## Commissioners Court studying bond issue

The Schleicher County Commissioners Court met for their second meeting of July, Monday morning.

The first order of business was the reading and approval of the minutes and the approval for the payment of monthly bills.

The court voted to contact the bonding firm of Rauscher, Pierce and Refsnes to look into the possibility of issuing a \$100,000 bond for the renovation of the Memorial Building.

Vanda Estep was hired in the capacity of dispatcher for the Sheriff's Department.

The court agreed to contribute a total of \$1500 toward the construction of the tool shed at the golf course.

The Eldorado Golf Club will contribute \$1500 also toward the construction.

The commissioners began to review the budgets that have been submitted to them by various county department heads.

The county tax appraisal office offered the court its report in compliance with the budget. According to the report the total taxable revenue is down to \$2,500,958.00. Losses in gas, oil and residential properties were named as the culprits.

In the final action of the day, the court okayed the transfer of \$1,000 to the Jury Fund from the General Fund.

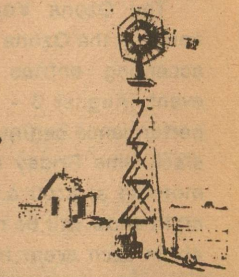

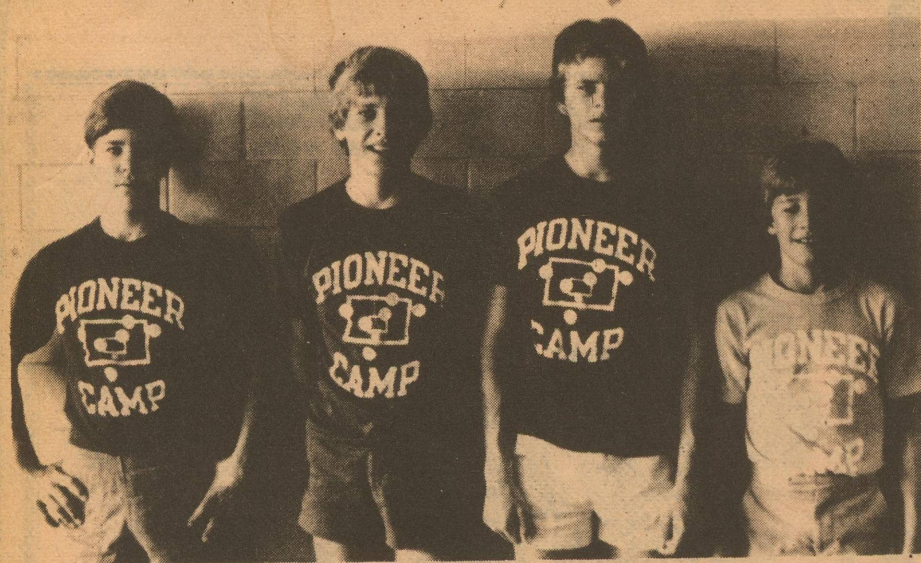

Monday, the group left for Winnipeg, Manitoba, Canada where they boys met with Canadian Boy Scouts and each was assigned to another scout.

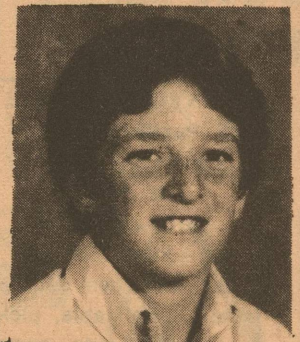
The scouts spent the night with the families of the Canadian scouts.

AT&T Communications has filed with the Public Utility Commission (PUC) of Texas to introduce a new intrastate, optional long distance service to begin August 1, 1984, the same date "Reach Out America" plan will be available for interstate calls.

A new service designed to give customers the opportunity to reduce the cost of long distance in Texas has been filed with the state PUC by AT&T Communications of the Southwest, Inc.

"Reach Out Texas" is an optional calling plan which will provide additional discounts on long distance rates for Texas customers who frequently place calls in the evening, weekend, and night time calling periods.

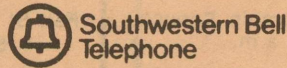

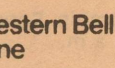

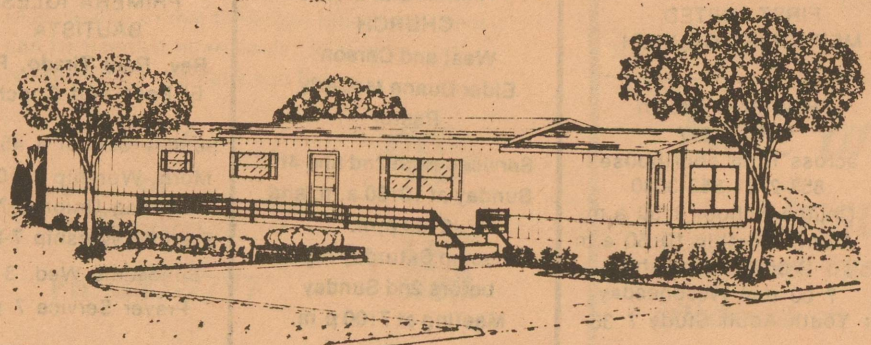
