

Mayo draws the lot

Johnny Mayo Jr. is the new commissioner from Precinct #1 but, it wasn't easy getting there! He ran against incumbent Jack Turner in the May 5th Democratic Primary where he received 79 votes to Turner's 59. Due to the narrow margin of the outcome

Turner and Mayo met for a run-off June 2nd. Again, there was no official winner as they both received 70 votes. The winner was finally decided Tuesday June 5th when, witnessed by the Democratic Executive Committee, the two men drew lots, mutually deciding that whoever drew the largest number would win. Mayo drew number 15 and Turner number 6.

The local race wasn't the only one in town last Saturday as there were three statewide run-offs. The one generating the most interest was the race between senate hopefuls Kent Hance and Lloyd Doggett. Hance carried Schleicher County with 217 votes compared to Doggett's 54. Doggett went on to win the election statewide but, since he received only

509 more votes than Hance there will be a recount.

W.C. (Bill) Davis beat out Roy E. Greenwood in the run-off election for Judge, Court of Criminal Appeals, Place 2 with 131 votes to Greenwood's 98. Thomas B. (Torp) Thorp was beat out by Bill White for Judge, Court of Criminal Appeals, Place 3 with White bringing in 143 votes to Thorp's 92.

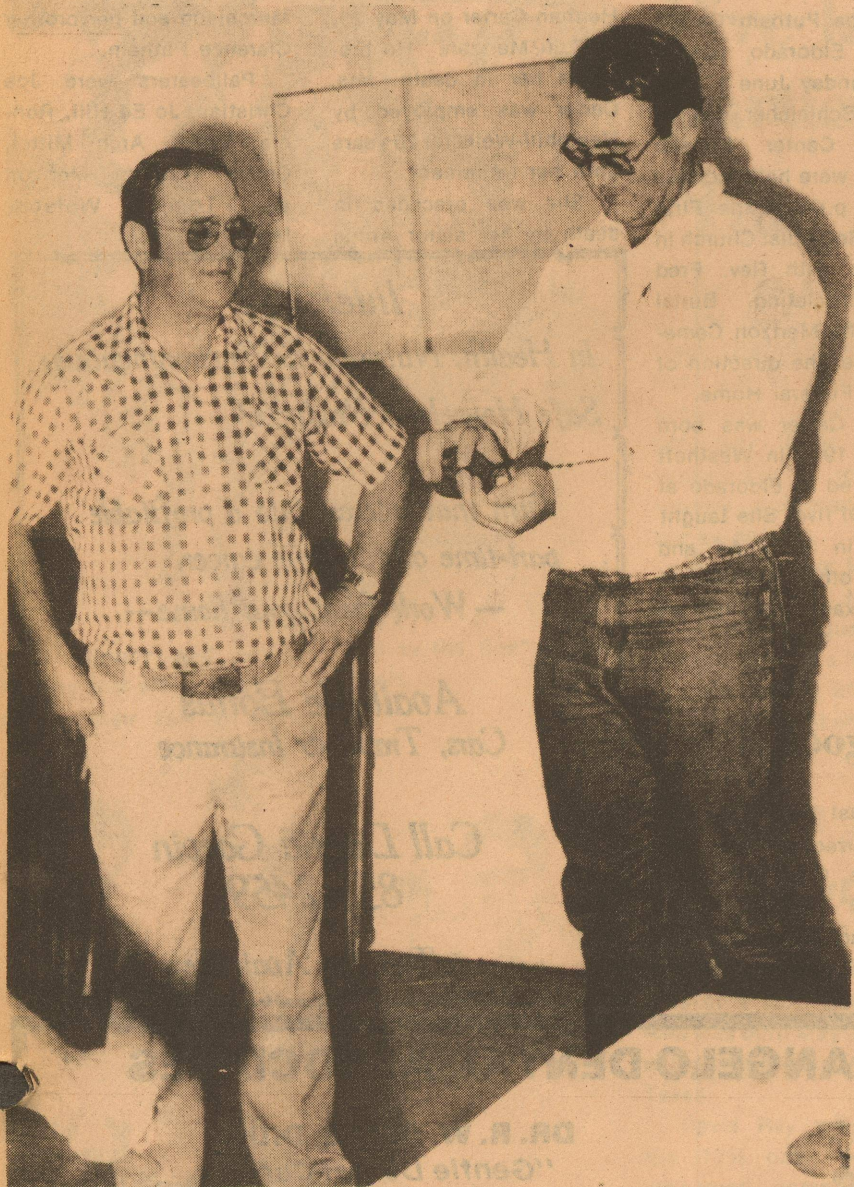

health and physical education major.

