

Republican ticket carries

Mayo cinches Commissioner's seat

The majority of Schleicher County's 1625 registered voters turned out strong for Tuesday's General Election. As was expected, President Reagan and Vice President Bush trounced the Democratic ticket of Mondale - Ferraro by 854 to 326. Independent candidate Lyndon LaRouche tallied six votes.

On the local level, Johnny Mayo, Jr. emerged victorious over write-in incumbent Jack Turner by 157 to 126 for the Precinct #1 County Commissioner's seat.

The U.S. Senate race saw Republican Phil Gramm, overpowering Democrat Lloyd Doggett by 761 to 394.

Congressman Tom Loeffler had no trouble carrying Schleicher County as he handily won over Democrat Joe Sullivan by 871 to 272.

Sheriff Orval Edmiston, running unopposed, takes on another term tallying 908 votes, as does County Tax Assessor-Collector Dorothy Evans who brought in 935. County Commissioner from Precinct #3, Prissy Paxton, unopposed took in 157 votes for her precinct.

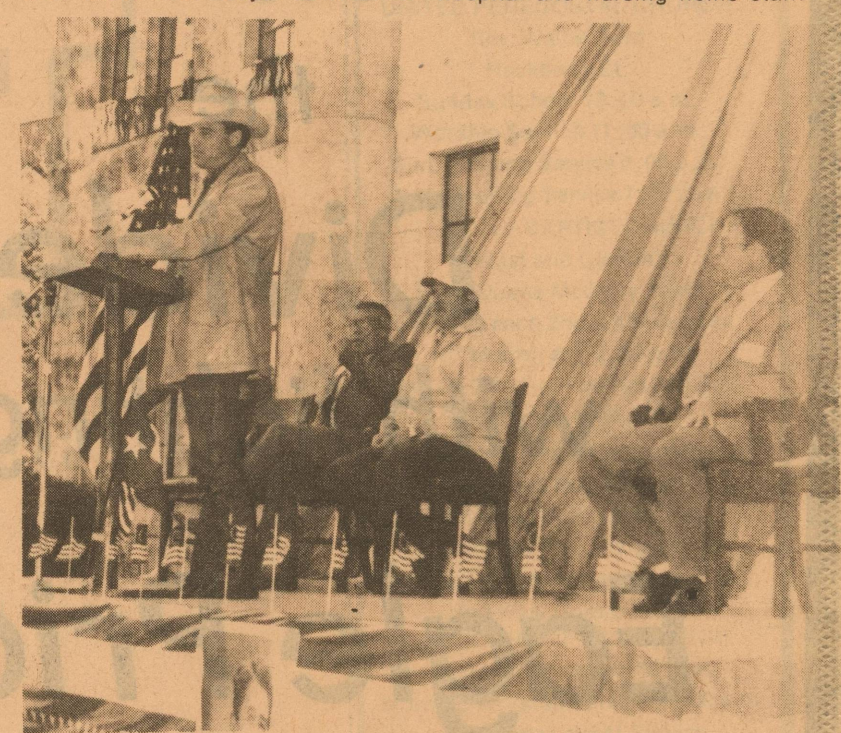
John Nikolauk of Eldorado was Master of Ceremonies and Floyd Butler welcomed everyone to the rally.

Blessitt brings message to Eldorado

Jimmy Belk first heard tapes of Arthur Blessitt in 1983. And later heard him speak in person at Decision '84 in Midland. Belk contacted Blessitt concerning speaking in Eldorado. As a result of Belk's interest and efforts, Arthur Blessitt will be conducting services Saturday, November 10th at 7 p.m. at the Eldorado football stadium. In case of inclement weather, the services will be held at the high school auditorium.

Arthur Blessitt's unusual method of spreading the Word of God (he carries a 12 ft. long, 6 ft. wide 90 pound cross) began on Christmas Day 1969 after having suffered four strokes in three years and with doctors telling him he needed surgery for an aneurysm in the brain he left the hospital and began his

now famous walk. He has carried the cross 21,000 miles across six continents: North America, Europe, Africa, Australia, Asia and South America and the Middle East.

