The Rules Committee: "Traffic Cop" for the House

Many responded to my recent legislative questionnaire with a question of their own: how can complex legislative questions be reduced to simple "yes" or "no" responses? An upcoming vote on the immigration bill, which is expected to come to the House floor before Easter, could be limited if the Rules Committee abides by the wishes of the Judiciary Committee leaders who have been strongly lobbying the Speaker. Judiciary Committee members continue to demand that two provisions in this legislation remain inseparable, those being sanctions against employers who hire illegal aliens and amnesty for illegal aliens who are already in this country by a certain date.

Given the complex nature of issues before the House, the Rules Committee plays a crucial role, that being to provide an agenda by which debate and deliberation can proceed. Frequently, the Rules Committee performs its function admirably well. It is unfortunate that politics have come to play an increasingly larger role in the
