

# Rebate checks still show decline

State Comptroller Bob Bullock made a lot of folks happier this past week as he mailed out checks totaling \$41.1 million in local sales tax payments to the 974 cities that levy the one percent city sales tax.

Bullock stated "Last September we were reporting the biggest allocation based on a single month's tax collections in the history of the state. This month, with sales tax receipts running about one percent behind last year, shows us just how fast things change."

Eldorado's share of the money came to \$2,579.98 which was down

over half from last year's payment of \$5,663.28. This brings 1983's total payments to \$53,702.21. Last years total payments to date for the same period was \$73,904.47.

Sutton County's total of \$10,961.81 was down from last year's payment of \$18,664.00 for the same period. This payment brings 1983's total to \$174,525.08 when compared to last year's total at the same time of \$279,960.44 brings down the payments 37.66 percent.

Menard's payment was \$2,383.84 which was up from last year's payment of \$2031.61. With this last check the total of Menard's payments this year are \$30,209.80 which is down

slightly from last year's total to date which was \$31,094.58.

San Angelo's check showed a marked decline from this same time last year with a check of \$281,356.73. Last year it was \$323,888.17. Even with the decline in this payment, San Angelo shows a 2.03 percent increase from this time last year.

Bullock also sent checks to the state's two Metropolitan Transit Authorities. Houston's MTA payment was \$8.9 million, bringing the 1983 total to \$117.4 million. San Antonio's MTA check was for \$2.1 million for a 1983 total of \$17.1 million, up more than nine percent from 1982.

### Council okays fee increase

Tuesday night September 13th found the City Council of Eldorado in session. During this meeting the Peddler's Permit Ordinance was discussed and revised by increasing the Peddler's Permit fee to \$25 per day or \$100 for 3 months of permission from the City Fathers. The time frame is to be from 8:00 a.m. until 5:00 p.m. and a maximum of a \$200 fine for non-compliance with the ordinance. The one exception the Peddlers Permit is the school, churches and non profit community groups.

The City Council also decided to participate with the Joint Texas Political Subdivision Policy for Workmen's Compensation which is offered by Employers' Insurance as opposed to participating with the Texas Municipal League Workmen's Compensation Insurance plan, the City is presently participating in the Employer's Insurance system.

The Council reviewed a letter submitted by Dale Lipsett of the Schleicher County Ambulance Service and following a round table discussion a flat water rate was granted by the City Fathers to the Ambulance volunteer drivers similar to that of the volunteer firemen. The qualifications are that the recipient be an ECA or better before the new rate is allowed to the ambulance attendants.

Two items were tabled by the City Council. They were: any action concerning easement requirements for various sites within the city limits, the other was a membership in the C.V.C.O.G. which the councilmen planned to review further before making a decision.

During the City Secretary report to the Councilmen, it was learned that WTU's street lighting program would be soon implemented. And an update on the Community Development Block Grant as well as the Bond sewer project was offered. Carolyn Mayo, the City Secretary, informed the City Fathers that since the beginning of the Municipal Court in August that \$555 had been collected with 41 cases filed. Twenty cases are still pending with the estimated total of citations coming in at \$734 if all citations were paid in accordance with the fine schedule.

Following the Secretary's report the city officials entered into a discussion of updating the utility ordinances which would incorporate the new rates of water and sewer as well as redoing of the trash service

now that it includes the new city dumpsters. Mrs. Mayo will have a draft of the new utility ordinances present for the next meeting.

With the minutes read and the monthly bills okayed for pay the September City Council meeting drew to a close with all Councilmen attending with the exception of Bobbie Sanders and Ronnie Sauer.

Saturday afternoon will be spent by the band members in clinics that will be conducted by University of Texas faculty members.

The band will leave Eldorado on this, their first band trip for the year, at 6:00 am Saturday and will return at about noon Sunday.

Helen Bebee, the County Clerk for Schleicher County announced this week that there has been a change in the polling places in all county, state and national elections.

Precinct Two formerly had the designated polling place of the Southwest Electric Co-op which has been changed to the Schleicher County Fire Hall. The other polling positions remain the same. Precinct One voters are asked to continue voting at the Methodist Educational Building. Precinct Three at the Memorial Building and Precinct Four at the High School Administration Building.