Blessitt first gained prominence when in the '60's he was known as the "Minister of Sunset Strip" in Hollywood, Ca. where he began "His Place" a christian nightclub. As one of the leaders of the Jesus movement in the early 1970's, he was the originator of the first modern Jesus cheers, Jesus marches and Jesus stickers.

The 44 year old Mississippi native, who now calls Los Angeles home, has been featured on all the major networks and talk shows as well as being featured in People magazine, Time, Newsweek, A.P.

and U.P.I. Blessitt has carried the cross through war torn Lebanon, Israel, West Beirut and Poland sharing Jesus and his testimony along the way.

An author of ten books, Blessitt is also President of the Arthur Blessitt Street University, dedicated to training Christians around the world on how to better share the love of Jesus to people everywhere.

Blessitt will be visiting and speaking with people from noon - 4 p.m. Saturday on the courthouse lawn in Eldorado. He will also be speaking at the 11:00 a.m. service Sunday at the First Baptist Church in Eldorado.

The public is urged to come out and hear Arthur Blessitt as he gives his testimony.

Antlerless deer tags available Nov. 14th

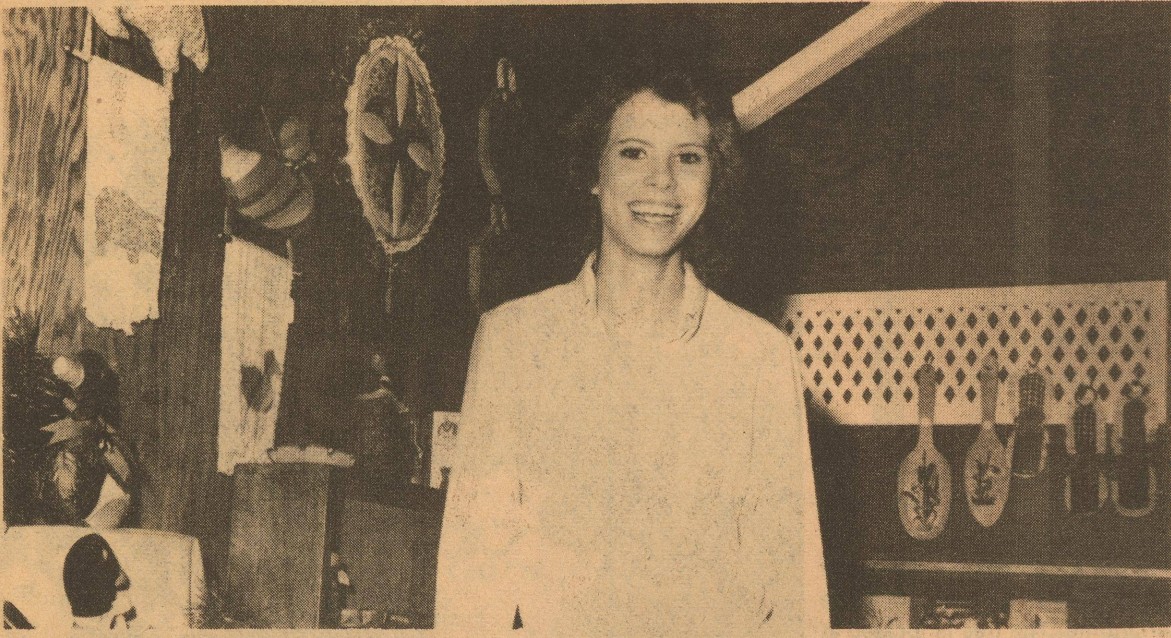
Texas Parks and Wildlife Department will issue special antlerless deer tags for Schleicher County on November 14, 1984 from 8:00 a.m. to 12 noon and 1:00 p.m. - 5:00 p.m. in the Schleicher County Courthouse. The special tags are required for any antlerless deer harvested in this county during the upcoming hunting season.

To qualify for tags, a landowner

must own or control acreage in Schleicher County.

After the opening of the hunting season, tags will only be available through Regional Offices located in Rockport, San Angelo, Tyler, Waco and the State Office in Austin. Tags will not be issued by local department personnel.

