New speed limit

Newly elected City Councilmen Richard Mendez and John Nikolauk and re-elected Mayor Bob Lester were administered their oaths of office during Monday night's City Council meeting. The votes from the April 6th election were canvassed by the Council and were declared as official.

Secretary Carolyn Mayo reported to the Council that the Texas Highway Department traffic control personnel had presented a revised speed limit strip along Hwy. 190 east. The revision will extend the 35 mph zone by approximately 150 ft. The 45 mph zone was extended approximately 2200 ft. to the east city limits. The State has revised their maps on the city limits line on the east to show the line at the abandoned railroad right of way which will account for the elimination of the 55 mph zone within the city limits (the major reason for requesting a revision due to the number of accidents in that area). The speed limits going west from the city limits will be: 45 mph zone extended by 2200 ft. and extending the 35 mph zone by approximately 300 ft. The council approved the revision and after a discussion the ordinance was also approved.

Superintendent Long reported to the Council of an incident of toxic waste dumping at the landfill and his ensuing investigation. He then discussed streetpaving, lot clean-up, and other long range projects. Discussions were also held concerning mapping needs and ordinance enforcement needs. He and Mayo are to prepare a proposal to the Council of capital improvements plan setting priorities for the Council's review and adoption at a future meeting. Mayo also informed the Council at this time that she had not released any further payments to Pine Tree as of this meeting time.

Long also presented his monthly report of the council and requested that they pay Texas Water Utilities Association dues for Juan Arispe, Porfirio Arispe and Samuel Santelano. The Council approved the request and also voted to reimburse Long for his membership dues.

The Council approved the payment of \$173,298.90 concerning Anglin Construction after revisions by Ray Longoria of Freese & Nichols.

J.D. Tuck of GTE met with the council to discuss any questions or problems they might have with General Telephone.

The monthly report from Eagles' Point was presented to the City Council and after discussion they agreed to pay the teen center \$1,500.00.

The Jaws-of-Life was discussed by the Council but any action was tabled until some questions could be answered by a fire department representative.

The Council agreed to pay the county \$1.00 for the self propelled broom.

Secretary Mayo reported to the Council a proposal from 3-M copiers for a plain paper copier. She was instructed to pursue additional proposals.

In other business, the Council agreed to pay 20 cents per mile when city personnel go to educational seminars and meetings and use their own vehicles; initialled the March tax report; heard Secretary Mayo bring them up to date on her efforts to obtain liability insurance coverage; reviewed status reports on the bond funds showing interest earned, disbursements to date and investments and cash on hand; and approved minutes of the March 12th and 27th meetings.

Trustees meet in Mertzson

The Irion County School Board of Trustees met Tuesday night for their regularly scheduled session. The first topic following the paying of the bills and the reading of the previous minutes was the canvassing of the recent election. No discrepancies of the canvass were found by the board members and the board focused its attention on the restructuring of the board itself. All officers retained their position from the previous year and the board

addressed the next subject on the agenda. Superintendent Denman outlined for the board members the administration plans for construction and upkeep of the plant during the summer and the board approved the administration's recommendations for hiring of auxiliary personnel.

The board reviewed the 1985-86 school year calendar and set it for approval at the next scheduled meeting. The next topic they ad-

ressed themselves to was to discuss how the district should handle teacher transfer students, both incoming and outgoing. The next topic on the agenda led to another lengthy discussion concerning the gifted and talented segment of the student population. The administrators plan is expected at the next board meeting. Following a short review of regular school business, the board adjourned until next month.

