

Budget work begins at City

Citizens ask for paving.....

The Eldorado City Council met in regular session Tuesday evening July 12th at 7:30 p.m. Councilman Gus Willeke was not present for the meeting.

A group of concerned citizens approached the Council concerning paving on Honeysuckle Lane. The

group, comprised of: Clyde Thacker, Britt Poyner, Rick Sterling, Hyman Sauer and Sidney Reynolds. The gentlemen were inquiring as to when the alleys could be leveled and the street paved. The Council stated that Bill Radle would be contacted and that as soon as a crew was

available work on Honeysuckle Lane and others would commence.

Next to approach the Council was Jack Bebee, concerning the Appraisal District 1984 Budget. After a question and answer period, a motion was made by Edwin Jackson, Jr. that the matter be tabled. The motion was

seconded by Wayne McGinnes and the motion carried.

Chief Appraiser Ray Lewis Ballew with the Schleicher County Tax Appraisal District asked the Council to consider the possibility of joining the School in obtaining an attorney to attempt collection or eventual sale of properties to pay delinquent taxes. Motion was made by Bobbie Sanders that the City Secretary complete a listing of delinquent taxpayers for the Council's review at the next meeting. The motion was seconded by Ronnie Sauer and the motion carried.

The Council then approved the minutes of the June 7 and June 21 meetings.

City Secretary Carolyn Mayo then reviewed the First National Bank of Eldorado's proposal to finance the lease/purchase of the trash system at a rate of 10.5 percent over a five year period. A resolution prepared for the City to authorize the execution of lease purchase papers was read by the City Secretary with a motion made by Ronnie Sauer that the resolution be passed for the City to borrow the money from FNB at 10.5 percent. A

move to second the motion was made by Wayne McGinnes, the motion carried. A motion was made by Bobbie Sanders that the \$10,000 down payment be made from Revenue Sharing Funds. The motion was seconded by Ronnie Sauer and the motion carried.

The June bills were reviewed by the Council with a motion made by Ronnie Sauer that the bills be paid as presented. The motion was seconded by Wayne McGinnes and the motion carried.

An Affirmative Action Plan (requirement of C.D.B.G. program) was reviewed by the City Secretary and after a brief discussion, a motion was made by Wayne McGinnes that the plan be adopted pending H.U.D. approval. The motion was seconded by Edwin Jackson, Jr. and the motion carried.

The Council heard a request for \$400 in expenses for Fire Marshall Bill Radle to attend A & M Fire Training School. The price includes registration fee, room, meals and car expense. A motion was made by Ronnie Sauer that the money be

appropriated with a second made by Edwin Jackson, Jr., the motion carried.

The Council then discussed the proposed budgets for Trash and General Funds for 1983-84. The City Secretary reviewed her recommendations based on the past 10 month period and any anticipated increases or decreases. No major changes were noted with the exception of longevity pay in all departments. A motion was made by Edwin Jackson, Jr. that the longevity pay (currently \$50/yr. longevity) be limited to a 10-year amount (\$500). The motion was seconded by Bobbie Sanders, and the motion carried. The Council will review the Utility Fund budget in the next meeting with passage of the budgets for all departments scheduled prior to September 1.

With no further business to discuss, the Council adjourned.

Craft fair planned

The Woman's Club of Eldorado is sponsoring an Arts & Crafts Fair in conjunction with the Third Annual Schleicher County Days Celebration to be held in the Memorial Building on the Courthouse Square in Eldorado, Texas, August 13, 1983.

It is anticipated that a wider variety of arts and crafts will be on display and for sale. In addition, several local businesses and organizations will have food and game booths on the lawn. The Woman's Club is trying to reserve the Memorial Building for just arts and crafts but arrangements can be made for artists wishing to locate outside.

Booth spaces will be assigned immediately upon receipt of completed registration form and registration fee. As there will be few tables and chairs available artists are urged to bring their own display stands and a table if possible. Electrical outlets will be available to those wishing to use them.

