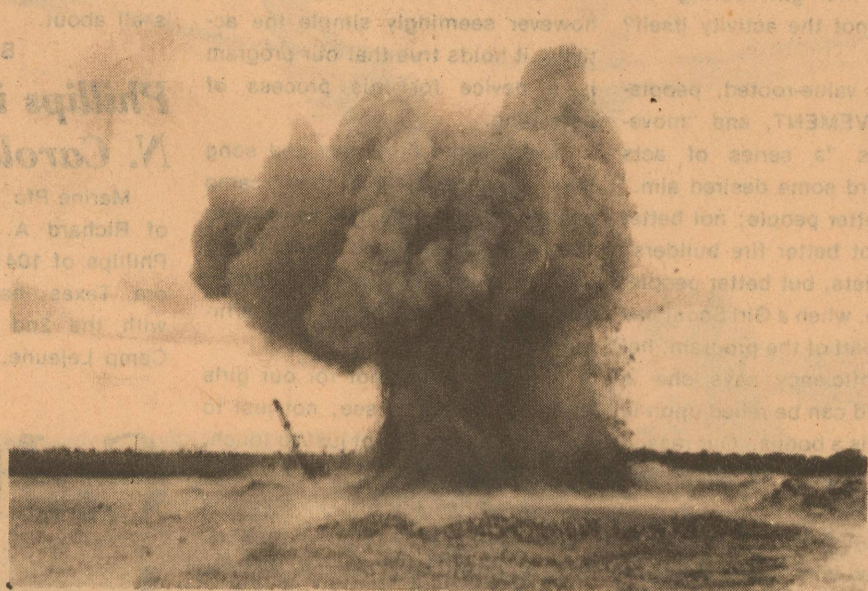


Booooooooooom!

