center to see if they are scheduled to work at the Halloween Carnival. If any member is not listed who wishes to work, contact the supervisors.

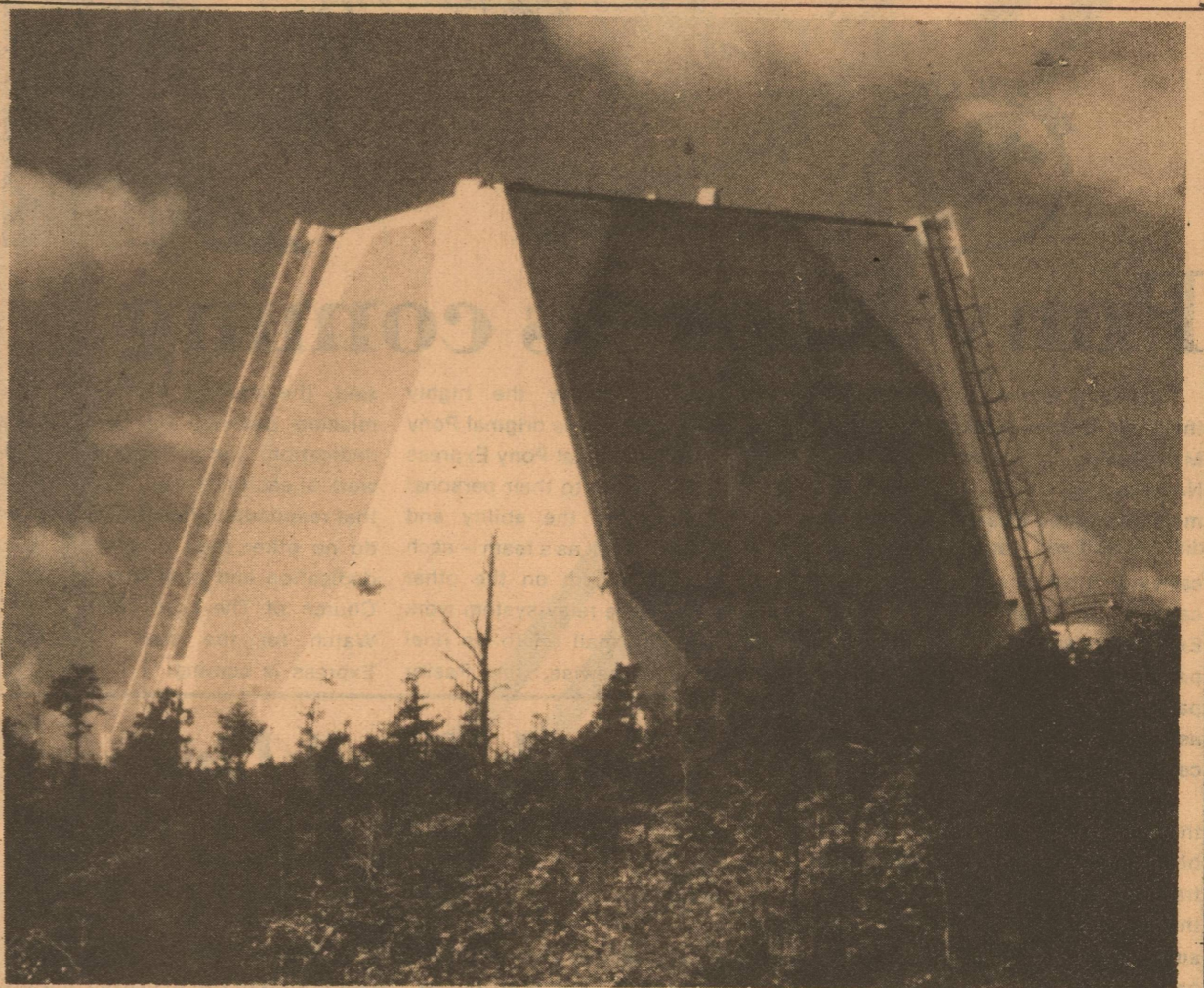

## PAVE PAWS ground breaking to culminate 2 1/2 year effort

With the sunset of next Tuesday, Eldorado can no longer be described as a sleepy, little West Texas town perched on the Divide. It will become unique for it will be the town nearest the site of Southwest PAVE PAWS Array Radar, one of four in the nation.