The next election scheduled to be held in Schleicher County is on November 8th, this is the amendment to the Constitution election.

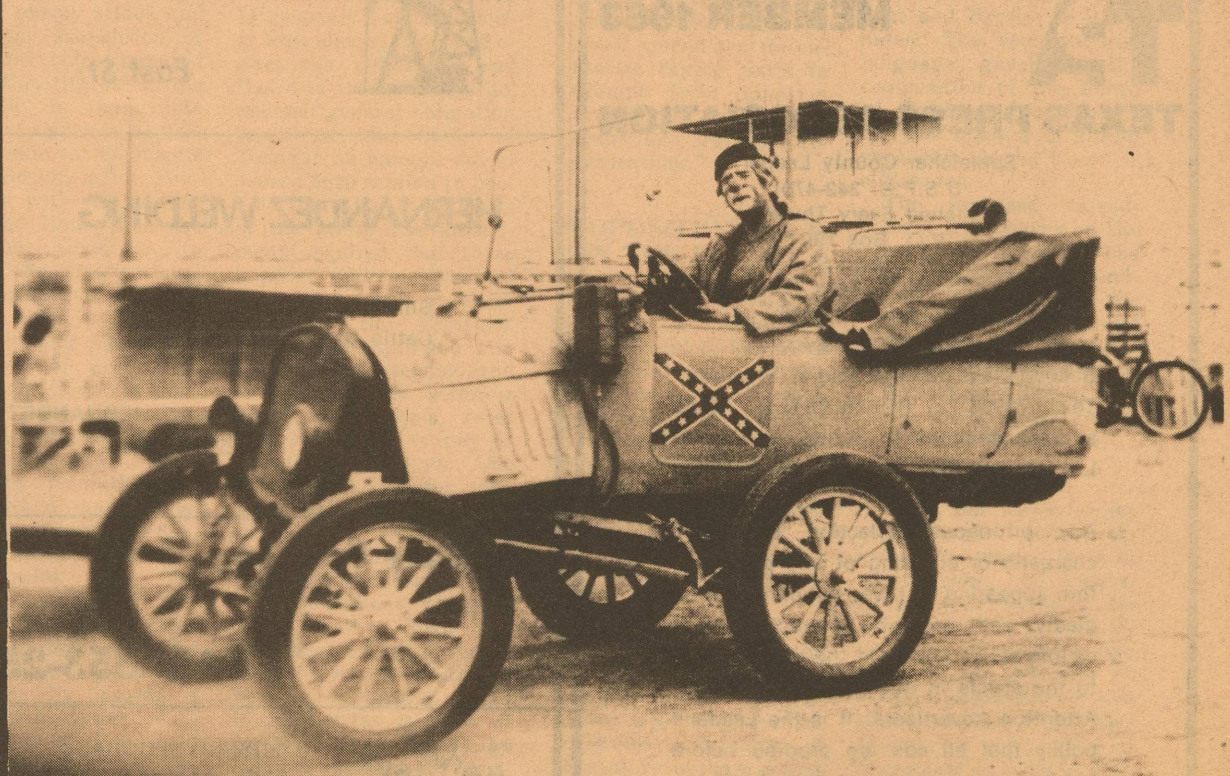

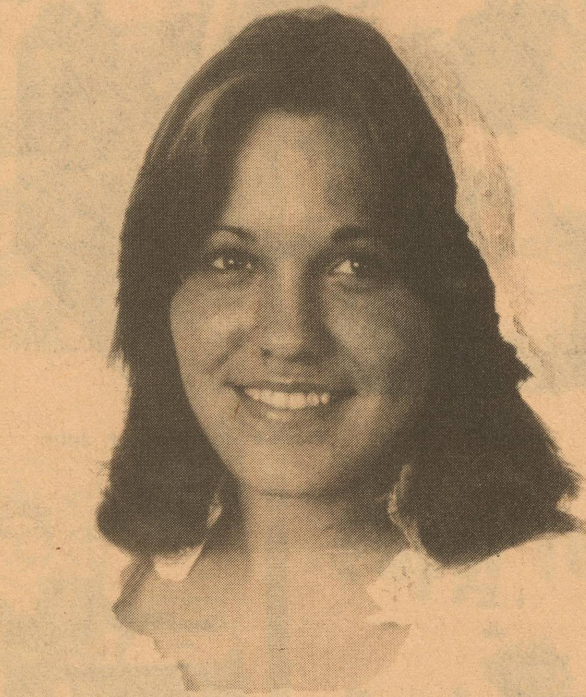

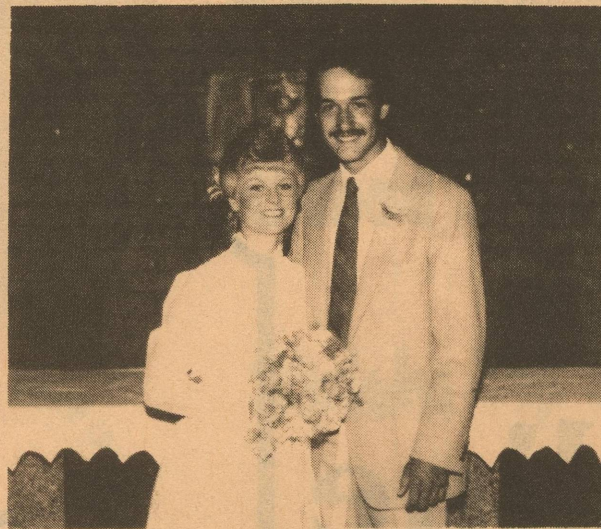

### Large turn out for seminar

Twenty-eight people attended a wildlife seminar held in Eldorado Sept. 12. The seminar, dealing primarily with managing deer herds and hunting leases, was sponsored by the Eldorado-Divide Soil and Water Conservation District, the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, and the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department.

Willard Richter, SSC biologist, gave a presentation on range management to benefit wildlife and local plants that provide food and cover. Jake Landers, TAES extension range specialist, described nutritional needs of deer, nutrient level variations in local range plants, and competition between deer and different classes of live-stock. Tommy Hailey, TP&WD biologist, presented a study made at the Kerr Wildlife Management Area on the effects of nutrition and heredity on production of quality deer, and showed how managers can apply the information obtained to their own programs. He also reviewed a number of successful deer herd management programs carried out on ranches under a wide variety of conditions.

### FARM SAFETY WEEK

Protecting rural children and teaching them safety measures is the emphasis of National Farm Safety Week September 18-24, according to George R. Gustafson, Executive Vice President of the Texas Safety Association.

The 40th annual observance of rural safety has been proclaimed by President Ronald Reagan and is being sponsored by the National Safety Council and the US Department of Agriculture.