Landowners or their agents are urged to pick up tags on the scheduled issuance dates.

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Head lice problems here

Head lice are once again becoming a problem in many areas of Texas and are presenting a real nuisance in public schools and private day care centers.

The tiny pests suck blood, causing intense skin irritation and itching. Continuous scratching may cause skin abrasions that can lead to bacterial infection.

Head lice are tiny grayish, flattened, wingless insects, says Dr. Phil Hamman, entomologist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service Texas A&M University System. The adult female attaches 50-100 eggs, or nits, to the hair near the scalp. Eggs hatch in a week and lice start sucking blood in the scalp area.

Head lice spread easily by physical contact, such as children at play. Even under the best sanitary

conditions, infestations may occur among school children who are in close, daily contact, notes the entomologist.

Infested persons should see a physician, says Hamman. Medicated lotions or shampoos can be prescribed for effective control.

Personal hygiene and not using another person's comb, brush or hat are keys to prevent lice infestations. Shampooing with soap and water normally will not remove nits from hair since they are attached by a "cement", explains Hamman.

Dry cleaning or thorough laundering of clothing, towels and bedding in hot, soapy water (125 degrees F. or more for at least 10 minutes) kills lice and nits. Personal items (hats, caps, combs, rollers,

hairbrushes, wigs) can be heat sterilized.

Suspected infestations should be reported to a physician, local public health authorities or school officials so the source can be located. Prevention is the most important control of head lice, emphasizes Hamman.

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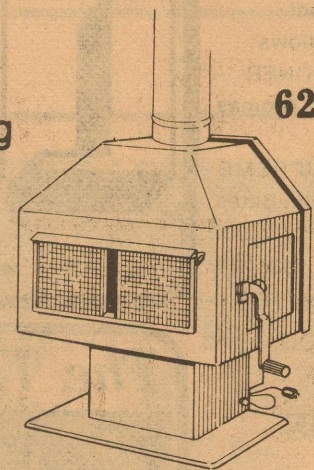
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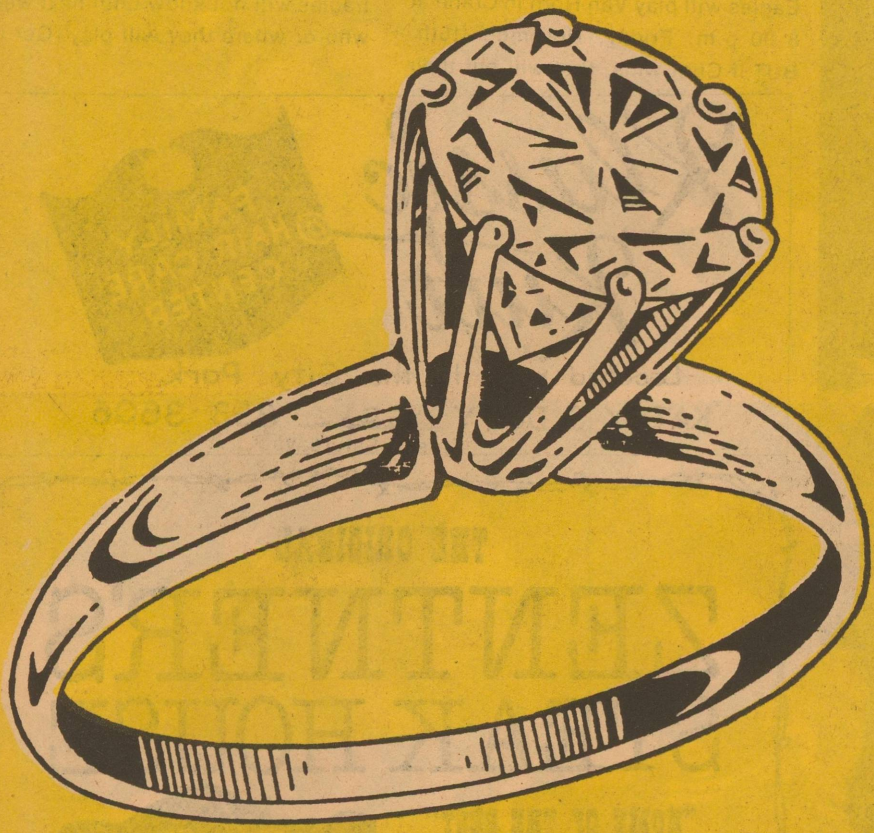
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McCamey falls Eagles 21 - 15

