## School Board meets new Superintendent

July 1st begins the term of Paul Gothard as the new Irion County Superintendent. Gothard brings 26 years of experience with him. He is currently the Superintendent for Highland I.S.D. Forty nine year old Gothard graduated O'Brien High School. He received his B.A. in Science and his Masters from McMurray College, and has a Superintendent Certificate from ACU. He began his career as a basketball coach and math teacher at Blackwell, then moved on to Rotan for those same positions. Gothard has been at Highland the last 21 years, 16 or 17 of them as the Superintendent. He accepted the position at Mertz on because of the

small school appeal, and the ranch country. Gothard stated he had heard some very good and promising things about Irion County.

The Administrator is married to his wife of 22 years Kay, and they have two children. Their sons are Courtney, a senior this year who plans attending ASU, and Brandy, a freshman Kay is looking forward to the move and expects to reside in Mertz on around the third week of June. Gothard stated, "We have already met some really nice people here and I'm impressed with their attitude about the school." His favorite hobbies include wood working, gardening and fishing. "Cattfish is my best subject," he said.

## Schleicher County School Board re-hires Teachers Aides and Secretaries

In the regular session Monday night of the Schleicher County I.S.D. Board of Trustees Meeting, the board voted to re-hire all teachers aides and secretaries for the upcoming school year of 85-86.

The board heard Dennis Utley, science teacher and High School Principal Richard McCarson present the program on the weighted graded system for graduating Seniors. After a discussion the board wanted additional information on how it will affect one or more classes but the board came to no decision on the matter.

Due to the absence of Gary Donaldson, architect for the proposed middle school, the board rescheduled a special meeting with Donaldson for March 18th.

Bids were opened by the board for a vehicle for school activities. The bid was awarded to Mustang Chevrolet for a station wagon at a price of \$11,045.00.

The Textbook Committee presented their report to the board. The

board approved the committee's recommendations. The textbooks approved were for math and science for Elementary, computer textbooks and Junior High and High School science books.

Clerks for the April 6th Trustee Election were named. They are Lynn Holsey, Rosanna Sauer and Connie Martinez.

The board approved a request from a transfer student to graduate from Eldorado High School.

In a discussion of the calendar for 85-86 the board requested a full week known as Spring Break to be held during the last week in February. The administration would then develop their calendar around the break.

Other business conducted by the board included the casting of their ballot for Director of Region XV. They also advised Principal McCarson to continue the study on the cheerleading policy and to bring his recommendations to the next meeting. The board then paid the maintenance bills and adjourned.

## Mertz on Council says no vote for unincorporation referendum

The Mertz on City Council met in a regular session Wednesday, March 6th.

Elton Gene Davis approved the bills, and all City Council members filed for the renewal of their terms on the Council. On the April 6th

election there will be no vote to unincorporate the city of Mertz on. The petition did not receive the required amount of signatures, and that topic may again go into circulation in 2 years, but nothing is definite yet.

## Eldorado City Council hears update on the C.D.B.G. project

The City Council of Eldorado met Tuesday night March 12th for their regular meeting during which they were brought up to date on the C.D.B.G. project by Ray Longoria. He stated that power was still needed at the sewer lift station and when that was completed, the testing would be done and a final "walk through" inspection could be held. He stated that he expected the first pond to be filled within 2-3 weeks and he could make his final verification on approximately March 25.

Secretary Carolyn Mayo reported that an application was being prepared to submit to H.U.D. concerning using the remaining money from the C.D.B.G. for paving

improvements in the Christian Addition.

Gary Harris with Parkhill, Smith and Cooper met with the Council informing them on various funding programs such as grants, low interest loans, etc. for municipal improvements. After a discussion period the Council voted to consider the possibilities further.

County Commissioner, Kerry Joy from Precinct 2 and Clay Bursleson, County Road Superintendent met with the Council concerning the possibility of the city lowering utility lines in the Orient Heights addition due to drainage problems. The Council discussed the problem but tabled it until further investigation of the costs and legal aspects could be

made. Joy also presented the city an offer for a self-propelled broom for their consideration but no action was taken.

Superintendent Long requested the Council's recommendation concerning providing water for livestock from the new sewer treatment plant. After some discussion he stated that he would contact the State Health Department officials and would arrange for a ruling and meeting with Hal Whitten who leases Mr. Christian's irrigated farmland. He reported that he would also obtain fencing estimates.