Farm safety is a particular concern in Texas, where 100 persons lost their lives in farm accidents last year, according to Gustafson. The statistics are tabulated by the Texas Farm Bureau, based on data furnished by the Texas State Health Department. These records show that of the 100 deaths, most were

related to tractors, firearms, drowning, electric current, and machinery, he said.

Safety leader estimate that the incidence of these rural-type accidents is actually much greater than those numbers reported, he said.

Although farm fatalities are a major concern, farmers and ranchers should also be aware that up to 20,000 disabling injuries occur to Texas Farmers and ranchers each year, according to Dr. Gary S. Nelson, Extension Specialist Safety Engineering, Texas A&M University and Texas Safety Association Vice President for Agriculture.

According to Nelson, "If you are a farmer or a rancher, the probability of experiencing a serious injury this year is 1 in 5."

# Sonora blanks Eagles 27-0

The Eldorado Varsity football team were hosts Friday the 16th of Sept. to the Broncos of Sonora. The Broncos made themselves at home, as they beat the Eagles 27-0. It was the Eagles' first loss of the year, and the first time the Eagles had been shut-out. This was one of the biggest rivalry games between these teams that's been going on for a long time. Last year the Eagles went South to take the title, this year the Broncos came 21 miles north and got it back.

In the beginning of the game the stands were packed on both sides and you could feel the electricity in the air. On the opening kick off the Broncos kicked to the

Eagles and John R. Griffin took a reverse hand off and ran for 25 yards before he was brought down. On the next two plays the Eagles looked as though they were about to start something, but the Broncos stopped them short of the first door. Either team wasn't able to do much in the first quarter as the Eagles gave up possession on a fumble and the Eagles' defense would not let the Broncos get much on their possession.

