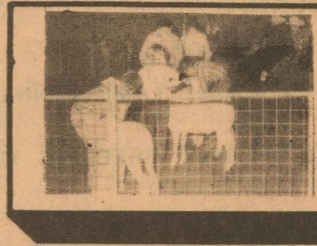

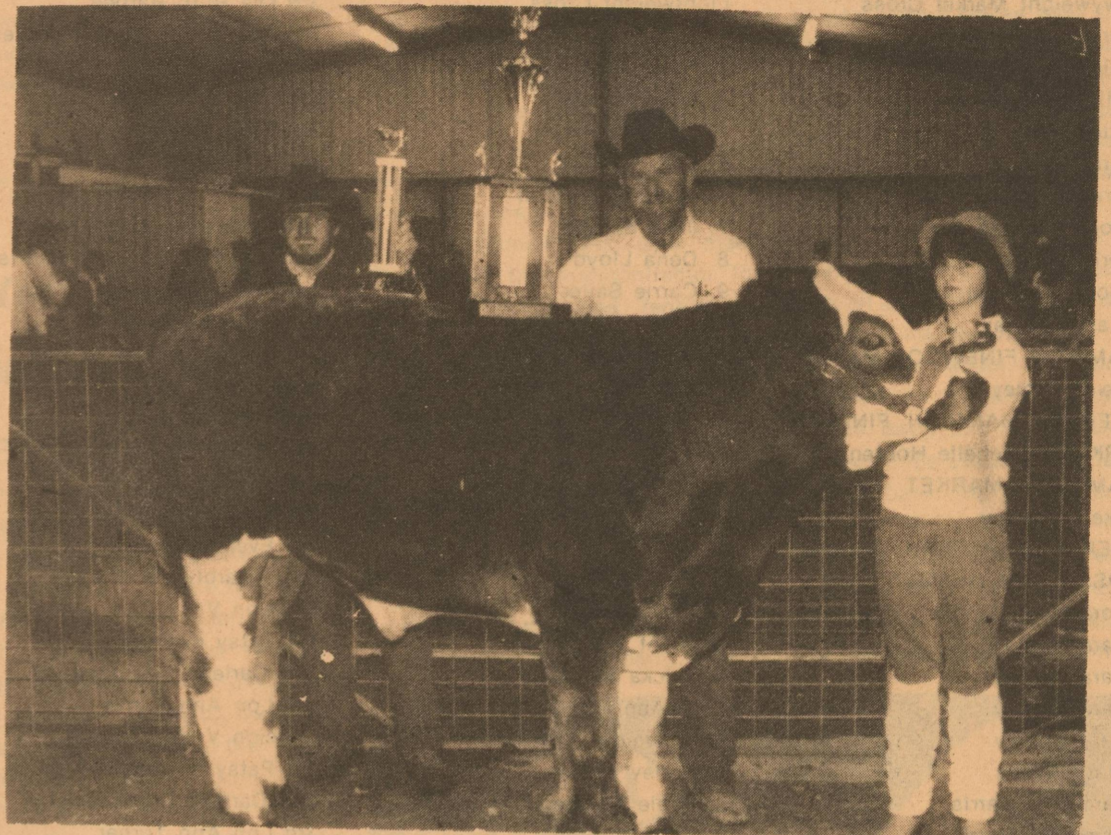
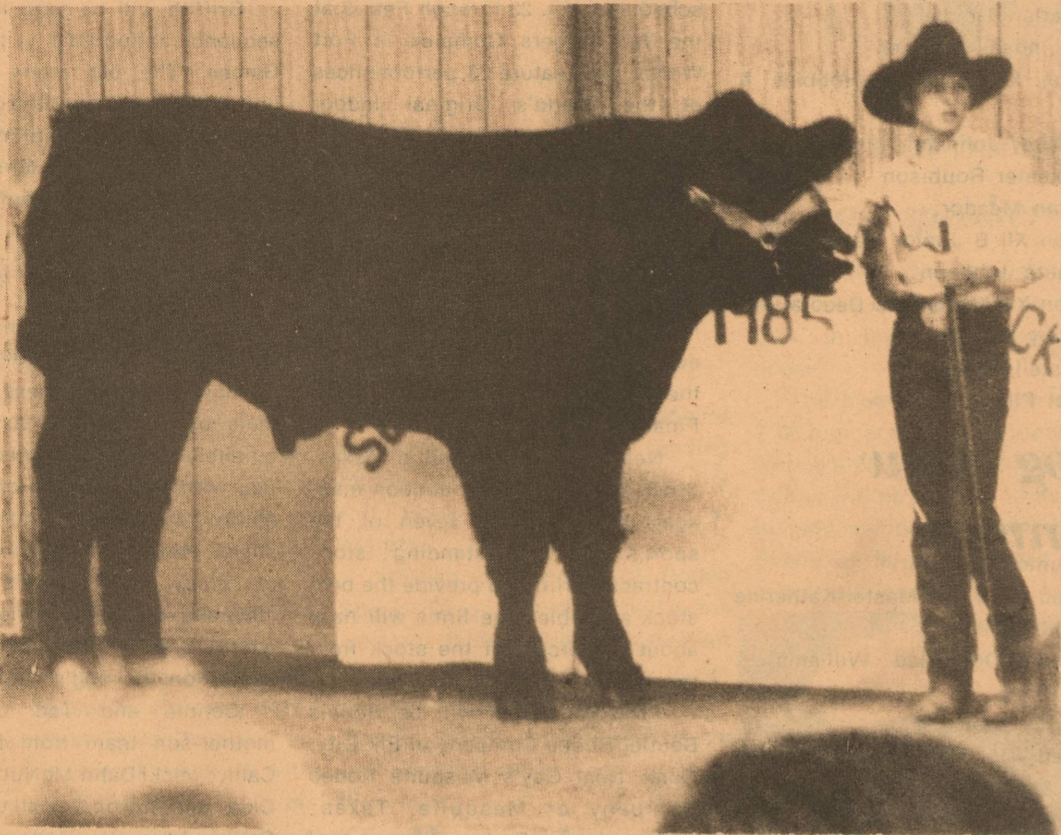

