Only a few weeks left

September 30th is the last day to apply for Crop Insurance for Barley, Oats and Wheat in Schleicher County, according to Dottie Sampley, District Director for the Federal Crop Insurance Corporation (FCIC).

Crop Insurance covers unavoidable loss of production resulting from adverse weather conditions, wildlife, earthquake, or fire.

"Three coverage levels (50, 65, or 75 percent) are available for insurance protection. Additionally, FCIC offers three optional price elections for valuing production lost or damaged," says Sampley.

"To assist producers, the Federal Crop Insurance Corporation will cost-share up to 30 percent of the cost of carrying insurance. For more information about the program, producers should contact an authorized Crop Insurance agent," says Sampley.

To select an agent, producers should check the list of agents available at their county ASCS office. Applications should be made no later than September 30.

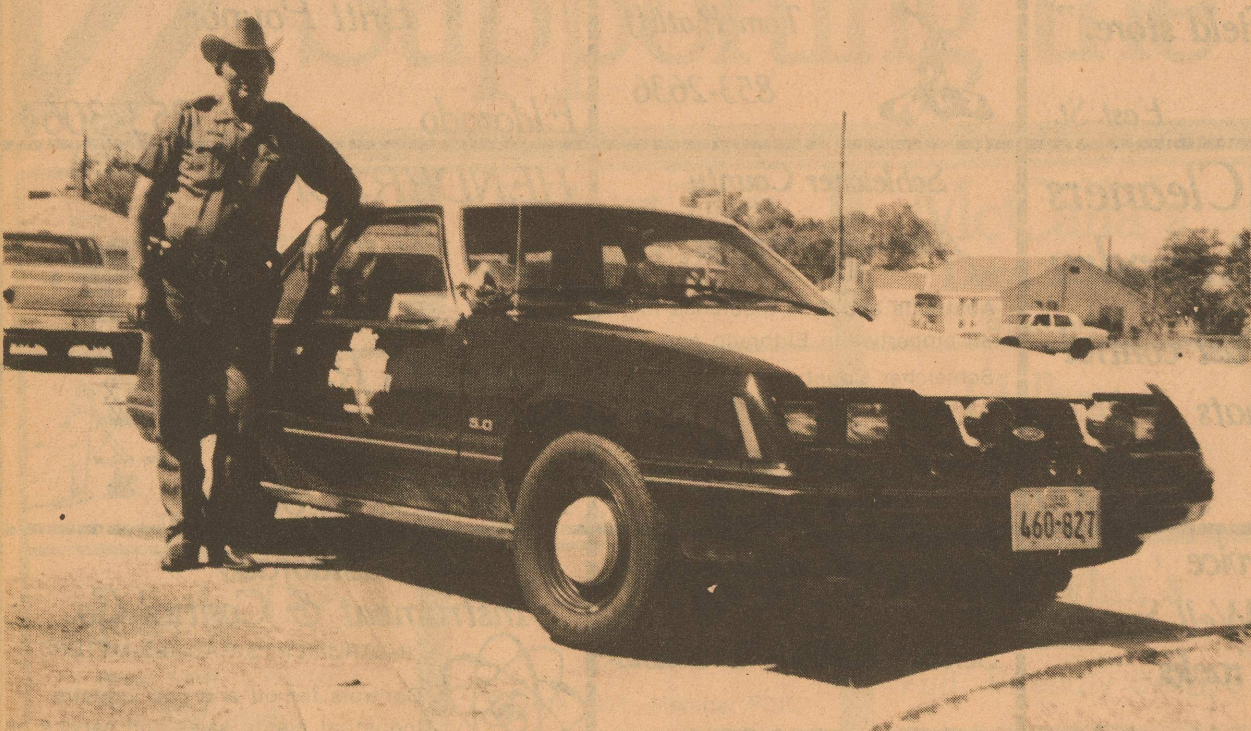

Shelter liaison New service for county

"You always hurt the one you love" probably means a little more than the lyrics to an old song to some Schleicher County residents or so Irene Page's statistics indicate. Miss Page is the county liaison for the San Angelo Family Shelter. The nationwide rule of thumb indicates that 10 percent of the women out of any given population has experienced either emotional, psychological or physical abuse from a loved one each year. The liaison for the family shelter is new to Schleicher County in that this past Tuesday is only the second visit to Eldorado. The newly expanded program is intended to inform the public that there is a haven for the battered wife and a counselor will be in our midst on the 1st Tuesday of each month and officed in the Memorial Building.

The liaison program, an in community counselor for thirteen West Texas counties surrounding the family shelter center is located in San Angelo. The location of the center itself is kept confidential for the obvious reasons but, last year Ms. Page stated that the center housed over 175 families and received over 300 calls in which counseling was offered. The center is manned with a program director and five full time peer counselors who assist the battered and abused families through these unsettling family problems.

The services offered by the shelter are counseling to the wife and instilling in her the ability to find avenues necessary to break the wife-beating cycle, a cycle which is often caused by stress and tension. Ms. Page said there

are several factors which bring on the wife-beating syndrome in a spouse. Some of which are jealousy, fear, frustration, lack of control over one's life, money problems, problems with the children. She also stated that drug and alcohol abuse were not causes for wife beating but were there again only symptoms of the basic stress and tension syndrome.

The shelter offers to the battered woman a place of sanctuary for herself and her children, counseling and how to prevent abuse if possible and then avenues of escape if not. Irene said the program was getting support from many area hospitals and law enforcement agencies and that the Texas Attorney General's office was highly beneficial to the program. One of the newer mechanisms to prevent family abuse is the warrantless arrest in cases of wife-beating where there is justifiable evidence that the beatings will continue and the family is in jeopardy. Law enforcement officers can arrest the batterer without a warrant.

