Hospital adopts \$4.29 million budget

SCMC trustees agree to hold tax rate at 38.25¢

The Schliehcer County Hospital District board of trustees met Monday evening and adopted a \$4.2 million budget. They then took up the question of taxes and, after a brief discussion about declining taxable values, they moved to adopt the same tax rate as last year, 38.25 cents per \$100 valuation. That rate will net the hospital some \$12,000 less whan last year, but with an improving financial picture, the trustees seemed confident that the rate would be sufficient to fund operations at the hospital and nursing home for another year.

Contained in the budget is a substantial amount for capital improvements, including some \$204,000 that was earmarked for an expansion project. The trustees have long expressed a desire to add additional rooms to the nursing home since the facility is routinely full. Other items listed in the capital budget include a portable x-ray machine, furniture for patient rooms and the replacement of some of the facility's existing equipment.

Board President Randy Mankin explained during the meeting that he was pleased with the budget and hoped that a portion of it would find its way into the hospital's reserves. "We've come a long way in the past two years," Mankin said, "but we still need

to rebuild our reserves." Mankin said he was also pleased that the hospital could hold the same tax rate for another year.

The budget presented to the board was the 4th draft of a document that made its way through numerous budget committee meetings. After a brief summary of the numbers, the board voted unanimously in favor of the bud-

The meeting was the regular monthly session for the board. It was called to order at 6:00 p.m. by Mankin. Board members Delia Pina, Shirley Joiner, Ricky Fuessel, J.D. Doyle, Frank Williams and Jim Martin were in attendance. Also on hand for the meeting were Hospital Administrator Sharon Dietz and Assistant Administrator Beverly Minor.

Among other business, the trustees approved the minutes of the Aug. 14 board meeting listened to the hospital Quality Assurance Report, delivered by Rebecca Silva, Director of Nurs-

Next, Ms. Dietz updated the board on several items, including the Community Outreach Program. She explained that the program calls for a hospital nurse to conduct free screenings at the Sr. Citizen Center. The screenings include blood pressure, weight, medication review, pulse rate and a question & answer session. Dietz said the program has been well received. It is being conducted in cooperation with the Community Resource Cen-

Other items contained in Dietz's administrator's report included updates on the facility's Day Care and ongoing efforts to recruit a Nurse Practitioner to assist Dr. Jim Lucas and Dr. Lillian Perez.

The trustees then took up the

Lab identifies bees as "Africanized"

A sample of honey bees collected the at the site where an Eldorado man died after being swarmed on August 8, 2003, was determined this week to contain Africanized bees. The report, issued by the Texas Honey Bee I.D. Lab at Texs A & M Universty stated that the bee sample scored 0.9996 on a scale of 0 to 1.0.

The report explained that bees that score 0 to 0.49 are considered to be European Honey Bees while those scoring 0.50 to 0.89 are considered to be European Bees with evidence of Africanized Intogression. A score of 0.90 to 0.98 indicates bees taht are Africanized with evidence of introgression of European genes. Those bees scoring 0.99 and above are labeled as Africanized.

Africanized Honey Bees first began appearing in the area in the early 1990's with reports of bee swarms and bee attacks becomeing more and more prevalent.

On August 8, 2003, Bobby Daniels, 66, of Eldorado, was swarmed by bees while he clearing brush on a ranch in the Southern protion of Schleicher County. Investigators say that Daniels ran from the tractor in an attempt to reach his pickup. His body

was found some 400 yards away from the dozer.

The bee sample was collected by Sheriff David Doran and Fire Chief Jerry Jones. It was submitted to the Bee Lab by County Extension Agent Scott Edmonson.

The Texas Honey Bee I.D. Lab is located at Texas A & M University in College Station and is operated by the school's

department of Entomology. Daniels' death was the first in Schleicher County to be connected with a bee attack. Since that day, at least one other person has been hospitalized after an attack and numerous hives and swarms have been reported to authorities.

School board votes to slash budget

Tax rate increased to \$1.50 per \$100 valuation

After weeks of discussion, and numerous revisions of a proposed budget, the SCISD board of trustees met Monday evening, August 25, to face the inevitale, adoption of an official budget for fiscal year 2003-04 and the establishment of a tax rate sufficient to pay for it.

Ultimately the trustees did approve a \$4.6 million budget, but not without dissent. Trustees Eddie Albin and Kurtis Homer voted against the budget. The board also authorized a tax rate of \$1.50 per \$100 valuation, the aighest allowed by the State, but even that fell short of servicing the budget by some \$2,000. The tax rate also failed to receive unanimous support of the board with Albin and Homer again voting in opposition.

The move to adopt a budget and set a tax rate came only after a public hearing where two citizens appeared to speak to the issue. First, Leann Higgins inquired if the school district couldn't apply for "Robin Hood" funds. SCISD Supt. Mark Gesch replied that the school is no longer eligible for Robin Hood, or Chapter 41, funds due to declining enrollment. He explained that, in the past when enrollment numbers were higher, the district's wealth, or tax base, was distributed over a greater number of students. Now, with fewer children in school, the wealth is being spread among fewer kids, driving ratio up to the point that SCISD doesn't qualify. In recent years, the school received Chapter 41 funds from Crockett County, but no longer, Gesch explained.

Ms. Higgins also inquired about a field trip that Middle School children have traditionally taken to a water park. She said it was her understanding the trip would be cancelled this year due to increases in liability insurance rates. EMS Principal Kara Garlitz noted that she had heard the same "rumor" but explained that the trip is being can-

> Quail — Good production last year and a mild winter through most of the state provided a good spring breeding population, said Steve DeMaso, TPWD upland game bird program leader. Weather conditions were good for most of the spring, providing a good first hatch," he noted. "As summer has progressed, conditions have remained favorable in some areas of the state and conditions have declined in others. There is still a lot of time between now and opening day. Weather conditions during the hunting season will play a big role in hunting success. Statewide, the season should be above average. Specific areas that should be good for bobwhites are the Panhandle and southern Rolling Plains and South Texas. Other areas should see more bobwhites, but not the level of south Texas and the Rolling Plains. West Texas should provide good opportunities for scaled quail hunters."

Fall Turkey — Most of the state had good production for about the third year in a row, according to DeMaso. Fall hunters should see an abundance of jakes, as well as two and three-year-old birds. Statewide fall turkey season should be above average.