Schleicher County Commissioners agree to help with Civil Defense hospital

In a very lengthy session Monday, the Schleicher County Commissioner's Court took care of much county business.

The court agreed to pay for half the cost of three overseas containers, if the city will pay half the cost, for use as the Civil Defense emergency hospital. The current facility housing the hospital is unsuitable and is not secure against vandalism, and extreme weather conditions. If the containers are

purchased they would be set up at the new fire hall.

Mike Porter requested that a public road be made from the Farm to Market road to the Torres property as this road serves five families. The court agreed, if easements could be received from each land owner.

The court voted, with one member voting against, to have all county deed records and commissioner court records micro-filmed.

County Agent Jerry Swift re-

quested that the county purchase three additional speakers for the county's sound system, with two of the speakers to be left permanently at the rodeo arena. Com. Prissy Paxton said she would check with the Junior Rodeo Association and Com. Ross Whitten agreed to check with the Schleicher County Rodeo Association and see if each group would purchase one speaker each. The county agreed to purchase one speaker if these groups would

purchase the other two.

The commissioners agreed to do road work for a cost for Jim Cawley and Jimmie Powell.

In other business they selected a Grievance Committee, the committee is made up of the county sheriff, county clerk, county attorney, county treasurer and tax assessor plus selected members of the Grand Jury.

The Historical Committee, was reassigned by the county court with no changes in the board.

County Attorney Tom Giovannitti requested that the county purchase a typewriter for his office. His request was approved.

The court approved the 1985 Holiday Schedule for county employees. It is as follows: Good Friday - April 5, Memorial Day - May 27, July 4th, Labor Day, November 28-29 - Thanksgiving, December 24-25 - Christmas and January 1st.

