Five local offices will be up for grabs during the upcoming democratic primary which has been set for May the 5th. The terms which have expired belong to Schleicher County Commissioners Jack Turner, in precinct one, Prissy Paxton, in precinct three, the County's Attorney's position now held by T.P. Robinson, the County Tax Collector occupied by Dorothy Evans, and the Schleicher County Sheriff's job now held by Orval Edmiston.

As of presstime only two of these officials have registered to re-seek election. They are Dorothy Evans and Orval Edmiston.

Town meeting called

Concerned Eldorado citizens are again, urged to attend a Town Meeting to be held Sunday, January 8th. The Meeting will be held at the Ag Barn at 8 pm.

The purpose for the meeting is to organize interested adults on the ever increasing problem of drug and alcohol abuse among school age children. There is a "Get Tough" attitude growing throughout communities all over the country that is bringing concerned citizens together to fight a common problem. The public is urged to attend this Town Meeting.

Driver License classification changes

Beginning January 1, 1984, those persons who renew their driver license, qualify for their first license, or apply for a duplicate permit will receive licenses bearing new codes signifying class of license.

Colonel Jim Adams, director of the Texas Department of Public Safety, said the department is starting the conversion to a new classified driver licensing system in accordance with a law passed this year by the Texas Legislature.

"Licenses issued prior to 1984 will be valid until the expiration dates which appear on them," Adams said. "The new licenses will carry classifications designating the type and weight of vehicles which the holder may operate."

The new license classifications are "A", "B", "C" and "M".

The Class "C" license permits operation of single, two-axle vehicles with a gross weight of 24,000 pounds or less excluding motorcycles and mopeds. This designation also allows the towing of a vehicle not exceeding 20,000 pounds GVW. In addition, the Class "C" designation permits the operation of a bus with a maximum seating capacity of 23 passengers not including the driver. Standard operator licenses issued under the old law will be converted automatically to Class "C" permits upon renewal or issuance of a duplicate license.

The Class "B" license allows the holder to drive all Class "C" vehicles plus single vehicles with a GVW exceeding 24,000 pounds and buses with a capacity of 24 or more passengers. Motorcycles and mopeds are excluded.

Class "A" permits allow operation of any vehicle or combination of vehicles including those listed for classes "B" and "C". Mopeds and motorcycles are excluded. Commercial and full chauffeur licenses issued under the old statute will be converted automatically to Class "A" permits upon renewal or issuance of a duplicate license.

The Class "M" designation allows the holder to operate motorcycles, motor-driven cycles and mopeds.

The road test must be taken with a vehicle which meets the specific requirements of the license class for which the person is applying.

"All classes of licenses including renewals will be valid for four years."

The three day event will see a variety of activities sure to appeal to everyone. The program of events for the show is as follows:

Friday, Jan. 13: 8:00-9:00 a.m. - Women's Division. Entries Accepted. 9:00-12:00 a.m. - Judging Women's Entries in Divisions. 9:00 a.m. - Weighing Lambs. 10:00 a.m. - Weighing Hogs. 11:00 a.m. - Weighing Steers. 3:00 p.m. - Dog Show. 4:00 p.m. - Judging of Market Lambs. 6:00 p.m. - Judging of Angora Goats. 6:30 p.m. - Judging of Breeding Sheep and Range Ewes (in wood). 7:00 p.m. - Swine Show.

Saturday, Jan. 14: 9:00 a.m. - Judging Shorn Lambs. 9:30 a.m. - All Food Show Entries in. 10:00 a.m. - Judging of Food Show Entries. 11:00 a.m. - Judging Range Ewes - Shorn. 12:00 Noon - Bar-B-Q Lunch. 1:00 p.m. - Judging of Wood Fleeces. 1:00 p.m. - Judging Breeding Cattle. 2:00 p.m. - Judging Steers. 3:30 p.m. - Champion and Reserve Champion Steers. 3:45 p.m. - Judging of Rabbits.

