

Class of '84 ends high school years

Forty-five seniors received their diplomas from Eldorado High School Friday night, May 25th in the high school auditorium.

Ms. Grace Grimes, Deputy Commissioner of the Professional Development Support of the Texas Education Agency, was the guest speaker. She was the first woman speaker ever to address a graduating class of Eldorado High School.

She admonished the graduates to

"keep promises that you make to yourself, to concentrate on helping others, to develop confidence in themselves, to find a lasting purpose and to take advantage of every opportunity available."

She stated that they would be both glad and sad that the time had come to graduate; glad for opportunities for the future and sad for some of the opportunities that might have been missed.

High School Principal Richard McCarson presented some awards to various seniors; Margaret Turner, Valedictorian, received the Bausch & Lomb Science Award, a \$400 T.S.T.A. Scholarship and the Hext Memorial Scholarship of \$600; Charlotte Mobley received the Cassie Gibson Memorial Award of \$100; Bill Clark received the Beta Sigma Phi \$300 scholarship and Romaine Gauna received the A & M Scholarship.

Schleicher County's Democratic Party will go to the polls again June 2nd to decide who they would like to have as commissioner in Precinct One. Incumbent Jack Turner is facing a formidable Johnny Mayo, Jr. for the county position. Mayo tallied 79 votes in the May 5th Primary followed closely by Turner with 59 votes.

In the U. S. Senate race, Kent Hance is facing Lloyd Doggett for the seat vacated by Senator John Tower. Hance is expected to carry rural East and West Texas and Doggett is predicted to carry urban counties in South and East Texas. Whoever wins the run off will face Republican Phil Gramm in November in the General Election.

Can't keep a good man down

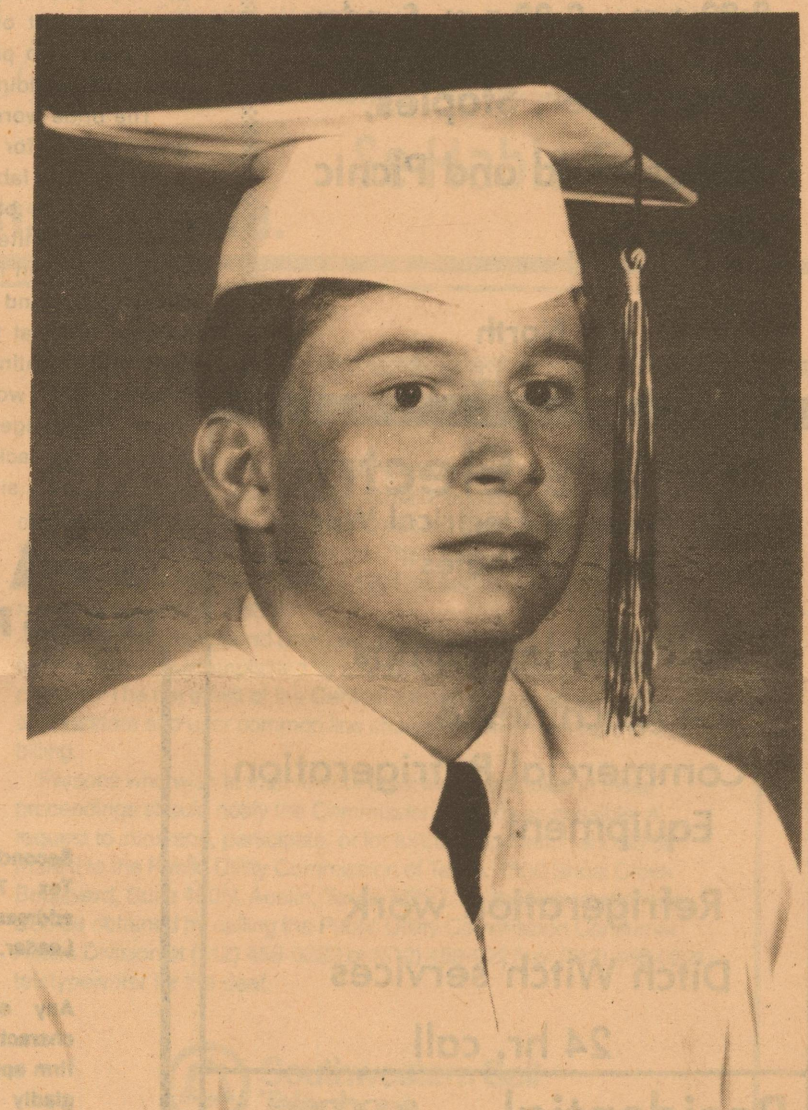
Randy Scott, son of Mr. and Mrs. George Scott, has been handicapped all of his life. He was born with a defective heart in San Angelo and when he was about three years old he had a stroke that left his right side paralyzed. The doctors could not determine if the heart condition caused the stroke but, they were determined to try to find out, so in December of 1967, he had open heart surgery in Houston which helped correct the heart condition. Although his improvement was slow he continued therapy to help strengthen his leg and arm.

At the age of four Randy moved to Eldorado with his parents. His father works at Atlantic Richfield.

While in the first grade a cast was put on Randy's leg to determine if a brace could be used. He was fitted with a brace on his leg and wore it almost three years. During the latter part of his third grade the brace was removed as he had outgrown it.

Randy was an active child and always wanted to do what everybody else did such as running and playing. His mother says that he never gave up and never complained.

Randy finished elementary school and went on to Junior High and while in Junior High he started helping as football manager and trainer, a job he held on through high school. He felt that he was a part of the team in that capacity. He decided that that was what



he wanted to do as an occupation, so in his senior year he started looking for a school where he could get that kind of training. He investigated Ranger Junior College and after several contacts he was awarded a full scholarship to study to be an Athletic

Trainer. Randy is a 1984 graduate of Eldorado High School and is a living example of what can be done with determination, will power and a desire to do well in spite of a physical handicap.

Turner and Clark recipients of Carr Scholarships

Two Eldorado students have been awarded Carr Academic Scholarships for 1984-85 at Angelo State University.

enrolled undergraduate and graduate students at Angelo State University for 1984-85.

The distinctive scholarship program was created by the late Mr. Carr in 1978 and will provide approximately \$1.5 million in academic scholarships during the 1984-85 school year to assist worthy and deserving students to pursue their education at Angelo

State University.

Mr. Carr bequeathed to the Board of Regents, Texas State University System, for the use of Angelo State, all his interest in oil, gas and other minerals with the provision that these properties be held in trust for the establishment of the Carr Academic Scholarship Program.