Commissioners approved the purchase of a chain saw to be used in the upkeep of the courthouse grounds.

In other business they approved the transfer of funds concerning the jury and general funds; approved a quit claim deed to Jess Blaylock for a strip of land located on the old San Angelo Hwy; reviewed correspondence; heard departmental reports and paid bills.

The court also convened in executive session to discuss salaries, employees and the county's impending law suit.

Barnhart's new Fire Hall ready for action

Barnhart, in Irion County, is expecting to have its new fire hall completed by January 19th according to Fire Chief, J.D. Baker.

The 2000 sq. ft. building, constructed by Tony Verdon of Ballinger, was built with revenue sharing funds and will be serving all of the west end of Irion County. They, at present, are equipped with two fire trucks and will be on hand to help their neighbors in Schleicher, Reagan, Sterling and Crockett counties.

The new facility is located two blocks from U.S. Hwy. 67 and State Hwy. 63, and houses a kitchen, restrooms, office space and a meeting hall. A tennis court, volleyball court and basketball court plus a playground are also located at the new fire hall, which will enable the facility to also serve as a community center for Barnhart.

The Irion County Volunteer Fire Department now with the new fire hall's completion, will boast of two fire departments, one in Mertzon and

one in Barnhart. The Barnhart Station began with 10 members and now has 22 members including five women.

Officers of the Barnhart Station include Chief Baker, Assistant Fire Chief, Arthur Tarvin, Secretary Joyce Everett and Treasurer, Linda Baker.

Chief Baker told the Leader, "We're very proud of the new building. We had the annual Christmas tree in it this year and everyone was tickled to death with it."

Schleicher and Irion counties were among the "lucky" ones who received a record snowfall this past week-end. A very unusual occurrence for West Texas was the heavy blanket of snow which began falling late Friday night and continued to fall through Sunday leaving 6 inches of the pretty white stuff in Schleicher County, according to official weather observer, Pat Joiner. This left the area with around .61 inch of moisture from the snow.

Mertzon's official weather observer, Robert George, measured a three inch snow on Saturday and another five additional inches on Sunday, which converted into moisture content comes to .80 inch.

The heavy snowfall caused the area to pretty well grind to a halt, but the kids, big and small, enjoyed the days off from work and school, as witnessed by the number of snowmen seen in the towns. Looks like there is an abundance of accomplished sculptors in our midst!

Fat Stock Show

The 89th annual Southwestern Exposition and Fat Stock Show, scheduled Jan. 23 through Feb. 3 at the Will Rogers Complex in Fort Worth, will feature 23 performances of the World's Original Indoor Rodeo.

A record purse of \$248,400 this year has brought over 700 world champion cowboys and challengers into the entry list, including current all-around champion cowboy Dee Pickett of Caldwell, Idaho, all the event world champions and most all the finalists at the recent National Finals Rodeo.

Neal Gay of Mesquite, Texas, Stock Show Rodeo production manager, has lined up seven of the sport's most outstanding stock contracting firms to provide the best stock available. The firms will have about 60 percent of the stock from the NFR.

Providing stock will be Bennie Beutler Rodeo Company of Elk City, Okla.; Neal Gay's Mesquite Rodeo Company of Mesquite, Texas; James Harper Rodeo Company of Lake Charles, La.; Jim Shoulders Rodeo Company of Henryetta, Okla.; Dell Hall Rodeo Company of Tehlequah, Okla.; Ralph Morgan Rodeo Company of Lauderdale, Miss.; and Harry Vold Rodeo Company of Fowler, Colo.

Three of the most professional rodeo bull fighting clowns in the business will be in the arena to entertain and help protect the cowboys. Here for the second year in a row will be Leon Coffey of Austin, Texas, and Bobby Cook of Big Rapids, Mich. Returning after a brief absence will be Rob Smets of San Martin, Calif.

