The key to such emergency treatment is a reservoir of trained emergency medical personnel in each com-

The best hospital, the best ambulances are all useless without people who are trained in how and what to do in emergency situations. Currently, Schleicher County has the smallest number of trained emergency care people of any county our size or smaller in the 13 county CVCOG area. The Schleicher County Emergency Service needs volunteers. We need people who are willing to take the required training, people who are willing to drop everything and respond when the beeper sounds. 