You could call it a "cliff-hanger" you could call it ball control, but whatever you call it, you have to admit it was one whale of a football game as the McCamey Badgers fell to the Eagles 21 - 15. The Badgers controled the ball more than the Eagles earning 13 first downs to Eldorado's 11. They rushed for a grand total of 50 times and passed 10. Eldorado rushed only 36 times but gained 224 yards, they passed only five times completing four for a total of 109 yards and an 80% completion ratio compared to the Badgers 40%.

The Badger attack on Eldorado turf, though plentiful, lacked the steam necessary to put it across when it was absolutely necessary.

Each team had the explosive big play ability and exhibited it. The first came early in the first quarter when Jay O'Harrow broke loose for a 53 yard dash on a sweep play. McCamey made their play for fame with only 1 second remaining before half-time as Lionel Viaza pulled in a 65 yard pass from quarterback Heath Stephens.

Eldorado's second score came when Jimmy Turbeville, working off of a reverse brought it sixteen yards across the line at 3:33 on the clock in the first quarter. Jay O'Harrow plowed over for the extra 2 more points. The Badgers hit the scoreboard for the first time when Lionel Viaza received a ten yard pass from Stephens. Eldorado's last score came with 2:14 remaining in the second quarter when Victor Gutierrez received a 37 yard pass from quarterback McAngus and returned to get the point after with a good field goal effort.

The entire last half remained scoreless but left the viewers waiting for the big effort one more time as the Eldorado defense dug

their heels in and stopped McCamey.

The Eagles have cinched the first representative slot for the district championship as they enter the

game against the Rangers Friday night at Greenwood but, a clear cut championship title remains in the wings until the Eagles prove they can stop the Greenwood offense who has gained nearly 700 yards in the last two games on the ground with the assistance of one of the best fullbacks in district. The Greenwood game could prove to be a real shoot out and one not to be missed.

