And it really gets interesting when you marry into a ready-made family. Not only are you on the spot with new wife and kids, but the See t.b. Page 5



# Four killed in Thursday collision


Just as the West Texas sun was beginning to make its' first sneaky fingers felt last Thursday morning two automobiles collided headon north of Eldorado.

Three members of a Sweetwater family and a San Angelo man were killed in the accident when the two cars hit headlight to headlight, an eight year old girl was saved due to "heads up" work by emergency personnel and an Eldorado physician.

Killed in the 5:42 a.m. crash were Johnny Garcia Cajas, 35, a Goodyear Tire Company test driver from San Angelo, and Margarito M. Martinez, 33, Martha Martinez, 35, his wife, and their 14-month old child, Donna Maria.

Maggie Martinez, who was riding in the auto's rear seat, was pulled from the wreckage after Schleicher County Volunteer Fire Department members cut the car's roof off with the county's new "Jaws of Life" tool. The rugged, scissor-like tool was invaluable

at the scene, as was Eldorado physician Dr. Benjamin Richard Respess, who happened onto the accident scene with his wife.

Dr. Respass administered aid to the actions to the local community. Martinez girl as well as to the fatally-injured but still alive Cajas until both could be transported to San Angelo.

Members of the Christoval EMS unit were first on the scene, followed closely by Schleicher and Tom Green Emergency Medical Technicians and law enforcement officers from both counties.

Dr. Respess drew respect from those on the scene. "He has a willingness not to wait for the patient to get to the emergency room, but to come to the scene where he's needed," Ray Ballew, local EMS technician reported.

## AIR FORCE SAYS

# **PAVE PAWS** testing set

The Air Force has announced that short duration testing is expected to begin June 19 on the Southeast face of the PAVE PAWS sea-launched ballistic missile (SLBM) detection and warning radar at Eldorado AFS, Texas.

The alignment and calibration work marks the first step in preparing the Southeast face for later full power testing. Similar testing of the companion Southwest face is expected to begin some time in July.

PAVE PAWS is "Phased Array" radar, whose being is steered electronically by computer rather than being directed by mechanically swinging antennae that shifts back and forth as traditional dish-shaped radars do.

With the experience gained from testing of similar systems in Massachusetts and California, plus computer tuning of the radar elements, officials expect to quickly complete the SE face adjustments, probably within a few days.

During the initial checkout, the radar will be operating at low power levels. Even when operating at full power, microwave energy levels beyond the Air Force station should register about one microwatt per square centimeter, and that is about 1,000 times lower Building this year. than current safety standards anywhere in the world.

As work proceeds on schedule, the Air Force expects to have the entire Southeast face ready for intermittent testing at full operational power next month.

"I rely on the quality performances of our small-town emergency crews. The fact that citizens in small towns realize the necessity for quality emergency equipment really saves some lives," Respess said.

"Many rural residents learn emergency skills to fill in a gap in the community and volunteer their time, while my performance is part of the routine," Dr. Respess added.

The Eldorado physician is also credited with helping save the live of an auto accident victim two years ago in San Angelo and at a plane crash site near Plano.

The Martinez girl was admitted to Shannon West Texas Memorial Hospital for treatment for an open fracture to the left leg and facial injuries.

Texas Highway Patrol Trooper Tommy Mathews said Cajas was enroute to San Angelo along with five other test cars when the 1986 Ford he was driving crossed the center stripe and collided headon with Martinez' 1979 Ford about 17 miles north of Eldorado.

No skid marks were found at the crash site and the two autos stopped only 18 inches apart after impact. Mrs. Martinez and Cajas were wearing seat belts, the DPS report indicated.

The Martinez family was reportedly enroute to Mexico via Hidalgo County to visit a sick relative.

# COMMERCIAL PRODUCTION POSSIBLE 'Bonnet' tarning talked

The Texas Agricultural Extension Service is working hard to tame Texas' most stately and beautiful wildflower, the bluebonnet.

If these efforts prove fruitful, the state flower of Texas may one day adorn yards and gardens rather than just the countryside in early spring.

The Extension Service is studying the bluebonnet with the hope that the flower will be able to be grown commercially, thanks to a special three-year \$30,000 grant by The Worthington Hotel in Fort Worth.

Through the grant, the Worthington Bluebonnet Development Program has been established in honor of the newly-named Worthington Bluebonnet, a rare pale blue selection recently segregated by Extension Service horticulturists Dr. Jerry Parsons and Dr. Don Wilkerson. The program will support more intensive investigations into the bluebonnet's germination, pollination and color variations.

"Our role is to continue studying the plant's germination characteristics," Parsons points out. "We hope to eventually unlock the secrets of the bluebonnet's blooming cycle to make commercial production of seeds for garden annuals both efficient and reliable."