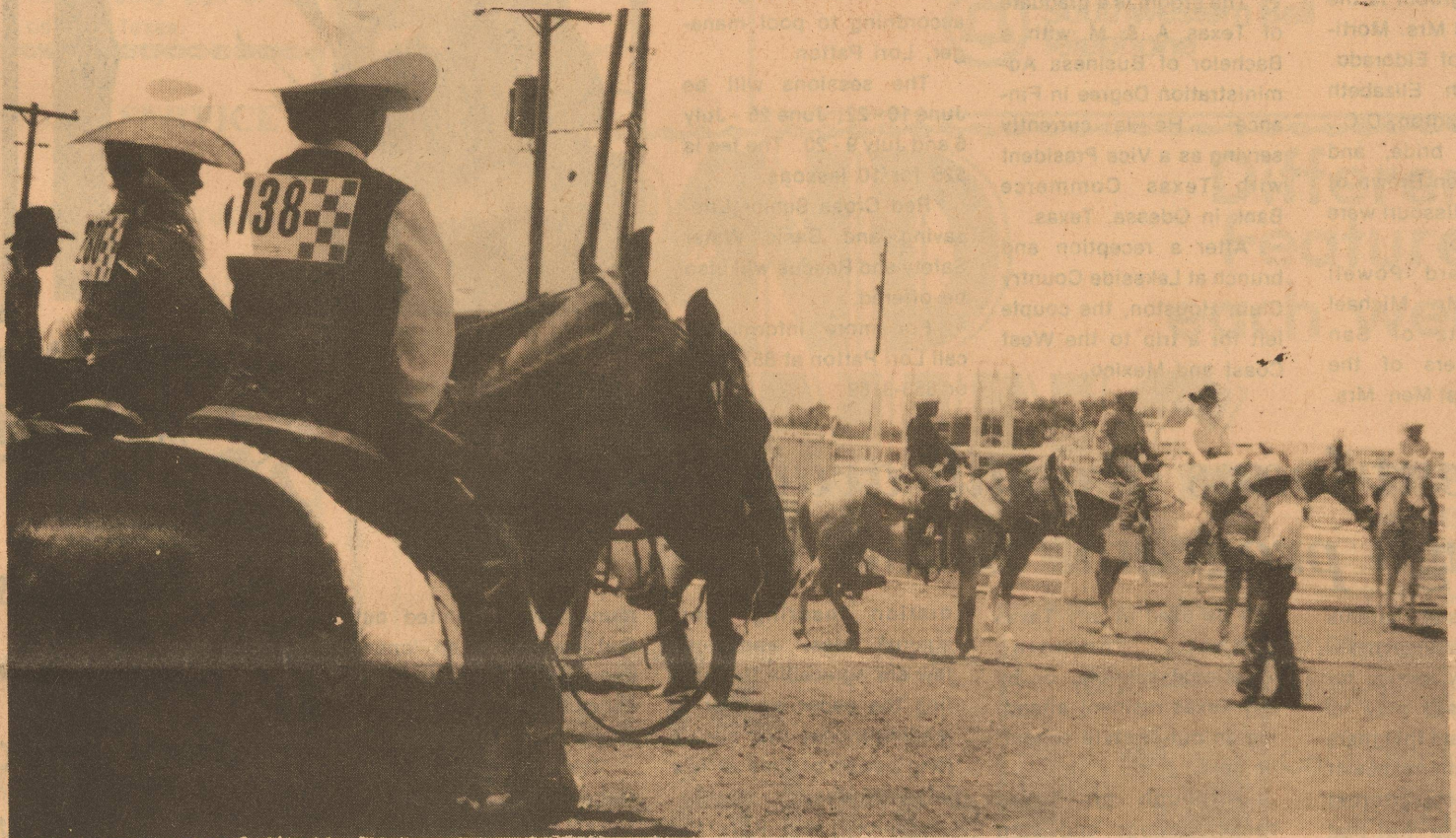

cher County Commissioners Court and others. This civil suit revolves around the designation of a caliche road. The plaintiffs, Bill and Mable Freitag, requested a postponement until a witness deposition could be rendered. The trial has been moved back to the October dockets.



