## Busy night at the school board meeting

Odds and Ends comprised a lot of the Schleicher County School Board's time at Monday night's meeting.

Minutes were approved as presented from the previous meeting.

Guest that attended was Mr. Dennis L. Utley on an updated grading system. The board is concerned that advanced kids tend not to enroll in difficult classes because it would lower their grade average. Mr. Utley and school board members are trying to revise a grading system to where the students will receive higher grades for their efforts in more advanced courses.

The Board authorized Mr. Guy Whitaker, Superintendent, to take bids on the houses to be moved from the school property.

Mr. Whitaker was also appointed to represent Schleicher County Independent School District's joint committee at Region 15 Education Service Center.

The Texas Association School Board Convention will be held in San Antonio later in September. This is an inservice training for school board members. Mr. Whitaker asked those who wish to attend the convention.

Bids will open Thursday, May 30, at 4:00p.m. for the renovation projects this summer. The projects consist of building handicapped ramps, adding exterior doors for the older buildings and repairing the roof on the vocational building and the roof on the gymnasium. A meeting will be called the following week to award or reject the bids.

The Board authorized Mr. Whitaker to reach an agreement with the TASB to localize the policy manuals. This will enable the school to receive periodic updates from the state as to the policies and procedures mandated by the state.

A change in clerks for election day was made. Betsy Jones will fill the new position.

The school board authorized Mr. Whitaker to make adjustments in math and science job description for Mr. Utley. They increased his salary in accordance with his responsibility. The board also accepted Randy Deax's resignation from Janitorial services.

Payments were made concerning maintenance bills and the board adjourned.

Among the many items attended to by the Schleicher County Commissioners Monday morning included the decision to have the County Attorney present an agreed judgement to Bill Freitag's attorney concerning the recent suit brought by Freitag against the County and various individuals on a country road dispute.

The Commissioners heard from Cliff Kammerdiener of Blue Cross Blue Shield Insurance. He informed the court of a 10% increase in cost for the county's coverage. Later in the meeting they also heard from the White and Zeach Insurance Agency of San Angelo who are representatives of Blue Cross Blue Shield. The Court discussed the matter but took no action.

Eldorado Firemen Jerry Jones and Richard Harris requested of the court that the county help with the purchase of three new radios for the fire trucks. The commissioners took no action after discussing the proposal.

Lynn Meador requested and received approval from the court on plats at the edge of the Edgefield Addition.

Floyd Butler and Edwin Jackson, Jr. requested permission from the court to build a 30' X 40' airplane hanger at the airport. The county would be responsible for building the pad and the two men would then

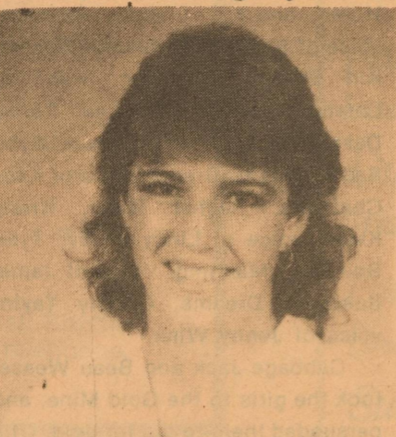
## Vote Saturday

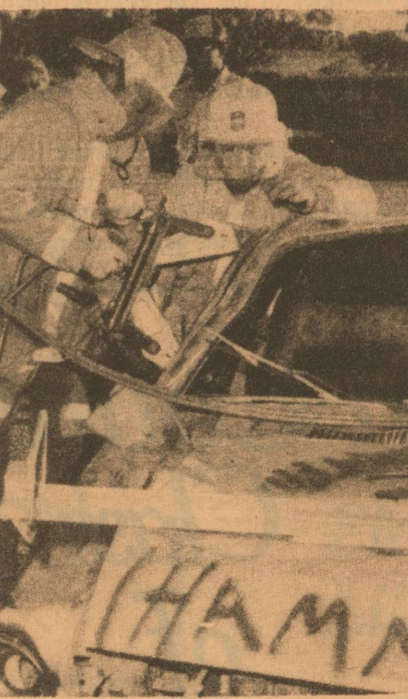

At the rate donations are coming in to the Jaws of Life fund it should be mid-January before this life-saving device is within useable range. A grand total of \$2,500. has been accumulated in the past 2.5 months since the conception of the fund. These monies have come from various civic groups and personal donations but it is beginning to appear that this will be the only funding for the \$7,900. lifesaving apparatus.

