

Trustees set bond price for new middle school

Last Thursday the 18th of April Schleicher County Board of Trustees of the School District unanimously voted to present before the voters a \$2,365,000 issue with election date set for Saturday the 18th of May.

The primary thrust of the bond issue itself is to provide funds for a new Middle School comprised of fourteen classrooms, an administration, library, science lab, resource room, multi-purpose area, rest rooms for student body as well as a teachers lounge, a computer center, and special education areas. The building is in a L shape configuration and consumes 22,000 square feet. Other aspects of the bond issue include the renovation of the existing auditorium area, reroofing as well as renovation of the heating and cooling as well as the electrical system in the elementary wing with basically a duplication of the elementary wing to be accomplished on the high school buildings. The renovation of the gymnasium area including roofing and insulation, the providing of easy accessibility to the buildings for the physically handicapped, and improved rest room and press box and concession stand at the football stadium as well as a atheletic facility for physical education which would possibly include a better weight room and dressing facility

Other funds that the administration and board members are looking at using in this summer renovation of the Schleicher County school district plant include \$200,000 in general funds that are presently undedicated, the liquidation of certain school properties such as recently acquired structures.

Editor's note (It was quoted last week in The Leader that Rosanna Sauer was to be the election Judge for this bond issue election. This was incorrect. The Election Judge is Bill Gentry and Rosanna Sauer is the second Election Judge.)

Mr. Guy Whitaker, Superintendent of the School District, sited six elements that necessitated the calling of this bond issue: a continued growth of the populus of Eldorado to extent that at present two temporary classrooms are being utilized to handle the overflow in the lower elementary classes, House Bill 72 and many of its regulations towards providing the proper academic atmosphere. A new regulation which cites a new kindergarten class requirement changes in ciriculum in reference to the way the 7th and 8th grade classes coinside with high school classes. The Middle School children attend classes for 45 minutes whereas the high school students attend for 55 minutes. The ten minutes lost in the scheduling

make scheduling of rooms virtually impossible. The teacher-student ratio which must be held at 22 students per instructor, and finally the social contact between Junior High and High School students which is less than condusive to a good learning environment.

The bond issue itself, should it pass, will increase the present tax rate by 13 cents per \$100 evaluation. An example is offered which follows: A house valued at \$30,000 will see an increase of \$39.00 per year in taxes. Ranchland will experience a 3% increase per acre. Row Crop deep soil will see a 9 cents jump and shallow soil farmland will increase by 5 cents per acre. The only other variable remaining in the taxpavers Homestead owner with frozen tax documents will experience no tax increase at all. The majority of the proposed tax increase will be carried by industry and royalty owners with the lion's share going to this bracket at 85%. Eight percent of the new proposed tax burden will be experienced by the land owners and seven percent by the home owners.




AT&T Communications has filed a reprice of its tariffs designed to more closely recover access and other costs for WATS and 800 Service and all private line services including Channel Services, Foreign Exchange (FX), DATAPHONE* Digital Service, and OCC Facilities.

Also proposed is the institution of a charge for Directory Assistance to begin to recover access costs incurred for such service and increases in rates for operator assisted AT&T Long Distance calls. The initial minute charge for all AT&T Long Distance calls and additional minute rates for AT&T Long Distance calls 51 miles or less are proposed for increases to reflect the access charges approved by the PUC for such calls.

The proposed new rates for all services would result in an increase in adjusted test period revenues of \$139 million or 12.7 percent.



A homestead exemption reduces the taxable value of your residence homestead. Various types of homestead exemptions are available in Texas and, if you qualify, they can lower your total property tax bill. Read on for details.

What Exemptions Are Available?

School districts offer a residence homestead exemption to all home-owners and additional exemptions to people who are disabled or over

65.
Counties offer homestead exemptions on their farm-to-market or flood control tax rates and may offer exemptions to the disabled and elderly.
Cities and other taxing units may offer exemptions for the disabled and elderly.
All taxing units offer an exemption for certain disabled veterans on one designated property.
Some taxing units offer an additional local-option percentage homestead exemption to resident homeowners.

If you received a residence homestead exemption on your present home in 1984, you will not need to apply again for 1985, unless the chief appraiser requires you to

to apply this year

Or, if you have never had a homestead exemption on your present home, you should file your original application in 1985. Apply for all exemptions to the county appraisal district at the address below. Forms are available from the appraisal office.

You should apply before May 1 for 1985 exemptions. While late applications for exemptions may be accepted in certain instances, you can fully protect your rights by applying before May 1.

YOUR PROPERTY TAXES

The Texas Property Tax Code provides a form of tax relief for farmers and ranchers. If you qualify, your agricultural land will be taxed on its productive value rather than its market value. Productivity valuation may lower the 1985 taxes on your agricultural or open-space land.

If your land has never received open-pace (1-d-1) valuation, or if your land has een receiving agricultural (1-d) valuation, ou must apply to the appraisal district ffice before May 1 this year to get tax elief for 1985.

If your land received open-space (1-d-1) aluation in 1984, you will not need to eapply for 1985 unless required by the hief appraiser. Remember, however, that he law requires annual applications for gricultural (1-d) valuation. For additional information, contact the appraisal district office at the address shown below:







hile proposals as to specific rates vary, it is expected that the requested rate schedule will furnish a 10.5 percent increase in the Company's unadjusted test year intrastate revenues or a 9.7% increase in test year revenues as adjusted for test year customer growth and annualization of test year rate increases. The rate application seeks an annual increase of \$323.9 million in revenues. All customers and classes of customers of Southwestern Bell Telephone Company within Texas will be affected by the proposed changes.

Most rates proposed for increase would ncrease by about 18.5 percent, including local exchange rates. However, there are some excet tions. For example, those customers residing in cities that will be reclassified into larger rate groups will experience local exchange rate increases greater than 18.5 percent. Also, the rate increases proposed for private line services in El Paso, due to a proposal to restructure such rates, are greater than 18.5 percent.

A complete copy of the new rate schedule is on file with the Public Utility Commission at Austin, Texas and with each affected incorporated municipality served by Southwestern Bell Telephone Company. The Commission staff has contended in the past that all rates are subject to change as a result of Southwestern Bell Telephone Company's rate application. This filing includes, but is not limited to, proposals to increase rates for local exchange service, intraLATA long distance, intra-LATA interexchange private line service (which includes foreign exchange service) and to decrease certain access service rates.