County horse show big success

Council meets

Tuesday night the Eldorado City Council entered into an agreement with Pinetree Utilities to begin work on the C.D.B.G in the Christian Addition for the new sewer lines. The company is expected to begin work on the project within 10 days to two weeks.

Carolyn Whitten and George Spinks met with the Council concerning monetary support of the Eagle Point youth center, the center has already received an informal commitment from the county to help with one-third of the operation and the Council gave their approval for one-third of expenses also. The center will also request support from SCISD.

Several residents from the Orient Heights Addition met with the Council making information as to how they, the residents would benefit or suffer from being annexed into the city in order to receive city sewer service. They were told they would not lose any of their current services but in fact would receive better services on their existing water lines if the sewer lines were installed. They were issued by the Council their livestock would not be a hindrance. The residents were informed that the sewer bond money was available and that 51% of the residents of Orient Heights must petition the city to be annexed. No action was taken but a letter informing the residents of their options will be sent at a later date and a town meeting will also be held concerning the annexation.

Jim Hardy reported to the city fathers that he has tied his well into the city water system according to specifications and under city supervision. The line, itself, belongs to the city and Hardy will give the ROW to the city for city use. Hardy also offered a 1000 h.p. 3-phase motor to the city for \$1,000. In later action, Superintendent Hal Whitten requested that the council purchase the motor to replace the natural gas operated motor at the airport well. The council approved the purchase if the motor operated satisfactorily.

Ronnie Sauer reported on the SCS

biologist's findings regarding the proposed city lake.

The gas line from the gin to the Keeney house on the Sonora Hwy. has been reported as broken and consequently approximately \$1700 worth of gas has been lost. The owner of the line has been billed for the amount and the master meter has been cut off and will not be turned back on until the necessary repairs are made and the bill paid.

The State Highway Department requested that their regular bulk water rate of 2.50 per 1000 gallons be lowered during the work being done on Hwy. 190. The department will be using between 500,000 and 700,000 gallons of water for the project. The Council approved a rate of 1.50 per 1000 gallons for the department on this job only.

The Council gave their approval to the purchase of a Pneumatic roller for the paving department. The roller will require some repair work.

The Health Department has contacted the city concerning the status of hazardous dumping at the city landfill. Western Company has been contacted concerning the dumping of certain materials at the site and the city has received complete cooperation from Mr. Nicholson on this matter.

A petition was presented to the Council for another street light in the Glendale Addition. The light will be located in the Newport yard. The Council gave their nod to the the petition.

To cut down on any possible mishaps, the Council voted to close Williams St. only during Little League baseball games.

The Eldorado dog problem was discussed at length but, due to lack of public participation at the meeting no action was taken. The Council has tried unsuccessfully to hire a dog catcher to correct the problem.

Bills were approved for payment with the exception of a \$25,000 bill from Freese & Nichols, which will be held for later action. Minutes were also approved from the last meeting.

Ninety-seven entries participated in last week-end's Schleicher County 4-H Horse Show. The big turnout saw competitors from Del Rio to Big Lake to Brady.

Trophies were awarded to all first place and championship winners. Jo Ann Jones of Christoval and Carol Cohea of Ft. Stockton were judges for the annual event.

Jay O'Harrow of Eldorado showed the Champion Mare and Wendi Dunagan of Eldorado took Champion Gelding honors with her entry. Reserve Champion Mare was shown by Shanna Swift of Eldorado and the Reserve Champion Gelding was shown by Lori Lancaster of San Angelo. The All-Around winner in the senior division was Nancy Benson of Sonora and in the junior division the winner was Allison Schwiening of Sonora. The Sub-Junior All-Around winner was Tara Farmer of San Angelo. The Jesse Coy Memorial Award, the over all award for all age groups, was won by Allison Schwiening of Sonora.