Mid-way through the second quarter a "Bomb" fell out of the sky and landed on the Eagles running back Douglas Ussery as he was playing linebacker on defense, a silence hovered over the crowd on both sides as Ussery lay in pain, and it appeared to be a knee injury. In the second half the Eagles returned to the field with out Ussery as he was headed to the hospital for X-rays. There wasn't much the Eagles could do on

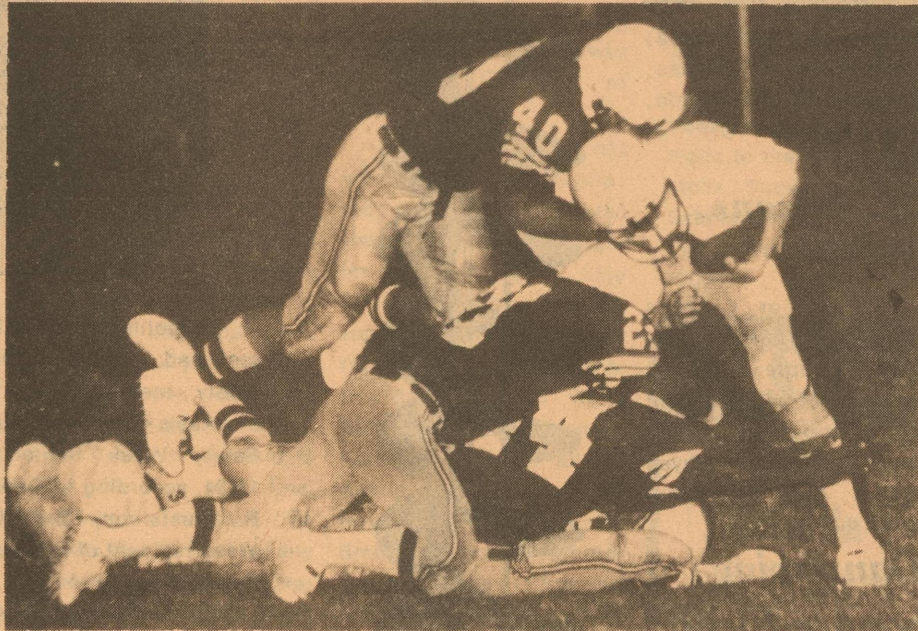

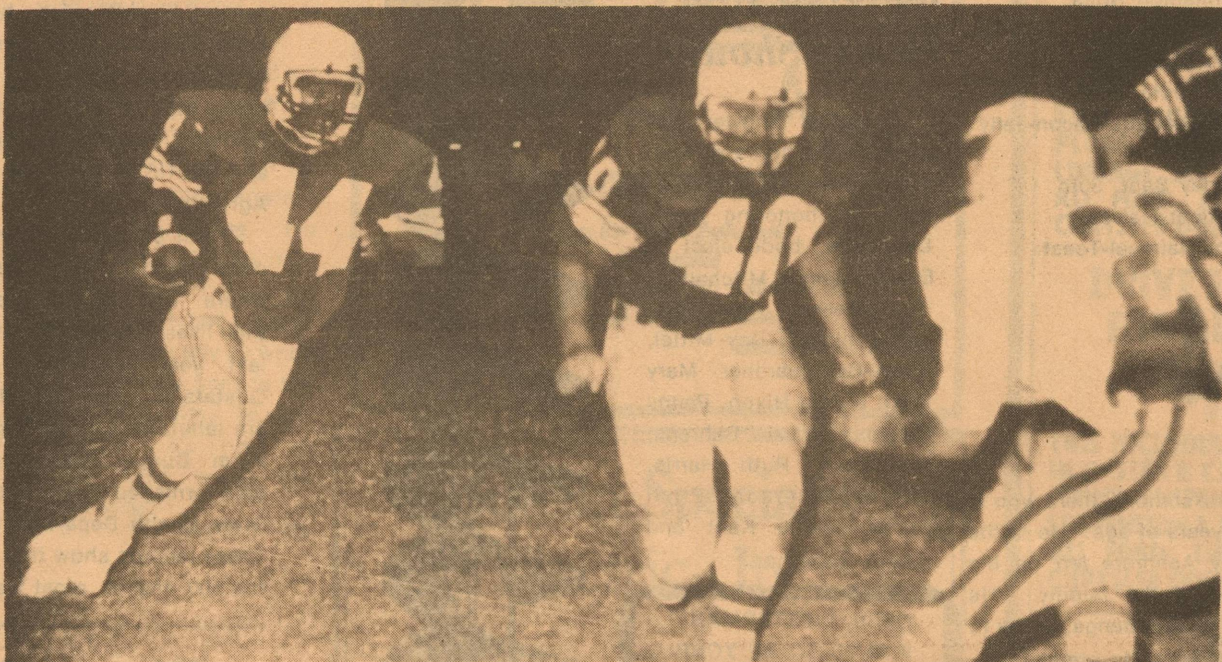

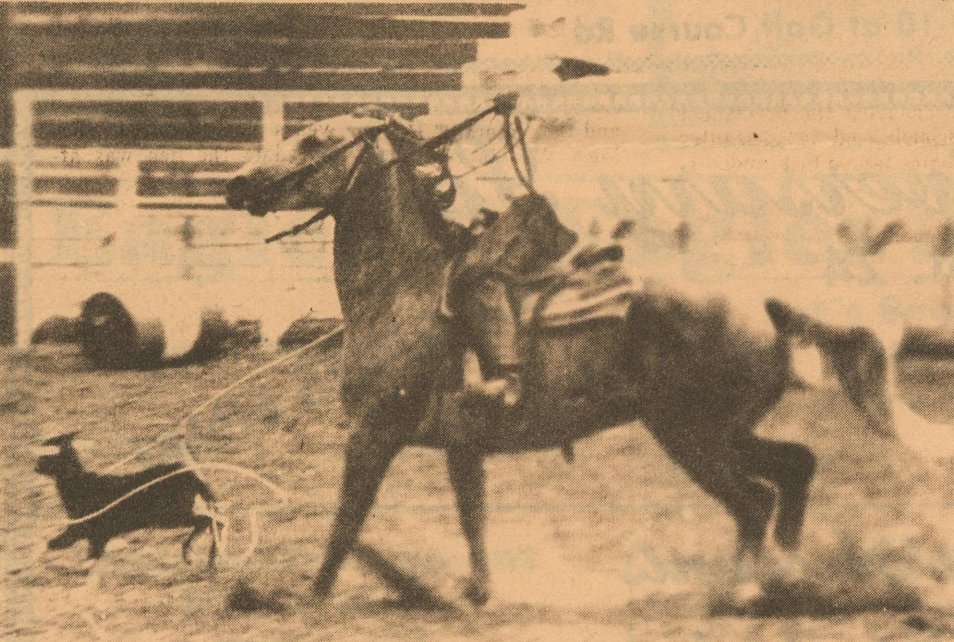
neighbor.

### PUBLIC NOTICE

BRIEF EXPLANATORY STATEMENTS OF PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENTS SPECIAL ELECTION NOVEMBER 8, 1983

#### PROPOSITION NO. 1 ON THE BALLOT

House Joint Resolution 91 proposes a constitutional amendment which requires a county with a population of 30,000 or more to be divided into not less than four nor more than eight justice of the peace precincts. A county with a population of 18,000 or more but less than 30,000 shall be divided into not less than two nor more than five justice of the peace precincts. A county with a population of less than 18,000 shall be designated as a single justice of the peace precinct or, upon a finding of necessity by the commissioners court, shall be divided into more than one justice of the peace precinct but not more than four. The amendment provides further, that in any precinct in which there is a city with a population of 18,000 or more, two justices of the peace shall be elected. The amendment allows a justice of the peace, constable or commissioner to continue in office until the expiration of his term, although a change in precinct boundaries results in the officer no longer being a resident of the precinct for which he was elected or appointed and allows a justice of the peace or constable to continue in office until the expiration of his term even though a change in precinct boundaries results in the abolishment of the precinct or more than one justice of the peace or constable serving the precinct. Vacancies in the office of justice of the peace or constable that result from a precinct boundary change shall be filled by the commissioners court until the next general election. The amendment would take effect on January 1, 1984, and counties with populations of less than 30,000 and with more than four justice of the peace and constable precincts would have until January 1, 1987 to comply with the amendment.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment authorizing fewer justice of the peace and constable precincts in counties with a population of less than 30,000 and providing for continuous service by justices of the peace, constables, and county commissioners when precinct boundaries are changed."