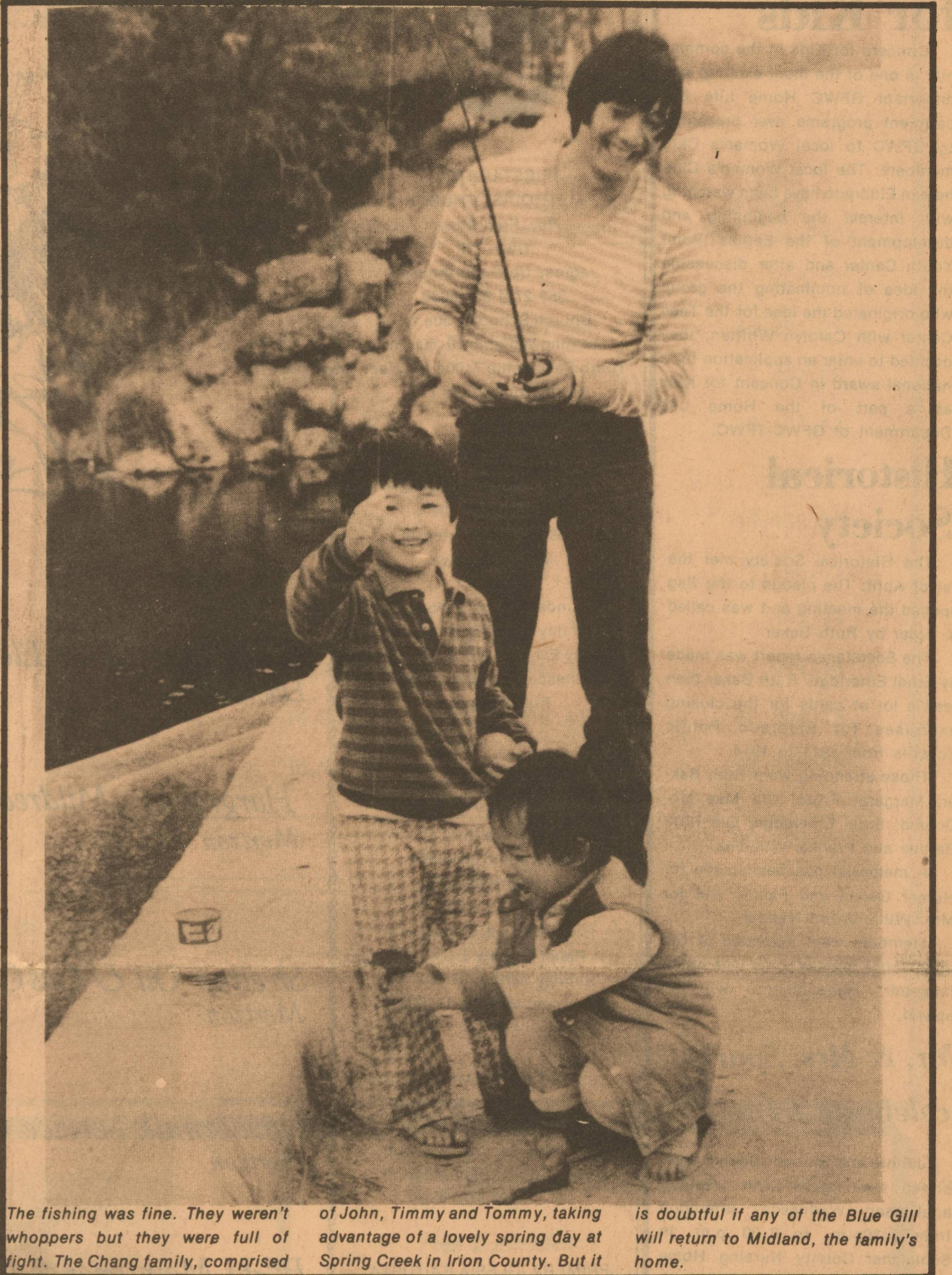
New Center administrator

Schleicher County Medical Center Board of Directors collected Jack Black, a sixteen year veteran of Nursing Home administration as the new Administrator for the Medical Center. Light turn out everywhere

Area elections are now just a memory but for the newly elected officials, their jobs are just now beginning. Some are "old hands" at the positions, others will be serving on the respective boards for the first time. Public apathy was again apparent due to not only the few candidates but to the low voter turnout in general.

In the Schleicher County Independent School District Board of Trustees' election, incumbent Ronnie Mittel garnered 98 votes, as did William Chris McCravey, and Mrs. Terry Green received 91 votes. Irion County School Board saw incumbents Pon Laudermilk, Lawrence Dannheim being re-elected along with new member Peggy Thomas.

The Eldorado City Council will see two new councilmen: John Nikolauk who received 68 votes and Richard Mendez who tallied 65 votes, taking their positions soon. Incumbent Mayor Bob Lester, running unopposed received 74 votes to serve another term.

In Mertzson incumbent Mayor John Nicholson was re-elected as were Councilmen Vicente O. Fuentes and Neta Jurecek.

The Schleicher County Hospital Board re-elected incumbents William Edmiston with (unofficial numbers) 94 votes, Pam White 89 votes and Penny Bland with 92.

In the Water District Elections, Ray Willoughby, Jr. of Precinct 1 received 35 votes and Earl Lloyd of Precinct 3 received 31 votes. Richard Preston received one write in vote.

County bosses meet for session

The County Commissioners of Schleicher County met Monday morning where they took care of the county's business in record time.

Repair to the duct work of the courthouse air conditioner was okayed by the commissioners.

Jeri Whitten, Librarian is now a county employee. She will still work under the guidance of the Library Board but will be considered a county employee.

Carrol Greën and De Lux of the Soil Conservation Service met with

the commissioners to request permission to borrow the county's new matic roller to use in a grass seed test. The commissioners granted permission to use the equipment.

The commissioners voted to advertise for bids on a new pickup for county extension agent Jerry Swift and also for a water truck for the county road department. Bids will be opened on April 22.