Booths may be set up beginning at 7:30 a.m. Saturday morning, August 13, but no booth will be allowed to open until 9:00 a.m. All booths must close by 5:00 p.m. so the area can be vacated by 6:00 p.m. for Saturday night's events.

Tax money continues decline

State Comptroller Bob Bullock sent checks totaling \$35.1 million to 974 cities that levy the one-percent city sales tax, this past week.

Eldorado's share of the monies was \$3491.63 which was down from last year's amount of \$3944.62. This payment brings Schleicher County's total payments to date to \$41,792.25. Last year's total for this period was \$59,344.20 which is a 29.58 percent decrease.

Sonora received a check for \$5,216.38 which is really down considerably from last year's payment for this period of \$13,363.18. Sonora's total for sales tax revenue is down 38.37 percent from last year's total at this time which was \$210,024.53 compared to 1983's \$129,435.22.

"Our total payments to cities so far this year are still running about one

percent behind last year," Bullock said in sending the July checks to the cities. "Texas was slow to enter the national recession and we are still lagging behind in the recovery. Most major Texas cities are beginning to show higher tax receipts than last year, but the border and oil and gas producing areas are still substantially behind."

Bullock also sent checks to the state's two Metropolitan Transit Authorities. Houston's MTA received \$7.8 million, down from last July's payment of \$9.4 million. San Antonio received \$1.1 million, bringing the yearly total to \$12.4 million, up 10 percent over 1982.

The City and MTA sales taxes are collected along with the state sales tax by merchants and rebated monthly to the cities in which they are collected by the Comptroller.

The July checks were for taxes collected on sales made in May and reported to the Comptroller by the end of June.

Mitchel also told the Leader that the coaching staff will be attending Coaches' School in Ft. Worth on August 23-28.

All voters are urged to vote on this most important election.