Bluebonnet transplants are becoming more readily available at local nurseries, notes Parsons, but too many variables remain that hamper full production of the flower for home gardening.

"A lot of mystery still remains to the bluebonnet's blooming cycle," says Wilkerson. "One possibility is that of 'forcing' blooms at a designated time, similar to the blooming poinsettias at Christmas and lilies at Easter.

"We also have identified and segregated several new color selections, such as the lighter blue Worthington bluebonnet. We now have varieties that are pink, white and very dark blue," notes Parsons.

The horticulturists are hopeful that one day gardeners will be able to select, mix and match their favorite bluebonnet shapes, just as they do now with pansies, petunias and other annuals.


A big question regarding bluebonnets continues to be seed scarification and pollination. Since the seed coat is hard, most seeds are unproductive. In fact, commerciallyproduced seed currently have only a 30 to 40 percent germination rate, but Parsons is optimistic that this rate can be increased to as high as 90 percent through use of chemical abrasives.

"In many ways, the bluebonnet remains a mysterious flower, but we hope our efforts will unlock some of its secrets," says Wilkerson. "Since it is the state flower, we hope to make it available to all Texans so that they can enjoy it in their own yards and gardens rather than just in the wild."

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

Texas registrations of new imported cars improved 4.5 percent in April, ending a two month decline, but overall new car and truck registrations continue to fall, according to Gene Fondren, president of the Texas Automobile Dealers Association.

According to information supplied by the Detroit-based R.L. Polk Co., 12,919 new imported cars were registered in April 1986 while 12,351 new imported cars were registered during April 1985. During the first four months of 1986, almost 3.7 percent more new imported cars -- 55,536 -- were registered while 53,558 new



The General Motors Corp. recorded the greatest decline of the three largest domestic manufacturers. GM's new car registration in April were down 27.58 percent to 19,677 and the largest domestic carmaker saw its registrations off 17.24 percent to 84,761 during the first four months of this year.

**Registrations of new Fords** dropped almost 25 percent in April to 9,166. Texas had recorded year-to-date only 40,641 new Fords, which is 11.46 percent fewer than the number registered during the first four months of 1985.

The Chrysler Corp.'s April registrations in Texas were 4,489 while they totaled 5.667 in April 1985. Chrysler's yearto-date new car registrations in Texas dropped 9.13 percent from 1985 to 1986 to 19,828.

Eldorado area residents experiencing television signal interference that they believe is PAVE PAWS related should contact Air Force officials at Eldorado AFS, Texas.

Harold Emerson of the Air Force Electronic Systems Division says, "Special filters designed to eliminate the problem will be installed at no charge. The filters will be made available to residents whose antenna systems were operating before and during the radar construction."

Radar signal interference may be sending out a thin white line, flashing intermittently across the screen. Anyone whose television is showing similar symptoms can call Emerson at either 657-2409 or 657-7260. Arrangements will be made to fix the problem if it is determined to be radar related. All requests should be routed through Emerson.

The Eldorado-based PAVE PAWS radar, expected to become operational by May 1987, will warn of sea-launched ballistic missile attacks against the continental United States.



# From The Top of The Divide

Over the last few months I have had the opportunity to see some movies of recent vintage. They are movies about growing up. The kind of "coming of age" movies. They are relatively well made. The acting is professional, lighting and camera work adequate, attention to detail admirable. The thing that bothers me n. ' is the amount of profanity use by the child actors.

i am sure the author feels that this creates a realistic effect. For all I know, todays teens talk with an endless succession of profane words interspersed with some rather witty dialogue. I thought art should imitate life not recreate it verbatim!

I am not so much of a stuffed shirt that I have never used profanity. I did, in fact, use it considerably more fre-quent in my own youth. This does not mean that I want to have such words shouted at me over the television or movie TV filled with the prolific use

screen. What part does the use of profanity, may use those of such words, in an otherwise fine story, play in plot development or characterization.

I know that kids cuss. Why do it in a movie? Our movie makers ought to shoulder the responsibility they have to present the ideal as well as the real. I am sure there must be some interesting kid some where who can express himself or herself without using vulgar language. If there is no such kid then we are all to blame not just the movie makers.

Maybe the movie makers kids talk using these words. I know my children don't use them in my presence, although they may use them when I am not around. But that is just what I mean. There are probably a few times and places when a well spoken profane word can, in one stroke, express a whole range of emotions. My fear is that our children, raised on movies and

words so frequently that such words will become accepted language. If that happens then such words will lose their pejorative punch.

The only value that these words have is to express moments of emotional stress that any longer oration would defuse.

I think we Americans have become a litle tto casual in our speech and we are letting our literati do the same to our entertainment. In the barracks such language may have its place but not on the silver screen.....