The commissioners then adjourned their meeting.

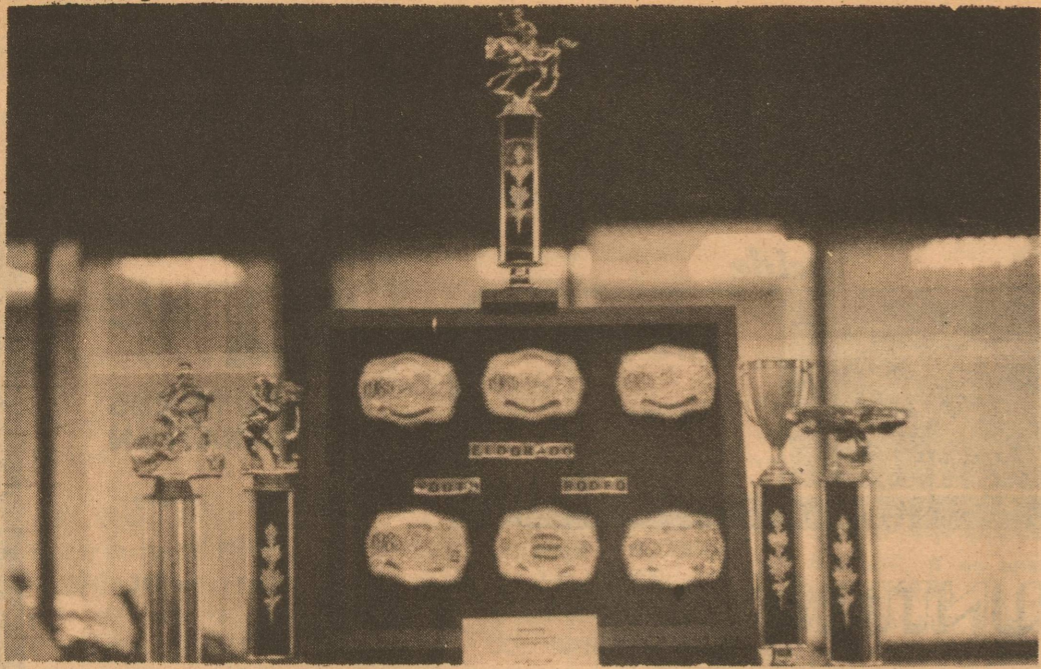

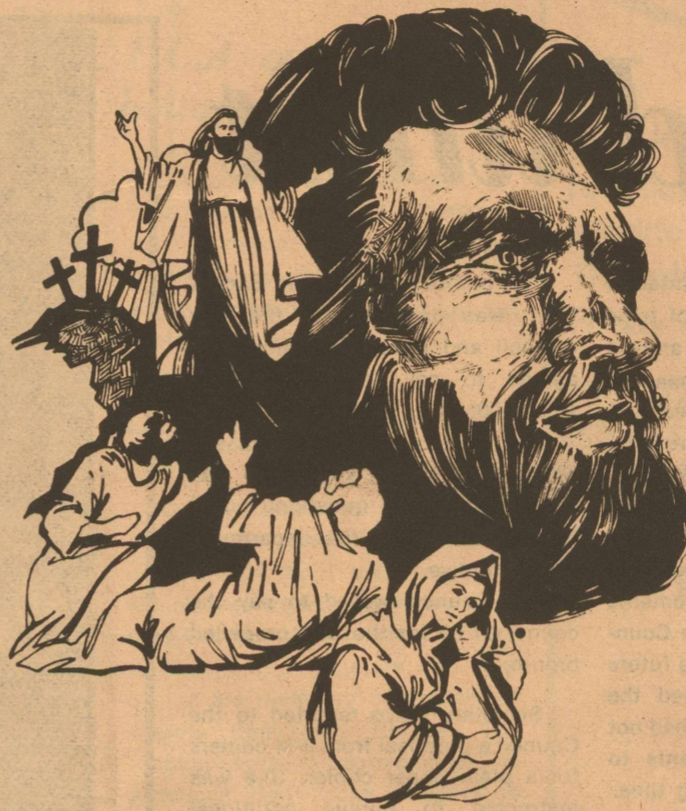

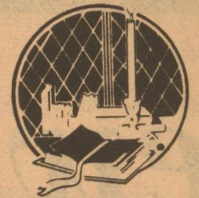

Don't take phone off

The telephone has been ringing off the wall. You decide to take the telephone off the hook so you won't be disturbed. You could cause telephone service problems without knowing it, or interrupt your own telephone service.

When you lift the receiver from its base, telephone equipment in GTE's central office provides a dial tone. If you take your receiver off the hook and do not complete a call, the telephone equipment is tied up for as long as the receiver is off the hook.

