City enters into contract with **Appraisal District**

March 13th, the Eldorado City Council agreed to enter into a joint contract with the Schleicher County Appraisal District to collect taxes. Ray Lewis Ballew representing the district met with the Council to review the proposal. The collection is scheduled to begin April 1st.

A concerned James Harris appeared before the Council to request their consideration on the payment of damages done to his carpet when the sewer backed up. Mr. Harris claimed that he requested that his line be checked in December because it was stopped up. No workorder could be found on the job, the City crew did check it out. Secretary Carolyn Mayo was instructed to look into the matter further before any action was taken by the Council.

Secretary Mayo gave an update on the C.D.B.G. and bond projects to the Council. The bids for Wastewater Plant will be opened April 10th and the Secretary requested the Council's advisement on running the bid request in the Standard Times. She was requested to get a price on the advertizement and report back to the Council.

In a busy meeting Tuesday evening the Sonora landfill and the prices charged to the various sized vehicles utilizing the dump. Although no action was taken by the Council, they discussed at length the neighboring city's regulations and how Eldorado might incorporate them at the City's landfill


> Sonora's policy on truck traffic was also a source of discussion Tuesday night. The "no truck traffic" policy instituted by Sonora keeps traffic off residential streets and the council invited Sheriff Orval Edmiston to the next meeting to discuss the possibility of Eldorado enacting such a policy.

Secretary Mayo reported that two prices for the Cities Service check meter run had been obtained. The Council agreed to table the matter until after the April 7th election.

The amendment to the Peddler's Permit Ordinance #105-83 was read and approved by the Council.

Other subjects touched on by the Council included Jim Hardy's development of certain acreage southeast of the City limits; ambulance drivers, repairs on the landfill house and completion of a well in Edgefield. After no further business was

brought before the Council the meeting adjourned.



Local economy declines

West Texas is still behind on sales tax receipts according to Bob Bullock, State Comptroller. He said among the 20 biggest sales tax cities Midland and Odessa are still lower than last year. But overall Texas is pulling out strongly from the trough it was in last year.

The State Comptroller's office sent out checks Tuesday totaling \$53.5 million in local sales tax payments to the 985 cities that levy the one-percent city sales tax. These checks reflect sales made in January and reported to the Comptroller in late February.

Eldorado definitely has not experienced any resurgence according to its check from Bullock. The city received a check for \$2,338.80. This same time last year the city received \$5,903.15. To date the total of Eldorado's share of the money comes to \$12,432.08. Last year to date the total was \$22,263.30. Folks, that's a decrease of 44.16 percent.

Sonora is doing quite a bit better in their sales tax receipts than we are however. They received a check for \$15,456.31. Last year's check for this same period came to \$10,500.24. Their payments to date for 1984 come to \$56,909.82, which is a decrease of only 14.33 percent from last year's total of \$66,429,51

Menard, again has shown the least amount of change for the three small towns, sales tax wise. They show only a decrease of 1.38 percent from this time last year. Their check for this period was \$2776.18. Last year at this time it was \$2,216.53. Their total for 1984 has reached \$10,601.51; last year's total was \$10,750.22.

Mertzon is showing the healthiest economic growth of all the area towns with an increase of 16.42 percent over last year. Their check from Bullock this period totaled \$3,509.71 whereas last year at this same time it was \$2,910.63. Their 1984 payments to date total \$12,892.29 which is quite an increase from last year's \$11,073.62.

San Angelo is still not showing an increase over last year. Their check totaled \$330,159.45 for this time which makes their 1984 total so far at \$1,283,781.53. Last year at this same time they received \$237,884.52 which brought their total to date to \$1.366 586.55, a decrease of 6.06 percent.







WHAT ARE HOMESTEAD EXEMPTIONS?

This public service message from the State Property Tax Board, local taxing authorities and this newspaper explains exemptions.

A homestead exemption is a reduction in the taxable value of your residence homestead. Various types of homestead exemptions are available in Texas and, if you qualify, they can reduce your total property tax bill. Read on for details

What Exemptions Are Available?

School districts offer a residence homestead exemption to all homeowners and additional exemptions to persons who are disabled or over 65

Counties offer homestead exemptions on their farm-to-market or flood control tax rate, and may offer optional exemptions to the disabled and elderly

Cities and other taxing districts may offer optional exemptions for the disabled and elderly

All taxing units offer an exemption for certain disabled veterans on one designated property.

Additionally, some taxing units offer a local option, percentage homestead exemption to resident homeowners.

How Do I Apply?

State Property Tax Board

Box 15900, Austin 78761

If you were 65 or disabled on January 1 and have not previously filed for the over-65 or disability homestead exemption, you will need to make application this year.

Or, if you have never received a homestead exemption on your present home, an original application should be filed in 1984.

Applications for all exemptions should be made to the county appraisal district at the address shown below. Forms are available from the appraisal office.


For 1984, applications should be filed before May 1. While late applications for exemptions may be accepted in certain instances, you can fully protect your rights by applying before May 1.