Next Tuesday will mark forever the welcoming of the future to Schleicher County with the PAVE PAWS ground breaking ceremony. The 10-story defense radar system will make a striking contrast to the broken country of the Divide, whose residents can point with pride when they pass by and see one of our nation's strongest guardians, the early warning defense system in action at our back door. The sheer visual impact of the structure will be an attention-getter for the nearest community, the massive size of the system denotes nothing but stability and security for the nation and the ground that the structure occupies.

The citizens of Schleicher County can hold their heads up high with a pride found only in true patriotism for our great nation. This pride can and will be shared with every county resident as we see the effect that being neighbors with some of our nation's highest technical achievements can bring forth.

Our population should increase somewhat with highly skilled technicians, the economy should be boosted, particularly through the

construction phase and the long term effect that PAVE PAWS will have on Eldorado and Schleicher County is only limited by our imagination and drive.

Attending the celebration will be Congressman Tom Loeffler, Senator John Tower and former Congressman O. C. Fisher. Military guests include; General Robert T. Following the bar-b-que, an exhibit will be on review at the Memorial Building. The exhibit has been prepared by Raytheon, general contractor for the PAVE PAWS installation.

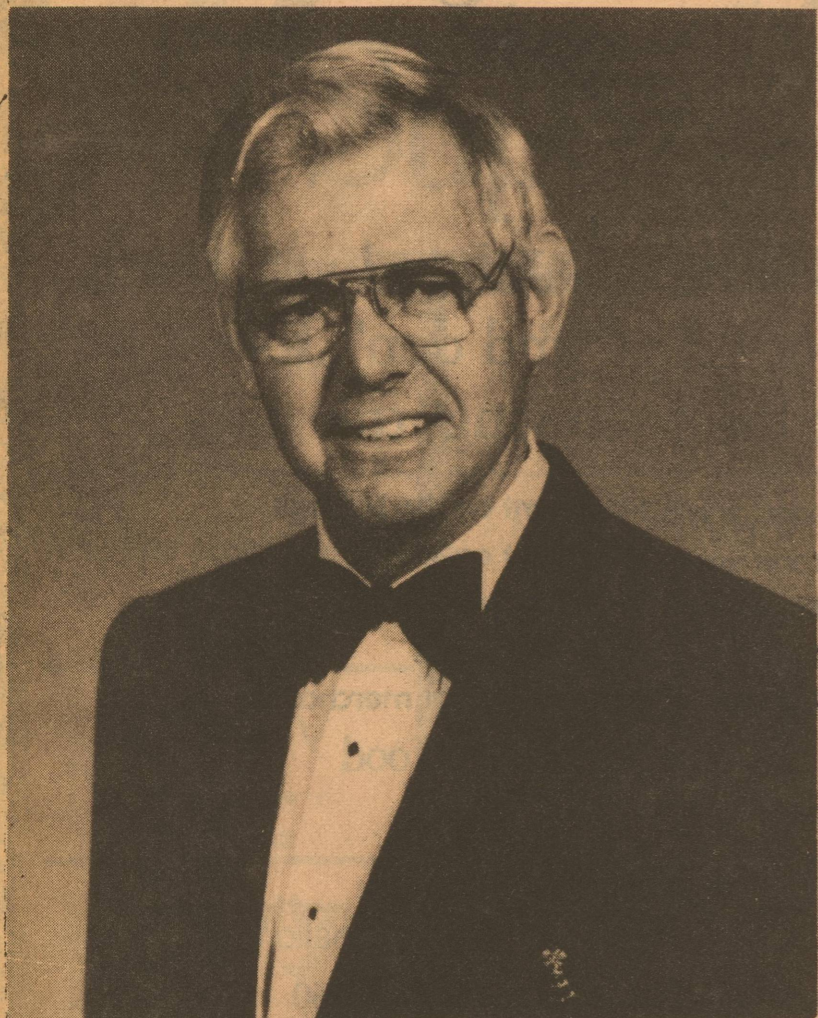

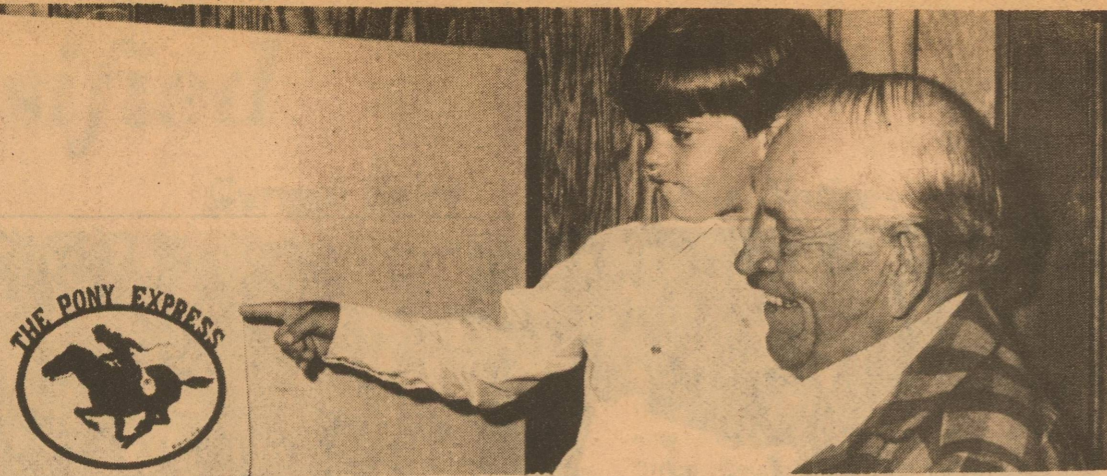

## Pony Express coming

The Pony Express is returning to the First United Methodist Church Membership in Eldorado, Sunday, November 4, 1984. Again, the members of the First United Methodist Church will become saddlebag carriers "trail bosses" and "route carriers" in their church's Pony Express stewardship campaign. The pastor, Fred Brown, said the campaign is based on the same concept as the Pony Express of more than a century ago -- teamwork.