The age-old alliance of man and animal is the basis of the variety of family-style entertainment being presented during each of the 23 performances. The Fort Worth Stock Show Rodeo is unique in featuring a variety of special acts not normally found in other rodeos.

Featured will be Tad Griffith of Van Nuys, Calif., the undisputed men's World Champion of gymnastics on horseback, Tommy Lucia of Weatherford, Texas, with Zippy, the world's smallest cowpoke, and a special troupe of Championship Trick and Fancy Riding Artists

brought together especially for this year's Stock Show.

Griffith will be seen in a riding sequence dating back to the Roman Games. The big arena here will unfurl the splendor of the gala age of Rome in a thundering glimpse of the early harnessing of horse power, with the grandeur of authentic era costumes and precision horsemanship.


Lucia, long active in rodeo arenas across the North American Continent, will present a unique display of his prowess with animals by spotlighting a large, exquisitely trained British Isles sighthound with an exhibition of the dog's ability to control a flock of wild sheep. Part of the act is the presence of Zippy, the world's smallest stock saddle available. The firms will have about 60 percent of the stock from the NFR.

Connie and Tad Griffith, a mother-son team from Fan Nuys, Calif.; Micki Dahn McNutt of Stuart, Okla.; and Sutton Powell of Solvang, Calif., have traveled across the United States performing unbelievable, and seemingly impossible, equestrian gymnastics while riding their horses at full speed. The presentation is choreographed to music that depicts and enhances the mood of the emotional and memorable spectacle.

Rodeo tickets are on sale daily, including Sunday, at the box office in the lobby of Will Rogers Coliseum from 9 a.m. until 5 p.m. Tickets are priced at \$6 for 2 p.m. matinees Monday through Friday, including the new matinee on Jan. 25; \$8 for Monday through Thursday nights; and \$10 for Friday nights and all weekend performances.

School Board changes policy on election

In their regular meeting last Monday night the S.C.I.S.D. Board of Trustees discussed and passed an abbreviated schedule for the school. This schedule, required by the TEA, enables the school to correct or make-up for days lost, due to weather, etc. This is especially for high school classes since they are required to be 45 minutes long.

The board called for the Trustee Election for 1985 when the terms of Ronnie Mittel, Richard Sterling and the vacated seat of John Nikolauk will be up. They passed a policy where the person in the election earning the lowest number of votes would be given a one year term, as opposed to the normal two years.

In the area of transportation the board agreed to purchase two 47 passenger buses for next year. They also discussed the need to lease an additional car to be used in peak times of car useage, such as the spring.

The trustess discussed problems concerning the upcoming 1985-86 school calendar. Due to House Bill 72, school cannot start before September 1st and therefore the board must take this into account when planning the year. Holidays and in-service days must be worked into the schedule. Superintendent Whitaker asked for the in-pur of the

trustees concerning these questions. No decision was made at the meeting on the matter but, will be handled later after the trustees have studied it further.

They approved the centralizing of the fire alarm panel in the elementary school. The panel will be located in Mr. Moore's office and the cost to place new panels in the facility is expected to cost approximately \$3350. The new system will be installed before the new school year begins in September.

Mr. Moore, Elementary Principal and Mr. McC Carson, High School Principal, were authorized by the board to make whatever changes they deemed necessary to make the tutorial services operate more efficiently.

The Texas Association of School Boards' policies were discussed. These policies encompass all school policies, and would enable this area to have access to lawyers with expertise in school law, etc.

The board accepted the resignation of Jo Helen Kotsch, who is leaving to attend nursing school. The board has hired Leesha Albin to replace her in the capacity of an aide.

They then paid the monthly maintenance bills and adjourned the meeting.

PUBLIC NOTICE

In accordance with the Public Utility Regulatory Act and the Rules of the Public Utility Commission of Texas, AT&T Communications of the Southwest, Inc. (AT&T Communications) gives notice to all of its Texas customers that a new procedure for long distance billing was made effective on an interim basis on August 6, 1984 in Docket No. 5800.