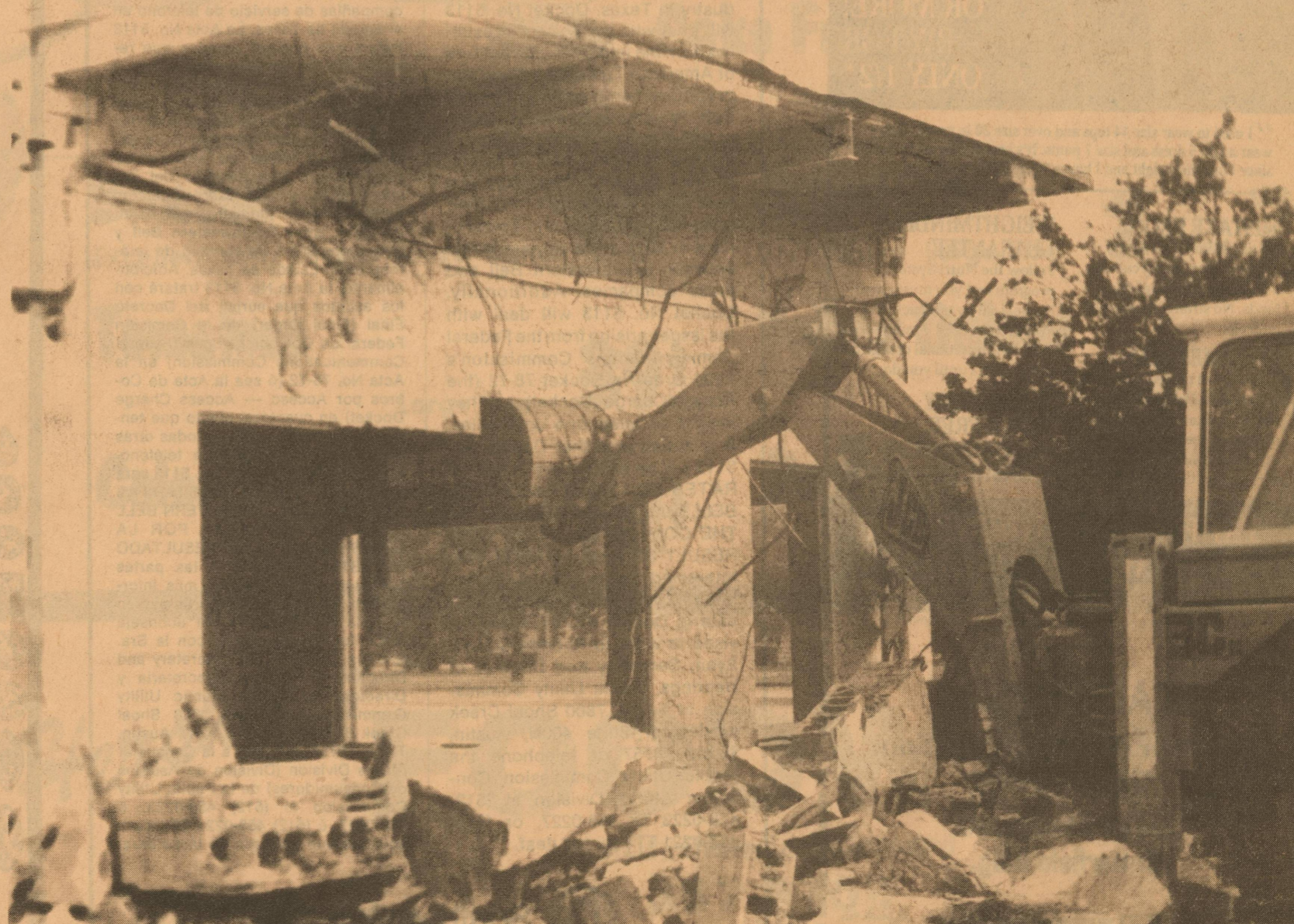


Patton competes in the Hershey

Open letter to Eldorado

Contrary to some Eldorado Citizens' opinion, the adoption of a City Manager type government is not a "cure all" for our community. No one person can streamline Eldorado. All the information published thus far in this newspaper has been unbiased, and Mr. Bratcher is to be commended on his search for information. However, none of his material relates specifically with Eldorado and its problems.

The persons responsible for the initial drafting of the petition were obviously not aware of the pros and cons of City Manager government themselves - as the petition asked for the pros and cons to be considered and did not list any specific problems needing attention that could be resolved by the hiring of a City Manager. How can problems be approached without knowing the problems?

According to law, a petition by 10 percent of the number of voters voting in the last mayoral election calls for the election and related expenditures to be made. Several people who signed the petition readily admit that they did not know what the petition involved and that their simple execution of it could mandate and election to be called. They thought that signing the petition would only ask the Council to air any problems. The Council could then have made a study and adjusted the problem areas by adjustment of duties or responsibilities. The election expense seems a waste of taxpayer's money.

If the matter should pass the public's approval on August 13 through the election, the City Council must outline clear-cut job duties, interview and hire a City Manager within 60 days. To fail to do so would constitute a failure of the Council to carry out the public's desires.

How will a City Manager affect Eldorado? First of all, let's talk money. This could and probably would be an additional salary in the range of \$28,000 plus. Experienced and trained City Administrators do not come cheaply. In order to obtain and hold a good City Manager, a community must offer a comparable salary with appropriate benefits. This \$28,000 plus figure is approximately 50 percent of the net 1982 tax levy (\$56,800). Future taxes are already destined to increase to pay back a portion of the sewer bond money issued for the new sewer treatment plant. To pay out an additional \$28,000 could raise taxes another 50 percent just to pay this salary. The General Fund, which would be the source for a City Manager salary, draws revenues from taxes, sales tax, and various licenses, permits, and gross receipt taxes. Meanwhile, the General Fund is expended on street paving and patching materials, salaries and related expenses; tax appraisal district expenses; fire department expenses; county deputy (nightwatch) services; office and building expenses; general liability insurance; office personnel; and other related general city expenses. This fund is currently operating in the black; however, this margin is tight due to a 30 percent drop in sales tax and other revenues.