Student loans are still available through program

Students and parents who have tried unsuccessfully to borrow money for college expenses may be surprised to learn that there is actually an abundance of long-term, low-interest money available for that purpose. The trick is to find a banker interested enough in making such loans to go through the paper work involved.

At least one West Texas banker says his bank is not only interested but is eager to process student loan applications. Jim Bullock, senior vice president and head of the consumer loan department of Texas American Bank of Amarillo says his department is "Quite active in making student loans and would like to make even more."

Cooperating with the Texas Guaranteed Student Loan Program, he said the bank will lend qualified undergraduate students up to \$2,500 per year and up to \$12,500 total over the course of his or her college years. Graduate students may qualify for as much as \$5,000 per year or up to \$15,000 total in student loans.

No interest is charged on the loans until six months after the borrower ceases to be enrolled as at least a half-time student. Then repayment at 8% interest may be made over five to ten years, depending on the amount borrowed.

The amount of the loan for which a student may qualify depends on the cost of attending college, other financial aid which may be received and the family's financial condition. Determination of the amount of the loan and the approval of the application are made by the financial aid officer of the college.

Bullock said that once the school completes its part of the application, the bank routinely processes it and arranges for the disbursement of the cash. The proceeds from the loans

can be used at any Texas school, including vocational schools, or by any Texas resident attending an out-of-state school, he said.

Although all Texas banks, savings and loan associations and credit unions may make such loans with the Texas Guaranteed Student Loan Corp-

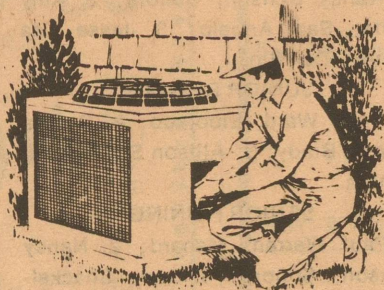
oration insuring them against loss, apparently few are agreeable to handling the paper work or to lending money over such a long period of time at low interest rates.

Bullock said it is the policy of Texas American Bank of Amarillo to participate in such programs as a service to the com-

munity. He pointed out that the bank is an "open-door" lender and that no deposit relationship is required.

The Eldorado-Divide Soil and Water Conservation District joined the nationwide celebration of Soil Stewardship Week to that took place May 27 - June 3, 1984, according to Charles Ray Pfluger, Chairman of the Board. The theme of this year's celebration is "Conservation: A Common Commit-

ment". The National Association of Conservation Districts (NACD) has sponsored Soil Stewardship Week since 1955, in cooperation with the nation's nearly 3,000 soil and water conservation districts.