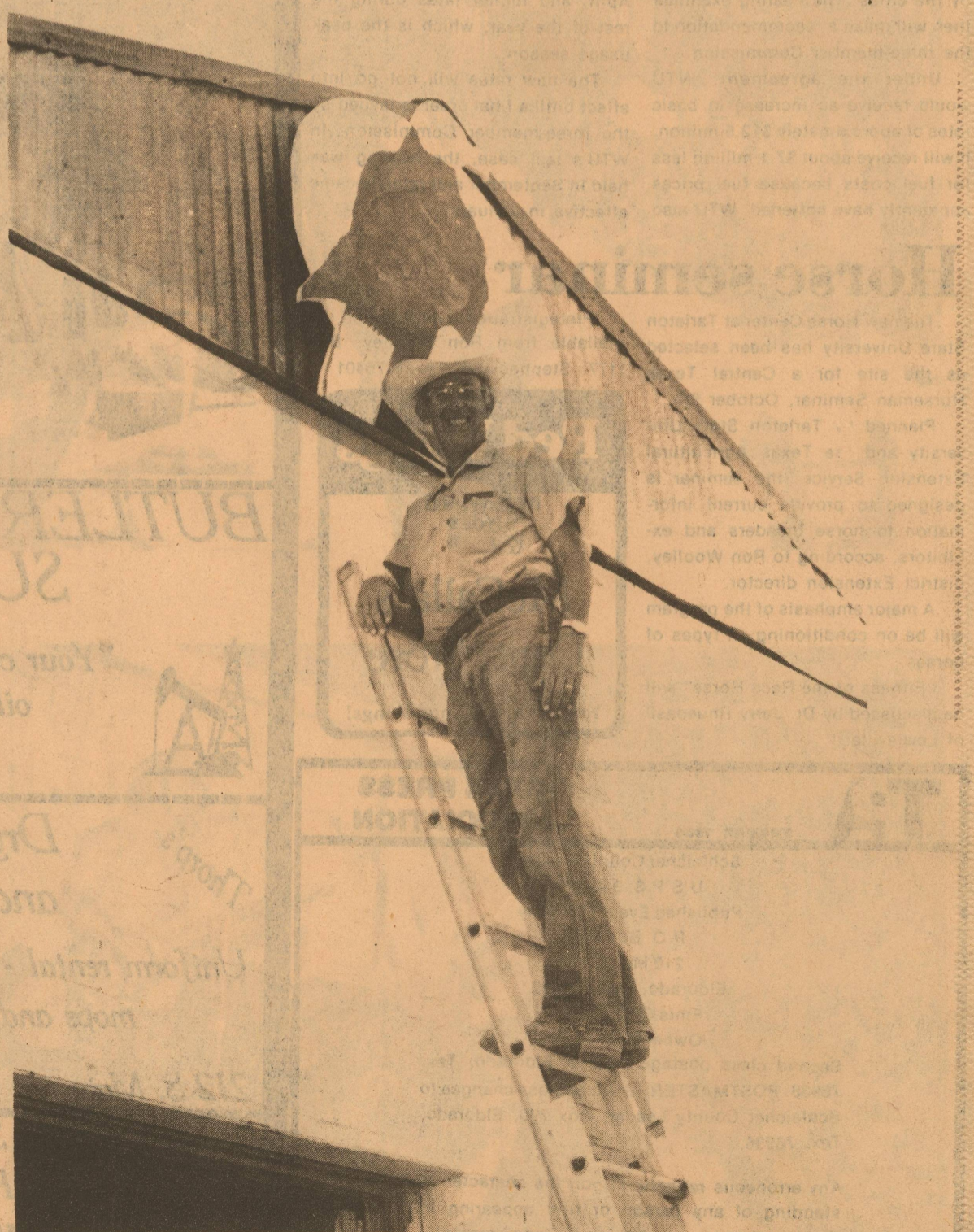

Calf Creek homecoming

The Calf Creek Homecoming will be held October 7th at the housing center 405 East Main Street in Brady.

Calf Creek was once the hub of what was a community of prosperous, religious pioneers who lived a rich, full life of service.

Calf Creek is located in the south west corner of McCulloch County and is now made up of four families: Bobby Hext, Haby, Jay Parton and J.W. Ewing. The land surrounding it now is owned by ranchers and others who live elsewhere.

The first settlers were the Delands, who came from Kansas in 1874. Then the Wilhelms who came from Germany and settled in 1878. They were followed by the John I. Jones, Willis Hueys, Espys and Wheelers. Following them were the Youngs, Putmans, Yoases, Ewings, Groves, Marbys and Millers.

In 1903 the Meltons Land Company put on a land site boom, selling off the Huey Ranch by cutting it up into farms. This brought the Attaways, Kolbs, Whitelys, Hains, Tuckers, Stapps, Karnes and Crouches.

In 1904 the Bridges, Hodges, Hazeltons, Browns, Whiteheads, Childress, Devours and Gains moved to the community and in 1907 came the Bradshaws, Barnetts and Wil-

The business portion of the meeting consisted of the reading and approval of the minutes and a report was given from those members that attended the state meeting in San Angelo.

Soon there was Presbyterian, Methodist and Baptist Churches organized.

In later years a J. W. Wren who did not believe exactly like anyone else organized his own church and named it "The Wren Church". There is no way to number the couples he married from far and near.

The first school was a one room house in the Deland pasture and taught by Miss Minnie Deland.

The Hueys gave land for a school and cemetery. The school grew to a 4 room, 4 teacher school. In 1921 until 1942 as many as one hundred pupils attended.

In 1942 the high school was sent to Brady and in 1949 the district was consolidated with Brady. The Post Office was discontinued in 1953.

The Homecoming Association was organized in 1946 by C. L. Bridge in memory of his mother and her sister, Mrs. Josie Williams and other old timers. There has been large gatherings and good times had in keeping with the descendants of the people of this typical community of our times. There is hope of another large gathering October 7th. Agreement reached

A settlement agreement providing an increase in base rates and a decrease in fuel cost charges has been reached in the West Texas Utilities Co. rate case now pending before the Public Utility Commission of Texas.

A formal hearing scheduled for this week in Austin was cancelled after WTU, the PUC staff and intervenors on behalf of several cities entered into a negotiated settlement on all issues involved in the rate case. A hearing is set for 3 p.m. Wednesday September 26 for submission of the written agreement, which must be approved and signed by the cities. The hearing examiner then will make a recommendation to the three-member Commission.

Under the agreement, WTU would receive an increase in basic rates of approximately \$12.5 million. It will receive about \$7.1 million less for fuel costs because fuel prices apparently have softened. WTU also

will refund to consumers about \$6.1 million in fuel costs over-collections during the past year, bringing the total fuel revenue reduction to roughly \$13.3 million. The refunds will be reflected in customer bills throughout the coming year.

The effects on various classes of customers depends on details of the new rate design which were being worked out by Company representatives and other interested parties. A new feature for WTU rates will be a summer-winter differential for residential and commercial customers. This will establish lower rates during the winter period, November through April, and higher rates during the rest of the year, which is the peak usage season.

The new rates will not go into effect until a final order is issued by the three-member Commission. In WTU's last case, the hearing was held in September and rates became effective in January.

