The board of trustees have scheduled a 7:30 Thursday night meeting in order to meet with the district's selected architect Gary Donaldson. During this meeting a more accurate accounting for the project's expenditures should be ascertained.

with the firm of Rauscher Pierce and Refsnes, Inc. of San Angelo and San Antonio entered into contract with the district to act as bonding agents for the election and the sale of the bonds, should the issue be approved, by the voters. The contract also sited McCall, Parkhurst, and Horton, an attorney firm of Dallas to act as the legal agents in the bond transaction. School chief administrator Guy Whitaker discussed the renovation plans for existing buildings with board members and here again gave an approximate figure for the needed repairs. No action was taken but it is the general concensus of the board that two of the districts rent homes need degrees of remodeling, re-vamping of the high school principal's office, interior and exterior doors and fixtures, vestibule renovation, carpet in the band hall, roof improvements to the vo-ag building as well as the high school gym were cited as part of the summertime improvement to the existing plant. The moneys for portions of these improvements

could come from a \$200,000 found in the general fund and as of yet undedicated. This combined with the extent of the campus renovation as well as the new Middle School complex are all awaiting exact estimates and finalization of plans which could possibly be finalized Thursday night.

Roseann Sauer was elected as Election Judge and Helen Blakeway as Absentee Election Judge for the bond issue.

Apart from the construction plans the board canvassed the votes from the recent election and swore in the two newest members to the board who are Chris McCravey and Terry Green. The board then had an election to reorganize itself in which Lynn Meador retained his presidency, incumbent Ron Mittle was made vice-president and Richard Kent was selected as Secretary. Nancy Willis, the high school drama instructor appeared before the board requesting permission that her one-

act play drama class be allowed to attend the UIL finals in Austin. The board expressed their views of consent to Mrs. Willis but left the final decision to be made by the Superintendent. Ray Ballew the chief appraiser of the county tax district met with the board and discussed the collection of delinquent taxes in relationship to Tax Code Revision 3307. Motion came which stated that the method currently used to collect back taxes should be continued on and not be approved each and every year. The board also gave the high sign to Ballew that a fifteen percent collection charge should be attached to each delinquent tax collected over and beyond the taxes owed to the entity. The board then approved the transfer of two students and moved directly into approving a resolution requesting continued state funding for vocational programs within the school district.

The board then retired into executive session to discuss personnel and real property.

# Area towns receive rebates from Bullock

State Comptroller Bob Bullock warned against drawing conclusions about the Texas economy based on one month's rebate figure but added that April's rebate payments were "in line with our projections for the state."

He sent out \$48.9 million to Texas cities this past week for sales made in February and reported in March.

Mertzton is showing a large 48.39% increase in their payments over last year. Their check for this period totaled \$5,057.95 as compared to \$3,409.70 last year at the same time. This brings their 1985 total to \$24,189.77.

Eldorado wasn't quite as industrious. They show a decrease of 2.24% from last year. Their latest payment came to \$2,530.22. Last year at the same time the city

received \$4,037.44. The 1985 total for Eldorado now comes to \$16,100.99 whereas last year's total to date was \$16,469.52.

Sonora shows a 20.32% increase over last year with their latest check of \$18,651.04. Last year's payment for the same period was \$10,395.32. The latest payment brings their 1985 total to \$80,982.57 as compared to 1984's total to date of \$67,305.14.

Menard is showing an unusual downward trend with a decrease of 16.24%. Their last year's check at the same time was for \$2,953.46. The 1985 payments to date now total \$11,354.28. For 1984 their payments to date totaled \$13,554.97.

San Angelo is showing a 6.55% increase over this time last year with their most recent check of \$285,138.83. Which brings their 1985 payments to \$1,653,039.90.

# Explosion takes man's life Sunday

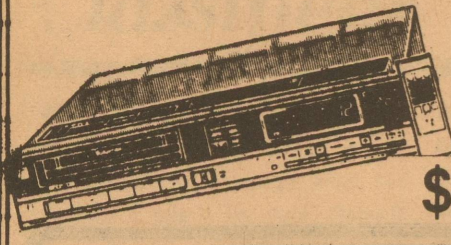


Tragedy struck on Spring Creek last Sunday when Mertzton's Fire and Sheriff's Departments were called to the scene of a trailer that apparently blew up.

At 3:30p.m., the trailer, located a quarter mile east of Hwy. 67 and State 71, blew up killing Jimmy D. Young, 41, owner of San Angelo's Young Paint and Supply.

Speculation on the explosion by authorities say it may have been caused by a gas problem. No ruling on the death has been made yet, but sources say it could be ruled as suicide.

Sheriff Delmon West took the body to San Antonio Tuesday for an autopsy but no word on the report has been given as yet. Sheriff West said, "I don't know if the ruling of the death will be handled by the Justice of the Peace or by Judge Lindley, we'll have to wait and see."