The shelter is limited in its ability to protect the family until the family is at its location and the best avenues for abused families to seek assistance from the shelter is to either call the local law enforcement agency or call 655-5774 if necessary. collect, the phone line is open 24 hours a day and all family abuse discussions are kept confidential.

Ms. Page is currently seeking voluntary assistance in preparing a network for battered families seeking assistance in the county.

He anticipates a ground game from Rankin whereas, he plans an aerial as well as ground assault. But the key to a sound victory over Rankin will be the amount of hustle the Eagle team can provide. He wishes to encourage everyone to attend this opening game of the season and show the 1984 Eagles that the entire town is behind them.

Number Please

General Telephone customers here should take note of a change in the number to dial for local directory assistance.

"As of Saturday, August 25, the number to dial is 112-411," said E.O. Cambren, GTE General Manager. General Telephone changed the information numbers to correspond with its new digital switching system in downtown San Angelo. The facility is linked to directory assistance operators, also based in San Angelo.

To obtain a number in another city located within your area code, there has been no change. Simply dial 112-555-1212. If the city is located outside your area code, dial 112-area code-555-1212.

"Linking all our Concho Valley customers to the digital system is the initial step," noted Cambren. "We are switching all our toll (long distance) traffic for nearby cities through the San Angelo office, also recently converted to the new system."

The digital system is computer-based and has replaced the mechanical telephone switching system with state-of-the-art electronics. Similar conversions to digital systems are planned for Concho Valley communities in the months to come.

Theft on upswing

With farm and ranch equipment theft on the upswing, neighborhood or community patrols can be a key deterrent to such crime, says a community development specialist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, Texas A&M University System. Community patrols organized in cooperation with the county sheriff enable neighbors to watch each other's homes, barns, equipment and livestock. These patrols extend the eyes and ears of law enforcement agencies. Patrols do not get involved in any action, but just notify the police or sheriff of suspicious activities.

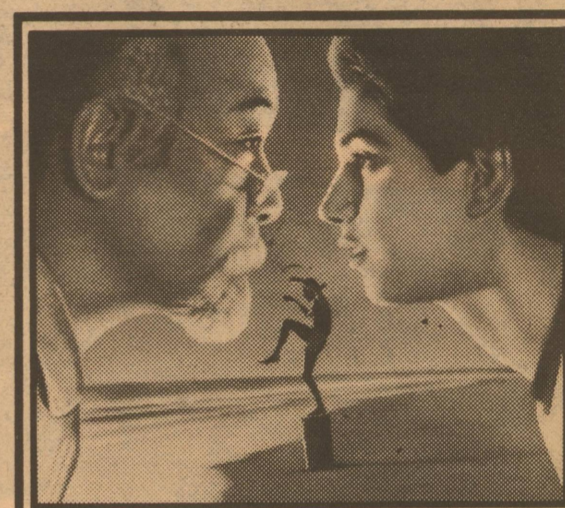

PUBLIC NOTICE

AT&T Communications of the Southwest, Inc., has filed with the Public Utility Commission of Texas (PUC) a proposal to reduce intrastate, interLATA long distance revenues to offset proposed increases in specialized service rates for private line, WATS, 800, OCC facilities and directory assistance services. The proposed tariff restructure will not result in any increases in the overall revenues of the Company. The proposed effective date for the tariffs is September 20, 1984. All customers and classes of customers will be affected by this filing.

The restructure in the basic long distance service (MTS) results in an overall decrease in the revenues received by the Company from such service of approximately \$100 million. While this proposed restructure results in an overall decrease in revenue, certain MTS rates are proposed to be increased to more nearly recover the access charges approved by the PUC for such service.

AT&T Communications has also filed restructured tariffs designed to more closely recover access costs for private line, DATAPHONE® Digital Service (DDS), OCC facilities, WATS, 800 and directory assistance services. These restructured tariffs result in an approximate overall revenue increase of approximately \$100 million from increases in its WATS, 800, DDS, OCC facilities and private line rates, and institution of a charge for directory assistance.

The result of these proposed tariff changes and the restructure of our service offerings is to more nearly recover access costs from those services for which such access costs are incurred.

This proposed restructure results in no increase in overall revenue to AT&T Communications and is not a major rate change as that term is defined in Section 43(b) of the Public Utility Regulatory Act.

A complete copy of all tariffs and rate schedules is on file with the Texas Public Utility Commission at Austin, Texas. Persons who wish to intervene or otherwise participate in these proceedings should notify the Commission as soon as possible. ACT registration

As the new year begins, more than one million high school juniors and seniors across the nation are preparing to participate in the ACT Assessment Program.

The ACT Assessment, which consists of four academic tests that measure educational development and a detailed questionnaire that collects information relevant to educational and career planning, is recommended or required by more than 2,700 postsecondary institutions and scholarship programs.

School guidance counselors recommend that students participate in the ACT Assessment Program during the junior year or early in the senior year, so their results will be available in time for use in planning for postsecondary education and careers.

Students can obtain registration packets that contain all the information necessary to register and prepare for the Assessment from their high school guidance offices. The basic registration fee for the Assessment is \$9.50. New for 1984-85, late registration will be accepted for an additional \$10.00 late handling fee.

For 1984-85 ACT has established this test date schedule:

It takes about three hours to complete the four ACT examinations in English, math, social studies and natural sciences. A sample copy of a full-length test is available in every high school. Students who would like to have copies of additional tests may obtain them at cost from ACT.

The ACT Assessment also includes a two part questionnaire that students complete at home when they register. The questionnaire focuses on the student's interests, academic and nonacademic accomplishments, and vocational and
