Councilmen head for Austin Thursday

At the regular meeting Monday night City Council members discussed traveling to Austin to meet with the Department of Water Resources Thursday. The members who will go to Austin (undecided at presstime) will petition the board to give consideration to Eldorado concerning the new sewer treatment plant. Specifications order that a liner be installed for the pit at the site but engineers agree that due to the local abundance of caliche and clay the liner is not needed.

The Council also met with J.D. Tuck and Fred Wright of GTE. The representatives reviewed the construction on Cottonwood Street to the Pave Paws site with the Council. The Councilmen expressed their approval of the work done to date. The city fathers also expressed their satisfaction of the manner in which the GTE recently installed new phone cables on Gillis St. by not disrupting traffic, etc.

Richard Preston presented the plat for his subdivision located off the Old

Mertzon Hwy. The 5.33 acre tract inside the city limit at present does not have a name. The Council approved the plat.

Six gas meters that have been vandalized were discussed and the two youths responsible will have to pay \$75 each for repairs of the meters.

The south big well was discussed by the Council as it is not operating properly again. No action was taken.

Secretary Carolyn Mayo advised the Council of the Texas Municipal League's advice on annexation. She was advised to raise rates or service charges for those wishing city services but who were not inside the city limits. This rate increase is due to the fact that the number of people wishing to be annexed is increasing and the rate increase would help alleviate problems with gas shortages in the winter and water in the summer.

The members discussed the possibility of repairing city equipment and the need for some new equipment but no definite action was taken.

Mayo also reported to the Council concerning acquiring the services of Financial Collection Agency, a national service, to collect old delinquent accounts. She has checked with other facilities who had used the service and all were pleased with the service provided. No action was taken.

The matter concerning a nine year old controversy was officially closed by the Council. Frank Perkins approached the Council concerning reimbursement on some sewer lines for lots on North Street in 1975 but due to the fact that Perkins has never in the past nine years produced evidence for his cause the Council voted to close the matter.

Paving was discussed by the Council and the need to get city crews to work on repairs. The council hopes to have crews back on the repair work as soon as possible before the damaged spots get out of hand.

In other action the Council paid bills and approved the minutes from the previous meeting.

Precinct one still the only race in town ; Runoff set

A run-off between Johnny Mayo, Jr. and incumbent Jack Turner for the position of County Commissioner of Precinct #1 will be held June 2nd. Mayo tallied 79 votes for the county seat and Turner had 59 in the May 5th Democratic Primary. Phil McCormick also in the running for the seat received 24 votes. Mayo needed only seven more votes to eliminate the need for a run-off.

Plenty of good food and cold drinks will be available at the concession stand operated by the Beta Sigma Phi Sorority.