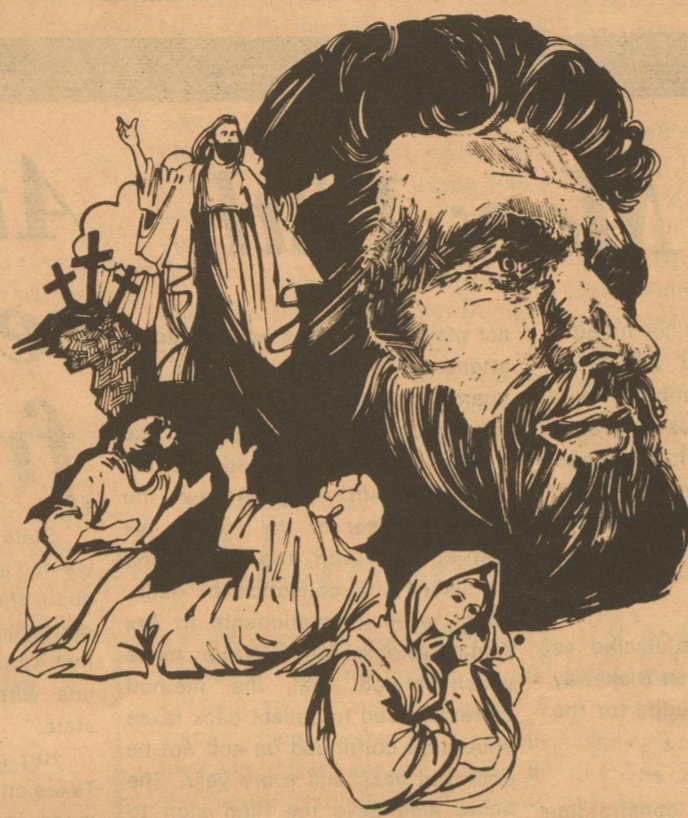

## Eden hosts Green Thumb

More than 60 Green Thumb workers and host agency sponsors from a 7-county area met Tuesday, April 16, at the Multi-Purpose Center in Eden, Texas.

The training seminar featured Mr. John Willen of the Social Security Administration with some timely information for seniors; Ms. Patricia Hohensee, Concho County Home Demonstration Agent, whose subject dealt with cooking for one; and an in-home safety program presented by Green Thumb staff.

Green Thumb, an older worker program, if funded by the Department of Labor through Title V of the Older Americans Act. Sponsored by Texas Farmers Union, Green Thumb provides part-time work opportunities for seniors in rural

areas. Program operation began in 1970 and currently includes 111 counties employing over 1,000 older Texans who are placed with local non-profit organizations to

provide needed community services.

## Have records ready when visiting SS office

At various times, you may be asked to submit evidence to Social Security to substantiate a statement you make. For example, when you apply for a Social Security number, the law requires evidence of your date of birth, identity, and United States citizenship or lawful admission status.

However, Social Security tries to be flexible in regard to the type of evidence it will accept. When proof of age is required, for example, the best evidence would be an official public record of birth. If this is not available, however, other documents may be acceptable, even if they are written in a foreign language. These include religious records, hospital records, school, census, and family re-

ords; insurance, employment, and labor union records; and military and voting records.

The same kind of flexibility is seen when a person seeks to establish proof of a marriage.

If you plan to visit a Social Security office, you may save a good deal of time by calling beforehand. It is possible to transact some business completely by phone so an office visit is not even necessary. In addition, if you must visit the office, you can learn what you need and thereby possibly avoid an extra trip.

Anyone who has questions about getting evidence should contact any Social Security Office. The people there will be glad to help.

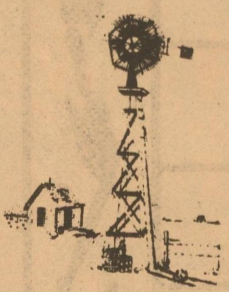

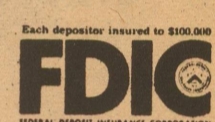

The Public Utility Commission of Texas has received the application as Docket 6200.

While proposals as to specific rates vary, it is expected that the requested rate schedule will furnish a 10.5 percent increase in the Company's unadjusted test year intrastate revenues or a 9.7% increase in test year revenues as adjusted for test year customer growth and annualization of test year rate increases. The rate application seeks an annual increase of \$323.9 million in revenues. All customers and classes of customers of Southwestern Bell Telephone Company within Texas will be affected by the proposed changes.