It has been suggested that the hiring of a City Manager will pay their related expenses by saving the small volume of purchases and the small surplus funds available for investment prohibit relying on this source of revenue. Also, it has been suggested that this person could make applications for government grants. The City recently spent a mere \$2000 of revenue Sharing Funds to make application for a C.D.B.G. grant through the 1982 program. Through the expertise of the engineering firm, their available broad resources of information and experience, and local City personnel input, the firm was able to procure a \$430,000 grant. We were only one city among many competing for only a few available grants, and we were barely funded. Perhaps the engineering firm has the "edge" of expertise needed. It seems some things are better left in the hands of the experts in this field.

A City Manager is primarily an administrator. All policy making, budgeting, and tax levies must remain with the City Council. The City Manager would follow policies already established and being currently followed and use good judgement to collect all revenues proposed by the Council. Any decisions made by the City Manager would be firm and not directly reversible by the Council.

An area that would offer assistance to the staff and City Council would be along the line of technical assistance. A City Manager is not technical personnel. Such technical assistance can be obtained as required from specialized firms, i.e. planners, engineers. A steady flow of technical help is not needed in Eldorado at this time, so a full-time planner, etc. is not required.

The primary need for a City Manager might be to relieve the City Council of day-to-day problems. The current City Council is not overburdened with

day-to-day problems. Any unusual problems should be and are now referred to the Council unless they become too numerous to handle satisfactorily by the Council. To transfer all problems and decision-making would eliminate any one-on-one contact between the Council and the people who elected them. It is true that the City Council meetings are rather lengthy, but these once or twice per month meetings could be shortened by the use of Robert's Rules of Order by not only Councilmen but visitors to the meeting, not delegation of authority and responsibility.

Many current ordinances and policies allow for enforcement through a fine levied. This fine can only be levied and collected through a Municipal Court. A Municipal Court has been established by the Council with Mayor Lester presiding as Municipal Judge as outlined by State Law. A City Manager cannot replace a Municipal Court or sit as Judge to enforce these ordinances.

Through the foresight of the Council and staff recommendations, the current city staff is handling rather well the 50 percent additional growth experienced by Eldorado during the past 4-5 years. No one anticipated this growth 10-15 years ago and definitely not 20-30 years ago. Meanwhile, the number of regular City employees has remained almost the same. During the past 5 years approximately 15 miles of gas lines have been replaced to R.R.C. specifications; a new sewer treatment plant is being designed and built; work is beginning on extension of sewer lines into Christian Addition via a C.F.B.G. grant; water, gas and sewer lines are being extended into new subdivisions and other areas not previously served. Meanwhile, the everyday maintenance of City services (trash pickup, water, sewer and gas) continues according to R.R.C. and Health Department regulations. Paperwork wise, ordinances are being catalogued, records are being updated manually and via computer, all reports, billings, payments, and collections are being made in a timely manner. There is not a backlog of workorders.

Hiring a City Manager would not eliminate any specific City employees and his/her job duties are vague at this point because the City Council must outline those duties specifically. A City Manager does not automatically come with outlined duties or qualifications. The current office and outside employees make a genuine effort to treat everyone in a non-discriminatory manner, realizing that it is impossible to please everyone. The current staff follows written or verbal policies and instructions from the City Council. If anyone is not satisfied with the service received, they are welcome to meet with the

City Council at regular or special meetings.

It is my opinion that the issue of a City Manager should be defeated. Eldorado does not need a City Manager at this time. The cons far outweigh the pros in a community this size. Many cities much larger than Eldorado are providing exceptional services without a figurehead called a "City Manager".