#### PROPOSITION NO. 2 ON THE BALLOT

House Joint Resolution 105 proposes a constitutional amendment which would limit a homestead in a city, town or village to a lot or lots amounting to not more than one acre of land, together with any improvements on the land. The constitutional requirement that, at the time of

designation, an urban homestead not exceed ten thousand dollars in value without reference to the value of any improvements on the land would be eliminated.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment replacing the limitation on the value of an urban homestead with a limitation based on size."

#### PROPOSITION NO. 3 ON THE BALLOT

Senate Joint Resolution 1 proposes a constitutional amendment that authorizes the Legislature to enact legislation that permits representative associations of agricultural producers to collect refundable assessments on their product sales to be used solely to finance programs of marketing, promotion, research and education relating to those products. It provides, further, that adoption of the proposed constitutional amendment will bring into effect Senate Bill 607, Acts of the 68th Legislature, Regular Session, 1983, with rejection of the amendment resulting in Senate Bill 607 having no effect.

#### PROPOSITION NO. 4 ON THE BALLOT

House Joint Resolution 30 proposes a constitutional amendment which authorizes the Legislature to enact laws to provide for the succession of members of the Legislature in the event of enemy attack and laws the suspension of procedural rules imposed by the Constitution in the event of, or immediate threat of, enemy attack. The amendment empowers the Governor, after consultation with the Speaker of the House and the Lieutenant Governor, to suspend the constitutional requirement that the Legislature hold its sessions in Austin and allows the suspension of procedural rules by the Governor issuing a proclamation in which the House of Representatives and Senate concur by resolution approved by a majority of the members present. Suspension of the constitutional rules may not exceed a period of two years under a single proclamation; however, the Governor may renew the suspension by issuing a new proclamation concurred in by the House of Representatives and the Senate through a resolution approved by a major-

ity of the members present.

The amendment will appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment authorizing statutory provisions for succession of public office during disasters caused by enemy attack, and authorizing the suspension of certain constitutional rules relating to legislative procedure during those disasters or during immediate threat of enemy attack."

#### PROPOSITION NO. 5 ON THE BALLOT

Senate Joint Resolution 12 proposes a constitutional amendment that authorizes the Legislature to enact legislation providing for the use of the permanent school fund and income from the permanent school fund to guarantee bonds issued by school districts. The amendment provides, further, that the Legislature may appropriate part of the available school fund for administration of the permanent school fund or of a bond guarantee program established pursuant to the amendment.

The constitutional amendment will appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment authorizing use of the permanent school fund to guarantee bonds issued by school districts."

#### PROPOSITION NO. 6 ON THE BALLOT

House Joint Resolution 1 proposes a constitutional amendment which would permit the Legislature to provide for the garnishment of wages to enforce court-ordered child support payments. The garnishment remedy would not be available for other purposes.

#### PROPOSITION NO. 7 ON THE BALLOT

Senate Joint Resolution 14 proposes a constitutional amendment that authorizes the Veterans' Land Board to provide for, issue, and sell general obligation bonds of the State of Texas in an amount not to exceed \$800 million to provide financing to veterans of the state. The amendment requires that three hundred million dollars of the state bonds be dedicated to the Veterans' Land Fund. The Fund is to be used to purchase land to be sold to veterans under such terms, rules and regulations as may be authorized by law. The amendment creates the Veterans' Housing Assistance Fund and requires that \$500 million of the state bonds authorized by the amendment be dedicated to the Fund. The Veterans' Housing Assistance Fund will be utilized by the Veterans' Land Board for the purpose of making home mortgage loans to veterans for housing within the state and for the administrative

costs of administering the fund and issuing the bonds. The amendment provides, further, that if there is not money in either the Veterans' Land Fund or the Veterans' Housing Assistance Fund available for payment of principal and interest on the general obligation bonds issued pursuant to the amendment, then money coming into the Treasury in each fiscal year is appropriated in an amount sufficient for payment of principal and interest due in that fiscal year.

The proposed constitutional amendment will appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment for financial assistance to veterans and to authorize the issuance of \$800 million in bonds of the state to finance the Veterans' Land Program and the Veterans' Housing Assistance Program."