Planned by Tarleton State University and the Texas Agricultural Extension Service the seminar is designed to provide current information to horse breeders and exhibitors, according to Ron Woolley, district Extension director.

A major emphasis of the program will be on conditioning all types of horses.

"Fitness of the Race Horse" will be discussed by Dr. Jerry Rhuedasil of Lewisville.

Ram Performance Test Oct. 1st.

A Ram Performance Test is scheduled to be conducted at the Texas Agricultural Experiment Station at Sonora according to Dr. Maurice Shelton, San Angelo based Professor and test coordinator.

The delivery date for Rambouillet rams going on test is set for October 1 - 3.

The rams will be examined by a committee in the period between delivery and the first official weigh day which has not yet been set. A note will be made of any animals thought to be unsound and breeders will be given an opportunity, but will not be required, to remove these rams before the initial weigh day. "During this period, breeders may elect to remove animals based on their own initiative," said Shelton. "After this, the breeders are requested to leave the rams on test except for reasons of health as determined by Station personnel."

The rams will be self-fed a commercially prepared and pelleted ration. Breeders will be responsible for the costs involved in the test including any veterinary costs incurred.

According to Shelton, the test is open to all breeds, and registration is not a requirement. However, the testing program is primarily designed for Finewool sheep. Only registered Rambouillet rams born after October 1, 1983 are eligible for the American Rambouillet Sheep

Breeders' Association Registry of Merit Program.

Breeders are asked to provide as much information as possible concerning their rams such as sire, birth date, age of ram and type of birth.