It is true that what I have written here is a biased opinion based upon the facts as I know them. I have worked for the City of Eldorado for approximately 4 1/2 years and feel that I know where we need improvement. I feel that the petition originators did not do their homework, and did not spend time with the City employees so as to determine what the City of Eldorado needs. They don't know if we are doing our jobs or even if we are doing a good job. Perhaps their ultimate goal is to replace me...the hiring of a City Manager would affect my position with the City directly.

I personally feel that the City Manager form of government is not in the best interest of Eldorado at this time. Should we continue to grow in the next few years, a City Manager might be justified. The City Council has made sound decisions using foresight to update City services while trying to keep costs down. The present system is not the best perhaps, but it is working.

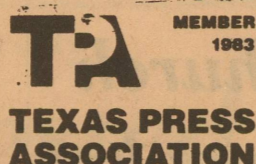

In getting college courses taught locally

Interest requested

A committee of Sonora citizens interested in education including representatives from governing bodies in Sutton County met last week to coordinate plans for getting extension courses from a State University taught in Sonora. These courses would benefit the Sonora, Ozona, and Eldorado areas.

Senator Bill Sims has been kept apprised of the situation by the committee and has expressed interest in the improvement of educational facilities for the three-county area and has offered the assistance of his office.

The purpose of these extension courses is twofold. (1.) to expand and further the education of teachers in the three school districts and (2.) to make college level courses available to citizens who, for whatever reason, would not be able to participate in "on campus" college courses.

Persons attending the meeting last week were Jimmy Condra, president of the Sonora Independent School District; Sutton County Judge Charles Sherrill; SISD Superintendent Wendell McAndrew; Smith Neal, junior high principal; Gus Allen publisher of the Devil's River News; and Carol Jones, assistant publisher of the D.R.N.

Angelo State University declined to offer the courses here. Texas Tech University in Lubbock and Sul Ross University in Alpine have been contacted concerning their interest in offering the courses.

Most extension classes meet one evening a week for 18 weeks and are offered for less than \$100 per course, books included. The exact cost will be available until the universities furnish this information.

The questionnaire published in this issue of the Devil's River News should be filled out by any persons interested in taking courses. If a course is not listed that of interest to someone, please print the name of the course in the space indicated.

The questionnaire may be taken by the school administration office or the Devil's River News office, or may be mailed to either at the addresses listed within two weeks. The forms will then be polled to determine what courses are in the greatest demand and the university will be advised.

It is the hope of the committee to have graduate courses offered with choices of general or educational. Undergraduate courses choices listed on the form include freshman and sophomore level English; freshman and sophomore level Spanish; college math; computer science; and business type courses.

The undergraduate courses would benefit working people who might desire a college degree later.

All citizens interested in participating in extension classes are encouraged to complete the forms and mail them immediately.