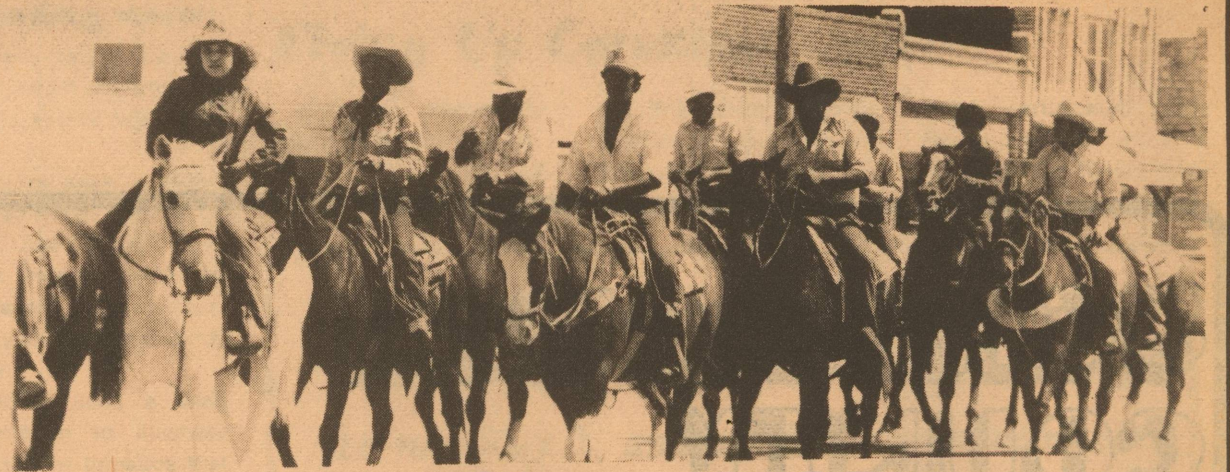
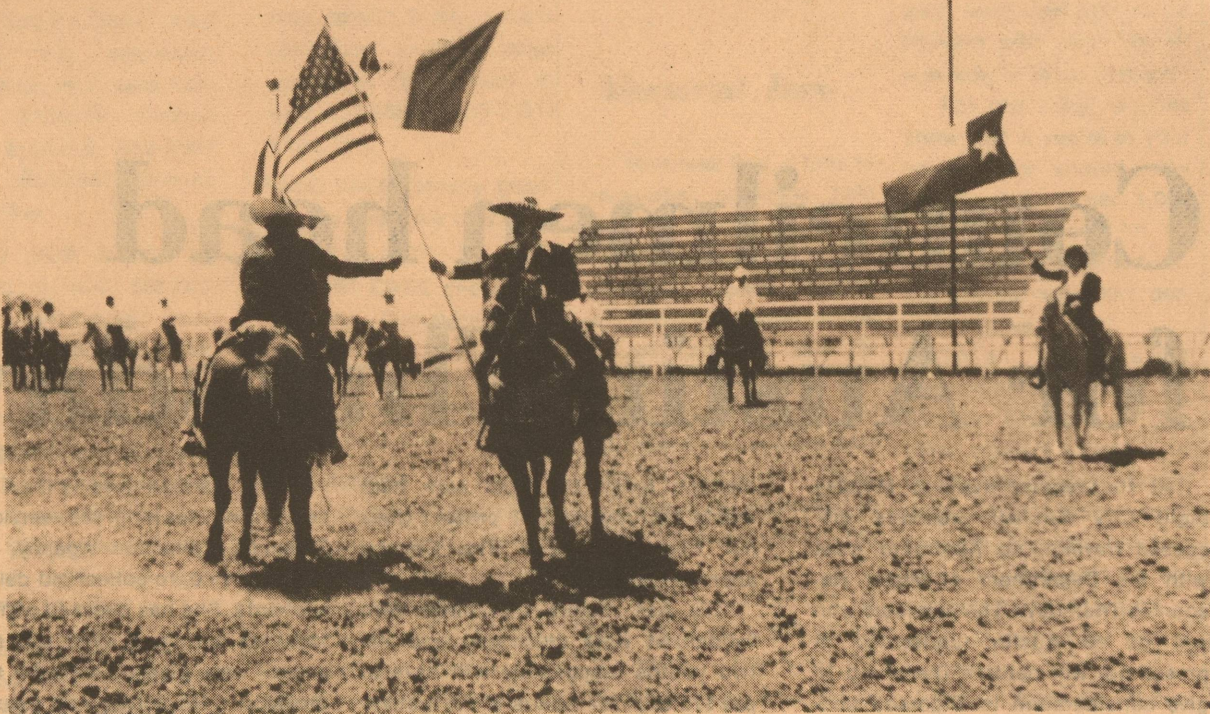

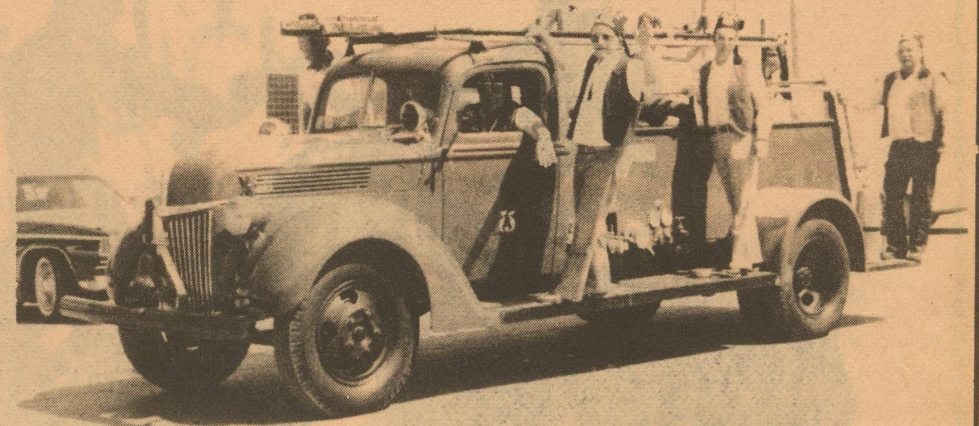
Cinco de Mayo, the fifth of May, is an important date in Mexican history. The date is sometimes mistakenly identified as Mexican Independence Day. However, it is the date, in 1862, when a contingent of the Mexican army turned back invading French forces in the Battle of Puebla.

The victory was particularly significant because the Mexicans were greatly outnumbered and poorly equipped, compared to their French foes.

The defeat caused the French to retreat and delayed their ultimate arrival in Mexico City for over a year.

The leader of the Mexican army, General Ignacio Zaragoza, was born near Goliad, when Texas was a part of Mexico.

Cinco de Mayo is a national holiday in Mexico, commemorating the victory at Puebla more than 100 years ago, which continues to be a focal point of national pride.