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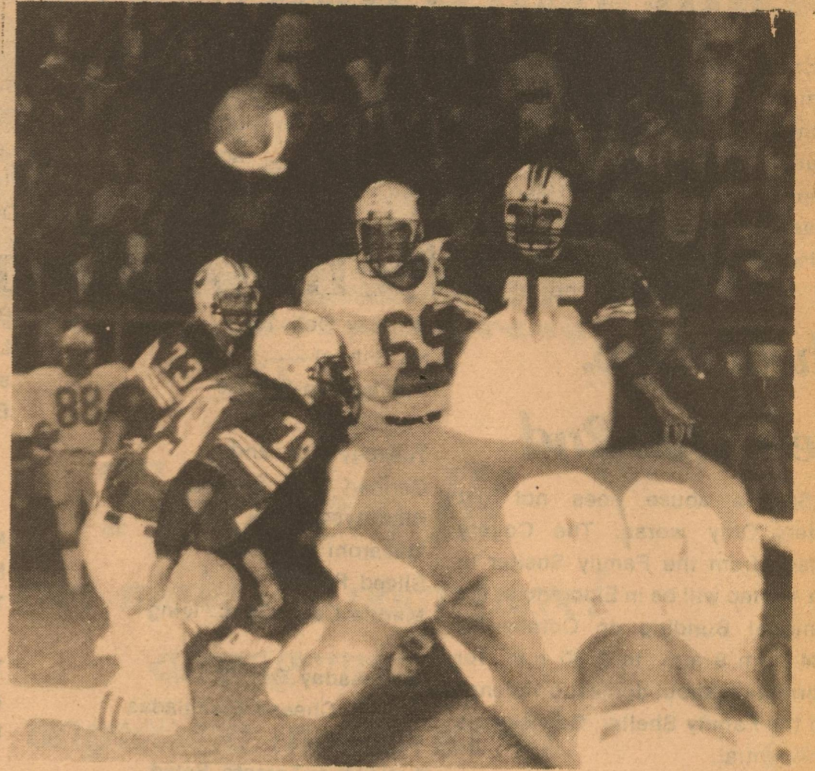
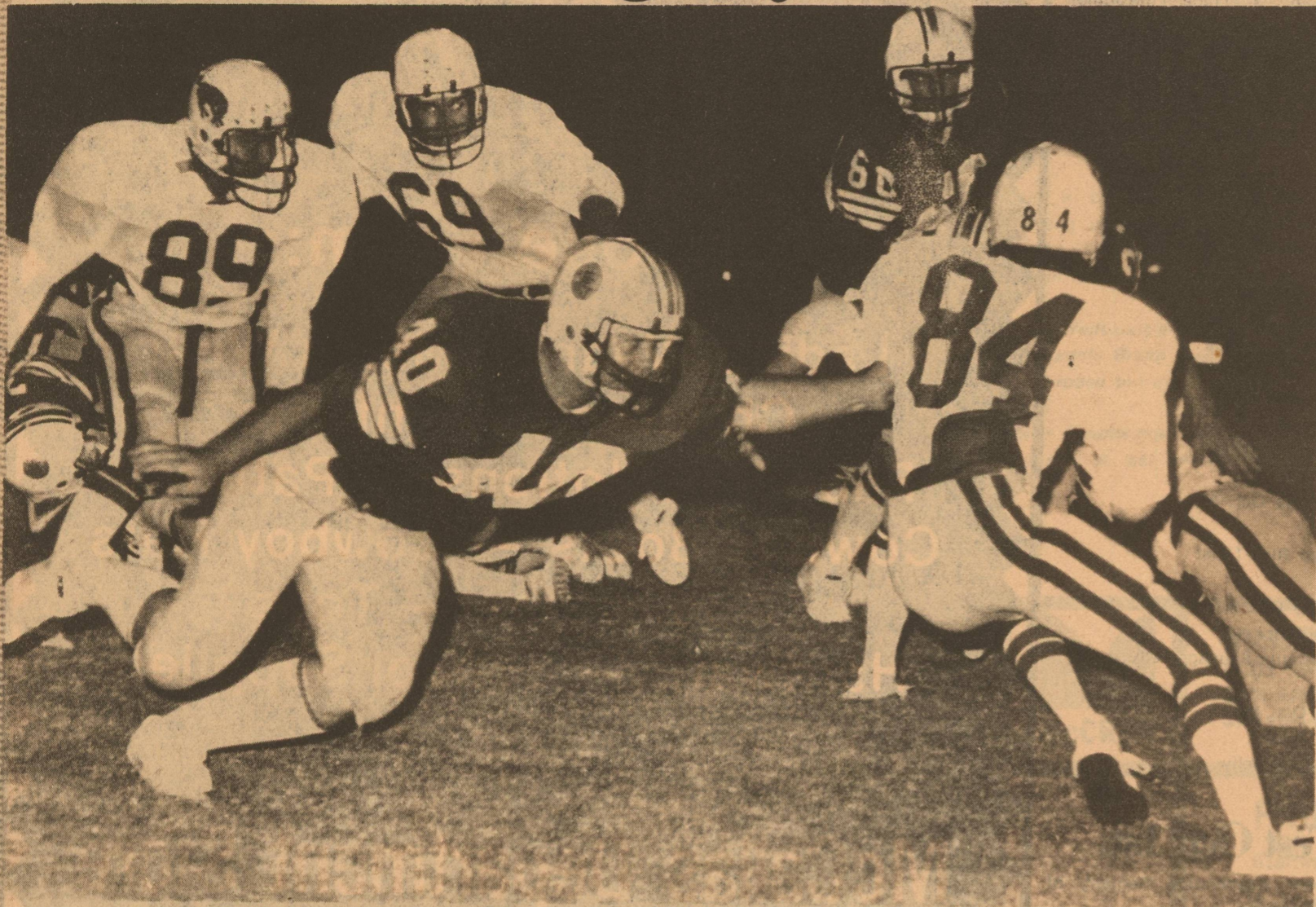

Eagles fall to Sonora

Errors set the rhythm here last Friday night as the Eagles fell short for the second consecutive year facing their ancient rival, Sonora. The packed stands witnessed three Bronco interceptions setting up their victory of 33-14.

Coach Mitchel cited mental mistakes in the game against Sonora. Eldorado's defense always managed to present a strong obstacle to the Broncos particularly in their end zone but the Eagles' air game just wasn't as effective against the Broncos as it had been against their two previous opponents.

The notoriously hard fought game between the Eagles and the Broncos saw only one injury this time. Quarterback Tim McAngus suffered a mild concussion and will not see play against Menard Friday. The shot that McAngus took drew a penalty for the Broncos.

James Harlin was responsible for Eldorado's first score early in the first quarter completing a drive with a six yard dash over the goal line. Victor Gutierrez came back in for the extra point. Eldorado's only other score was late in the third quarter

when Ron Mittel received a pass from James Harlin Gutierrez once again put it through the uprights.

Mike Moore racked up the majority of yards rushing earning 45 out of seven attempts and Jay O'Harrow accumulated the most yardage in pass reception earning 18 yards for two efforts. John R. Griffin brought the football back twice on the kick-off return for a grand total of 65 yards gained which places him with a grand total of 107 yards on kick-off returns for the three games played this year.