The procedure referred to is "Rate Period Specific Billing" and it applies to all message telephone service (AT&T Long Distance calls) including non-REACH OUT Texas calls within the State of Texas. This new procedure affects all AT&T Long Distance customers. All intra-LATA long distance calls and all interstate long distance calls are currently billed using this procedure.

Under this procedure, customers are billed a specific charge for long distance calls according to the rate or rates in effect throughout the time of each call. If a call begins in one rate period and extends into a different rate period, the customer will be charged whatever rate is in effect for each portion of the call.

For example, if a customer places a call at 4:58 p.m. on a weekday and talks for ten minutes, the first two minutes of the call would be charged at the full weekday rate which extends from 8:00 a.m. to 5:00 p.m. The remaining eight minutes of the call would be billed at the evening rate which extends from 5:00 p.m. to 11:00 p.m. and includes a 25% discount. If Rate Period Specific Billing were not in effect, the entire call would have been billed at the higher day rate. Calls which extend from the evening rate period (25% discount) to the night and weekend rate period (40% discount) or from the night and weekend rate period (40% discount) to the day rate period (no discount) would also be billed according to the actual minutes of use during each rate period.

AT&T Communications anticipates a minimal increase of approximately .02% in its revenues or approximately \$250,000 annually.

A complete copy of the "Rate Period Specific Billing" tariff is on file with the Texas Public Utility Commission.

City projects' near completion says representative

In the regular meeting of the Eldorado City Council last Thursday evening, the Council was presented an update on the wastewater plant and the C.D.B.G. job by Ray Longoria of Freese & Nichols engineering firm. According to Longoria the wastewater treatment plant should be completed by the March 1st deadline. The only problems now were loose livestock in the area and he was going to check into the State's requirement for fencing the area. The C.D.B.G. job should be completed by January 31st as the job was progressing well. Damage done by blasting will be checked into by Anglin Construction.

The Council approved the purchase of a back up system for the

city's computer at an approximate cost of \$680. Secretary Carolyn Mayo was instructed to check with at least three suppliers before purchasing.

Annie Arispe met before the Council to request that Mr. and Mrs. Mike Arispe be permitted to use water from her water line to their new home temporarily. The Council agreed to the request. While on this subject the Council discussed water pressure problems and their alternatives.

Mayo reported that Cities Service had caught up to date with their billings and charts for the city after a three month lapse.

The problem with standing water in Paseo de Vaca and the drainage off of Lee Avenue and other areas were discussed.

The Council was also made aware that the sub-contractor for GTE had not made repairs as expected.

Mayo reported to the Council her findings from Blue Cross/Blue Shield and from NNG insurance concerning insurance premiums. No action was taken at the present until further investigation can be made.

