

Cotton Insurances

June 10 is the final planting date for insured cotton in Schleicher County, Texas, according to Dottie Sampley, District Representative for the Federal Crop Insurance Corporation (FCIC)

Insured cotton planted by June 10 must be reported by June 30 in order to receive full crop insurance coverage. The acreage report reflects the actual acreage planted and reported by the farmer.

In order to provide some flexibility on planting dates, a late planting option may be exercised by farmers who find themselves unable to plant their crops on time due to adverse weather. The late planting option provides insurance coverage for the late planted crop, but at a lower

For insured farmers, "Entering into the late planting option is not automatic," Sampley said. "Farmers wishing to use the late planting option must sign an agreement prior to the final planting date in order to have coverage under the late plant-

quarantee

ing option.' "Increasingly, our insured producers are discovering that with yield guarantees which reflect production capability, crop insurance establishes a farm income floor. Thus, cash flow and the ability to repay a loan can be more accurately projected," explained Sampley.

Farmers wishing to discuss local conditions that may affect planting should contact their local, authorized crop insurance agent.

Bucks From Bob

State Comptroller Bob Bullock sent checks totaling \$58.1 million in local tax payments to the 1,003 cities that levy the one percent local sales tax.

Irion County received a payment of \$3,563.21 for this period. This brings their 1985 payments to date to \$33,727.54, which is an increase of 23.46% over last years total to date of \$27,317.97

Menard's check for this period was \$2,352.03. They are showing a 10.59% decrease in total payments to date of \$18,869.90 compared to last years of \$21,105.32.

Schleicher County shows a slight 2.75% increase over last year in total payments. They received a check for \$3,317.65 for this period. Their total payments to date are \$27,924.17 compared to last years of \$27,176.33

Sutton County's check for this period was \$8,559.45. They show a 14.54% increase in total payments to date of \$124,229.82, last year's was \$108,460.57

Tom Green County received a check for \$311,520.13 for this period. This brings their total payments to date to \$2,638,177.87. This is a 6.57% increase over last years total payments of \$1,475,474.33.

June checks represent taxes collected on sales made in April and reported to the Comptroller by May 20.

The Mias Amigas Club was organized so that those who attended school in Eldorado could keep that schoolday friendship and preserve through the crowding years the love and sentiment of our school days

Eighteen members of Mias Amigas Club met June 25, 1932 for the second annual get-together in. the J.A. Whitten home. Following the registration Thursday morning a "hub-bub" of conversation was held with talk ranging from politics to prohibition to the rearing of children. There were twenty-three members in the club.

Mr. J.B. Smith, Superintendent of Eldorado High School was the special guest for the Thursday, June 24, 1937 meeting of the Mias Amigas Club's annual get-together. The program that night was directed by "Professor Smith."

The old school bell that used to call the students to school was set in place on the courthouse lawn at the 1940 annual Mias Amigas get-together.

Special events of the 1948 Mias Amigas get-together was the getting together for the first time of all four members of the first graduating class of Eldorado High School in 1907. Those members were Dr. Clifford T. Womack, Mrs. J.A. (Pearl Bailey) Nixon, Mrs. P.L. (Minnie Strother) Gilbert, and Alvis M. Beavers. Lula Mae Womack, a class member who did not graduate that year, was also present. J.B. Smith, who came here in 1905 as the first school superintendent was also present

Topics of conversation ranged from the rain at Sonora and Del Rio to "You remember when." Popular songs in 1948 were "Red Wing" a "Juanita."


On June 28, 1952, teachers and students came from all around. Classmates of the years between 1907 and 1919. The "kids" many of them grandmothers and granddads, celebrate June-with-a-no-school now just as they did 40 summers

The 1907 graduating class and the first grade of the same year were represented. Now they call themselves "Mias Amigas" because in 1931 four former campus belles decided to keep school days more than just a memory.

On September 13, 1952, J.B. Smith, 82, formerly superintendent of schools at Ozona, Brady, Eldorado, and Christoval, died at his home.

The school job at Christoval paid \$75 per month and Mr. Smith kept books for the W.S. Crawford Grocery at that time, getting \$8 per moth in addition. This was taken out in trade.

Mr. Smith became superintendent at Eldorado in 1905.