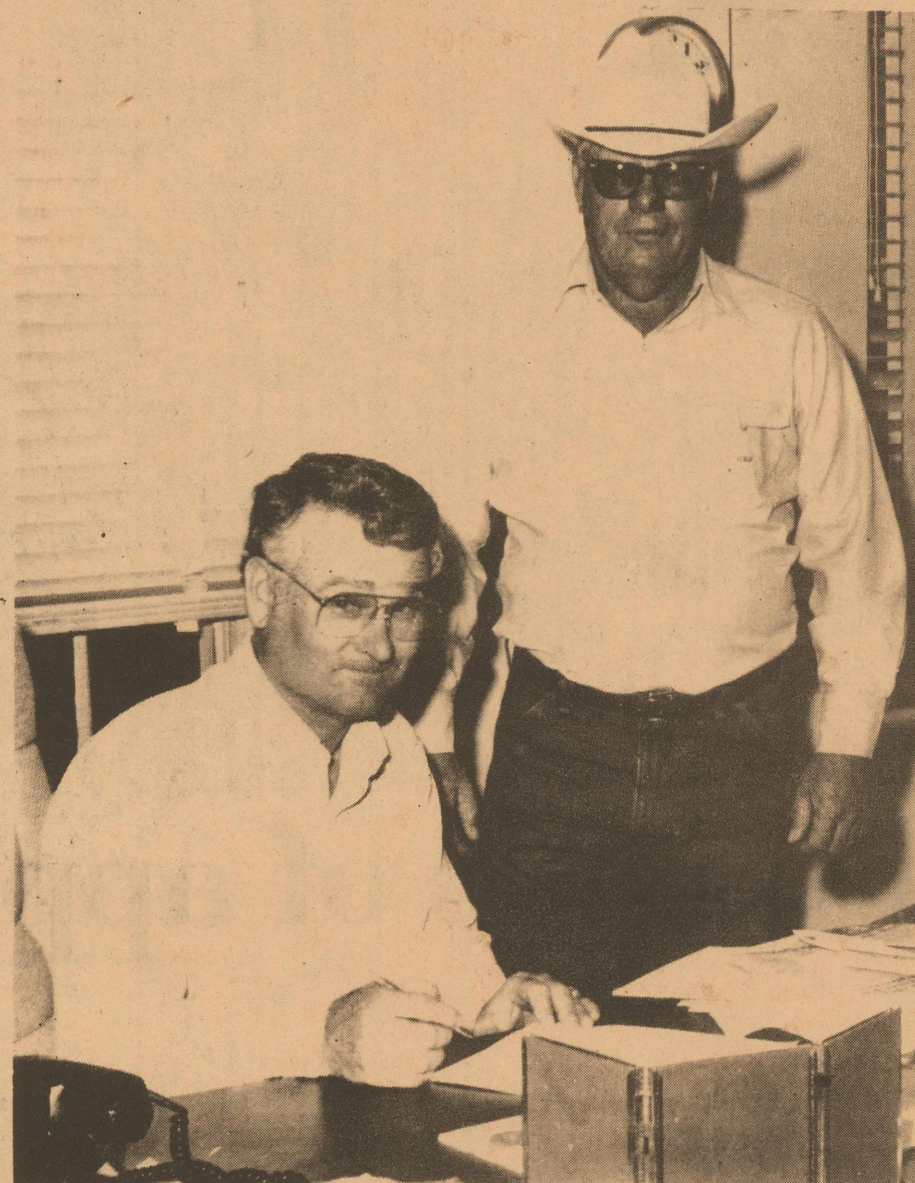
The thirtieth annual reference booklet published by NACD cites the reluctance of the human

race to fully accept its primary role as caretaker of God's earth. "We are prepared to eat the fruit but the task of dressing the garden is left to the few among us who sincerely care about the perpetuation of the forests, the preservation of the rivers that water the garden and the renewing of the topsoil

from which the plants gather their nutrients."

Materials especially designed to promote the Soil Stewardship Week theme is distributed each year through local conservation districts to clergymen, lay leaders, churches, civic and educational organizations and to individuals participating in the observance.

District get three new cooperators

Dan Griffin, David Meador, Jerry Kidd and Clovis Olsak have become district cooperators in an effort with the district to protect and conserve our soil and water resources.

Dan Griffin is in the process of improving his irrigation system following an efficiency evaluation made by the Soil Conservation Service. He also plans to build some ter-

aces to help control erosion and conserve moisture.

David Meador is continually working to control his brush problems and to grow more grass to provide a good cover against soil erosion. He is also very interested in assisting with conservation education of the youth. He has provided a place for the range judging contest and the sixth

grade education field day.

Jerry Kidd is a newcomer to Schleicher County. He is in a partnership with Jack Green on the Otto Williams place on Toe Nail Trail. Current conservation practices planned include water improvement and cross fencing for better grazing distribution and removal of undesirable brush plants.

Sixth grade has field day

Fifty-nine sixth grade students of Eldorado recently traveled to DAVID MEADOR'S ranch to observe and participate in a variety of demonstrations showing the importance of soil and water conservation.

The students were taught how soil is made and some of its characteristics. They were shown the importance of soil as one of the basic elements of the life cycle. The students participated in demonstrations where they were shown how to protect against soil erosion by using different conservation practices on crop land and range land. A variety of

desirable and undesirable plants for livestock and wildlife were identified for the students. Basic principles on how to manage for these different plants were discussed. The students were taught the importance of wildlife on their lands and the management of their habitats and populations were discussed.