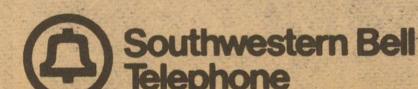

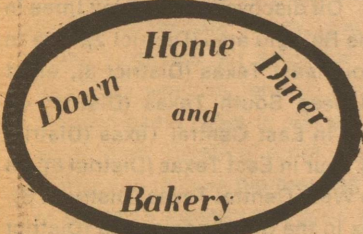

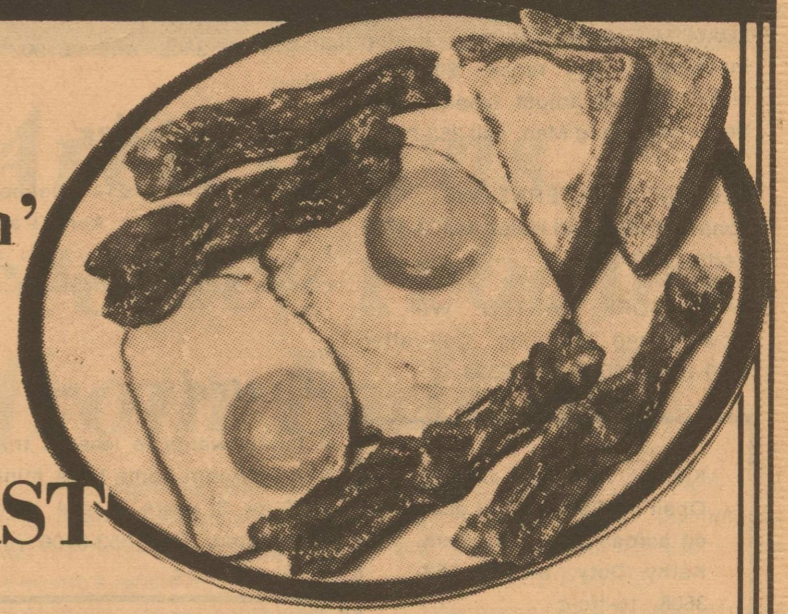


## Mertzon places in U.I.L. meet

A native of Oxford, Ms., he is the recipient of a Presidential Citation for the Development of Aids for Handicapped Persons. As an aspiring young surgical resident in 1946, Dr. Guyton was stricken with polio and, following his recovery, turned his attention from the operating room to the classroom and research laboratory. The illness left him confined to a wheelchair and his affliction soon became his triumph.

With his natural interests in mechanics, he developed a special leg brace, and a hoist for moving patients from bed or chair to bathtub. He also created a version of the still, widely-motorized wheelchair. It is for those accomplishments that he received a Presidential Citation. He has also been honored by the American Association for the Advancement of Science, the American Heart Association and the prestigious Royal College of Physicians in England.

However, the greatest legacy he will leave is in the area of medical education. He has published over 25 medical textbooks and nearly 500 articles and has trained some of the nation's foremost physi-

cians, including eight of his 10 children who have earned medical degrees.

Dr. Guyton will give a scientific lecture Monday, April 29, at 2:15 p.m. in Room 100 of the Raymond M. Cavness Science Center.

Monday's scientific lecture is entitled, "How Our Heart and Circulatory Systems are Controlled for Our Bodily Activities." The public lecture will be "Man, His Past, and His Future."

Admission to the lecture is free. The annual lectureship, established in 1976, honors long-time San Angelo physician the late Dr. Roy E. Moon, who was a member of the obstetrics-gynecology staff at Clinic Hospital, now Angelo Community Hospital.

Funding for the Moon Lectureship is provided through an annual contribution from the members of the West Texas Medical Associates.

The son of a physician and scholar, Dr. Guyton is a graduate of the University of Mississippi and of the Harvard Medical School. He served his internship at Massachusetts General Hospital and was a member of the surgical staff, National Naval Medical Center in Bethesda, Md.

He returned to the University of Mississippi in 1947 to teach courses in pharmacology and physiology and by the summer of 1948 he was chairman of the department. His lecture notes served as the basis for his "Textbook of Medical Physiology," the world's most widely-used text on the subject.

Dr. Guyton and his wife Ruth are the parents of 10 children.

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## RRC Report

Texas oil and gas operators reported 102 gas and 62 oil discoveries in March, according to Railroad Commission Chairman Buddy Temple. In February, a total of 89 gas and 51 oil discoveries were filed with the Commission. A

discovery is an exploratory well that is completed in a previously untapped reservoir.

Gas discoveries in March included six in the San Antonio area (District 1), 15 in the Refugio area (District 2), 18 in Southeast Texas (District 3), 27 in deep South Texas (District 4), five in East Central Texas (District 5), 11 in East Texas (District 6), 10 in West Central Texas (District 7B), two in the San Angelo area (District 7C), one in the Midland area (District 8), three in North Texas (District 9), and four in the Panhandle (District 10).

Oil discoveries included three in the Refugio area (District 2), five in Southeast Texas (District 3), eight in deep South Texas (District 4), two in East Central Texas (District 5), four in East Texas (District 6), 18 in West Central Texas (District 7B), six in the San Angelo area (District 7C), one in the Midland area (District 8), eight in the Lubbock area (District 8A), five in North Texas (District 9), and two in the Panhandle (District 10).

Those discoveries were included in the 1,331 oil, 447 gas, and 116 service completions operators reported in March. In February, operators filed 1,261 oil, 381 gas, and 76 service completions.

A total of 534 dry holes were reported in March, compared to 431 in February.

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
