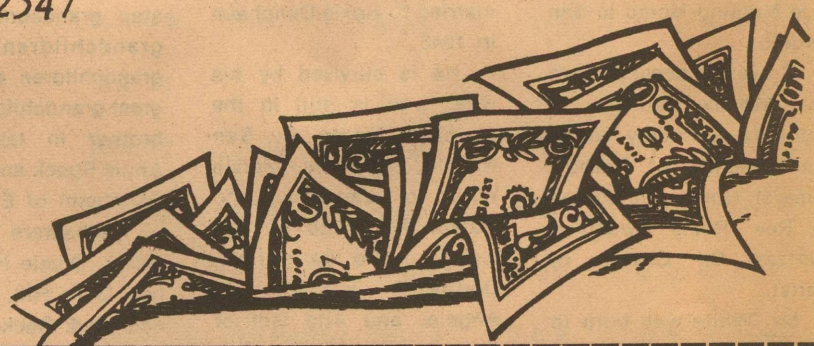

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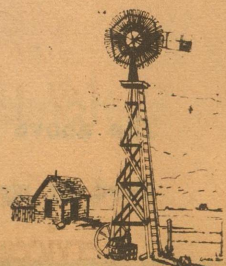

Angora Goat Performance Test

The annual Angora Goat Performance Test will be conducted by the Texas Agricultural Experiment Station here beginning March 13 according to Dr. Maurice Shelton, test coordinator.

"Goats should be delivered to the station between February 27-29," said Shelton. "They will be shorn March 12 with the first day of the 112 day test set for March 13."

Shelton said a final weigh-day is set for July 3 with the final shearing to

occur July 5 and 6. A field day and potential sale is set for July 19.

The animals will be sampled for fineness and yield determination of the fleece prior to the final shearing. Yield values will be based on a hand-scoured side sample.

Animals may be delivered as individuals or in sire groups. It is not required that the animals be registered, though sale or use prospects would be improved with registered animals. Upon arrival, the

animals will initially be fed in large groups sorted by size. When smaller test pens become available, the goats will be separated to sire and/or ownership groups and fed in these facilities for the remainder of the test.

Shelton said that ideally the goats, male kids born in the spring of 1983, should be submitted for testing in-fleece. Shorn animals will be accepted, but he said it will be necessary to reshear them. After arrival at the Station,

the goats will be drenched and vaccinated for enterotoxemia and soremouth. Feet will be trimmed twice during the test. The cost for trimming will be charged to the producer, however, producers are welcome to trim their own goats' feet as they wish.

Participants are asked to deposit \$100.00 to cover the cost of feed and shearing. Any unused funds will be returned at the end of the test.

Ask yourself this question: If the coming of the Kingdom of Heaven depended upon me, when would it get here? There is a Biblical principle that states that you reap what you sow. What have you sown for the Kingdom? What do you expect to reap? If you aren't happy with your answers, why not make some changes now?

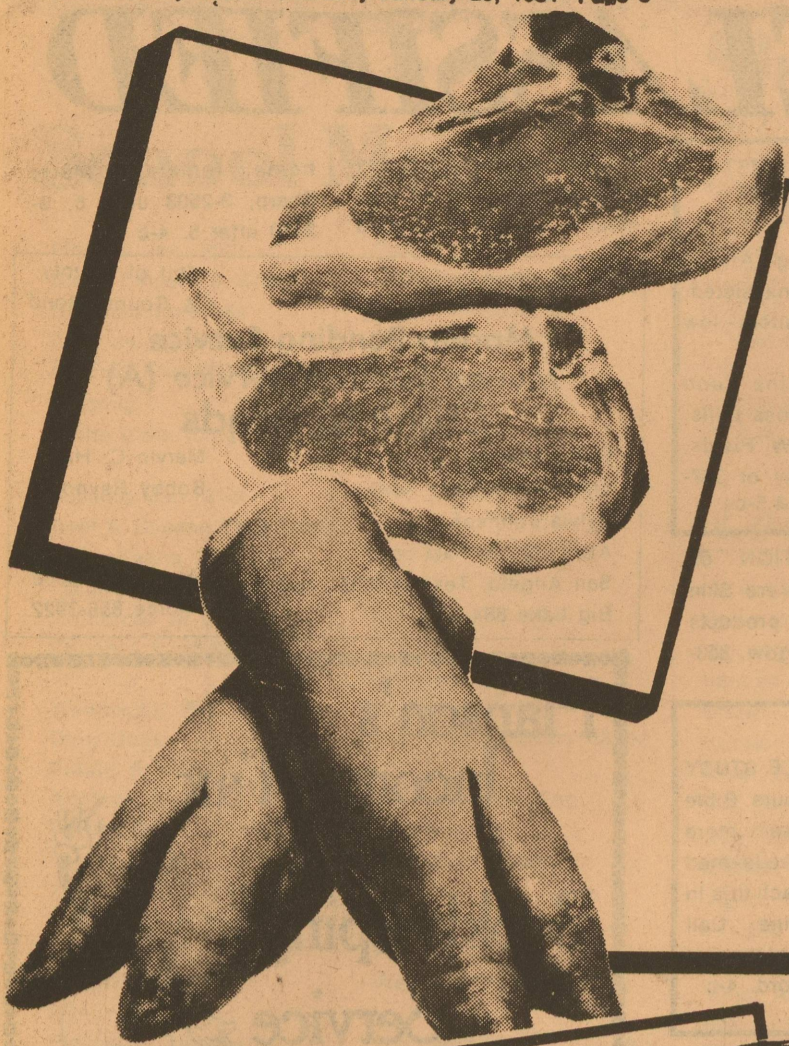