#### PROPOSITION NO. 8 ON THE BALLOT

Senate Joint Resolution 1 proposes a constitutional amendment that authorizes political subdivisions to exempt veterans' organizations from ad valorem taxation on their property. The amendment requires that the veterans' organizations be chartered by the United States Congress, be composed of members or former members of the United States Armed Forces, and be organized for patriotic and public service purposes. The amendment provides, further, that political subdivisions may exempt fraternal organizations from ad valorem taxation on their property. The amendment requires that the fraternal organizations be organized to perform and be primarily engaged in charitable or benevolent functions. The Legislature would be authorized to enact laws that prescribe eligibility requirements for fraternal organizations to benefit from the exemption and to pass legislation limiting the types or amount of property owned by a fraternal organization which may be exempted from ad valorem taxation.

The proposed constitutional amendment will appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment to authorize taxing units to exempt from taxation property of certain veterans' and fraternal organizations."

#### PROPOSITION NO. 9 ON THE BALLOT

House Joint Resolution 70 proposes a constitutional amendment to authorize the Legislature to provide, by local or general law, a method by which judges of statutory courts with probate jurisdiction may be assigned to any other statutory court with probate jurisdiction and to any constitutional county court in any county in the state.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment providing for assignment of judges of statutory probate courts to other statutory county courts with probate

jurisdiction and to county courts."

#### PROPOSITION NO. 10 ON THE BALLOT

Senate Joint Resolution 17 proposes a constitutional amendment that authorizes the Legislature to enact laws which would allow a city or town to expend public funds to relocate or replace sanitation sewer laterals on private property if done in conjunction with the replacement or relocation of sanitation sewer mains serving the property. The amendment requires that the law authorize the city or town to affix a lien on the private property, with the consent of the owner, to cover the costs of the replacement or relocation of the sewer laterals on the property. The lien may not be enforced until five years have expired since the date the lien was affixed. The amendment provides, further, that the law require that the costs of the replacement or relocation of the sewer laterals on the private property be assessed against the property with repayment to be amortized over a period not to exceed five years and at an interest rate provided by law.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment to permit a city or town to expend public funds and levy assessments for the relocation or replacement of sanitation sewer laterals on private property."

#### PROPOSITION NO. 11 ON THE BALLOT

Senate Joint Resolution 13 proposes a constitutional amendment that would change the Board of Pardons and Paroles from a constitutional agency to a statutory agency and would eliminate the Governor's power to revoke paroles. The Legislature would be authorized to establish the Board of Pardons and Paroles and to require it to maintain records of its actions. The amendment would empower the Legislature to enact parole laws. Constitutional language specifying the qualifications and terms of office for members of the Board of Pardons and Paroles is eliminated. The constitutional language governing the composition of the Board of Pardons and Paroles and the manner of filling vacancies on the Board is eliminated.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment to change the Board of Pardons and Paroles from a constitutional agency to a statutory agency and to give the board power to revoke paroles."

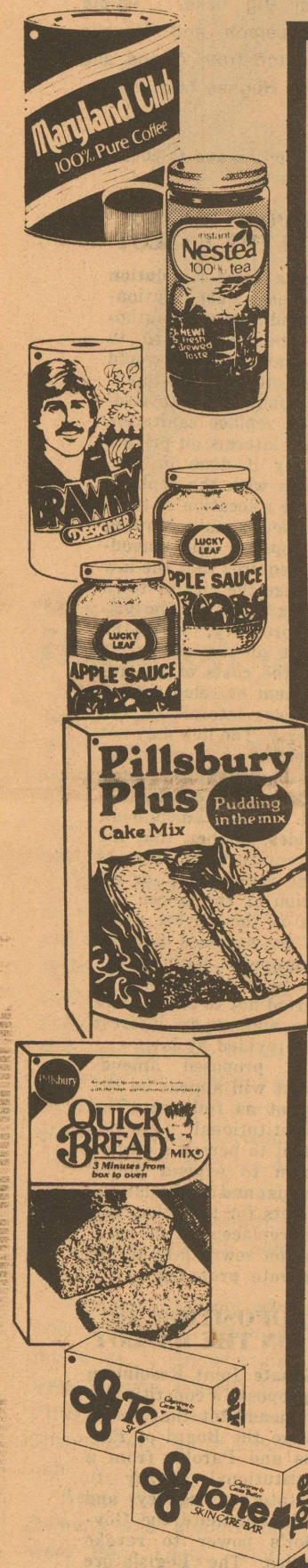