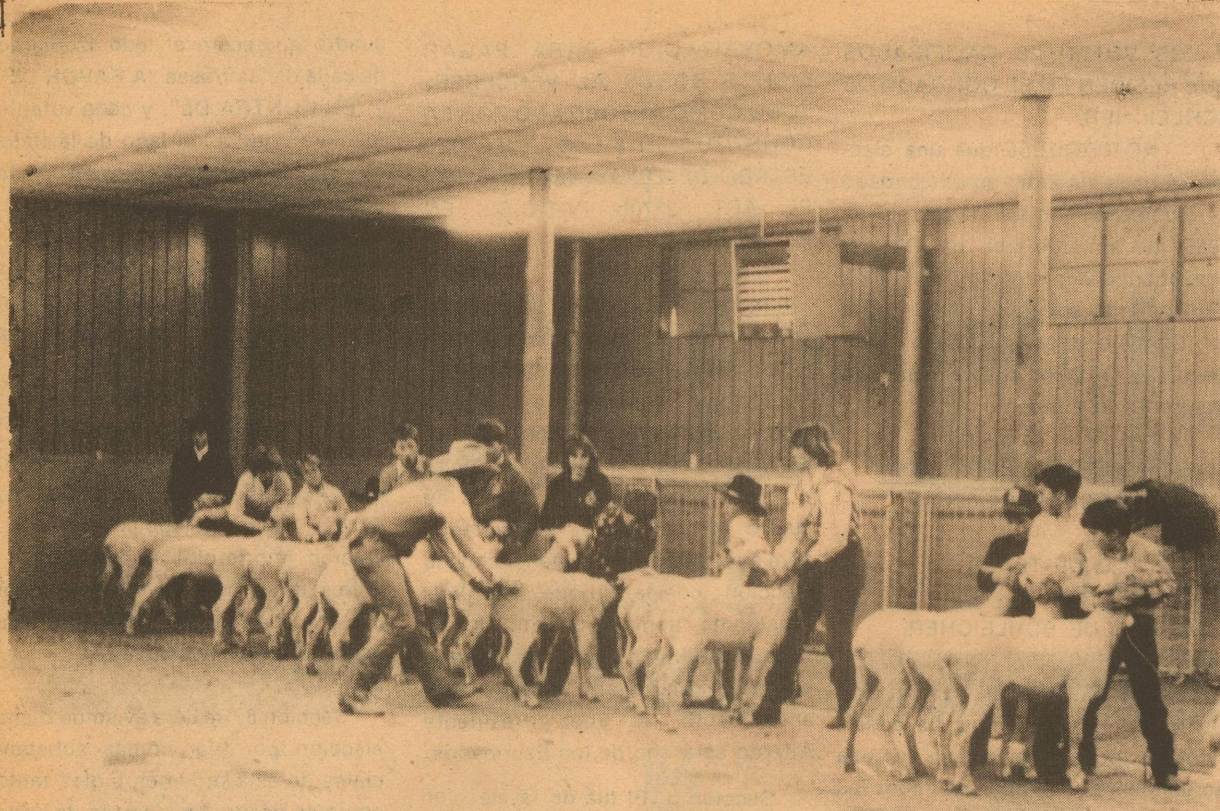
She also reported that Billy Green of Sonora had made an offer of \$250 for the 1979 3/4 ton pick-up bed stored in the city barn. After a

discussion the Council voted to accept the bid.

The Council heard a report from Mayo concerning the State Hwy. Department's study of the Menard Hwy. speed limit entering the city. They are still continuing the study of the problem.

Superintendent Clay Long reported to the Council that he was checking into a water meter repair shop as opposed to sending off or buying new meters. It was also decided by the Council to have accuracy checks run on the next load of gas meters before they are sent off for repairs or to be rebuilt. Long also reported that he planned to replace the high pressure gas line between the regulator stations as soon as warmer weather prevails. He also advised the Council that with regard to the pipe salvage operations, he would get back to them after an inventory is made of the pipe that is to be disposed.

In other action the Council reviewed an agreement with Mercantile Bank and agreed that the agreement be executed and returned to the bank for their execution; approved the payment of monthly bills with the exception of two; initiated the tax report for the month of December; and read and approved the minutes before adjourning.