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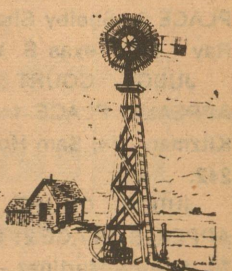
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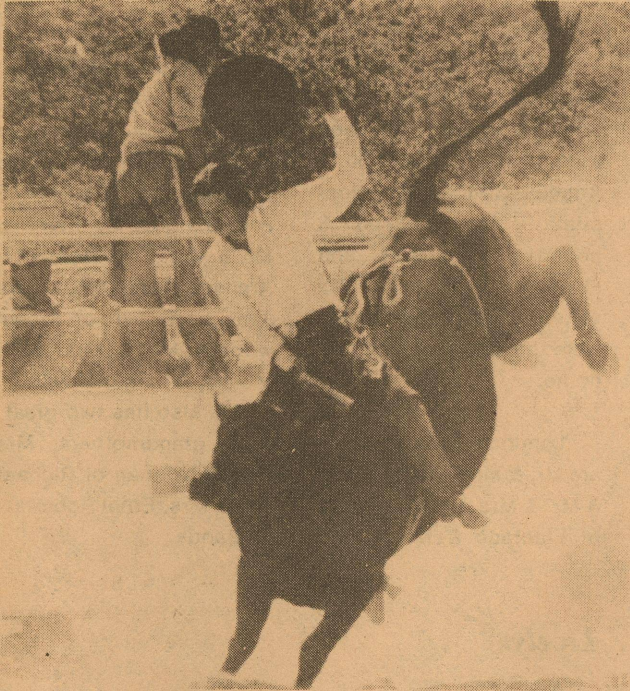
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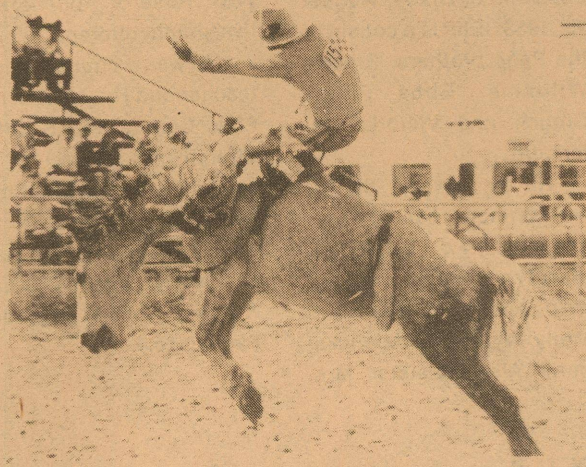
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Michael Phillips and Tony Diver exhibit their rodeo skills as the Eldorado High School Rodeo Team continues in it's quest for the regional rodeo title.

National Pet Week

May pet illnesses associated with summer months are preventable. During National Pet Week, May 6-12, remind residents to "summerize" pets with a visit to the veterinarian.

"During the summer, cats and dogs are outdoors more often and in frequent contact with other animals. Many illnesses such as canine distemper, can-

ine parvovirus, feline panleukopenia, and rabies are easily transmitted from one animal to another and can be fatal. Your veterinarian can vaccinate against these diseases so they don't strike your pet."

Periodic brushing and combing of a pet's coat can minimize the chances of fleas and ticks infesting the animal. Baths and aerosol

sprays can also help rid the animal and the environment of these stubborn pets.

Heartworm disease in dogs is a problem now prevalent in most states, and because it is spread from dog to dog by mosquitoes, dog owners must be concerned about prevention.

If undetected, large

accumulations of heartworms can impair circulation, causing serious damage to the dog's liver, lungs, kidneys, and heart. There are no early warning signs of heartworm disease. Difficulty in breathing, coughing, fatigue, listlessness, loss of weight, and fainting are signs often seen by owners when it may be too late for effective treatment.

Keep your cool

Butter & Cheese

Commodity Butter and Cheese will be distributed on Wednesday May 16th at the Memorial Building from 2 pm - 5 pm. New income guidelines have been set to determine eligibility for receiving this food. The income guidelines are as follows: Persons who receive foodstamps, AFDC, SSE, or Medicaid (non-institutional) are automatically eligible to receive donated

Green Thumbers attend training session

When the storm sirens blare and the radio warns that a "twister" is on the way, what can you do to improve your chances of surviving a Texas tornado?

For one thing, studies show that if you're in your house, you should stay there. Only 3 per 1,000 people in houses hit by tornadoes are killed--or, put another way, 99.7 percent survive.

This somewhat comforting statistic is especially welcome to the older workers enrolled in the Texas Farmers Union Green Thumb employment program, because most of them live and work in the northern half of the state so often assaulted by spring storms.

More than 50 Green Thumbers from 8 counties attended a training session at the Multi-Purpose Center in Eden, Texas on May 8, 1984, and learned how they could save their lives if a tornado should come their way.

"In the case of severe storms, there truly is no place like home," said Green Thumb Director Diane Parrish of Waco, "provided your home is a sturdy house."

Parrish used a slide presentation to illustrate the kinds of tornadoes that can develop and to describe the techniques most likely to enhance survival. Slides of twisters that hit Lubbock, Waco, Wichita Falls, San Angelo, Clarendon, and northeast Texas were used in the presentation.

According to Parrish, most tornado deaths result from head injuries caused by flying debris. People in mobile homes are at much greater risk, and in fact may be even more vulnerable than persons in cars.
