As you may have gathered by now, column writing is not one of my favorite tasks and I normally reserve the left hand portion of the front page for items and issues which have more bearing than my "at random" ramblings, but occasionally a topic does cross my mind that I feel is necessary to be expressed in this particular editorial manner. The purpose of this particular editorial is two-fold and neither are taken lightly by this writer.

Since last week's publication it has come to our attention that several people are unhappy with the coverage that we presented following the Schleicher County Day celebration. Granted, ours may not have been the best possible coverage and I am aware of the deficiencies in that particular issue, but what it boils right down to folks, is simply economics. For those of you who complained that there weren't enough pictures in that particular issue of the festive activities, may I say, the Leader staff took approximately 500 individual pictures of the goings on. We would have loved dearly to have presented every picture, every face and every activity within the confines of that particular issue but financially this was an impossibility. We utilized as many pictures as was economically feasible.

It might be beneficial if I explained the principle of newspaper facts of life. The size of the paper is not governed by the amount of news or photographs that is available at one given time, the amount of papers sold and the capital derived has little bearing on the overall financial success of a newspaper. The primary money maker in newspapers, and I might add television and radio, is the number of column inches provided weekly in display advertising. And this my dear reader, relates directly back to you, if you elect not to support your local merchants by patronizing their establishments, their need and desire to in turn support the local media, whatever quality of product it may present, is also jeopardized. In reality it is kind of like the old saying, "You get what you pay for."

Elsewhere on this particular front page the casual observer will find a very meaningful testimony to the truths of my statement. In a story about sales tax rebates presented to the city you will find that Eldorado is in a negative mode in correlation to last year's tax rebates and yet in the same story we find that our metro area to the north, San Angelo has improved its financial retail sales over last year. This direct indicator says that too many of the hard earned money earned in Schleicher County is being spent in Tom Greene County. True, the retail outlets don't have the quantity of products found in the stores in San Angelo, but after having visited with virtually every merchant in our little community I have been impressed with their sincere desire to serve their customers' needs. But how many times are they not even allowed an opportunity to fulfill your requests? Each and every merchant in this community is loyal to the maximum to their patrons and yet, their patrons show only a minute degree of loyalty in return. It's easy for all of us to ridicule and criticize what our community has to offer but how often do we stop and think what we are offering our community, how big of a part do we play in keeping our community on the proper track of progress.

County bosses table discussion on S.O. cut back

Monday morning found the Schleicher County Commissioners in session with all members present. One of the main purposes for the commissioners' meeting was to review and discuss the county's budget for the upcoming year. In preparation for the budget hearing the commissioners elected to increase the tax evaluation from 37c per \$100 to 38c per \$100 valuation which is a mere one cent increase over last year.

Another item that related to the upcoming budget proposal was the need for cost cuts in the sheriff's office budget for the upcoming calendar year. Eldorado City Councilman Edwin Jackson, Jr. appeared before the commissioners and informed them that the new city budget would not be approved until this coming Monday night and that a \$100 increase had been placed in the city's new budget for the purpose of increasing the city's portion of financial assistance from \$800 per month to \$900 per month to insure that the city has some degree of police protection. Jackson went on to state that since this budget had not been approved he could make no guarantees that the \$100 could be added to the financial assistance of the sheriff's office.

Following Jackson's appearance before the commissioners Sheriff Orval Edmiston met with the county bosses to discuss the matter further. The commissioner asked the sheriff if there was any way he could do without one of the deputies, he said yes, but at times there would be no one on duty at night. The commissioners went on to inform Sheriff Edmiston that they had received complaints about some of the deputies' actions. The commissioners elected to table any decision on the sheriff's department budget until next month.

Other business attended to by the county commissioners came in the form of approving private road work for Robert Bruton; to renew the accident insurance for the firefighters and to approve allowing the Eldorado Dance Club permission to use the Corral Room for dance classes to be supervised by Julie Moorman.

Other matters discussed by the commissioners was the possibility of

buying a new fire truck within the next two years; the need for Bill Wells to assist with the up keep of the arena for his high school buck-outs and the possibility of pumping out the swimming pool with a pump truck as opposed to using the pool's pump to discharge the water. No action was taken in any of these matters, pending further discussion.