The Secretary reported that the firemen had requested consideration by the Council to assist with the expenses incurred in purchasing a

"Jaws of Life" for approximately \$5,000 total cost. After a discussion the Council voted to table the matter until further discussion could be made.

Secretary Mayo was instructed to check the prison truck for pick-up and repair concerning the repairs to the office furniture and to check prices for chairs to replace the existing couches. She was instructed to go with the best alternative on the matter.

The Council convened in executive session where they voted to allow Mario Fuentes a \$50 per month tool allowance. A request from Superintendent Long for a 3% cost of living increase was denied by the Council.

In other business the bills were approved for payment with the exception of the Paymaster bill; the February tax report was circulated for initialling; Secretary Mayo updated the Council on correspondence from T.M.L. about the General Liability Insurance premium increases; and minutes were read and approved.

## All filing closed

Election updates on the area election shows only one more candidate signing up for a seat.

Chris McCravy has announced his candidacy for a seat on the Schleicher County I.S.D. Board of Trustees.

He joins incumbent Ronnie Mittel and Mrs. Terry Green in the upcoming April 6th election for the expired terms of Mittel, Rick Sterling and a position vacated by John Nikolauk.

Other candidates in the elections, to be held are: Irion County I.S.D. - incumbents Pon Lawdermilk, Harrel James and Laurence Dannheim along with Peggy Thomas and Joe Brooks; City of Mertz on - incumbents Mayor John Nicholson, Council members Neta Jurcek and Vicente O. Fuentes; City of Eldorado - incumbent Mayor Bob Lester, Richard Mendez and John Nikolauk; Schleicher County Hospital Board - incumbents William Edmiston, Penny Bland and Pam White.

## Wings Class may spread

The Irion County School Board met Tuesday night in a regular session. Present was Mr. Paul Gothard from Highland I.S.D., and Mr. Joe Brooks who is running for the school board.

The meeting was called to order by President Wolfenbarger and Secretary Magee read the minutes and all were approved.

The Gifted and Talented Child Program, also known as the Wings Class, was one of the largest concerns. Mrs. Weaver is currently teaching this class of 5th and 6th graders. The Board wishes to expand the class to cover grades 3 through 8. Jim Coffey, representative for Region 15 Education Service Center, was present to explain the reason for the program. Coffey stated the children in these programs are provided with a higher level of learning, for kids who can and will excel consistently. They must have the potential and ability to do this. It gives the child a more challenging rate of learning. The Board listed their concerns on the matter. President Wolfenbarger stated, "The class only excels as fast as the slowest student, so the need for this program is justified." The board suggested accepting bids from teachers willing to take on the responsibility, covering more areas of learning than Language Arts, covering at least 15% of the kids to make the regulations for this program less strict for accepting students into the program, and more worthwhile for the teacher. The state does not require this program as mandatory, but board officials see it coming to that in the future. Tom Henderson and John Schuch, Principals, were asked to conduct a study for evaluation and continue this matter at the June meeting.

Livestock Show representatives Ray Clark, Jr. and Tom Estes were on hand for the committee report. Last show saw 32 exhibitors showing. Suggestions on both sides centered on a future goat and ewe show. The men want more recognition for breeders and more participation by rancher's kids. No motion was taken.

Dick Jacks was back with the new modifications on the Band uniforms. The Sol-Franks Uniform representative showed the board the elegant and formal new look of the uniform. Gary McGehee made a motion to purchase the uniforms and garment bags. All were in favor. The board then took up the matter of the Appraisal Bill and the Election Judges. The board is seeking the best avenue to take on the bill and the name of Doris Vinson was nominated and accepted for the lacking position of Election Judge. All were in favor.

The Advisory Director Committee was the next discussion, but no

nominations were accepted as of yet. The board accepted a motion called by Pon Lawdermilk to give teachers a third evaluation during the school year. 2nd by Lawrence Dannheim, and all again were in favor. The board discussed land acquisition of property adjacent to school property. No decision was made. The board heard the Annual Textbook Report and Gary McGehee called a motion, seconded by Pon Lawdermilk, to accept the books.

Bills were paid before the board called an executive session to discuss Personnel. After the regular session returned, the meeting was adjourned.