It is true to date that there has been no need for such sophisticated machinery in the recent past and there may appear to be no need for this equipment at the present but sheer odds limit us from saying this about the future. With the ever increasing traffic flow from Interstate 10 up Hwy. 277 to San Angelo and the freshly started bypass around Christoval we can rest assured that the traffic will ever increase, and with the ever increasing transient traffic our luck won't hold forever and eventually these two pieces of machinery will be mandatory to save someone's life. We all know that the majority of traffic accidents occur in our own neck of the woods and with the ever increasing transient flow the chances of our having a fender-bender if not a major accident increases daily.



These were some of the thoughts that surely ran through the minds of the firemen and EMT's present Tuesday night as Dwayne Lyons demonstrated the Hurst Jaws of Life Rescue Cutter at the Fire Hall during the regular scheduled meeting of the Volunteer Firemen. The machine, at the hands of the two expert representatives demolished a Pinto 2door in approximately 15 to 20 minutes, made it feasible to place a back board under a potential victim's back in the rear seat. The crowd seemed duly impressed with the two pieces of equipments' capability. Each fireman had his turn at testing the equipment as the instructors briefed each one on the machine's capabilities and as each fireman had his turn at the lever the EMT's absorbed their actions in pursuit of a way to get faster access to the hypothetical victim. When watching the machine in action thoughts surely come to mind of the frustrations felt by everyone at the scene of an accident when they find they have no access to render aid.

The people at the meeting are skilled in life saving methods. The two organizations are designed with this in mind and when faced with a machine that has the capability to allow them to perform their job more expediently which can mean life or death in the proper circumstance the longing to possess such a life saving tool is immense and yet in each of those hearts that were present there was the mixed emotion that stated that each individual wished deep inside that the tool never be used but that's the way firemen and emergency technicians think. We all wish we could have state of the art when it comes to saving a human life but Jaws of Life are becoming rather common in ever community across America and for one simple reason: none of us wants to see our loved ones pinned in a car suffering untold injuries and be given a primitive tool with which to render them medical service. We simply cannot place a price on the cost of a human life and we should all better hope that we have no need for the Jaws of Life before 1986.

# Hepatitis epidemic

The recent weeks in our Eldorado Independent School District have produced four confirmed cases of hepatitis in the kindergarten and elementary grades. I have been asked quite frequently questions concerning hepatitis and hope that a short statement concerning the etiology of the disease will eliminate much of the heresy and misinformation concerning hepatitis.

Hepatitis is a viral illness which attacks the liver. As you well know, viruses have no known treatment at this time; therefore, steroids, antibiotics, etc., produce no significant change in the course of the disease. Other viral diseases such as mononucleosis are treated only in symptomatic fashion as well; therefore, only symptomatic treatment for dehydration and associated GI problems are applicable.

Hepatitis is transmitted by oral/fecal contact. Unlike mononucleosis, usually called the "kissing disease" because of its oral to oral contact mode of transmission; hepatitis virus resides in the liver is only excreted from the human body in fecal material. We often hear of hepatitis outbreaks from eating raw oysters due to the fact an oyster bed may be near an urban area where hepatitis contaminated fecal material is dumped into the water from which the oyster filters the hepatitis virus which is subsequently ingested by humans resulting in hepatitis.

In school age children, the important limiting factors in transmission of hepatitis virus are proper bathroom habits. A small or microscopic fecal or viral particle may reside on a child's hand after which hand washing in the bathroom is not adequate whereupon the child transmits this virus to a doorknob. The virus can easily reside on inanimate objects without outside nutrition for lengthy periods of time. Another child may open the door with that same contaminated doorknob. This child subsequently places his hand to his face or mouth resulting in acquisition of the hepatitis virus and a fulminant case of hepatitis. The incubation time for hepatitis can be as long as 60 days, and a patient may be infectious for this sixty days prior to the onset of the blatant symptoms of the sclera icterus (yellow eyeballs), nausea, vomiting, dark color urine, and light colored stools. These symptoms should be watched for in small children. Let me repeat the following symptoms: Dark urine, light colored stools, nausea and vomiting, yellow eyeballs, or a yellow flushed skin.

At this point in time, I think we would be safe to say that we are indeed in the midst of a hepatitis epidemic. What can be done for the safety of your child? Immuglobulin G (IgG or Gammaglobulin as it is known) is given by injection hopefully to lessen the risk of hepatitis acquisition by your child. There is no scientific study where upon a finite number of people are exposed to hepatitis, half of which are subsequently given IgG, to note a statistical difference in acquisition of hepatitis by the non-immunized versus immunized group because

hepatitis virus is indeed lethal and can cause death. As this study is far too dangerous to pursue, clinical results on the efficacy of IgG injections are not available. There are, however, multiple clinical notations that Immuglobulin G probably does help in the prevention of the spread of Hepatitis and it is recommended that IgG be given to children who are in high risk exposure areas.