Rebate check slightly better

The State Comptroller's office headed by Bob Bullock sent Texas cities \$103 million in city sales tax rebates. Of the 974 cities that received checks from the state office, Eldorado was the recipient of \$9,329.89, which shows something of an increase from last year's payment at this time which was \$8,896.99. To date this year Eldorado has received \$51,122.32 which reflects in a 25.9 percent decline in sales tax revenues from last year at this same time.

Sonora, our neighbor to the south, shows an even greater decline in retail sales in that it's percentage compared with last year's at the same time shows a decline of 37.40 percent. The county seat of Sutton County received a check for \$34,128.05 as opposed to its check at this time last year of \$51,271.91 for a grand total of monies received from Bullock to date at this time of \$163,563.27.

Menard's percentage was in arrears only by 4.26 percent and they received a check in this current mailing of \$5,884.60 for a grand total to date of \$27,825.96.

San Angelo, our neighbor to the north, received a payment this cycle

of \$674,622.32 surpasses last year's check at the same point in time of \$630,352.15 for a grand total of monies received from sales tax rebates this year of \$3,391,189.00 for a 3.53 percent increase over last year's rebate checks.

Hospital budget approved

The Schleicher County Medical Center Board of Trustees met in regular session last Monday evening.

After the meeting was called to order and minutes were read and approved the board turned their attention to the budget for 1984. The following is a break-down of the proposed budget:

Operating Budget - \$841,500.00

Non Operating Revenue: Taxes - \$420,000.00, Other - \$3,000.00

Operating Expense - \$1,065,170.00

Bond Payment & Interest - \$29,750

New Furn. and Equipment - \$10,000.00

Tax Appraisal District - \$10,550.00

Interest - \$9,930.00

Notes Payable-- \$135,000.00

The board set their tax rate at 18c per \$100 valuation.

Concerning the district and hospital's financial status the board authorized the borrowing of \$40,000 in operating expenses.

Monthly bills were then approved for payment.

The board then heard recommendations from architect Don Goss concerning floor covering for the hospital. The board agreed to replace the floor covering in the lobby area and if it proved satisfactory they would consider replacing other areas.

The board reviewed some of the responses they have received from physicians concerning a position at the Medical Center.

With no further business the board then adjourned.

Drought relief yet to come

As of Tuesday afternoon the application for declaration of Schleicher County in the designated drought district is in the hands of the United States Department of Agriculture stated a representative of Governor Mark White's office in Austin. The drought declaration, should Schleicher County qualify, will allow low rate interest loans from Farmers Home Administration plus the applicants in the county to take advantage of Section 504 (e) of the U.S. Tax Code. Twenty other counties were designated in the drought district last week of the twenty-nine submitted by the Federal Soil Conservation Service and Mark White's

office. All that is left now is the slow, bureaucratic process of red tape before Schleicher County is officially declared a drought disaster area.

Three indicted

Schleicher County Grand Jury was in session this past Monday to review five cases in which one was passed, one no billed. Three indictments were handed down from the Grand Jury and they are as follows: Gene Castro Rojas - DWI, Subsequent Offense; Rinaldo Cardona Robledo - DWI, Subsequent Offense and Gerald A. Fohn - Criminal Mischief, a felony offense.