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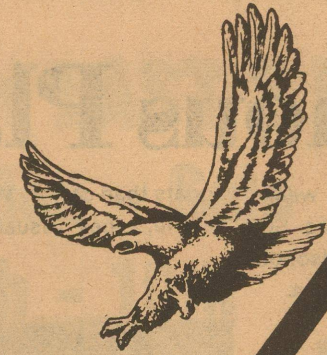
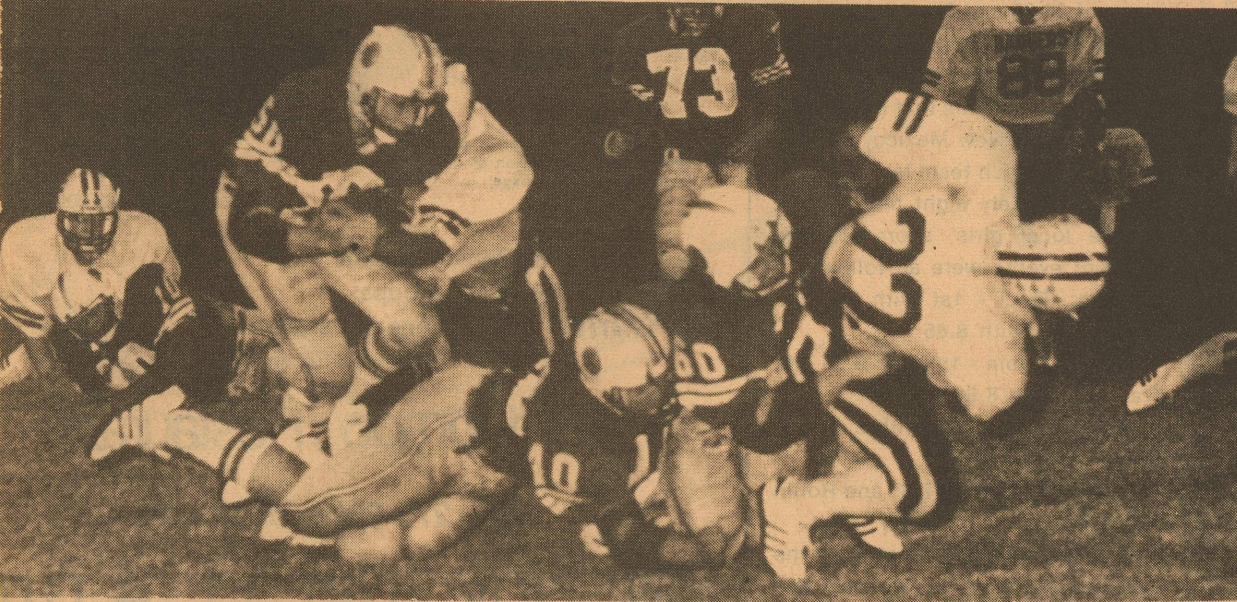
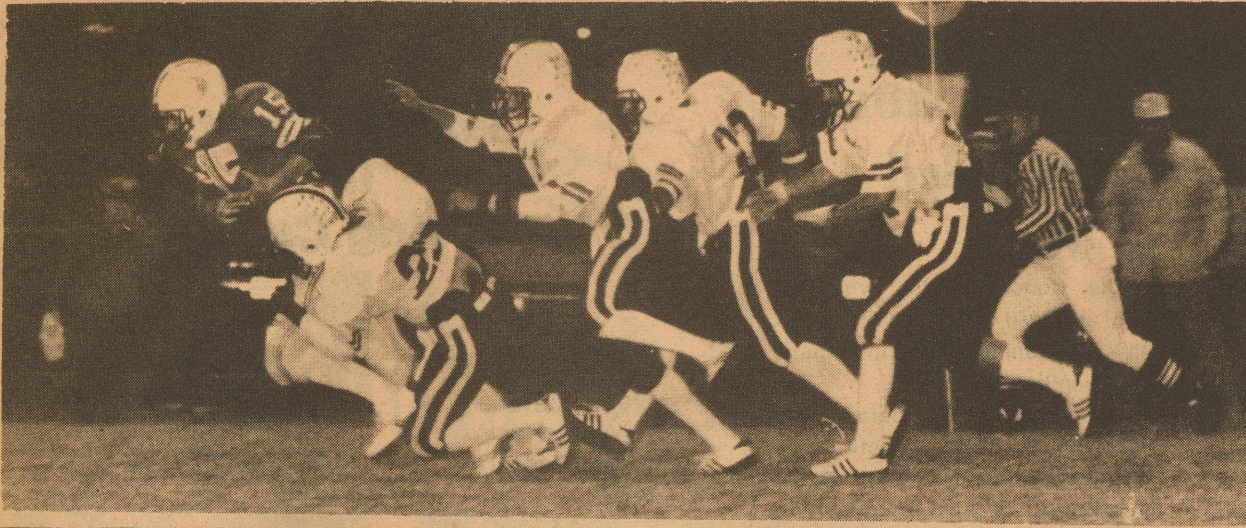

Poisonous Plant News

During the next several weeks, The Leader will be featuring SCS reports on the problem of poisonous plants and grasses in our area.

