Tough choices

Easy answers prove to be elusive as school grapples with budget

"Turn out the lights, the party's over. They say that all good things must end." — lyrics by Willie Nelson

On a similar Monday night, in another time and place, Dandy Don Meredith could have been heard singing, "The Party's Over." He wasn't there for the SCISD board meeting Monday, but he could have been, as school trustees sat grim-faced while campus principals and program directors explained exactly what budget cuts are going to mean to the school system.

No longer can the school afford to furnish caps and gowns to its graduates. Neither can it provide varsity letter jackets... or football shoes... or cheerleader uniforms. Library books are out, so are many of the school's field trips. No new buses, or new vans, or heating and air conditioning units.

"It will be a flat miracle if we get through the year without losing an AC unit," Maintenance Supervisor John Kotsch told the trustees as he reviewed the impact that budget cuts will have on his department. He noted that the school currently has 102 heating and air conditioning units, ranging upward of \$15,000 in cost...each. "If something happens we'll just have to wait until the board can meet and decide what to do," Kotsch added.

Faced with declining student enrollment and the need to repay more than \$273,000 to the Texas Education Agency, school trustees sent Supt. Mark Ge-

sch on a mission, find enough cuts to balance the books.

"When 88 percent of the budget goes for personnel there aren't many places to cut that don't directly affect the students," Gesch explained. "Those are the type of cuts that get people stirred up."

But, it isn't as though Gesch has totally avoided personnel cuts. Already seven jobs have been eliminated, all of them by not replacing someone who is retiring, transferring, or otherwise leaving the district's employ. Still, more cuts will be necessary to bring the budget into balance...more cuts and a higher tax rate.

The preliminary budget Gesch presented to the trustees Monday night was based on a tax rate of \$1.50 per \$100 valuation. That's as high as Texas law will allow the rate to go and is up significantly from \$1.4226 in the current year's budget. And still, the number's won't balance. Gesch pointed out that even with dramatic spending cuts and a hike in the tax rate a budget deficit of \$2,013 is expected.

As part of the process, Gesch asked each of his three campus principals, and three program directors to come and update the trustees on the cuts they are facing and how they will be implement-

For her part, Librarian Debbie Griffin noted that children won't notice much difference in the number of new books in the Library when school starts since many books have been bought out of the current budget. But, that won't be the

case for next year. She said she was also cutting back on reference materials and she will be canceling subscriptions to area newspapers, including The Suc-

Other cuts in the Library, including cuts in the number of videos purchased, will help her continue to pay for technical support for a computer database that replaced the library's old card catalogue.

Technology Director J.D. Doyle, whose budget virtually disappeared, explained that the district's computers are in good shape since most of them are new. He credited much of the good news to the fact that the community received a half million dollar networking grant that was used update the school's computer labs.

Other aspects of the technology department didn't fare so well, though. Distance learning will take a big hit, it was explained, especially since the Education Service Center has curtailed the money it can spend for items such as Electronic Field Trips.

Perhaps the campus that fared the best in all the cuts was Elementary, since very little of its budget involves extracurricular activities. Field trips and transportation will impact the elementary, however, with the cost of drives for field trips being taken from the campus' instructional budget.

Supt. Gesch told the trustees that the big unknown in the whole budgeting equation is what the State Legislature is going to do to address school finance CONTINUED ON PAGE 8

Jesus Adame hospitalized following bee attack

Jesus Adame, 78, of Eldorado, was hospitalized Friday, Aug. 15, 2003, after being swarmed by bees near his home at 108 E. Warner Avenue. The attack came as volunteer firefighters worked to eradicate a hive of bees in a storage shed near Adame's residence.

Fire Chief Jerry Jones and Firefighter Jerry Felver responded to a "bee call" at the Adame home and were in the process of spraying the bees with foam when Adame reportedly entered his back yard. That's apparently when he was attacked by the agitated bees. Adame sought safety in his residence after being stung several times. His wife, Mary Adame, reportedly used a fly swatter to knock off many of the bees that covered Adame as he entered the home.

Adame was later taken to Schleicher County Medical Center where he was treated and hospitalized. Family members tell the Success that as many as 32 bee stingers were removed from Adame at the hospital, not counting the ones that were removed at home. Adame was released from the hospital on Sunday.

Chief Jones says that neither he nor Jerry Felver knew that Adame had entered the back yard and they were not aware he had been attacked until they were notified some time later. Jones says he cautioned Adame to stay in the house while the bees were being exterminat-

Jones says the bees were some of the most aggressive he has experienced. They


were so aggressive, in fact, that Jones and Felver were forced to walk back to the Fire Hall in their bee suits after making a preliminary inspection of the hive. The bees not only swarmed the firemen, they also filled the cab of their truck. After hoofing it back to the Fire Hall, the men returned with the department's foam truck and used it to kill the bees.

Jones asks the public to stay away from suspected bee hives and to notify authorities if any suspicious swarms or hives are observed. The most recent attack comes just a week after another swarm of bees claimed the life of Bobby Daniels of Eldorado. Daniels was operating a bull dozer on a ranch South of town at the time of the attack.




Delicate butterfly set in stone — The final thing to see on the Crystal Palace tour, the Butterfly is supposed to be the most photographed cave formation on the planet.