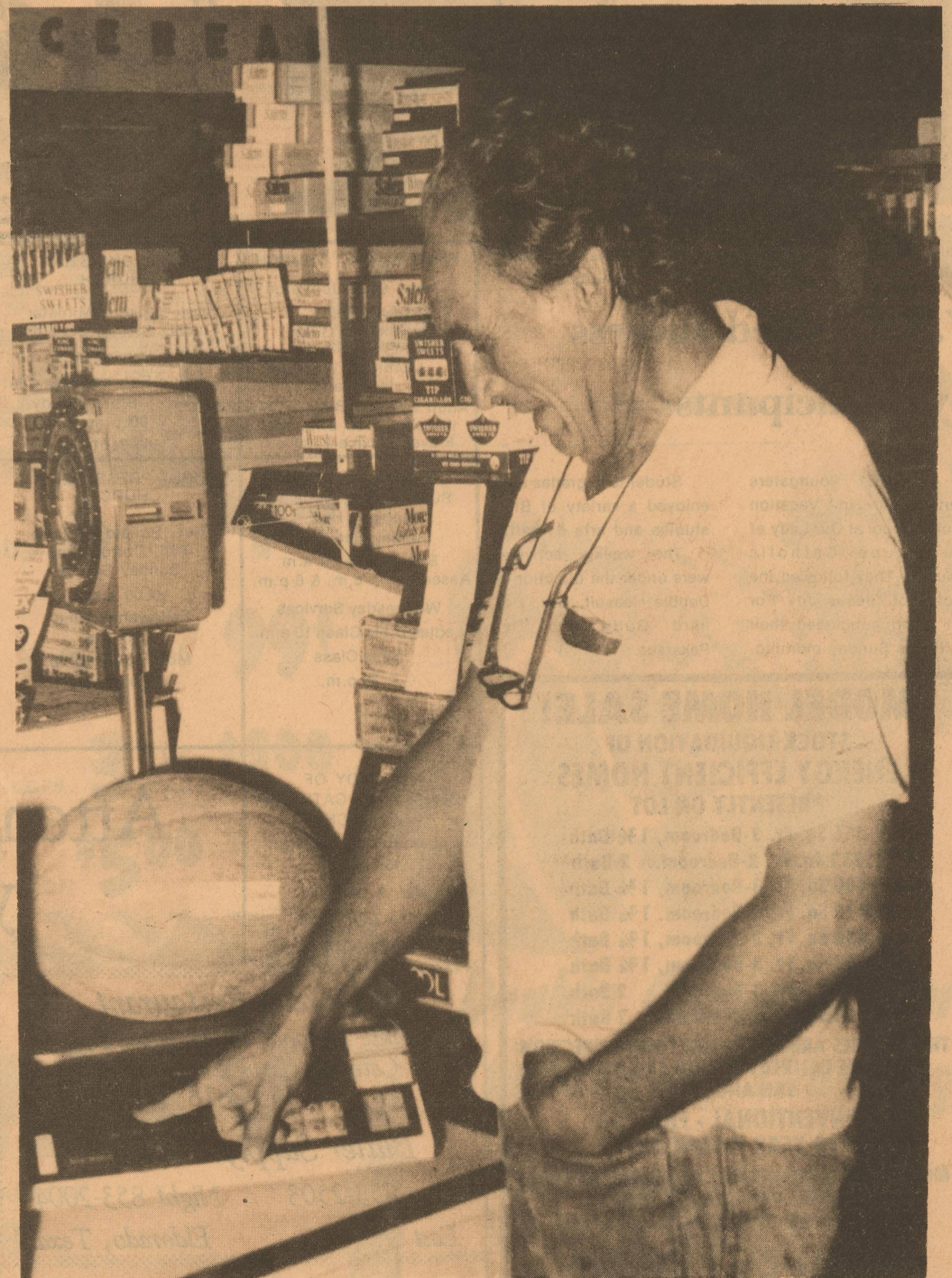
interested in being in the parade can contact Harold McEwen at 387-3861.

New retail outlet

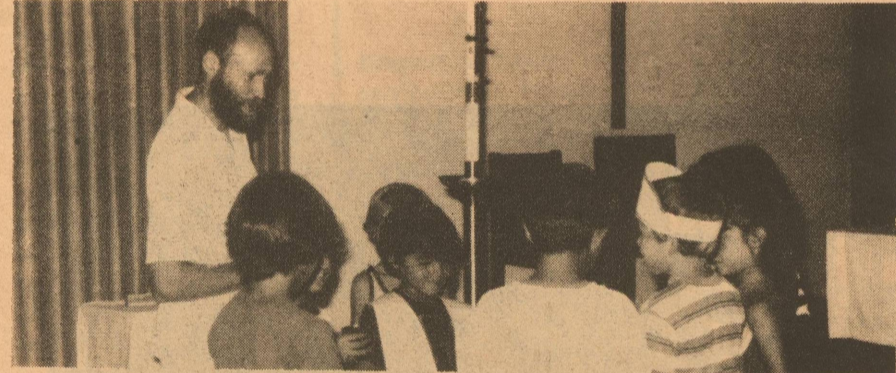
A new children's shop is open for business in Eldorado today, Aug. 22. Little Miss Bonnett is the name of the shop.