Presentation of awards: 4:00 p.m. - Livestock Premium Sale. 5:00 p.m. - Food Premium Sale. 6:00 p.m. - Chinese Auction. 9:00 p.m. - Dance.

The General Rules for the Show are:

G-1. All Exhibitors must be members of the Schleicher Co 4-H Club, FFA, or FHA. They must be carrying their exhibits as a project since Oct. 22 of the current year. Swine-Dec 1 Exceptions for Food Show.

G-2. Exhibitors will be permitted to sell one Premium Animal and/or Food dish in the Co. Livestock and Food Premium Sale. Sale animal must have been exhibited to sell at premium prices.

G-3. Maximum entries are open to the number per feeder, but only 2 animals per Class will receive prize money.

G-4. Showmanship - selected by Judges during the whole Show.

G-5. Entry card verified by Supervisor must be turned in before Weigh-in.

G-6. The Show Committee reserves the right to interpret these Rules, and to amend or add to the Rules, and to determine all matters connected with the Show.

G-7. Exhibitor must be present to sell or no Premium will be paid, or arrangement made with supervisor.

G-8. All Livestock in place by 6:00 p.m. Thursday, January 12.

G-9. 1st to 10th place in all Classes will receive ribbons. All animals participating will receive ribbons.

G-10. An individual can only sell one Champion, but can show for and

win as many ribbons, and trophies as possible.

G-11. If an individual wins more than one Champion, the other first place animal will sell as that Champion and the 1st place animal receives the Champion selling price. No animal will be delivered.

G-12. Must have 3 exhibitors in a Class before Prize Money will be paid.

G-13. Must determine individual ownership of every animal before weigh-in. No Exceptions. Weigh-in for All lambs and the participants need to indicate the number of lambs by cut-off day. Verification on all

livestock, shorn or market lambs, hogs, cattle.

G-14. Weighing Time - 9:00 a.m. Friday, Jan. 13. Release time on animals - Start of Sale (flexible with the weather). No animal leaves before this time.

G-15. Clean-Up after Show Clean-Up required of all exhibitors or parent, or check will be docked \$5.00.

G-16. "Any Division" must have 3 exhibitors to constitute a Class and have prize money paid. To have Champion - must be minimum of 15 entries. Reserve Champion must have at least 25 entries.

Food Division

County Home Extension Agent, Nancy Lester urges all 4-H, FHA and FFA members to enter the annual food show held in conjunction with the livestock show. Entry divisions for this year are Yeast Breads, Cakes, Pies, Candy and Cookies. There are 3 age divisions for the show:

Seniors: 14-19, Juniors: 9-13, Subjuniors: under 9 (you must be at least in Kindergarten to enter)

Entry forms for the show can be picked up at the county extension office. They need to be returned by Thursday Jan. 12. All foods need to be attractively displayed. Each member will be able to sell one food entry in the show sale. A "Best of Show" award will be given in each age division. Mixes may not be used to make entries for the show. Food exhibits should be brought to the 4-H barn by 9:30 am on Saturday, Jan. 14.

The Food Show Committee for 1984 is: Christy Meador, chairman, Sherry Johnson, Becky Sterling, Prissy Paxton, and Becky Harris.

Women's Division

The annual Women's Division will be held along with the 1984 Junior Livestock Show. Entry classes this year will be the same as for last year's show. These are:

Adult Categories: 1. Jams, Jellies, and Preserves. 2. Pickles and Relishes. 3. Hobbies and Crafts. 4. Art. 5. Needlework - Embroidery and Decorative Stitch. 6. Needlework - Knitted and Crocheted Articles. 7. Quilts. 8. Afghans. 9. Tole Painting. Youth Category: Art.

Entries in all categories need to be turned in at the new front room of the Show Barn between 1 and 6 p.m. on Thursday, Jan. 12 and on Friday

Morning between 8 and 9 am. They will be judged on Friday morning starting at 9:30 am. Entries will be on exhibit Friday afternoon and Saturday morning. They may be picked up starting at 12 noon on Saturday.

A first, second and third place rosette will be awarded in each division as well as honorable mention awards.