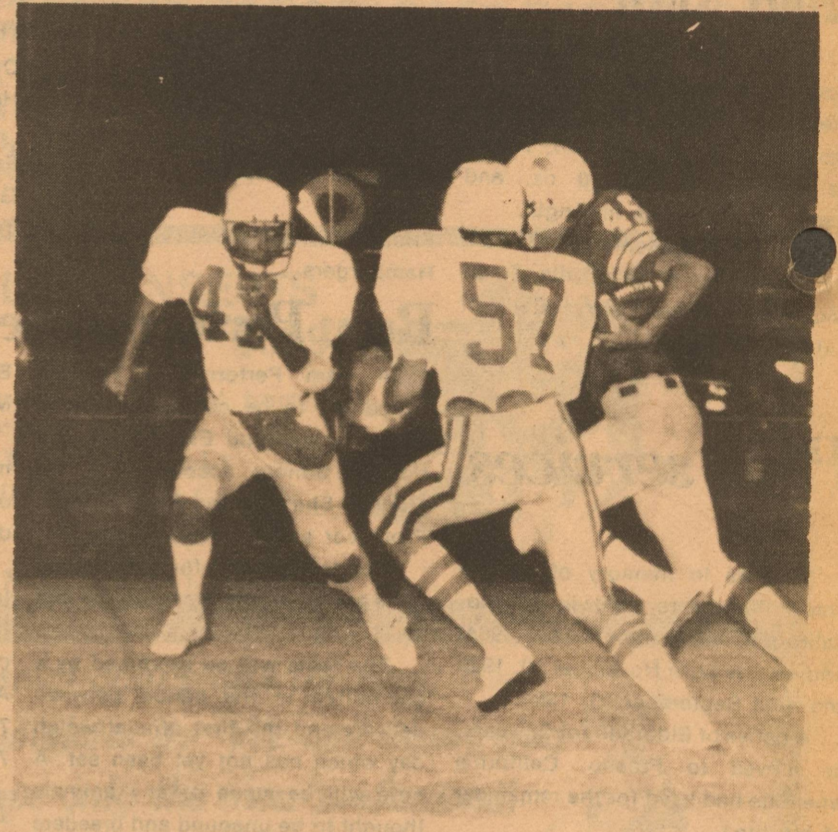
The Eagles have completed 44.2% of all the passes thrown this year for a grand total yardage of 321 whereas their rushing yardage accumulated for the year is 531 yards. The Eagles have accumulated 142 yards in penalties and have scratched up nine fumbles lost for the year.

Head Coach Mitchel said the upcoming contest against Menard would be a real tough football game the Eagles need to win in order to retain their confidence. The Yellow-jackets could be the toughest team that Eldorado faces before the district play.

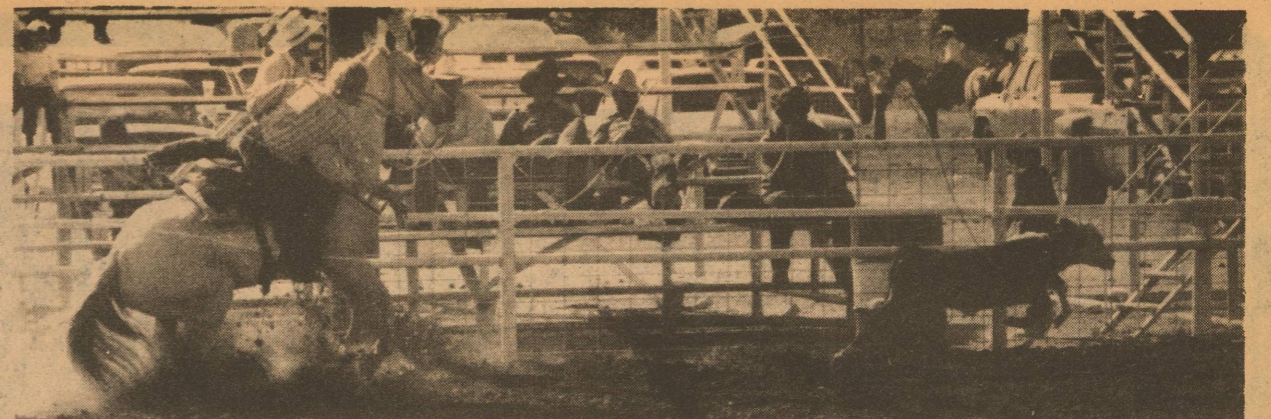

will host a rodeo here December 1 - 2, produced by Rough Trade Rodeo Co. of Eldorado.