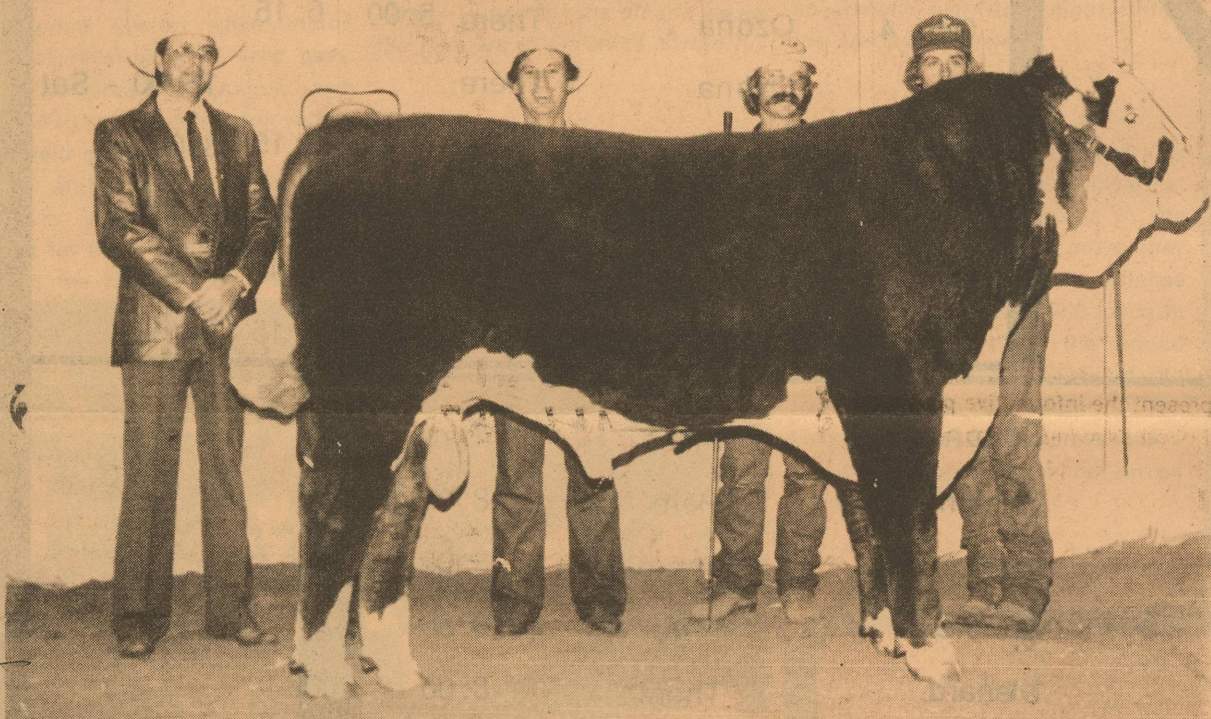

Senecio or groundsel is a many-stemmed, perennial composite that may reach 2 to 3 feet in height. It is evergreen on Texas ranges. Leaves are usually pinnately divided into three to seven segments. Stems and leaves of wooly groundsel have many hairs while those of threadleaf groundsel are nearly smooth. Yellow flowers are produced on the ends of the stems. Blooms are abundant following summer rains and may be produced throughout mild winters.

Senecio is poisonous to horses, sheep, and goats, but cattle are most commonly poisoned on Texas ranges. It is eaten throughout the year, but livestock losses are heaviest in late spring and summer. Senecio poisoning is especially insidious. Symptoms may not show up for weeks or months after the plant is eaten, and affected animals are likely to become aggressive and dangerous in the advanced stage. Groundsels tend to increase in ranges where sheep and goat numbers are declining.

Senecio plants compete well with native forage and are not controlled as well by proper range management as some other poisonous plants. If practical, herds should be moved to groundsel-free pastures. Adequate supplemental feeding when good native forage is low will help prevent poisoning. The plants are less toxic to sheep and

goats than cattle. When grazed by cattle, they usually control the groundsel plants and significantly reduce losses.

Bars: Traci - 1st with 9.0 and Robin - 3rd with 8.85

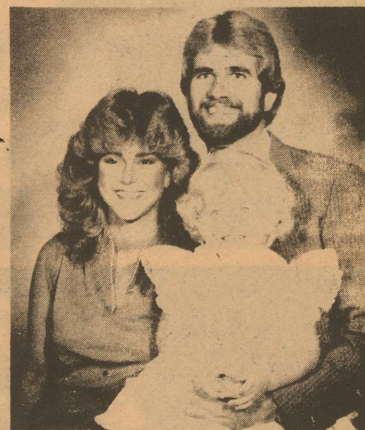
Floor: Robin - 1st with 9.20 and Traci 6th with 8.60.