# RRC Report

Texas oil and gas operators reported 89 gas and 51 oil discoveries in February, according to Railroad Commission Chairman Buddy Temple. In January, a total of 116 gas and 68 oil discoveries were filed with the Commission. A discovery is an exploratory well that is completed in a previously untapped reservoir. Gas discoveries in February included three in the San Antonio area (District 1), 24 in the Refugio area (District 2), 10 in Southeast Texas (District 3), 37 in deep South Texas (District 4), two in East Central Texas (District 5), three in East Texas (District 6), eight in West Central Texas (District 7B), one in the Midland area (District 8), and one in the Panhandle (District 10). Oil discoveries included two in the San Antonio area (District 1), three in the Refugio area (District 2), four in Southeast Texas (District 3), six in deep South Texas (District 4), two in East Central Texas (District 5), four in East Texas (District 6), 11 in West Central Texas (District 7B), five in the San Angelo area (District

7C), one in the Midland area (District 8), two in the Lubbock area (District 8A), seven in North Texas (District 9), and four in the Panhandle (District 10). **Letter to the Editor** Noel Cowling from Dublin, Texas opened his campaign to unseat Texas Agriculture Commissioner Jim Hightower. Cowling is a family farmer who has been forced to drastically cut back his farm in the present agricultural crisis. Cowling pointed out that Hightower's idea of the family is a farm which produces only enough for that farm family and one or two more. If this is what Hightower wants our family farms will become subsistence farms and under International Monetary Fund conditionalities the United States faces a future exactly like the catastrophe of Ethiopia and Mexico. ## Texas Ranger G. Frasier speaks at Women's Club

Then in 1835 Texas General Council authorized 3 companies, 25 men in each company. The pay was \$1.25 per day with furnished horse, saddle, pistol, bedroll, rifle, knife and food for himself and his horse. The D.P.S. was organized in 1935, also Texas Rangers and Texas Highway Motor Patrol.

Frasier resides in San Angelo, is presently serving 7 counties in the Concho Valley area. He is Firearms instructor and deals principally with criminal investigation. He stated that there are no black or women Rangers.

Noweitia Briggs gave a pictorial report on the Richness of our Texas Heritage. She began with telling and showing pictures of people who first began to live in Texas 3000 years ago. She traced them through the different tribes of Indians showing their types of life through the years. She traced life in Texas through the years as it has developed land, oil and many industries to its present time when Texas will celebrate its 150th birthday in 1986 with a huge celebration of the Sesquicentennial.

Average daily production in 1984 was 2,310,115 barrels, down from 2,326,225 barrels daily in 1983 and 2,388,439 barrels daily in 1982. In December 1984, crude oil production in the state averaged 2,279,653 barrels per day, as compared to the November 1984 volume of 2,304,670 barrels per day.

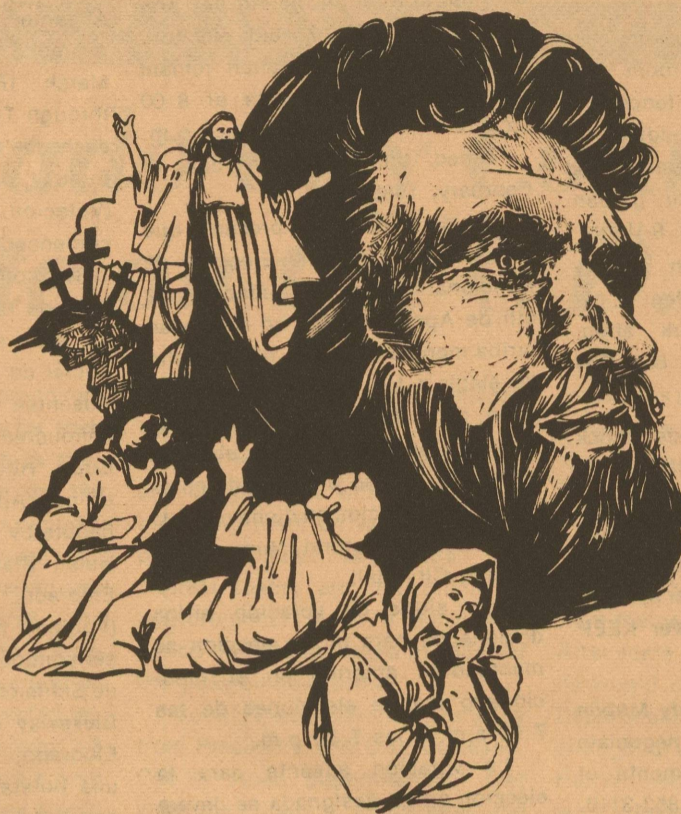

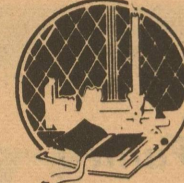