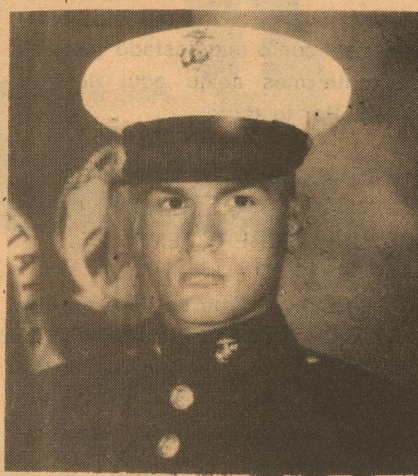

SHALL THE COMMISSIONERS COURT OF SCHLEICHER COUNTY, TEXAS, BE AUTHORIZED TO ISSUED THE BONDS OF SAID COUNTY, IN ONE OR MORE SERIES OR ISSUES, IN THE AGGREGATE PRINCIPAL AMOUNT OF \$200,000, WITH THE BONDS OF EACH SUCH SERIES OR ISSUE, RESPECTIVELY* TO MATURE, SERIALLY NOT TO EXCEED 40 YEARS FROM THEIR DATE* AND TO BE SOLD AT SUCH PRICE OR PRICES AND TO BEAR INTEREST AT SUCH RATE OR RATES AS SHALL BE DETERMINED WITHIN THE DISCRETION OF THE COMMISSIONERS COURT OF SAID COUNTY AT THE TIME OF ISSUANCE, FOR THE PURPOSE OF REMODELING AND IMPROVING THE COUNTY MEMORIAL BUILDING; AND SHALL SAID COMMISSIONERS COURT BE AUTHORIZED TO LEVY AND CAUSE TO BE ASSESSED AND COLLECTED ANNUAL AD VALOREM TAXES IN AN AMOUNT SUFFICIENT TO PAY THE ANNUAL

INTEREST ON SAID BONDS AND PROVIDE A SINKING FUND TO PAY SAID BONDS AT MATURITY; ALL AS AUTHORIZED BY THE CONSTITUTION AND LAWS OF THE STATE OF TEXAS, INCLUDING PARTICULARLY ART. 2370b, V.T.C.S.?

Section 2. The polling places and officers of said election shall be as set forth in Exhibit "A" attached hereto and incorporated herein by reference. Each Presiding Judge shall appoint not less than two (2) nor more than four (4) qualified Clerks to serve and assist in holding said election; provided that if the Presiding Judge herein appointed actually serves, the Alternate Presiding Judge shall be one of the Clerks.

Section 3. On election day the polls shall be open from 7:00a.m. to 7:00p.m.

Section 4. Absentee voting shall be conducted at the office of the County Clerk of said County, in accordance with the provisions of Chapter 5, V.T.C.A. Election Code. For the period absentee voting is permitted by law, the hours designated for absentee voting shall be from 8:00a.m. to 5:00p.m. on each day except Saturdays, Sundays and official State holidays.

Section 5. The official ballots for said election shall be prepared in accordance with V.A.T.S. Election Code, so as to permit the electors to vote "FOR" or "AGAINST" the aforesaid proposition, which shall be set forth substantially in the following form:

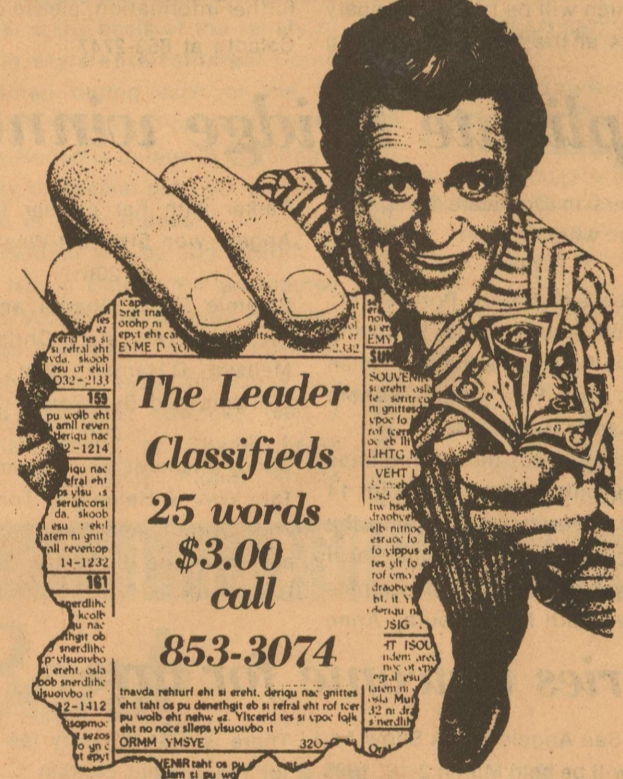