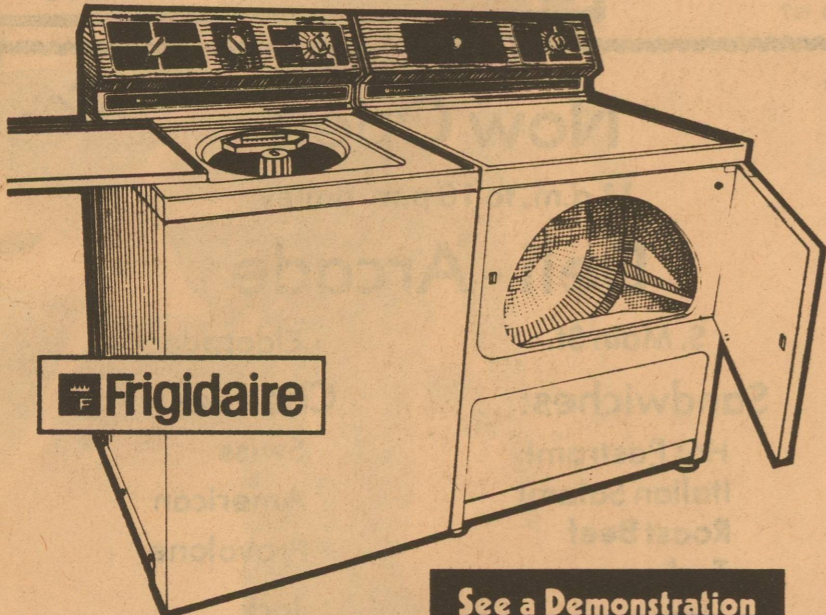

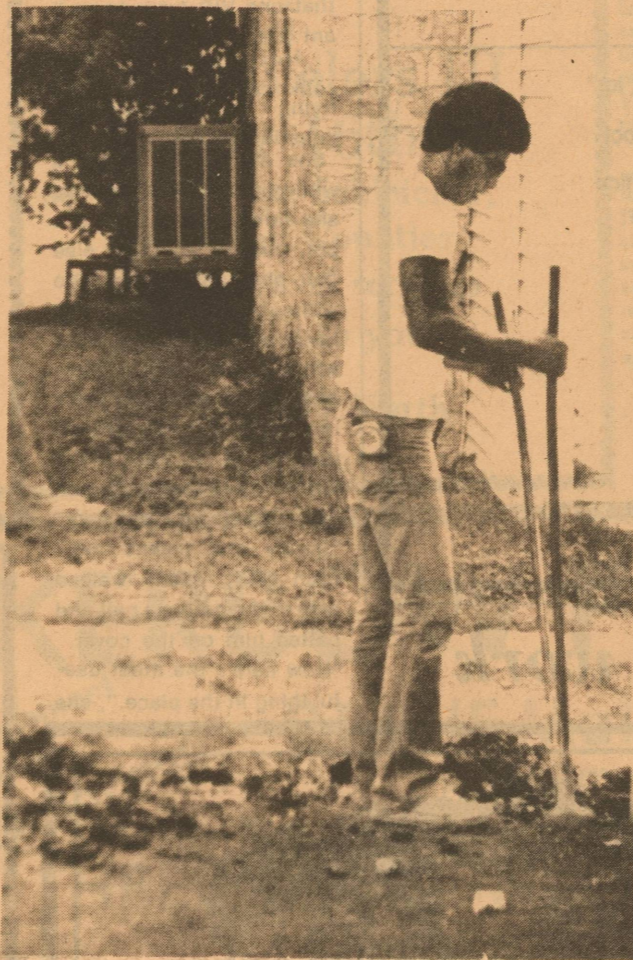

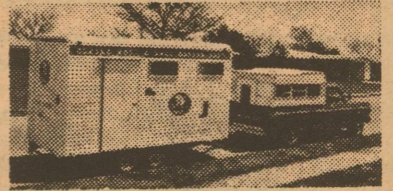

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Public Notice

Southwestern Bell, in accordance with the rules of the Public Utility Commission of Texas, hereby gives notice of the company's intent to implement a new schedule of telephone rates in Texas, effective August 1, 1983, unless otherwise determined by the Commission.

A complete copy of the new rate schedule is on file with the Texas Public Utility Commission (PUC) at Austin, Texas, and with each affected municipality served by Southwestern Bell, and is available for inspection in each of the company's public business offices in Texas. The Commission staff has contended in the past that all rates are subject to change as a result of Southwestern Bell's rate application.

As a result of the settlement of a lawsuit brought by the U.S. Department of Justice against AT&T, Southwestern Bell, on January 1, 1984, (or as otherwise ordered by the United States District Court) will no longer be a part of the Bell System, but will be owned by public shareholders. Under the terms of the settlement, Southwestern Bell has identified 15 areas in the state within which it may provide service, and the federal court with jurisdiction of the settlement has tentatively approved these areas, called LATAs (Local Access and Transport Area). On or about January 1, 1984, Southwestern Bell can not provide service between these LATAs, and in addition, must transfer to AT&T customer premises equipment that it leases to customers.