A noon meal of hotdogs and ice cream was provided by the directors of the Eldorado-Divide SWCD. Following the meal a presentation on wool, mohair and cotton was given showing how these fibers are prepared and made into clothing. The students also observed the film "A

Land Called Texas" discussing the soil conservation problems in Texas today and what is being done to solve them.

The demonstrations were given by Dr. Jake Landers, TAES from San Angelo; Clarence Weidenfeld, Mark Mosely and Randy Ward, SCS from San Angelo; Virgil Polocsek, SCS from Sonora; and Carrol Green and Bruce Deere, SCS from Eldorado. Others assisting with the field day were Jerry Swift, Schleicher County Agent; Mr. and Mrs. Charles Ray Pfluger and Mr. and Mrs. David Lloyd, Eldorado-Divide SWCD.

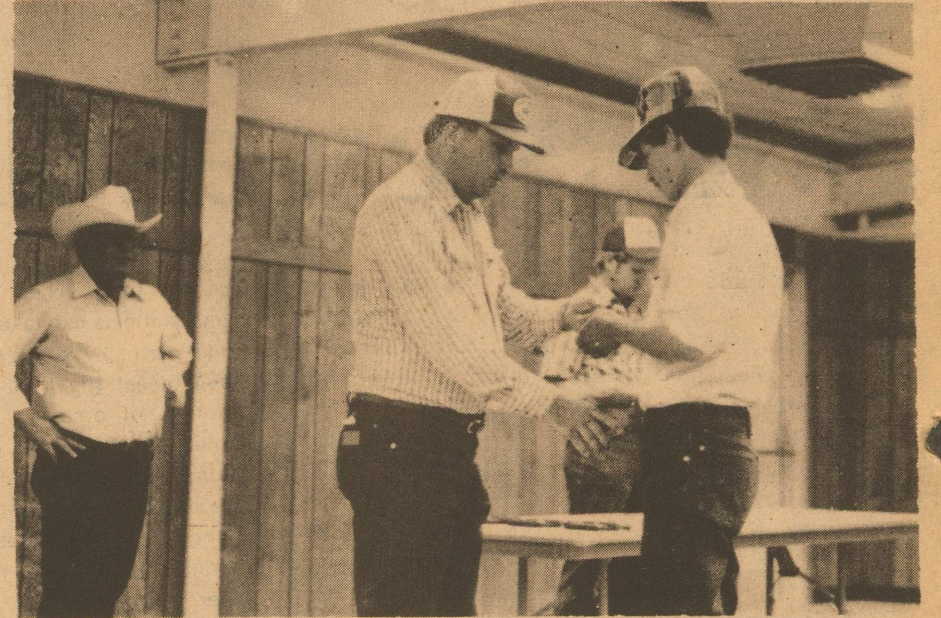

Benefits of applying planned grazing

"I haven't had to feed at all for the past eleven winters".

"I normally run about 60 animal units to the section, but since the drought I have cut back to 40."

These two statements sound like they must have been made by producers who ranched in better times and where conditions are a lot better than they

are here. However, both ranches are in Schleicher County and those statements were made this year by producers who grew up these ranches.

What do these two and other successful ranches have in common that gives them such an edge? One thing they all have is an active, intensive management program tailored for that particular ranch's cir-

cumstances. All these programs recognize that the most limiting factor in successful ranching is quality forage, and one key to success is the ability to harvest the maximum amount without damaging future production.

They have found that one of the things needed by a pasture to produce an ample supply of quality forage is periodic rest. This

rest allows range plants to grow leaves which produce 95% of the plants food, develop and maintain good root systems, and make seed. It also allows seedling plants to get established.

A planned grazing system is a systematic method of making sure each pasture gets the rest it needs. Not only will the result be more total forage,

but also a change in forage composition with an increase in desirable grasses, forbs and forage composition with an increase in desirable grasses, forbs and brows. In such a system, livestock receive a more balanced variety while better utilizing all available forage. A planned grazing system usually decreases labor, since fewer pastures need to be

checked. This type of system also benefits wildlife through an increase in food and cover plants, an important consideration as hunting becomes a larger factor in the ranching enterprise. Both of the producers mentioned earlier consider their planned grazing systems critical to the success of their management programs.