Jim Martin, general manager of the campaign, said fourteen leaders of the church have been designated trail bosses -- eleven adults and three youths. The trail bosses will supervise the relaying of the saddlebags to each of the church's families on the Pony Express "run" routes.

The stewardship estimate campaign will be exciting and pleasurable. Each individual will estimate the amount he or she will be able to give to the church during the coming year. This decision is made in the privacy of their home with the Lord's help.

The Administrative Board chose the Pony Express theme because of

the example set by the highly dedicated riders of the original Pony Express. The Original Pony Express Riders, in addition to their personal commitment, had the ability and willingness to work as a team -- each rider was dependent on the other rider to make the relay system work and speed the mail on to its final destination. Likewise, the Pastor

### Truth Shall Live

Gal. 1 - 11. But I certify you, brethren, that the gospel which was preached of me is not after man.

12. For I neither received it of man neither was I taught it, but by the revelation of Jesus Christ.

15. But when it pleased God who separated me from my mother's womb, and called me by his grace.

16. To reveal his Son in me, that I might preach him among the heathen, immediately I conferred not with flesh and blood.

After Paul received the Holy Ghost the thoughts came to him that was from the Lord Jesus that taught him the things to say and gave him the anointing to write. After you receive the Holy Ghost you will understand the apostles writing. You don't have to have commentaries to understand or three or four translations of the bible.

I want to say a little in this writing about the Rosary which is a string of beads made of wood or metal. The rosary commonly used in the Roman Catholic church consists of a circle of fifty small beads, four large beads divide the small beads into equal sections. A pendant, composed of two large beads, three small ones, and a crucifix, hangs from the rosary. On the large beads is said the Lord's Prayer or our father. The small beads are for prayers to the Virgin Mary or the hail Mary. On the crucifix is said the apostles creed.