Southwestern Bell has filed a proposed revised rate schedule with the PUC reflecting these changes. These rates would become effective August 1, 1983, if they are not suspended by the PUC; however, it is expected that they will be suspended and that the rates ultimately set by the PUC will become effective on or about January 1, 1984. If the rates were to become effective as filed, they would produce a 48.2% increase in Southwestern Bell's unadjusted test year revenues (or a 76.36% increase in Southwestern Bell's test year revenues adjusted to reflect the effect of Southwestern Bell's divestiture from AT&T). Any change in the rates for any interLATA services offered by AT&T or a subsidiary after January 1, 1984, could affect customers of Southwestern Bell Telephone Company.

Notice to Customers of Other Telephone Companies

While Southwestern Bell has proposed no increase in rates for intraLATA interexchange toll services, any change in those rates could also affect customers of other telephone companies. Southwestern Bell is proposing changes in the structure of the present private line and foreign exchange services. Changes in these rates may affect customers of other telephone companies. Any change in the rates for any interLATA services offered by AT&T or a subsidiary after January 1, 1984, could affect customers of other telephone companies.

Como resultado del arreglo judicial al cual se llegó tras el proceso legal entablado en contra de AT&T por el U.S. Department of Justice (Departamento de Justicia), Southwestern Bell dejará de formar parte del Bell System (Sistema Bell) a partir del 1o de enero de 1984 (ó en la fecha que disponga el United States District Court — Tribunal Federal de Distrito), y llegará a ser posesión de accionistas públicos. Bajo las condiciones de dicho arreglo, Southwestern Bell ha identificado 15 regiones dentro del Estado de Texas en las cuales puede proporcionar servicio, y el tribunal federal con jurisdicción en el arreglo ha dado su aprobación provisoria a éstas regiones, que se denominan "LATAs" (Local Access and Transport Area, ó Regiones Locales de Acceso y Transporte). A partir de fecha 1o de enero de 1984 aproximadamente, Southwestern Bell no podrá proporcionar servicio entre dichas LATAs, y además deberá ceder a AT&T todo equipo ubicado en premisas de clientes y alquilado a los mismos.

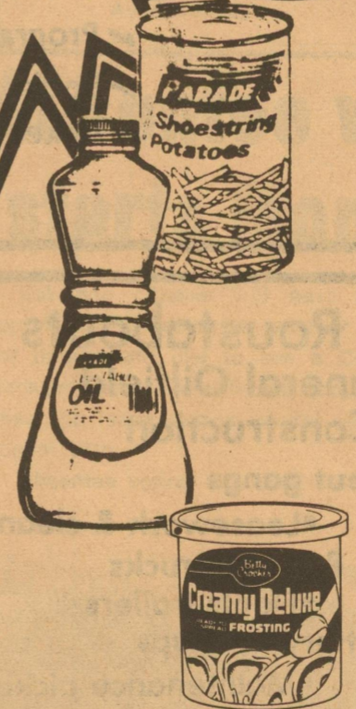

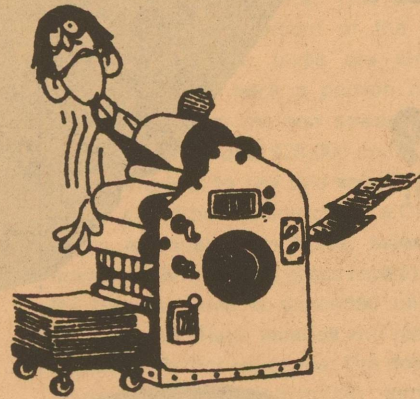

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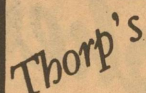