"Telephone switching equipment is designed to handle average calling levels," said E.O. Cambern, General Manager for General Telephone's West Texas Division. "This means that all customers cannot have a dial tone at the same time. So when you take your phone off the hook, you may be preventing someone else from getting a dial tone."

Some electronic switching equipment in GTE's central offices is

designed to put an off-the-hook telephone out of service. This is to prevent tying up dial tone equipment.

Cambren added, "If your telephone has been left off the hook, you should replace it immediately. Then, lift the receiver to see if there is a dial tone. If dial tone has not been restored in a reasonable time period, you should contact Repair to reinstate service."

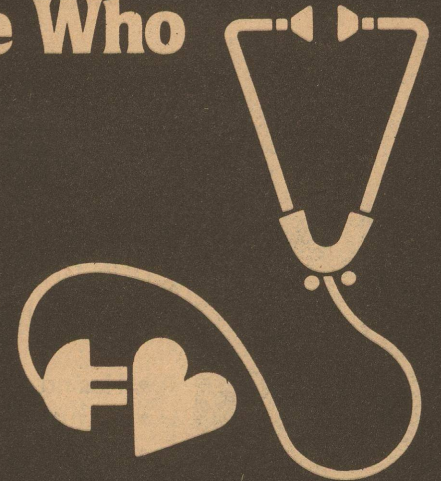

Southwestern Bell Telephone Company, in accordance with the rules of the Public Utility Commission of Texas, hereby gives notice of the Company's intent to implement a new schedule of telephone rates in Texas, effective May 6, 1985, unless otherwise determined by the Commission. The Public Utility Commission of Texas has received the application as Docket 6200.

While proposals as to specific rates vary, it is expected that the requested rate schedule will furnish a 10.5 percent increase in the Company's unadjusted test year intrastate revenues or a 9.7% increase in test year revenues as adjusted for test year customer growth and annualization of test year rate increases. The rate application seeks an annual increase of \$323.9 million in revenues. All customers and classes of customers of Southwestern Bell Telephone Company within Texas will be affected by the proposed changes.

Most rates proposed for increase would increase by about 18.5 percent, including local exchange rates. However, there are some exceptions. For example, those customers residing in cities that will be reclassified into larger rate groups will experience local exchange rate increases greater than 18.5 percent. Also, the rate increases proposed for private line services in El Paso, due to a proposal to restructure such rates, are greater than 18.5 percent.

A complete copy of the new rate schedule is on file with the Public Utility Commission at Austin, Texas and with each affected incorporated municipality served by Southwestern Bell Telephone Company. The Commission staff has contended in the past that all rates are subject to change as a result of Southwestern Bell Telephone Company's rate application. This filing includes, but is not limited to, proposals to increase rates for local exchange service, intraLATA long distance, intra-LATA interexchange private line service (which includes foreign exchange service) and to decrease certain access service rates.

Notice to Customers of Other Telephone Companies

This filing includes, but is not limited to, proposals to increase rates for intraLATA long distance and for intraLATA, interexchange private line service (which includes foreign exchange service) and to decrease certain access service rates. Changes in such rates would also affect customers of other telephone companies because such companies provide certain services in accordance with rates specified in Southwestern Bell Telephone Company's tariffs.

Notice to All Customers Concerning Access Charges and Certain New Service Charges

Southwestern Bell Telephone Company, as a part of this filing, is also proposing to reduce certain access rates charged such customers as AT&T Communications, Inc., MCI and other carriers. The resulting reduction in revenues is proposed to be offset by revenues from two new service charges, late payment charges applicable to business customers only and for certain operator services such as busy line verification, plus stimulation of access service charge revenues. Since this portion of the filing, if granted, would have essentially a zero net revenue effect on Southwestern Bell Telephone Company, Southwestern Bell Telephone Company is proposing that this portion of the filing be expeditiously handled by the Commission and not await Final Order.



MAY LOWER YOUR PROPERTY TAXES

The Texas Property Tax Code provides a form of tax relief for farmers and ranchers. If you qualify, your agricultural land will be taxed on its productive value rather than its market value. Productivity valuation may lower the 1985 taxes on your agricultural or open-space land.

If your land has never received open-space (1-d-1) valuation, or if your land has been receiving agricultural (1-d) valuation, you must apply to the appraisal district office before May 1 this year to get tax relief for 1985.

If your land received open-space (1-d-1) valuation in 1984, you will not need to reapply for 1985 unless required by the chief appraiser. Remember, however, that the law requires annual applications for agricultural (1-d) valuation.

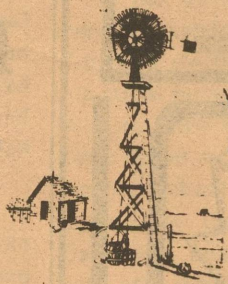