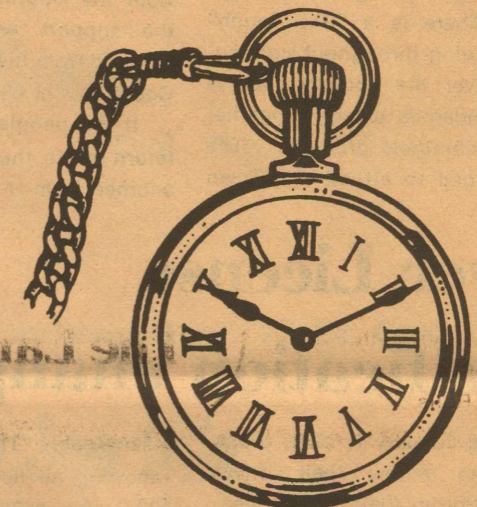

and misdirected pity. God does have rewards for his good and faithful servants. Many times in the Bible, God has made it plain that those who do his will are to be rewarded. He has also made it plain that those who do not do his will not only lose their rewards, but

may not be saved at all. It seems to me that the simple, safe path for any Christian to follow is to eagerly desire whatever God has for him. Do we believe that God is good? Do we believe that he

brings good to those who love him? Do we agree with Jesus that those who love him will keep his commandments? Then let us actively strive to please God who loves us and whom we are supposed to

love. It is useless to sing "O How I Love Jesus" on Sunday if we will not do what he commands on Monday. Brethren, let us not just be hearers of the word, but let us be doers of the word as well.

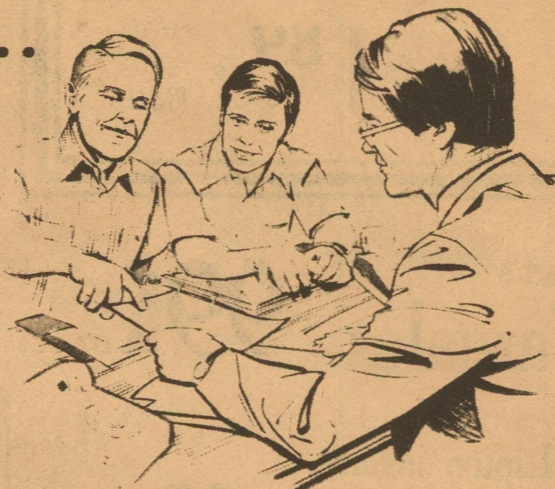

IRS request reports

Information reports, similar to those required of financial institutions on interest and dividend income, are now required for certain transactions involving direct sellers, barter exchange members, and brokers. The new informa-

tion reporting requirements, enacted under the Tax Equity and Fiscal Responsibility Act of 1982 (TEFRA), cover transactions taking place after December 31, 1982.

Non employee compensation payments totaling

\$600 or more during a calendar year must be reported on Form 1099-MISC, "Statement for Recipients of Miscellaneous Income," by trades or businesses that do business with non employees such as freelancers or independent contractors. These reports must contain the income recipient's name, address, identification number, and the total amount of payments made to the individual during the year.

Reporting is now also required on Form 1099-MISC from any business

that sells \$5,000 or more worth of consumer products to a direct seller on a "buy-sell basis," a "deposit commission basis," or any similar arrangement. A sale is on a "buy-sell basis" if the buyer's compensation includes part or all of the difference between the cost to him or her and the sales price. A sale is on the "Deposit-commission basis" if the buyer retains all or part of the consumer's purchase deposit as compensation.

Finally, brokers-including barter exchanges, dealers, stock brokers and other intermediaries - are

required to furnish Form 1099-B, "Statement for Recipient of Proceeds from Broker and Barter Exchange Transactions," on all gross proceeds on transactions occurring after June 30, 1983. However, brokers may report on all 1983 transactions.

In all cases, the information reports must be furnished to the IRS by February 28, and to the person receiving the payments by January 31. IRS will use the reports to

ascertain whether taxpayers have been accurately reporting all taxable income.