There are a wide variety

of planned grazing systems, providing suitable adaptations for all types of range and ranch operations. As few as two pastures are enough to start such a system. An integral part of any grazing system is flexibility. The good range manager not only watches the calendar, but "reads" his range and makes adjustments when needed.

Assistance with planning grazing systems is available through the local conservation district. The district directors encourage anyone interested in investigating a planned grazing system for his own operation to contact Carrol Green or Bruce Deere at the local Soil Conservation Service field office at 127 S. Main or call 853-2720.

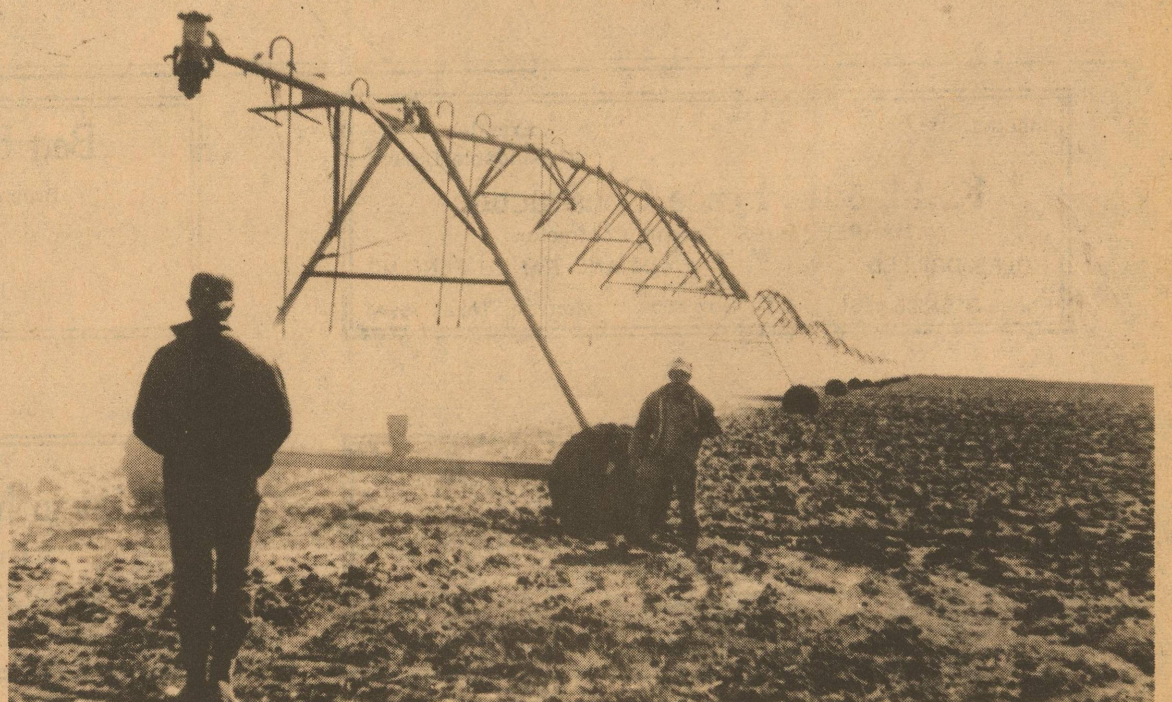

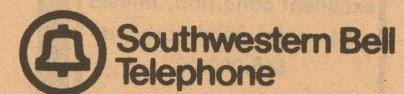


Public Notice

Phone changes

Changes approved by the Federal Communications Commission on May 25, 1984 will affect General Telephone customers using interstate long-distance directory assistance, customers using AT&T to make long-distance calls, and businesses with more than one line.

An interstate directory assistance charge of 50 cents per call with a two-call allowance for each billing period was approved for AT&T, the nation's only provider of interstate directory assistance service. To obtain the two-call directory allowance, the customer must make at least two interstate calls during each billing period. If the customer makes one or no interstate calls, the

allowance would be one or zero respectively.

The FCC also ordered AT&T to reduce its interstate long-distance rates by approximately 6.1 percent.

At the same time, the FCC approved interstate end user access charges of \$6 per line for businesses with more than one line.

All changes became effective May 25.