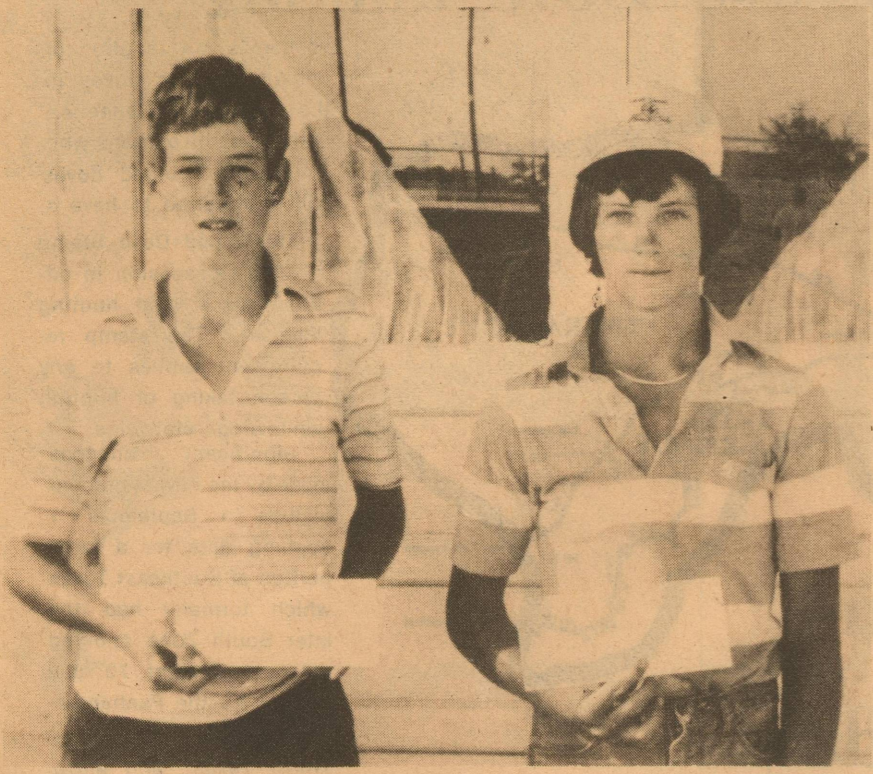

Brady scrimmage learning experience

The Eldorado Eagles traveled to Brady this past Friday the 19th of August to play the Brady Bulldogs. This was the Eagles' first scrimmage for the 1983 football season. A scrimmage game is that time when the coaches get a good look at the players who are making varsity for the first time.

It's that time when the quarterbacks throw too long and the next time too short, the running backs run up the wrong hole and the linemen forget to block, even the guy coming off the bench forgets what play is being called and where he should go. Scrimmages are for learning and it gives the players that time to make the mistakes that they would normally not make during the regular season, when every game counts. It's also that time when the coaches learn too.

The Eagles went back to the practice field Monday the 22nd to iron out their mistakes. Against Brady the Eagles were on defense first for Brady's 40 offensive plays. Brady scored four touchdowns. When the Eagles took over possession they were not able to score. The Eagles moved the ball pretty good, and if not for the penalties and the little mistakes that were made, the Eagles would have probably scored four touchdowns or more. After looking at the game film, the players and the coaches know what mistakes they made and will go over them this week in practice and will work on their weaknesses and strengthen their strong points. Coach Mitchel shuffled a lot of players in and out, so that he and the coaching staff could get a good look at the players and see what they would do when certain situations occur.

Asking Coach Mitchel about the scrimmage he felt that "the score itself showed no indication as to how the Eagles played, when you hear 4 to 0 you think that we were physically beat when we weren't,

three of the touchdowns came on long pass plays. The defense played reasonably well and we were not disappointed after watching the films the next morning."

The Bulldogs were able to squeeze in a touchdown on the ground against the Eagles, but it wasn't easy, the Eagles would bend but not break.

Coach Mitchel felt with the lack of experience in the secondary the Bulldogs were able to throw. When speaking of experience Mitchel said, "You have to look at Victor Gutierrez, playing safety for the first time as a varsity player. And moving from the front line to corner back, Jon Robledo had a taste of what it is like in that new position. In time these guys will learn and improve and with Luke Brame back, the secondary will be strengthened." Coach Mitchel has a lot of confidence in the younger guys that were brought up from JV like, again, Victor Gutierrez who plays safety, Ron Sauer who played good in spots and back-up center Wade Wallis is from last year's JV. James Flutsch is an offensive guard and two sophomores, Jay O'Harrow and Mike Belman, who will back up Ussery, will be called upon when needed. The Eagles have two quality quarterbacks in Mike Phillips, a senior and Tim McAngus, a junior. The Coach is pleased to have two good quarterbacks on the team, the hardest thing about that position is who he will go to, to lead the team and that decision has not been made yet. There are also two quality full backs and they happen to be brothers Mark and Bret Nikolauk. The Coach will probably go with Mark since he is the upper-classman. Taking nothing away from Bret, Mitchel feels that "They both can do the job."