More information on these new reporting requirements may be found in the instructions for Form 1096, "Annual Summary and Transmittal of U.S. Information Returns," and in Publication 553, "Highlights of 1982 Tax Changes." A new publication, Publication 911, "Tax Information for Direct Sellers," is also available by writing or calling the IRS.



Phone choice

The fast expanding world of electronics and telecommunications has given the consumer a myriad of choices when it comes to telephones. However, it may not be as simple as buying the phone of your choice and plugging it into the jack at home, according to E.O. Cambern, GTSW General Manager.

"The problem occurs because customers may have special ringing or dialing requirements that are not apparent," said Cambern. "For the case of party line customers, they are sharing a common line to the telephone company switching office. Each phone has its own special ringing, cycle setting which allows the phone to know when it should ring."

Cambern added that single line customers may also have special dialing or ringing needs. This means not every phone on the market today is compatible with local telephone company equipment. This is especially true for customers who may be thinking about buying a cordless telephone or a clock/radio telephone. Before buying a new telephone, Cambern advises Eldorado customers take the time to stop by their nearest GTE Phone Mart, local service office, or local service agency located at Western Auto, 201 South Divide, in Eldorado.

By checking on compatibility before purchasing a new telephone, customers can possibly save a lot of frustration and money.

Bell system breaks up

As a result of the divestiture of the Bell System, as well as other changes brought about by the deregulation of the communications industry. General Telephone Company of the Southwest will make changes in the way it bills long distance calls made after December 31, 1983. These changes will be detailed in special inserts which will be included in customers' bills in January and February, according to E.O. Camber, GTSW General Manager.

"In the past, all long distance charges have been listed together and this procedure will continue for

all long distance calls made prior to January 1, 1984," Cambern continued.

Charges for long distance calls made on or after January 1, 1984 will be listed in two parts, each showing a subtotal.

Part 1 is identified as "Long Distance Carrier - ATCI." ATCI is an abbreviation for American Telephone and Telegraph Communications Incorporated. All calls made over Atci facilities are itemized under this heading with a subtotal.

Part 2 is identified as "LONG DISTANCE - INTRAMARKET" Itemized under this heading is all long distance calls which are not placed over ATCI facilities with a subtotal.

As before, customers will continue to send payments to General Telephone Company of the Southwest, Cambern said.

The official added that if customers have questions concerning their bill they should call the telephone number shown on the bill.

PUBLIC NOTICE

In proceedings pending before the Public Utility Commission of Texas (PUC), local exchange telephone companies are requesting authority to charge AT&T Communications of the Southwest, Inc., for use of their facilities. These proposed charges are higher than AT&T Communications can pay at current Texas long distance rate levels. To position itself to be able to implement rates that are sufficient to produce revenues that will recover the costs facing the company, AT&T Communications must now file for rate relief to be able to implement rates that reflect the costs of access that are ultimately imposed on the company.

While AT&T Communications does not want to increase its Texas rates, an increase would be required to recover the increased access charges AT&T Communications will have to pay to the local exchange telephone companies under several proposals pending before the Commission. These access charges at the proposed increased levels represent more than 80 percent of AT&T Communications' operating expense in Texas.

Accordingly, AT&T Communications, in accordance with the Public Utility Regulatory Act and the rules of the PUC, hereby gives notice of the company's intent to implement a new schedule of rates for long distance calls within Texas. The proposed rates will be effective January 28, 1984, unless otherwise determined by the Commission. All customers and classes of customers would be affected by AT&T Communications' proposed rates.

If higher access charges are ordered, AT&T Communications has no recourse but to pay these charges and recover the costs from its customers as a cost of providing long distance service within Texas. AT&T Communications has filed rates which would mean a maximum overall increase in adjusted test period revenues of \$301.4 million, or 27.85 percent. This amount would help recover cost increases due to the proposed level of access charges now pending before the PUC.

A complete copy of all tariffs and rate schedules is on file with the Texas Public Utility Commission at Austin, Texas, and with every municipality in Texas.
