Former editor of the Eldorado Success, Aaron Edgar, 79, died February 17th in a Quannah hospital.

He began his newspaper career in 1927 with the Collingsworth Standard in Wellington. Edgar then later moved on to the Throckmorton Tribune and in 1937 went to the Eldorado Success, where he was editor and the Success was owned by C.S. McKinner. He later moved to Munday where he was co-publisher of the Munday Times along with Grady Roberts from 1947 to 1965.

In 1971 he founded the Munday Courier which he published until retiring in 1973. He resided in Munday at the time of his death.

## Use exemptions to lower taxes

The burden of property taxes for 1984 can be reduced for taxpayers in the Schleicher County Appraisal District who take advantage of various residence homestead exemptions available in Texas.

According to Ray Ballew, chief appraiser for the district, provisions of the Texas Property Tax Code permit a one-time initial application for residence homestead exemptions rather than requiring annual application as in previous years.

However, taxpayers who have never received a residence homestead exemption on the homes in which they were residing on January 1, and those who became 65 years old or disabled during 1983, must make the one-time application this year in order to receive exemptions for 1984.

A residence homestead is a structure, together with improvements and land up to 20 acres, used by the owner for residential purposes. Ballew said that in order for a property to qualify as a homestead, it must meet four tests.

It must be owned by the person or persons claiming the exemption; it must be designed or adapted for human residence; it must actually be used as a residence; and it must be occupied as the principal residence of an owner who qualifies for the exemption.

A mobile home, if it meets the requirements, can be claimed as a homestead, even if it is on leased land, Ballew said. He added, "A taxpayer can still qualify for the homestead exemptions if a portion of his residence is used for other purposes, such as a business in the home. And the home will not lose the exemption if the owner moves away temporarily, provided he intends to return and does not claim a homestead

Among the various types of homestead exemptions provided by Texas tax law are two which must be granted by a school district to taxpayers who qualify. School districts offer a \$5,000 general homestead exemption to all homeowners and an additional \$10,000 exemption to those who are 65 years of age or older or who are disabled.

An advantage associated with the over-65 school exemption is that elderly homeowners receive a "tax ceiling" on their school taxes. Although the appraised value of these homesteads may fluctuate with the market, taxes due the school district will not increase. The ceiling would be raised, however, in the instance of adding an improvement, other than repairs and general maintenance. In this case, the value of the new improvement will be taxed at current market value and tax rate, and the taxes due will be added to the previous tax ceiling to create a new ceiling.

Ballew stressed, though, that the elderly homeowner has to apply for the over-65 school tax exemption in order to get the ceiling. The homeowner has to apply for the over-65 school tax exemption in order to get the ceiling. The homeowner must be 65 years old or more on January 1, 1984, to qualify for the elderly exemption and tax ceiling.

Counties must offer a \$3,000 general homestead exemption to all taxpayers, granted only on the portion of the county tax levied for farm-to-market roads and/or flood control.

Any taxing unit's governing body may vote to offer an exemption for a minimum of \$3,000 on the homesteads of disabled and/or elderly taxpayers. Only in school districts, however, is a tax ceiling established for taxes on over-65 homesteads.

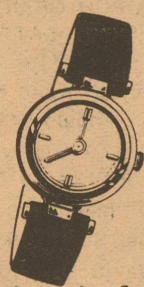

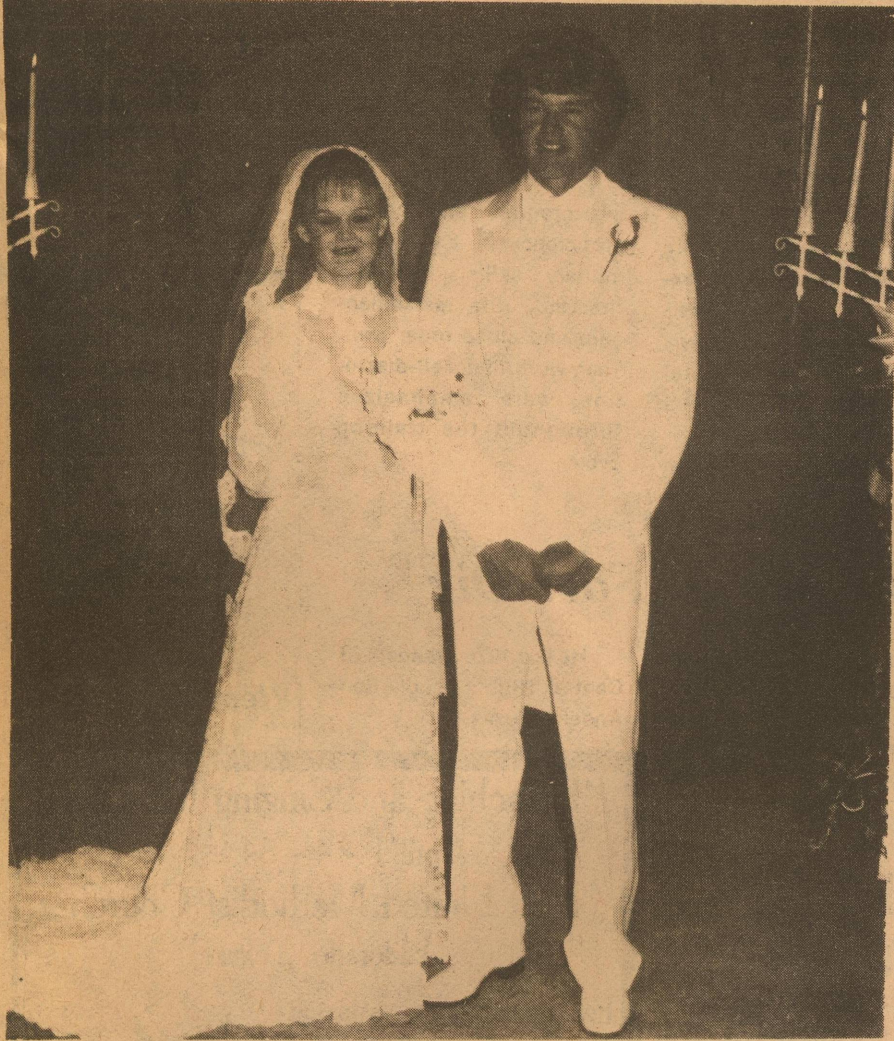

## Don't chew "C"

People who munch on chewable vitamin C tablets to ward off the common cold could be damaging their teeth, says a Texas A&M University Agricultural Extension Service nutritionist. Until recently, vitamin C tablets were not thought to be related to dental erosion, says Mary K. Sweeten. But the marketing of chewable vitamin C tablets containing mega-dose levels may present dental health problems, says the specialist. A recent American Dental

Association report indicated that the acidic level of three 500-milligram chewable vitamin C tablets, when dissolved in distilled water, is about equal to that of stomach acid. While saliva has a certain buffering effect, it can provide only limited protection when there is daily direct contact between ascorbic acid and teeth. If you are using chewable vitamin C tablets regularly, check with a dentist for any sign of a dental problem, advises Sweeten.