Prayer beads are of ancient origin first used by Buddhists. The Buddhists and Moslems make use of them in their prayers. Saint Dominic introduced their use to the

Roman Catholic Church. The rosary isn't a part of the Church of the Lord Jesus, it is a part of idol worship. All the Hail Mary's and all the beads you could hang on is not going to take you to heaven and the crucifix also. It is the one that hung on the cross "Jesus". You go through the rosary three times around and all the false worship and won't even consider being baptized in Jesus' name and receiving the Holy Ghost.

People put more thought on the cross than on the one that hung on it.

The people will go to the priest and confess their sins for him to get you forgiveness of them. Under the law the priest made the sacrifice for people's sins. But when Jesus died on the cross he became our high priest. We in this day just ask Jesus instead of a priest or preacher for the forgiveness of sin. The creed that is of the crucifix isn't in Jesus' name.

I know that most of the people that go to the Catholic Church here are Mexicans but we welcome you also to know Jesus as we know him. Folks if you don't come on to church and hear this truth you are the one that will be the loser. I'm doing what Jesus wants me to do. The calls and interest you have shown in the writing tells me that you care.

## WTU rates down some

West Texas Utilities Co. residential customers are paying slightly less than the state average for their electricity this fall, according to surveys reported by the Public Utility Commission of Texas.

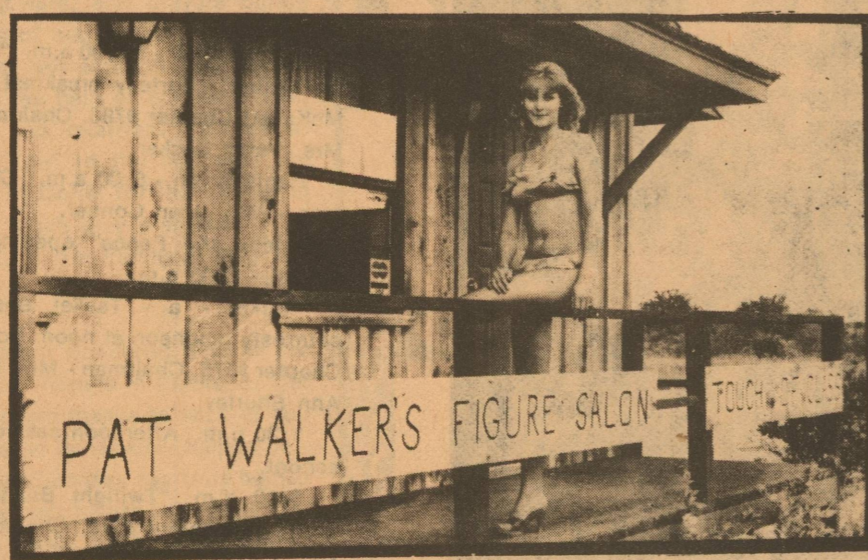
In September and October, WTU's standard residential rate for 1,000 kilowatt-hours was \$74.04, while the state average was over \$76, the PUC report shows. For 500 kilowatt-hours, WTU charged \$41, while the state average was \$40.41 in September and \$40.25 in October. Average monthly usage for WTU residential customers was 1,020 Kwh in September 1983 and 701 Kwh in October 1983.

The survey included 19 utilities, among which were 10 investor-owned companies. Highest rates in the state were those of El Paso Electric Co., which charged \$98.37 for 1,000 Kwh. Lowest rates reported were by the Lower Colorado River Authority, which charged \$53.09 for 1,000 Kwh.

WTU currently is awaiting the outcome of a rate case pending before the PUC. A settlement agreement presented to a PUC hearing examiner would raise WTU's base rates but lower the fuel cost recovery, resulting in only slight changes in the various rates now in effect. A final decision by the three PUC commissioners is expected in November.

Copies of the Department's investigation report, together with aerial photographs in the report's appendix, will become available on December 31, 1984 for inspection in the offices of the Texas Department of Water Resources in the Stephen F. Austin State Office Building, 1700 North Congress Avenue, Austin, Texas, and in the Department's district office at 204A West 5th Street, Odessa, Texas 79761.