Who is in the high risk area? Anyone who has direct contact with any of the people who have diagnosed hepatitis need IgG immunization or anyone who has had direct contact with the bathrooms or areas with which the infected person has had direct contact should be immunized. These immunizations are given at my office without appointment and only the cost of the medication is involved. Please instruct your children that handwashing after bathroom activities is mandatory, and please know that everything is being done at the school to help eliminate this problem. However, hepatitis is a very difficult problem to control and the ultimate responsibility lies with your child's personal hygiene techniques. Please do not take the spread of this disease lightly. As mentioned previously in this article, this disease is not usually fatal, but can be.

## Reports from Washington



### Budget Issues Challenge Congress

In the next several weeks, the fiscal year 1986 budget debate, which thus far has been focused on the Senate, will move to center stage in the House of Representatives.

The Congress is faced with an urgent and imperative challenge: to reduce the unacceptably large federal budget deficits which threaten the viability of our economic recovery and expansion.

President Reagan, in his television address to the Nation last month, urged the American people to support a comprehensive effort to curb the federal government's profligate spending habits. The President stated that the continued success of his bipartisan recovery program, which has been responsible for the remarkable economic turnaround this country has experienced over the past four years, is dependent upon this effort to reduce spending for programs which are unnecessary, inappropriate, or no longer affordable.

The President also reaffirmed his commitment — which I fully support — to oppose efforts to raise your taxes in order to fund these spending programs which benefit selected groups rather than advancing the interests of our nation as a whole. It was in the spirit of shared sacrifice that the President appealed to the citizens of this country to consider reductions in a myriad of government programs that have grown and evolved over time to address virtually every problem that may have arisen over the years.

The President's agreement with the Senate leadership for deficit reductions totalling \$50 billion in this fiscal year and \$300 billion over the next three years through spending cuts rather than tax increases has set the appropriate framework for the budget debate. Every area of government spending is touched by this budget agreement, including spending for national defense, which unarguably remains one of the primary responsibilities of the federal government on behalf of its citizens.

If the Congress, with the support of the American people can operate in the spirit of shared sacrifice, it will be possible for us to move forward to remove the remaining obstacles to prosperity and opportunity in the years ahead.

As a member of the House Budget Committee, I intend to make every effort to ensure that this Congress makes significant progress in reducing budget deficits while adopting policies which are equitable, responsible and responsive to the legitimate needs of our Nation and of our citizens.

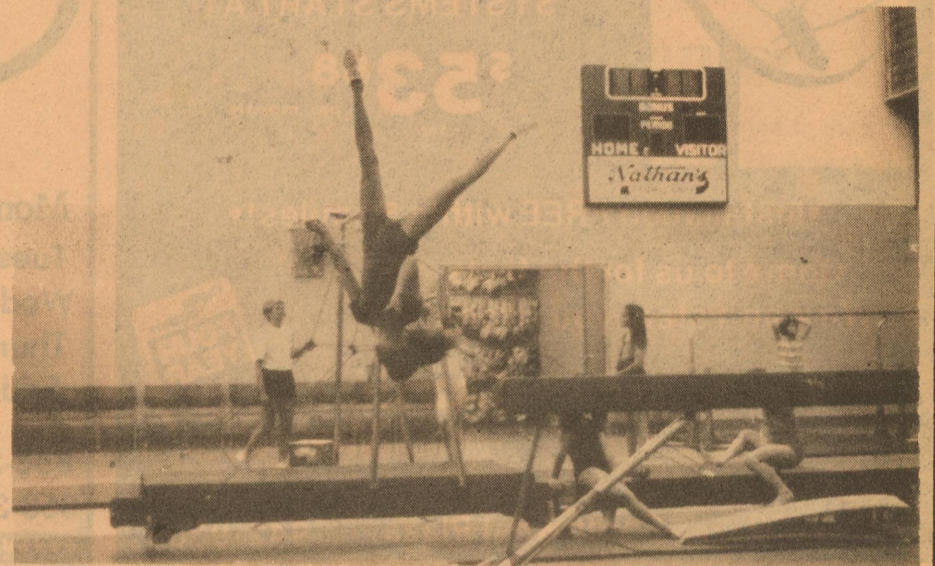
As Traci's mother stated, "I am so proud I could bust." She follows Traci to every meet and films her so when her Dad can't make it to the meets he can see Traci compete.

Justin, Traci's brother, thinks it's "neat", and stated that he was really proud of her.



Traci's goal is to be as good as Mary Lou or better!