Asked about any drawbacks from playing Brady, Mitchel felt that the Brady kids got after them more than the Eldorado kids got after Brady. And looking at the films and talking about the game

they know what corrections need to be made and hopefully "the kids know there is only one place to go and that is up" and that is where Coach Mitchel is looking to lead the Eagles. The coaches got a good look at every player in their positions and this week of workouts, the Eagles will work on every facet of the game.

The Eagle JV played Brady's JV right before the varsity game with Coach Singleton and Barton calling the signals, the Eagles walked away with a one touchdown lead, they beat Brady two touchdowns to one. Coach Singleton was real pleased with the team and felt everyone did a good job. From a coaching view point, "they did better than expected but will work this week at everything." Coach Singleton feels that they are still rusty in spots. The Eagles did a good all around job for their first

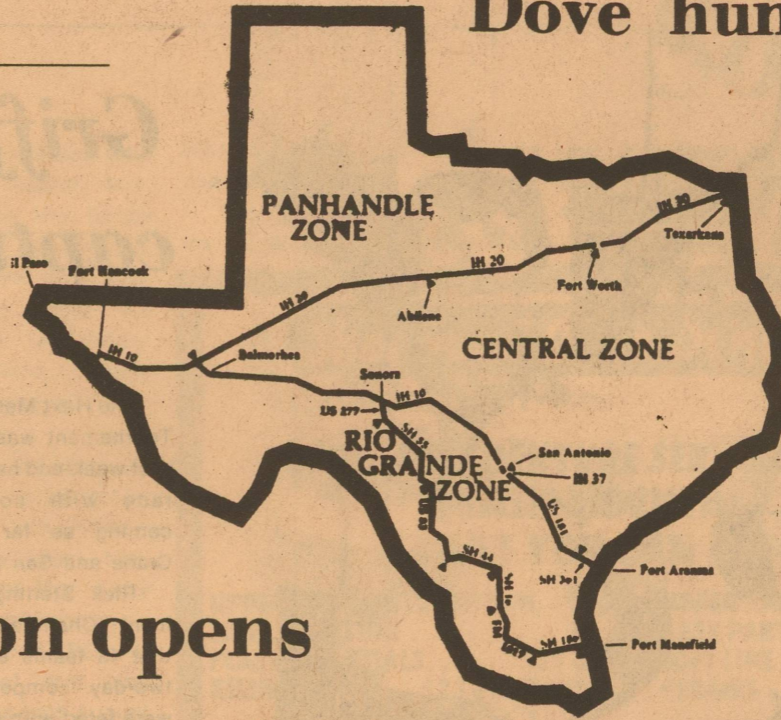

Dove hunting



license is not required of persons hunting doves in the county of residence. As in the past, all persons who hunt white winged doves will be required to have a white-winged Dove Stamp in their possession in addition to a valid hunting license. The stamp requirement applies to any person taking or hunting whitewings statewide.

Significant changes made by the new alignment include a September 1 opening date for a large portion of Southeast Texas which formerly had the later South Zone opening date; a straight 70 day season for the Panhandle, South Plains and much of North Texas; and allowance for two white-winged doves in the daily bag limit statewide.

Season opens next Thursday

The Texas Parks and Wildlife Commission has approved a new three-zone alignment for dove hunting for the upcoming seasons. Meeting recently in Austin, the commission establish-

ed the Panhandle, Central and Rio Grande Zones. The new alignment replaces the two zone system which had been in effect since 1946.

Ron George, dove program leader for the Parks and Wildlife Department, told commission members the three zone system was designed to provide optimum hunting opportunity for hunters when birds are available, within the context of proper management.

The statewide bag limit will be twelve doves, not to include more than two white-winged doves. Shooting hours will be one-half hour before sunrise to sunset. A hunting




